QUESTIONS

1. Cities are often named after people, plants, or landscapes. Climb this rooftop to find out how Chattanooga got its name.
2. Chattanooga had the first Coca-Cola bottling company. Find the rows of glass Coke bottles displayed below your feet.
3. A landmark Supreme Court case changed the course of American history and civil rights. Look for this contemplative space that recognizes and honors Ed Johnson, Noah Parden, Styles Hutchins, and the African-American community that supported them.
4. Ross's Landing was established in 1816 by John Ross and he operated it as a successful trading post until 1838 when the location served as a departure point from the Trail of Tears. Look for the nation's largest public art project celebrating Cherokee history and culture that features seven, six-foot ceramic disks and more.
5. Chattanooga has been a strategic location along the Tennessee River as a transit hub for people, goods, and information for more than 200 years. Climb in the brick boat that signifies Chattanooga's river history and go on your own water journey.
