


Wide open spaces await

Charlottesville and Albemarle County are surrounded by some of our country's most beautiful landscapes.

Hiking trails line the region like sidewalks, and a breathtaking view is rarely out of reach. Nearby, Shenandoah National Park features beautiful wilderness and camping. Skyline Drive runs right through the park along the Blue Ridge Mountains. And 500 miles of hiking trails, hidden waterfalls, and swimming holes await.

Outdoor activities around Charlottesville are infinite. Go up in a hot air balloon, float down a scenic river, or fish in the gentle James River. And with four distinct seasons, you can enjoy the great outdoors all year long.

Outdoor Recreation



From high peaks to gentle rolling foothills, the Blue Ridge Mountains are laced with legendary trails. Enjoy a leisurely stroll or push yourself on challenging climbs. Take to two wheels for a cycling tour, or saddle up on horseback for a different approach to the terrain. A variety of birds can be seen soaring high above the Charlottesville area. We've highlighted a few special locations for some of the best birdwatching around.*

Blue Ridge Parkway (BRP)



In addition to these notable hikes and overlooks (p.7), the Blue Ridge Parkway crosses the Appalachian Trail at Dripping Rock (Milepost 9.6), Three Ridges Parking Overlook (Milepost 13.1), Reeds Gap (Milepost 13.7) and Love Gap (Milepost 15.4). Entry points for the Parkway are at Rockfish Gap off Highway 250 and Interstate 64, Reeds Gap off Route 664, Tye River Gap off Route 56 and Humphreys Gap off Highway 60.

BRP – Humpback Rocks



Milepost 5.8 - Part of the Appalachian Trail, this historic rocky outcrop presents a stunning view over the Rockfish and Shenandoah Valleys. Trek a strenuous I-mile hike to the top of the main trail, stretch your legs on the moderate 0.3-mile Catoctin Loop Trail, or take it easy on the 0.25-mile Mountain Farm Trail.

BRP – Ravens Roost Overlook



Milepost 10.7 → Overlooks Torrey Ridge and the Shenandoah Valley. Raven and hawk sightings are common. Ruins of the 19th-century Torrey iron furnace can be found at the base of the ridge. Nearby are anchor points where climbers can rappel down the mountainside.

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Brookhill Farm



2067 Scottsville Rd., Charlottesville VA 22902 \rightarrow This full-service equestrian center offers lessons throughout the year. Clients have access to miles of trails and a cross country jumping field outside the main riding facilities. Call ahead for a lesson schedule or a tour of the stables \cdot 434-906-5049

Crabtree Falls



II58I Crabtree Falls Hwy., Montebello VA 24464 - With five major cascades spanning more than 1200 feet, this is the highest vertical drop waterfall east of the Mississippi River. An easy paved trail leads just a few hundred feet to an overlook. Adventurous hikers can continue up a strenuous 2.5 miles for views over the falls and Tye River Valley. Do not venture off the trail. Paid parking available onsite · 540-29I-2188

Grelen Trails



15091 Yager Rd., Somerset VA 22972 \Rightarrow Four miles of trails wind through the grounds of The Market at Grelen adjacent to James Madison's Montpelier. Leashed dogs welcome on the trail. Horses, bikes, and outside food and drink prohibited \cdot 540-672-7268

Highland Rustic Trails



2050 James Monroe Pkwy, Charlottesville, VA 22902 → Open to the public and free of charge, these scenic trails are well-maintained and adjacent to James Monroe's Highland • 434-293-8000

Ivy Creek Natural Area



1780 Earlysville Rd., Charlottesville VA 22903 • A prime location for spotting wildlife, this 215-acre preserve features 7 miles of trails with varying difficulty • 434-973-7772



John W. Warner Parkway Trail



828 McIntire Rd., Charlottesville VA 22902 - This urban paved trail runs 1.6 miles between East Rio Road and Route 250. Provides connectivity to Schenk's Greenway, McIntire Park, and Rivanna Trail. The provided address has onsite parking.

