

PUNTA GORDA/ENGLEWOOD BEACH FACT SHEET @RealPureFlorida #BestSideOutside

Description: Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach in the Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast is a collection of 10 charming coastal communities and four barrier islands clustered around the state's second-largest harbor. As Florida's premier eco-tourism destination, the area is known for its unspoiled beauty and is an outdoor enthusiast's haven. Eight hundred thirty miles of shoreline defines this expansive estuary-based escape which includes more than a dozen miles of sandy beaches and nearly 200 miles of the Charlotte Harbor Blueway Trails. Charlotte Harbor offers undeveloped vistas where 84 percent of the shoreline is protected preserve. Activities and festivals make year-round use of this beautiful setting and encourage families, couples, groups, and individuals to relax and explore.

Location: The Charlotte Harbor Gulf Islands Coast is nestled along Florida's Southwest Gulf coast, about 50 miles south of Sarasota and 30 miles north of Fort Myers. The area is served by five airports for travel convenience: The Punta Gorda Airport (PDG) with private and charter air service through Allegiant Air, Sarasota-Bradenton International Airport (SRQ), Southwest Florida International Airport, Ft. Myers, (RSW), St. Petersburg-Clearwater International Airport (PIE) and Tampa International Airport (TIA).

The entire area is also reachable via U.S. Highway 41 or Interstate 75 exits, both major northsouth arteries in Florida.

<u>Recreation</u>: The natural setting invites exploration

- More than a dozen miles of sandy beaches for strolling, swimming, jogging, and birding
- Nearly 200 miles of Charlotte Harbor Blueway Trails for kayaking and canoeing; local outfitters can supply all gear and guides
- Birding with more than 330 species recorded by the Peace River Audubon Society,

- Fishing: 830 miles of shoreline, two dozen marinas, and boat ramps give visitors access to the Gulf of Mexico, Charlotte Harbor, and the Peace and Myakka rivers for some of Florida's most diverse salt- and fresh-water fishing.
- Golf: Year-round golf on 20 courses ranging from executive to championship level, each with scenic vistas and spectacular landscapes.
- Hiking and bicycling trails, running tracks, tennis courts, and more can be found among over 70 parks scattered throughout Charlotte County.

<u>The Beaches</u>: The beaches include four barrier islands and two state park beaches. Easily accessible, yet quiet and remote enough to attract abundant birds, dolphins, sea turtles, and other wildlife, they are a local treasure. There are no big crowds here, just plenty of sand lapped by gentle waves from the Gulf of Mexico and decorated with colorful shells.

Natural Appeal: Nearly 84 percent of the Charlotte Harbor shoreline is protected from development providing vistas with broad appeal. With more than 70 parks, preserves, and recreational areas – including four state parks – the Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast encourages inland exploration, as well as waterfront strolling. Nature enthusiasts will want to hike and bike along park paths for expectant encounters with birds of almost every feather including red-cockaded woodpeckers, Osceola turkeys, swallow-tailed kites, ospreys, roseate spoonbills, and the seasonal white pelicans. Diverse local wildlife viewing by land and by sea includes gopher tortoises, otters, dolphins, and manatees. Several area environmental centers offer guided tours and educational programs.

<u>**Climate:**</u> The area rises only 5 to 25 feet above sea level, which equates to a sub-tropical climate where the temperature in both summer and winter are tempered by the gentle breezes of the Gulf of Mexico. Mild winters, from January to March, draw many visitors from colder climes.

Communities: The Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast ranges from Englewood on the northwest side of Charlotte Harbor to Punta Gorda on the south. Four barrier islands along the Gulf of Mexico include quaint and charming Boca Grande, secluded Don Pedro Island, accessible-only-by-ferry Palm Island, and alluring Little Gasparilla Island. An artsy and cultural personality distinguishes Punta Gorda, Englewood Beach, Placida, and areas of Port Charlotte. Surrounded by nature and water, the picturesque fishing communities of El Jobean, Manasota Key, Cape Haze, and Placida beckon in the soft, warm Gulf winds. Babcock Ranch, America's first solar-powered town, welcomed its first residents in January 2018.

Accommodations: Whether visitors come to Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach for fishing, kayaking, golfing, the beaches, shopping, or just plain relaxing, there are accommodations for every taste and budget. From waterfront resorts to cozy vacation villas and hotels and motels to rental condominiums and homes, the range of accommodations runs the gamut from budget to luxury. And, with many visitors opting to take their recreational vehicles on the road, warm and friendly RV parks and campgrounds await.

