1836

Province of South Australia proclaimed on 28 December. Adelaide established shortly after.

1874

University of Adelaide

The University of Adelaide is established – the third oldest university in Australia.

1907

South Pole expedition

The University of Adelaide professor, Sir Douglas Mawson, becomes one of the first people to reach the South Magnetic Pole.

1960

Adelaide Festival

The first Adelaide Festival of Arts is held, a movement that would set Adelaide on the path to becoming the Festival State by both name and reputation.

1991

First female governor

Dame Roma Mitchell becomes Governor of SA – the first woman to hold this position in any Australian state.

2021

Australia's most liveable

Adelaide is crowned Australia's most liveable city according to The Economist Intelligence Unit's Global Liveability Index.

1945

Penicillin's home

Sir Howard Florey (from The University of Adelaide), Sir Ernst Chain and Sir Alexander Fleming receive the Nobel Prize for developing antibiotic penicillin.

1975

Gay rights

South Australia is the first jurisdiction in Australia to decriminalise male homosexuality.

2018

Space

Adelaide is chosen as the headquarters for the Australian Space Agency.

SUSTAINABLE STATE

Since 1977, when the container deposit scheme was introduced, South Australia has emerged as a leader in sustainability within the country. The state has built on this reputation with the 2021 ban on single-use plastics and its commitment to renewable energy sources, green innovations, and the construction of new wind farms. South Australia aims to achieve 100% net renewables by 2030, and its waste diversion efforts equate to planting 2 million trees or removing 302,000 cars from roads each year.

As well as its focus on sustainability, South Australia is a global leader in artificial intelligence and data analytics. These world-class capabilities have been instrumental in developing innovative solutions to address environmental challenges and support the state's ambitious renewable energy goals.



LIVING ON KAURNA LAND

The Adelaide Plains are the traditional lands of the Kurna people. With over 30 language groups there is a rich and diverse culture of First Nations people in South Australia.

The Government of South Australia was the first to commit to a state-based implementation of the Uluru Statement from the Heart - Voice, Treaty and Truth. This commitment starts with the South Australian First Nations Voice to Parliament.

Kurna heritage is recognised and celebrated through placenames with all 29 Adelaide city Park Lands and squares featuring Kurna names.

The Circle is South Australia's First Nations Entrepreneur Hub. You'll find a physical space at Lot 14 on North Terrace, but importantly The Circle connects First Nations businesses across the State to build capacity, capability and for businesses to thrive. This important network supports innovation, entrepreneurship and employment in South Australia.

WHAT'S ON IN ADELAIDE

SPRING

Spring in Adelaide is a vibrant season, with the city's streets and parks bathed in a deep purple as jacarandas come into full bloom. Visitors should not miss the OzAsia Festival, Australia's leading contemporary Asian arts event, which showcases a smorgasbord of performances, exhibitions, and workshops.

Locals take advantage of the pleasant weather to explore outdoor attractions, such as the stunning Mount Lofty Botanic Garden. Gardening enthusiasts visit the Adelaide Botanic Garden for inspiration and attend the Gilles Street Market to support local artisans and producers. On spring evenings, you'll often find locals unwinding at rooftop bars like 2KW and Söl Rooftop, marvelling at the cityscape while savouring local food and wines. The season culminates with the annual Christmas Pageant, the largest single-day parade in the southern hemisphere, signalling the beginning of the festive period.

Locals often immerse themselves in local sports events, such as football matches at the Adelaide Oval, joining the lively atmosphere with friends and family. Community-based events, such as farmers' markets, become weekend destinations for residents, who gather to support local producers and artisans. 





A hub of creativity with a passionate community along with trendy studio apartments and innovative warehouse style markets draw

in young professionals, artists and creatives. **Fact** The Thebarton Theatre, a renowned historic venue in the heart of Adelaide's west, has hosted many legendary musicians including David Bowie, Nirvana, and Arctic Monkeys.