McIntire Park



U.S. Rt. 250 Bypass, Charlottesville VA 22901 → This centrallylocated park has nature trails on its western boundary, while the eastern boundary connects to the John W. Warner Parkway. Picnic shelter areas are available, and leashed dogs are allowed •434-970-3260

Mint Springs Valley Park



6659 Mint Springs Park Rd., Crozet VA 22932 → Four trails wind through this park in western Albemarle County. The Hollow Trail and Lake Trail are both only 0.5 miles, while the Big Survey Trail and the Fire Trail are I mile and 2 miles respectively. An entrance fee is charged between Memorial Day and Labor Day • 434-296-5844

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Montpelier's Trail System



II350 Constitution Hwy., Montpelier Station VA 22957 + Eight miles of trails winding through horse pastures, wildflower meadows, and the impressive Old-Growth Landmark Forest. Follow the connection to the Grelen Trails for a longer hike • 540 - 672 - 2728 ext 450

Observatory Hill



602 McCormick Rd., Charlottesville VA 22903 \Rightarrow Owned by UVA, these intermediate to advanced mountain bike trails are riddled with steep, rocky climbs and descents. For a longer ride, connect to the Rivanna Trail network via access points at Ivy Road or Fontaine Avenue. The provided address has onsite parking.

Old Mills Trail



1445 Darden Towe Park, Charlottesville VA 22911 → Walkers, runners, hikers, and bikers can enjoy an urban escape on this 3-mile, multi-use trail connecting Darden Towe Park to Sentara Martha Jefferson Hospital along the Rivanna River. Add a little local heritage flavor to your hike at the Lewis & Clark Exploratory Center in Darden Towe Park • 434-296-5844

Patricia Ann Byrom Forest Preserve Park



6610 Blackwells Hollow Rd., Crozet VA 22932 - A number of steep and strenuous multi-use trails are open for hiking, running, mountain biking, and horseback riding. Try the 4-mile Little Flat Mountain Loop or the shorter Blackwells Hollow Trail. Horses must have a negative Coggins report · 434-296-5844

Pen Park Nature Trail



1400 Pen Park Rd., Charlottesville VA 22901 → A 1.5-mile trail along the Rivanna River. Leashed dogs allowed • 434-970-3260

Preddy Creek Trail Park



3690 Burnley Station Rd., Charlottesville VA 22911 \rightarrow Hiking, running, mountain biking, and horseback riding are all welcome on this 10-mile trail. Mountain bikers eager to push their limits can take to a new advanced bike trail. Onsite parking available. Horses must have a negative Coggins report · 434-296-5844

Ragged Mountain Natural Area



1730 Reservoir Rd., Charlottesville VA 22903 -> Several miles of forested trails form a loop around a small lake. Park at the upper lot, past Camp Holiday Trails. No dogs allowed • 434-970-3260

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On the trail

Rivanna Trail



Charlottesville VA → This 20+ mile loop trail circles the city with sections ranging from 0.5 miles to 2.5 miles, and with varying difficulty. Some sections are not suitable for cyclists. Best parking is at Fontaine Research Park, Quarry Park, and Riverview Park. The trail at Riverview Park is paved and ADA accessible •434-970-3260

Shenandoah National Park (SNP)



Five hundred miles of trails with difficulties to suit novice and seasoned hikers alike populate the striking Shenandoah National Park. Leashed dogs are allowed except where noted. Cycling is permitted on Skyline Drive, but use extreme caution. There are four entry points: Front Royal off Route 340, Thornton Gap off Highway 21, Swift Run Gap off Spotswood Trail, and Rockfish Gap off Highway 250 and Interstate 64. Entrance fee required for each vehicle \cdot 540-999-3500

SNP - Old Rag Mountain



Rt. 600, Etlan VA 22719 → Giant granite boulders line this very strenuous 9-mile circuit, which includes an unmatched 360-degree view over Shenandoah National Park. Entrance fee to the Park required. Plan seven to eight hours, bring lots of water, and never attempt this hike in wet or icy conditions · 540-999-3500

Saunders-Monticello Trail -> Charlottesville, VA





Sugar Hollow Trail



Sugar Hollow Rd., Crozet VA 22932 → A beautiful 4.5-mile loop, which connects with North Fork Moormans River Trail, the Appalachian Trail on Skyline Drive, Turk Branch Trail, and South Fork Moormans River Road. Swimming allowed in Snake Hole and Blue Hole.