Dining: Favorite eateries include a waterfront ambiance with an ever-growing selection of chefowned and fine dining restaurants complementing elegant steakhouses, ethnic cuisine, and cozy bistros. Of special note, the selection of restaurants and pubs offering entertainment ranging from jazz to reggae to country and everything in between makes dining out in Charlotte Harbor & the Gulf Islands a cultural experience.

Shopping: Fishermen's Village (<u>www.fishville.com</u>), a waterfront mall, resort, and marina in Charlotte County boasts a selection of boutique retailers and restaurants right on the harbor. It is the crown jewel of a shopping scene that offers an endless supply of choices. To

complement waterfront boutiques, stroll historic downtown Punta Gorda for specialty shops including fine jewelry and clothing. As a bonus, the destination is a haven for artists, so there are plenty of galleries featuring local artwork offering tropical landscapes and collectibles.

<u>**Cultural Attractions:**</u> Anchored by the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra, the Charlotte Performing Arts Center, and the Visual Arts Center, the Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast offers a profusion of art galleries, festivals and exhibits, theatrical productions, museums, and historical sites. Specialty museums include Rick Treworgy's Muscle Car City, The Military Heritage Museum, the Blanchard House Museum of African American History & Culture, and the Charlotte County Historical Center.

Film Industry: It's all about "location, location, location," and Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach, with its dedicated full-time film office, myriad natural environments, diverse architectural and geographic spectrum, acknowledged "film-friendly" reputation and entertainment industry incentives, is ideal for filmmaking, television, or even print production. Portions of *HOOT, Out of Time, Tale of Two Buds, Palmetto, Gone Fishing, Just Cause, and Pink Cadillac* were filmed in Charlotte County.

World's First Solar-Powered Town Officially Open in Charlotte County, Fla.

Babcock Ranch, the world's first solar-powered town located in southeast Charlotte County, just northeast of Fort Myers on Babcock Ranch Road/State Road 31, commemorated the town's official grand opening on March 10, 2018, with a celebration that featured tours of 20 furnished model homes and FPL's Babcock Ranch Solar Energy Center, where a newly constructed observation platform provides sweeping views of the 440-acre solar field. Babcock Ranch was created by Kitson & Partners with respect for the natural environment and the philosophy that smart growth and sustainability work hand in hand. Half of the town's 18,000-acre footprint is set aside as greenways, parks, and expansive lakes, providing recreation and scenic backdrops for Babcock Ranch's homes and the Founder's Square downtown district. Babcock Ranch promotes healthy living through a walkable community plan, 50 miles of planned biking and hiking trails, interconnected lakes for paddling enthusiasts, a robust calendar of exercise classes, and the Healthy Life Center operated by Lee Health. <u>Babcock Ranch</u>

Flowering trees bloom throughout the year and more than 15,000 sq. ft of boardwalks and docks are planned. Sculptures have been installed and the master plans for the Gardens were developed in 2010. The property is developed and primarily financed by Roger E. and Linda A. Tetrault Foundation, a 501 c. (3) private foundation. Unlock Your Inner Archaeologist

Chances are if you've been shell hunting before, there was a time or two you find something cool and unexpected like a shark tooth or fossil. If you love finding these gems, there's a place in Florida where the fossil supply has been known to be high; you can hunt for fossils at <u>Canoe Outpost - Peace River</u>.

At this watersport outpost, rent yourself a canoe or bring your own kayak and trek the river in search of fossilized treasures. Fossils are known to be found along the Peace River's tea-colored banks – particularly after a storm and when the water level is low. Fossil hunters begin their trip with a short bus shuttle ride up to the launch point, where you can start searching for your treasures. Rent a sifter and swish and swash for fossils from giant sloths, bears, tapirs, capybaras, giant armadillos, jaguars, saber-tooth cats, Llamas, camels, mammoths, horses, mastodons, sharks' teeth, and the prized megalodon tooth.

