#### **Board Notes**

This was the first in-person board meeting since March 2020, and board members were delighted to be in the same room. The board addressed a variety of issues.

We have received several inquiries from people who wish to make donations to the Library through the Library website. Many other nonprofit organizations offer that capability. Office Manager Jen Dixon will explore the steps that need to be taken to make that possible, and will report at the next meeting.

Board members discussed when more in-person events may be feasible, given Covid. Everyone agreed that there will be no Fall Festival this September. NW Author Dana Haynes is scheduled to speak on Saturday, September 11. All agreed that it is prudent to schedule his talk as a Facebook LIVE presentation.

There was discussion about when to schedule a Membership Meeting. The prospects for an indoor meeting in September are not good. Instead the board discussed having an outdoor Membership Meeting on September 1st. The focus of the meeting would be to give Members a chance to socialize and reconnect. There would not be a formal speaker. Les Shirley Park was suggested as a possible venue.

The board discussed surveying our members and patrons regarding our book and DVD collections to gauge their satisfaction with our offerings, to see what genres and authors they especially like, and to ask if there are any genres or authors they might like us to think about adding.

Claire Landrum suggested we consider doing away with overdue fines. Research has suggested that fines discourage Library use, and that the lack of fines has not resulted in the failure to return books. Multnomah County Library has done away with fines, as have other public libraries. Board members will look into this issue further and will discuss it more fully at the next meeting. In the meantime, we will not

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#### WOHR Library Lecture Series

Join us Wednesday, August 11th at 7:00 p.m. on Facebook Live @Friends of Haystack for the World of Haystack Rock Library Lecture Series. Dr. Selina S. Heppell will be presenting "What Can Citizen Science Tell Us About Puffin Declines and North Pacific Climate Change?"

Dr. Heppell is a seabird watcher and fisheries scientist. She will review the available science on tufted puffin declines, including data collected by citizen scientists. Dr. Heppell will provide information from NOAA's Integrated Ecosystem Assessment to review these impacts and their possible links to puffin declines.

Dr. Selina Heppell is a Professor of Fisheries and Ecology and Head of the Department of Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation



Sciences at Oregon State University. She is a strong proponent of citizen science and active engagement of the public in marine science and conservation.



#### Cannon Beach Reads Aug 18

The book that will be discussed, via Zoom, on Wednesday, August 18, will be Pilgrim on the Great Bird Continent: The Importance of Everything and Other Lessons from Darwin's Lost Notebooks, by Lyanda Lynn Haupt.

Haupt examines the notebooks Charles Darwin kept during his five -year voyage aboard the Beagle from 1831 to 1836. Focusing on Darwin's *Ornithological Notes*, she traces Darwin's evolution from an inexperienced young student to an accomplished naturalist, while at the same time discussing her own



experiences with nature. The result is what one critic has described as "the strong writer-reader bond that typifies good nature writing."

Lyanda Lynn Haupt is an author, naturalist, and speaker who is part of the movement to connect people with nature in their everyday lives. Her other books include Mozart's Starling, Rare Encounters with Ordinary Birds, and The Urban Bestiary: Encountering the Everyday Wild.

Kathleen Bell will lead the discussion, which will take place via Zoom, on Wednesday, August 18, beginning at 7 p.m. Cannon Beach Reads plans to continue to meet via Zoom on the third Wednesday of each month at 7 p.m. until vaccination levels rise and the current surge in Covid cases declines.

#### **NW Authors Series Returns Sept 11**

The 2021-2022 NW Authors Speaker Series will kick off on Saturday, September 11<sup>th</sup> at 2 p.m. Join us on Facebook Live with Portland author Dana Haynes, who will discuss his electrifying international crime thrillers. His latest work,



"Sirocco", is the sequel to the best-selling "St. Nicholas Salvage & Wrecking" and continues to follow bounty hunters Michael Finnigan, a former New York City cop, and Katalin Fiero Dahar, a former Spanish assassin, as they operate in the shadowy underworld hunting the worst of the worst. This program is the first of an impressive lineup of talented authors planned for 2021-22.

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#### **Looking for a Good Mystery?**

If you're in the mood for a mystery, why not turn to the classics? Mystery novels by Agatha Christie, Dorothy Sayers, and Josephine Tey not only offer satisfying plots and intriguing characters, they also provide a window on an earlier world.

Dame Agatha Christie wrote 66 novels and fourteen short story collections, two billion copies of which have been sold in countless languages. From her first published novel *The Mysterious Affair at Styles* in 1920 to *Postern of Fate* in 1973, Christie wove intricate and surprising plots around her often quirky detectives. In addition to the brilliant but egotistical and fussy Hercule Poirot, and the shrewd, intelligent spinster, Jane Marple, Christie created the intrepid sleuthing couple Tommy and Tuppence Beresford, the mysterious detective Harley Quin, and the gentle retired civil servant, Parker Payne, who regarded himself as a detective of the heart.

Dorothy Sayers is perhaps best known for her urbane, sophisticated detective, Lord Peter Wimsey. In a series of novels and short stories, Sayers portrays Wimsey as a breezy dilettante and man-about-town who enjoys solving mysteries in order to fend off boredom. Set in Britain between the two world wars, Sayers's novels provide a commentary on British society by examining the British class system; the disruptions caused by WWI for individuals and society; and the limitations faced by women seeking to break out of traditional roles.

Scottish author Elizabeth MacKintosh adopted the pen name Josephine Tey, which was her great great grandmother's name. Writing from the 1920's to the 1950's, Tey rejected the formula of amateur sleuths and bodies discovered in British manor houses. Her detective was one of the first to be a Scotland Yard detective rather than a talented amateur. Inspector Alan Banks ap-

pears in six Tey novels, in which he solves murders, investigates suicides, pursues unsavory characters, and even resolves questions about a four-hundred year old royal crime. Tey's novel, *Daughter of Time* was selected as the greatest crime novel of all time by the British Crime Writers Association.

So next time you're looking for a mystery, consider stepping back in time and discover why, after all these years, Christie, Sayers and Tey still have a lot to offer.