The Saunders-Monticello Trail & Park System



Rt. 53, Charlottesville VA 22902 \cdot This 9+ mile trail system includes a range of hikes with varying difficulty. The easier, ADA-accessible Saunders-Monticello Trail runs 2 miles through Kemper Park to the visitor center at Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, passing native hardwood forests, deep ravines, and views of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Limited onsite parking is available on Route 53. Main parking lot is off of Route 20 \cdot 434-984-9822

Walnut Creek Park



4520 Walnut Creek Park Rd., North Garden VA 22959 → Fifteen miles of interconnected trails. The Blue Wheel and Wilkins Way trails are longer, running alongside the shores of a lake • 434-296-5844

On the trail

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Whether you're after a tranquil afternoon getaway or a thrilling adventure, central Virginia's waterways are an ideal gateway to outdoor fun. When relaxation is your aim, angle for bass, catfish, or trout on one of the area's many lakes, or enjoy a lazy float down the river on a tubing excursion. To get your heart pumping, you can explore local rivers by kayak, canoe, raft, or paddleboard. And for those dog days of summer when it's just too hot to do anything else, take the family to one of the area's many lakes or swimming pools to cool off. State license is required for fishing unless otherwise noted.

Beaver Creek Reservoir



4365 Beaver Creek Park Rd., Charlottesville VA 22901 → Stocked with sunfish, channel catfish, and largemouth bass. Picnic tables and restrooms available in the park. Gasoline motors and swimming prohibited • 434-296-5844

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Belmont Park



725 Stonehenge Ave., Charlottesville VA 22902 → Cool off at a free, colorful sprayground in this centrally-located city park. Open May through September • 434-970-3260

Chris Greene Lake



4748 Chris Greene Lake Rd., Charlottesville VA 22911 + Fish, swim, boat or simply relax at this Albemarle County park. Gasoline motors are prohibited. Swimming is allowed IIam to 7pm, Memorial Day to Labor Day. Entry fee for summer admittance \cdot 434-296-5844

Forest Hills Park



1022 Forest Hills Ave., Charlottesville VA 22902 \rightarrow Splash into summer at this large sprayground, sure to please young children. Open May through September \cdot 434-970-3260

Greenleaf Park



1598 Rose Hill Dr., Charlottesville VA 22902 → The touch sensitive sprayground at this park features a mushroom fountain and an interactive water pole. Open May through September ·434-970-3260

Hardware River



See Outfitters & Services (p.28) for rental and tour information - Anglers can find sunfish, channel catfish, smallmouth and largemouth bass along this river. Water birds flock here.

James River



See Outfitters & Services (p.32) for rental and tour information → Virginia's largest river is also one of the area's most popular destinations for fishing and boating. Anglers can catch smallmouth bass, catfish, and a wide variety of panfish. Canoes and kayaks are best for exploring the river, but small boats, such as john boats, can also be used at most of the river's access points. A variety of outfitters offer equipment and excursions on the James.