Punta Gorda features the first Florida free bike loan program. The city has been recognized as a "Florida Bike-Friendly Community" by the Florida Bicycle Association for their volunteer organization called <u>TEAM Punta Gorda</u> offering a complimentary Yellow Bike Loaner Program. All that is required to enjoy a bicycle for an hour or a day is a credit card, driver's license (copies made for collateral), and signature of a waiver. Bicycles are offered on a space-available basis at various downtown locations. Since Punta Gorda is a bicycle-friendly community, the Punta Gorda Pathways, which is an 18-mile loop trail connecting pedestrian and bike paths around the city, was established to allow the city's bicyclists a more convenient way to get around. Four bicycle routes were also established and marked and range in length from 17 miles to a 31-mile ride. Biking

Beaches for Sunsets, Sports, Solitude, and Undiscovered Shelling Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach has 28 miles of uncrowded beaches for every interest. Romantics can watch the sun slip into the Gulf at Englewood Beach on Manasota Key or walk hand-in-hand along the shore. Many nearby restaurants offer nightlife. Adjoining Chadwick Park offers volleyball and basketball courts and plenty of fishing. At Port Charlotte Beach Park, families and athletes love the heated swimming pool, basketball, tennis, beach volleyball, bocce, horseshoe courts, and playground. Picnic shelters, a fishing pier, and boating access ramps add to the appeal. The dining scene in Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach is an eclectic mix of seafood shacks, sidewalk cafes, waterfront eateries, fine dining, and sweet spots. Primary dining districts include downtown Punta Gorda (which has more than 50 independently owned restaurants), Fishermen's Village, and Englewood's Dearborn Street. Familiar corporate-owned restaurants are bountiful, too. Notable culinary experiences include: dinner at Golden Spoon recipient The Perfect Caper, headed by a multi-time nominee for the James Beard Foundation Best Chef in the South, Jeanie Roland who beat chef Bobby Flay on national television; The Burg'r Bar in Punta Gorda is home to the \$40

Bloody Mary – an over-the-top brunch in a glass; Peace River Seafood is housed in a Florida cracker shack and for more than 15 years, they've been serving up boat-to-table blue crabs, shrimp, and other fresh seafood. <u>Restaurants</u>

Paddle Through Paradise - Blueway Trails

Part of the Florida Greenways and Trails System, 200 miles of Blueway Trails are mapped for paddlers whether they're in a kayak, canoe, or standup paddleboard, with 53 trails rated for access, difficulty, and scenic value. Veteran aficionados say these trails are some of the most beautiful in the U.S. Nearly 84 percent of the 830 miles of shoreline is protected from development, providing shelter and habitat for an amazing variety of species. With a guide, one might see hundreds of birds flying home to roost, wild boar, otters, Manta rays, and horseshoe crabs. Experienced sea kayakers can enjoy challenges out on the Gulf. Learn kayak fishing, where one can sneak up on the prey. Several outfitters/guides offer wilderness trips, photographic forays, and tailored tours for beginner to expert, perhaps accompanied by manatees or dolphins. One even offers an affordable Kayak Wedding or Vow Renewal package for couples who want to add some splash to their romance. <u>Water Fun</u>

Taste the Crafts

With the rising popularity of craft drinks, Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach is keeping up with the trend with its craft brewery taproom and craft distiller. Fat Point Brewery Fat Point Brewery has more than four brews that are hand-crafted locally every day. You can visit their taproom to test batches of beers that you won't find anywhere else. Peace River Beer Company is the newest brewery and is located in Punta Gorda. 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THE BEACHES OF CHARLOTTE HARBOR & THE GULF ISLANDS UNCROWDED, UNSPOILED SHORELINES @REALPUREFLORIDA #BestSideOutside

PUNTA GORDA/ENGLEWOOD BEACH, FL The unspoiled and uncrowded beaches of Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach on Florida's Southwest Coast are all about color, nature and relaxation. Relatively undeveloped, the area beaches are something of a rarity for South Florida. Four barrier islands, two state parks and more than a dozen miles of beaches offer access to delightfully deserted stretches of sand, sun and surf. The beaches of Englewood hold a cache of natural treasures. A cornucopia of multihued shells polished to gleaming smoothness by gentle Gulf waves, diverse species of shorebirds, schools of dolphins, slow-moving sea turtles, and dunes flush with sea oats put on a show every day. Visitors have not just one beach from which to choose to while away a day, a weekend, or even longer, but several coastal settings that appeal to every pursuit and temperament. While all the beaches welcome everyone, here are some recommendations in several favorite categories:

Romantic Beach – Englewood Beach on Manasota Key

Enjoy dinner at one of the many restaurants nearby, and then watch the sun melt away into the Gulf of Mexico for a romantic evening. Daytime brings sandier pursuits as the wide shorelines of **Englewood Beach** are perfect for building sandcastles, bird watching, or simply strolling hand-in-hand along the Gulf. For the sporting-type, adjoining Chadwick Park offers volleyball and basketball courts, and plenty of fishing opportunities including seasonal catches of snook and tarpon.

