Board Notes

The first order of business for the May board meeting was to welcome new board members Melodie Chenevert and Caroline Godderz.

The Library's fiscal year runs from May 1 to April 30, and treasurer Karen French reviewed the year's financial results, which, thanks to generous donations and frugal expenditures, showed the Library was able to break even.

Jen Dixon, in her Office Manager's Report, noted that use of eBooks continues to grow, and that use of InterLibrary Loan Service is also growing. Jen reported that there are quite a few books that are missing but have not been marked lost in the system. This creates confusion since patrons don't realize they are unavailable. Jen will now mark the books as 'lost' in the system.

Claire Landrum reported that more people are taking advantage of Limited Browsing. Because the county threat level keeps changing, and will continue to change in the near future, board members decided not to make any changes to the schedule at this time. The small size of the Book Sale Room limits browsing, so additional sale books are displayed on a cart and table outside the Sale Room.

Phyllis Bernt has begun a short article in the Library's monthly newsletter featuring mystery writers that patrons may have forgotten or may not be aware of.

Ken Quarles has agreed to expand the enclosure around the trash can to include the recycling bin behind the building. He will also enclose the bottom half of the back porch, from the railing to the floor.

The board members agreed that there won't be any children's programming this summer. Prior to the pandemic, a membership committee made up of Jen, Mary Kerwin, Wanda Meyer-Price, and Lynne Murray, developed a list of recommended actions. The board will revisit the list to see what actions are now possible.

The library's NW Authors Series programming is taking a break for the summer! Thank you to all the viewers who helped support our first virtual season. The series will resume in September 2021. 

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Looking for a Good Mystery? ³

Af you enjoy British mysteries with absorbing plots, well developed characters, and an engaging main detective, consider books by P.D. James, Martha Grimes, and Elizabeth George.

Reviewers of P.D. James's novels call her the 'queen of crime fiction' and find that she wasn't just an author of mysteries, but a great writer by any literary measure. James's detective, Adam Dalgliesh, is a poet as well as a detective commander, who pursues mur-

derers in country manors, hospitals, courts of law, crime laboratories, and colleges. P.D. James's experiences as a bureaucrat and politician make her plots and characters realistic and believable.

The titles of Martha Grimes's novels are all names of British pubs, which help form the backdrop of each novel. Her detective, Scotland Yard Inspector Richard Jury, is handsome, sensitive, and surprisingly unlucky in his personal life. He is helped in his efforts to solve cases by Sargeant Wiggins, an amus-

ing hypochondriac, and by the eccentric inhabitants of the Village of Long Piddleton, especially Melrose Plant, a British Earl who has given up his title and whiles away the time by helping Jury and by plaguing his annoying, snobbish Aunt Agatha.

Many readers of American writer Elizabeth George's novels assume she is British because of how accurately she portrays British life. Her detective, Inspector Thomas Lynley, is a British Earl who has chosen to pursue a career with Scotland Yard. He is assisted by his ag-



gressively working class sargeant, Barbara Havers, as well as by his longtime forensic pathologist friend Simon St. James. Lynley and Havers deal with problems in their personal lives as they solve challenging, psychologically realistic cases.

Cannon Beach Reads June 16

The book that will be discussed, via Zoom, on Wednesday, June 16, will be *Brave New World* and *Brave New World Revisited*, by Aldous Huxley.

Considered Huxley's masterpiece, *Brave New World* presents a futuristic view of World State, a technologically advanced country in which people are bred through artificial wombs, indoctrinated to accept an authoritarian government, and kept drugged on Soma, a drug designed to keep them "happy" and therefore willing to accept the status quo.

Huxley, writing in 1931, feared the impact of reproductive technology, psychological manipulation, mass production, consumerism, and pharmaceuticals on the social order and on individuals. Thirty years later, in the essays titled *Brave New World Revisited*, he asks how accurate his prophetic vision has been.



Aldous Huxley was a British author and philosopher who wrote 50 books of fiction and nonfiction, as well as essays, poetry, and screenplays. He moved to the United States in 1937, where he wrote Hollywood screenplays, lectured at MIT, became more deeply involved with Eastern religion, and wrote a number of novels. He was nominated for the Nobel Prize in Literature nine times and received the Award of Merit from the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Brave New World was ranked No. 5 by Modern Library on its list of 100 best English-language novels of the twentieth century. It's topic and themes remain relevant in the twenty-first century as well.

Arthur Broten will lead the discussion, which will take place via Zoom, on Wednesday, June 16, beginning at 7 p.m. Cannon Beach Reads plans to meet via Zoom on the third Wednesday of each month at 7 p.m. until in-person meetings are possible again. (hopefully soon). New members are always welcome.