Lake Albemarle



Lakeside Dr., Charlottesville VA 22901 → Find largemouth bass, sunfish, black crappie, and catfish in this 35-acre impoundment. Boat ramp and loading pier located off Route 675. State fishing license or access permit required. Nets and gasoline motors are prohibited · 540-899-4169

Mint Springs Valley Park



6659 Mint Springs Park Rd., Crozet VA 22932 - The lakes here are stocked with sunfish, channel catfish, and largemouth bass. Swimming allowed in summer months. Picnic shelters and restrooms are available on site. An entrance fee is charged during summer swim season · 434-296-5844

Moormans River



Sugar Hollow Rd., Crozet VA 22932 → Head upstream from Sugar Hollow Reservoir to find trout fishing in the North Fork of the Moormans River. Special trout license required for the lower section's put-and-take trout fishery. Within the boundaries of Shenandoah National Park, no bait is allowed, and all fish must be immediately released unharmed · 540-899-4169 or 540-999-3500

Onesty Family Aquatic Center at Meade Park



300 Meade Ave., Charlottesville VA 22902 - Open Memorial Day through Labor Day. Features of this public water park include water slides, an obstacle course, a lazy river, and a snack bar. Restrooms and a family changing room on site. Day pass and summer pass fees vary · 434-295-7532

Ragged Mountain Reservoir



1730 Reservoir Rd., Charlottesville VA 22903 → Largemouth bass and bluegill populate this 170-acre water supply for Charlottesville. Parking limited. Boats must be transported to the water. Gasoline motors prohibited. No dogs allowed • 434-970-3260

Rivanna River



See Outfitters & Services (p.33) for rental and tour information -There are many places throughout Charlottesville to access one of the city's most scenic rivers. Kayakers and canoeists favor the stretch from Darden Towe Park to Riverview Park, while rafters can find occasional rapids near other access points.

South Fork Rivanna River Reservoir



2494 Woodburn Rd., Charlottesville VA 22901 \rightarrow This 450-acre urban escape is stocked with largemouth bass, bluegill, black and white crappie, redear sunfish, and channel catfish. Parking is limited. A boat ramp is located on Route 659 at the provided address. Gasoline motors are prohibited \cdot 434-970-3260

Sugar Hollow Reservoir



Sugar Hollow Rd., Crozet VA 22932 - Rainbow and brook trout are stocked in this 47-acre city water supply. Boating not allowed. Swimming is not allowed in the reservoir itself, but visitors can hike one mile up from the reservoir to Blue Hole, a popular site for swimming.

Totier Creek Reservoir Park



9290 Totier Creek Rd., Scottsville VA 24590 - The water supply for Scottsville has a well-maintained boat ramp, fishing dock, restroom facilities, and picnic area. The lake is stocked with sunfish, channel catfish, and largemouth bass. Gasoline motors are prohibited \cdot 434-296-5844

Van Clief Nature Area



253 Hardware St., Scottsville VA 24590 \rightarrow East of downtown Scottsville, this 63-acre park features a large lake stocked with catfish and trout. Parking is available near a gated area at the provided address. Special trout license required in addition to state fishing license \cdot 434-286-9267



Walnut Creek Park



4520 Walnut Creek Park Rd., North Garden VA 22959 - A large lake sits at the heart of this south Albemarle park, providing a favorite summertime setting for swimming, boating, and fishing. Swimming allowed IIam to 7pm, Memorial Day to Labor Day. Kayak and canoe rental available for a small fee during swimming hours in season. Entry fee for summer admittance · 434-296-5844

Washington Park Pool



1001 Preston Ave., Charlottesville VA 22902 ~ Open Memorial Day to Labor Day, this city pool features water slides, a mushroom waterfall, zero-depth play area, and snack bar. Locker rooms and a family changing room are available onsite. Daily and summer pass fees vary · 434-977-2607



Resorts, country clubs, and public parks throughout the Greater Charlottesville area make the most of their picturesque settings with challenging and beautifully designed golf courses. Conquer courses with difficult hazards designed by renowned architects, or simply enjoy views of the Blue Ridge Mountains while you play a few holes. For an inexpensive and easy-to-learn alternative, disc golf has similar rules, but substitutes Frisbee throws for clubs and balls, with a basket serving as the hole. Tee time reservations are required, except where noted.