Shelling Beach – Stump Pass Beach

When the tide rolls away from Stump Pass Beach State Park on Manasota Key, there remains mixed in among the untold number of shells a plethora of fossilized shark teeth, attesting to the fact that the Gulf of Mexico is as ancient and mysterious as ever. Like Englewood Beach, Stump Pass Beach has plenty of wide-open coastlines, not to mention nature trails for wildlife viewing and native plants such as indigo berry and bay cedar.

Family Beach - Port Charlotte Beach

Port Charlotte Beach Park boasts harbor-side fun. Families and athletes love its heated

swimming pool, basketball, tennis, beach volleyball, bocce, horseshoe courts and playground. There are picnic shelters, a fishing pier, as well as access ramps for boating, canoeing, and kayaking. For those who want to take life in the slow lane or watch a spectacular sunset, the beach has plenty of space for lounge chairs and beach blankets.

Island Beach – Don Pedro State Park

Accessible only by boat, Don Pedro Island, one of Charlotte Harbor's barrier islands, is the ultimate Florida escape. Nature reigns here, where sightings of West Indian manatees, bald eagles, and gopher tortoises moseying among the sand, sky, and water are not uncommon. Although far removed from civilization, Don Pedro Island State Park still boasts modern-day amenities including restrooms, outdoor showers, picnic pavilions, and barbecue grills.

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CHARMING COMMUNITIES IN OUR NATURAL PARADISE @RealPureFlorida #BestSideOutside

Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach, FL is the embodiment of the charming Florida coastal community that makes up the Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast on Florida's Southwest Gulf Coast. Surrounding Charlotte Harbor, the state's second-largest marine estuary into which the Peace and Myakka rivers flow, this diverse blend of artsy towns, serene fishing communities, and barrier islands brim with unparalleled natural beauty, recreation, pristine beaches, arts, culture, and historic sites. The expansive landscape of unspoiled islands, upland pine flatwoods, meandering waterways, mangrove shorelines, and dune-fringed beaches is a watercolorist's dream.

From Englewood Beach south to Punta Gorda, the coastal communities of Charlotte County share a common bond with Charlotte Harbor, but each has its own distinctive personality:

Babcock Ranch, America's first solar-powered town and welcomed its first residents in January 2018. It was carved out of 91,000 acres of wilderness and ranchland. In 2006, 73,000 acres were sold to the state of Florida creating Babcock Ranch Preserve. Of the 18,000 acres left, half of it is set aside for preservation, leaving 90 percent of the original 91,000 acres preserved, and the other half developed into Babcock Ranch. More than 300,000 solar panels overseen by Florida Power and Light contribute energy to the town.

Boca Grande, a historic fishing village and beach town set on **Gasparilla Island** at Boca Grande Pass, is highlighted by a circa-1890 lighthouse, a host of charming shops and boutiques, and a walking- and biking-friendly downtown where captains of industry and President's play.

Don Pedro Island, just about the most perfect beach anywhere with plenty of shells and warm water, is a secluded barrier island accessible only by boat. Picnicking, birding, and wildlife viewing are popular here, but the star attraction is the mile-long beach fronting the azure blue waters of the Gulf of Mexico.

El Jobean, a modest community that is the former winter home for circus and carnival performers from across the United States, boasts a 1920s-era post office that is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and which has been converted into a museum/café that hosts lively bluegrass sessions weekly.

Englewood-Cape Haze, fronted by the Gulf of Mexico and Lemon Bay, has all the frills of a Florida beach town: nature parks, cultural events, fishing – the tarpon that runs here are among the greatest in the world, arts, unusual boutiques and galleries along Englewood's Dearborn Street, and of course, the beach.

Manasota Key, home to Chadwick Park at Englewood Beach and Stump Pass Beach State Park where beachgoers can comb for shells or sharks' teeth; take in an afternoon of sunning and swimming, or surf-fish for the main course for that night's dinner.