Birdwood Golf Course at Boar's Head Resort



410 Golf Course Dr., Charlottesville VA 22903 - The views of the Blue Ridge Mountains are anything but subpar at this nationally acclaimed 18-hole course, designed by famed golf pro Davis Love III. The practice facilities and driving range are one of the best places in the area to work on your game. The pro shop is fully stocked with equipment, apparel, and accessories. Fees vary by day and season \cdot 434-293-4653

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Full Cry at Keswick Hall



701 Club Dr., Keswick VA 22947 → Guests of the hotel can access this private award-winning, 18-hole course. The large fairways command impressive views not only of the surrounding foothills, but of the majestic hotel property itself • 434-979-3440

Meadowcreek Golf Course



1400 Pen Park Rd., Charlottesville VA 22901 → Water hazards, high bunkers and oak, dogwood, and cherry trees all populate this centrally-located 18-hole course. Many holes follow the Rivanna River, offering unique views of the area. Fees vary by day • 434-977-0615

Meadow Creek Gardens Disc Golf Course

1900 Morton Dr., Charlottesville VA 22903 - This free disc golf course, accessed by a gravel road next to the English Inn, features nine holes offering both short and long targets. Tees are concrete and the terrain is moderately hilly with a mixture of fields and dense woods. One throw crosses a creek · 434-970-3589

Old Trail Golf Club



5494 Golf Dr., Crozet VA 22932 → Mixing both links and parkland styles, this 18-hole championship course at the base of the Blue Ridge Mountains appeals to golfers of all skill levels. Views are particularly spectacular in the late afternoon. Old Trail also has an extensive practice area and a pro shop with regripping and club fitting services. Fees vary by day · 434-823-8101

Walnut Creek Park Disc Golf Course



4250 Walnut Creek Park Rd., North Garden VA 22959 → The I8-hole disc golf course at this Albemarle County park is challenging with a range of uphill, downhill, open and wooded holes, and even some water hazards. No reservations required • 434-296-5844

Swannanoa Golf Course and Country Club



4506 Howardsville Turnpike, Afton VA 22920 - Perched atop Afton Mountain, this 18-hole course designed by PGA professional Pete Lang commands sweeping vistas over the Piedmont and Shenandoah Valley. Closed in the winter • 540-943-8864

Some farms offer more in-depth agriculture tours where you can learn about beekeeping, organic gardening, and livestock care. Harvest seasons given in this section are just estimates. Find farmers markets where you can purchase fresh local produce, or go on a pick-your-own outing for outdoor family fun.

The BerryPatch



3035 Peavine Hollow Rd., Crozet VA 22932 \rightarrow Pick your own blueberries with family and friends on the beautiful grounds of the BerryPatch. You'll find three acres of fresh and pesticide-free berries, ripe for the picking from late May to late June \cdot 434-963-0659

Caromont Farm



9261 Old Green Mountain Rd., Esmont VA 22937 → The proudly woman-owned and -run farm is located 23 miles south of Charlottesville, in the heart of Virginia's Monticello Wine Region. Taste award-winning goat's milk and cow's milk cheeses, spend time with renowned chefs, and snuggle baby goats. What more could you ask for? • 434-831-1393

Carter Mountain Orchard



1435 Carters Mountain Trl., Charlottesville VA 22902 → Apples are the pride and joy of one of Charlottesville's most popular orchards, open March through December. Pick your own or stock up on cider, donuts, and apple butter at the country store. Prince Michel Winery and Bold Rock Hard Cider have tasting rooms on site. Live music on Thursday evenings May through September. Be prepared for very large crowds on weekends in September and October • 434–977-1833

Chiles Peach Orchard



1351 Greenwood Rd., Crozet VA 22932 → Sweet, juicy peaches flavor everything from pies to refreshing milkshakes at this Crozet orchard, open April through November. Pick your own in June and July. Strawberries are also available May to early June. Enjoy a pancake breakfast on weekends or mark your calendar for homemade peach ice cream the first weekend of August • 434-823-1583

Critzer Family Farm



9388 Critzer Shop Rd., Afton VA 22920 → Pick fresh fruit all summer at this Nelson County farm. Strawberries ripen in May and June, cherries are available in June and July, and blackberries and raspberries start harvesting in mid-July. The orchard also serves ice cream made with real fruit · 540-241-3305