Accessible only by car ferry, **Knight Island** has three miles of beaches where it's easy to get Florida sand in your shoes. A prototype for white sand, blue sky and clear water beaches, Palm Island is home to Palm Island Resort and is the perfect antidote for today's stressful lifestyles. <u>Palm Island</u>

Little Gasparilla Island, accessible only by boat. More than two miles of secluded beaches are perfect for swimming, fishing, shelling, and bird watching. A boater's paradise, accommodations are available in rental condominiums and homes, but guests need to bring their own supplies as there are no stores or restaurants on-Island.

Placida, yet another secluded waterfront community providing instant access to the Charlotte Harbor Blueway Trails. Professional outfitters complement the wealth of natural resources, and a great selection of vacation rentals, restaurants, and shopping lend a civilized touch.

Port Charlotte, a vibrant small town, with distinctive entertainment options including theater at the Cultural Center of Charlotte County and educational and historic programs at the Charlotte County Historical Center. The 400-member Arts & Humanities Council of Charlotte County is also headquartered here. For harbor-front relaxation, the Port Charlotte Beach Park offers 15 acres of amenities including a pool, picnicking, basketball, fishing, and boat ramp access to Charlotte Harbor.

Punta Gorda, perhaps the most well-known of Charlotte County's communities and is the only incorporated city in the county. It is the cultural heartbeat of Charlotte County with diverse performances at The Center for Performing Arts & Education and juried exhibits and workshops at the Visual Arts Center. As Charlotte Harbor & the Gulf Islands typify Florida and its great diversity, so does Punta Gorda illustrates distinctive images as a waterfront neighborhood. The streets, lined with towering royal palms, restored period homes complete with wide verandahs, and boutique shopping at Fishermen's Village, is highlighted by flowering shrubs, streetlamps, and town benches. Featuring palate-pleasing restaurants, privately owned boutiques, and a 140-slip marina where fishing, cruising, and boating are but moments away, Punta Gorda easily enchants even the most jaded of travelers.

Whether visiting the beaches and communities of Charlotte Harbor & the Gulf Islands as an angler, a beachcomber, honeymooner, nature lover, boater, kayaker, hiker, bicycler, shopper, or just plain vacationer in need of rest, the array of activities available here is endless.

A few of the top golf courses in Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach include:

Kingsway Golf Course in partnership with the new Sunseeker Resort Charlotte Harbor. Renovations on Kingsway Golf Course will begin in Fall 2021. When completed, the club, located just ten minutes from the resort, will be open exclusively to members and resort guests. Renowned golf architect Kipp Schulties will lead the course renovation. A veteran of more than 60 golf course design projects, Schulties is known for his work on Boca Raton Resort & Club and Quail Lodge Resort & Club. Kingsway's renovation will include full redesign and refurbishment of the golf course, with replacement of all turfgrass, irrigation, and drainage systems; expansion and enhancements to the club's driving range, putting, chipping and bunker practice areas; refurbishment of the clubhouse, restaurant, and event space, as well as the relocation of the maintenance facilities to improve the playability of the course. The reimagined golf course is anticipated to open simultaneously with Sunseeker Resort Charlotte Harbor. Kingsway Golf Course

Riverwood Golf Club is one of those 4 ½ star courses in Southwest Florida's premier golf destination, ranking #5 in Florida and #36 in the U.S. for customer reviews in 2017. Riverwood features truly unique design features, natural beauty, and varying challenges. Riverwood is a Par 72 Championship golf course with a full-length practice range, multifaceted short game practice area, and putting green. The front nine flows through heavily wooded terrain, rich in stands of natural pine. The back nine meanders through saltmarsh and wetlands. a lush par 72 championship course, rich with native vegetation and stretching almost 7,000 yards. Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach, FL From sea turtles to sea otters, to white pelicans and roseate spoonbills, nature lovers love nature in Charlotte Harbor.

Travelers seeking to learn about the environment, how to become better environmental stewards, and escape life's stresses have been enjoying this amazing destination and our nature-based tourism. Perhaps no place better presents a firsthand look at nature and the environment than Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach in the Charlotte Harbor Gulf Island Coast, with its 830 miles of shoreline incorporating barrier islands, unspoiled beaches, mangrove habitats, pine Flatwoods, meandering rivers, canals and creeks, all outlining Florida's second-largest marine estuary.

Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach is a place of ecological and ornithological wonders where outdoor enthusiasts can observe nature in its undisturbed state. Ideal for photography, shelling, hiking, bicycling, kayaking, and standup paddleboarding, Charlotte Harbor & the Gulf Islands beckons fans of the natural environment to come to play in their backyard. In addition to hundreds of bird species such as osprey, bald eagle, anhinga, cardinal, wood stork, white pelican, and Roseate Spoonbill, a veritable patchwork quilt of biology, zoology, and oceanography abounds with 256 fresh and saltwater fish species, 39 species of mammals, 67 species of reptiles, and 27 species of amphibians.

A favorite activity of nature lovers is paddling either kayaks, canoes, or standup paddleboards through the Peace or Myakka rivers and throughout the expansive aquatic preserves of the Charlotte Harbor watershed. These adventures offer a special, up-close look at the unique features of an estuarine ecosystem. Experience mangrove canopies while paddling among secluded, hidden coves of Coral Creek & Gasparilla Sound along the Intracoastal Waterways. Nearly 200 miles of the Charlotte Harbor Blueway Trails have been mapped out identifying 53 trails rated for access, experience level, and scenic value.

For further exploration, boat tour operators offer inshore and deep-water safaris along with sightseeing cruises into Charlotte Harbor, Florida's second-largest estuary, which has mangroves and sea-grass beds that provide habitat for manatees, sea turtles, wood storks, young fish, and dolphins. Kingfisher Fleet's Peace River Nature Cruise <u>King Fisher Fleet</u> offers a 3 ½ hours eco-tour with interpretation by naturalists from the well-known Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center. Visitors can experience the flora and fauna of four different

ecosystems as they journey into the winding waters of Peace River. The banks are lined with overhanging trees, native grasses, basking alligators, bald eagles, ospreys, herons, endangered wood storks, and tons of other wildlife.

Inland, Babcock Ranch Eco Tours <u>Babcock Ranch Ecotours</u> takes its visitors on an entertaining, educational 90-minute swamp buggy adventure through some of the woods and pastures of the 70,000-acre Crescent B Ranch, a working cattle farm, and Telegraph Cypress Swamp. Sightings of wildlife such as the boar, alligators, Osceola turkey, and whitetail deer are not uncommon.

Complementing Babcock Ranch Eco Tours is the Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center (CHEC) <u>Charlotte Harbor Environmental Center</u>, a 3,000-acre nature center with four miles of nature trails. Visitors will get to know the nature of Charlotte County up close through free interpretative programs including a Wading Adventure, where participants don waders and go out into the estuary with dip nets in search of the cool, gross, and bizarre: sponges called Dead Man's Fingers, sea cucumbers that eject their stomachs, worms that decorate their own homes, shell cases shaped like ice cream cones and an abundance of fish that are just starting their life here in nature's nursery. The Peace River Wildlife Center <u>Peace River Wildlife Center</u>, an active wildlife rehabilitation center and park; and the Gasparilla Island State Park and Cape Haze Pioneer Trails <u>Cape Haze Pioneer Trail</u>, two former railroad-turned-bicycle trails <u>Boca Grande Bike Path</u>, also offer diversions of the natural order.

Florida is certainly well known for its potpourri of state recreational areas, and Charlotte County contains four of them, each different from one another and offering even greater opportunities for naturalists to explore the wild side of the Sunshine State. From Babcock/Webb Wildlife Management Area<u>Babcock/Webb Wildlife Management Area</u> and Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park <u>Charlotte Harbor, Preserve State Park</u> to Don Pedro Island State Park <u>Don Pedro Island State Park</u> and Stump Pass Beach State Park, the area is host to a plethora of nature programs and events and provides exceptional recreational opportunities that include plenty more opportunities for bird watching, bicycling, hiking, swimming, and more.

With more than 330 spectacular and colorful species of birds migrating to and inhabiting about 70 parks, preserves, and natural areas and roughly 830 miles of shoreline edging Charlotte Harbor & the Gulf Islands on Florida's Southwest coast, bird watching here is at a premium. Lemon Bay Park, Cedar Point Environmental Park and Alligator Creek Preserve Alligator Creek Preserve are just three of 26 sites recognized by the Peace River Audubon Society for excellent birding. Endangered wood storks with their four-foot wingspan, the rare white pelican, and the purple gallinule are part of the extensive Southwest Florida Bird List.

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