Henley's Orchard



2192 Holly Hill Farm, Crozet VA 22932 \rightarrow Pick a wide variety of peaches and nectarines June through August, or apples late June through mid-October. The annual HenleyFest takes place every Saturday in October, with hayrides, cider making, live music, and apple cider donuts \cdot 434-823-7848

Liberty Mills Farm



9166 Liberty Mills Rd., Somerset VA 22972 → Adventure abounds at this Orange County farm, home to a number of family-friendly festivals. Strawberry Fest opens strawberry picking season in late May, while fall brings the largest corn maze in Virginia. A pick-your-own pumpkin patch opens in September • 434-882-6293

Romp with the piglets, gather eggs from the hens, hold baby chicks, learn to milk a goat, gobble with the turkeys, and taste all manner of herbs, berries, and vegetables while you learn the science behind organic gardening. 
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Go back in time for a day

Once home to three Founding Fathers, the Charlottesville area is a living relic of neoclassical architecture and American history.

With presidential homes located in the heart of the region, Charlottesville and Albemarle County's history is sure to be an adventure in itself. Most famously, third president Thomas Jefferson built his Monticello estate and founded the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. Stroll the grounds of each to walk through internationally acclaimed UNESCO World Heritage Sites.

Presidents James Monroe and James Madison also built homes in the Charlottesville area, and Monroe's Highland sits less than two miles from Monticello. Each home is open for tours and a step back in time. Don't forget to grab a traditional Southern meal from servers in Colonial attire at historic Michie Tavern. Built around 1784, the tavern accommodated travelers more than 200 years ago. If you're looking for a different type of historical adventure, you can check out the Lewis and Clark Exploratory Center - a hands-on center focusing on the historic expedition as a gateway for learning about history, exploration, the arts, science, and native cultures.

A complete story

Charlottesville and Albemarle County have complicated histories to share and are actively working with local community members and descendants to elevate and ensure modern, historically accurate, and inclusive stories from early America to the present day are told.

Each historic home is openly addressing the complex nature of slavery in a variety of ways, acknowledging and sharing this vital piece of the nation's story. By working with the intertwined generational makeup of the descendent community for each location, this effort includes integrating the horrors of slavery into the main home tours and providing tours that go into greater depth for the attentive visitor.

The Jefferson School African-American Heritage Center (JSAAHC), located in the city center, archives and disseminates narratives that are locally relevant and add to the larger history of African-Americans in Virginia and the nation.

The JSAAHC also serves as a permanent exhibit for art, theater, and various events while offering tours exploring African-American history from slavery to the civil rights movement to more recent events. Additionally, the JSAAHC offers walking tours of downtown Charlottesville to visit important historic sites.

The University of Virginia's Memorial to Enslaved Laborers, which opened in spring 2020, seeks to formally acknowledge the work and the individual lives of the enslaved African-Americans who built and sustained the everyday life and economic success of the University. This site is a place of quiet reflection, including names and, in many more cases, the unknown names of enslaved African-Americans who labored there.


Make sure you come hungry

Great art, music, and live entertainment

Regardless of what you're into—in Charlottesville, there Ris always something to inspire your creative mind.

The visual arts scene stretches from the artist studios at McGuffey Art Center to cutting-edge contemporary shows at Second Street Gallery and the University of Virginia's Fralin Museum of Art. The Kluge-Ruhe Collection is the only museum in the United States dedicated to Australian Aboriginal art. IX Art Park, known for popular festivals and concerts, also hosts "The Looking Glass" exhibit, Virginia's first immersive art exhibit offering a whimsical vibe for both new and seasoned admirers.

The historic Paramount Theater, a landmark at the city's center since 1931, is a staple for entertainment of all varieties. As a non-profit venue for the performing arts, film, and community events, this theater is both vibrant and versatile, and a must-see on your visit to the Downtown Mall.


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
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
