Hell on Wheels Rodeo Sets Records in 2023, Eyes 5th **Anniversary in 2024**

After six rodeos, ten champions and more than 2,800 tickets sold, the 2023 season of the Hell on Wheels Rodeo series comes to an end. This year the growth continued, breaking records for attendance, participation, prize money, sponsorships, and economic impact.

This year, Hell on Wheels saw 2,850 tickets sold, with the final rodeo of the season selling out. People came to see this open series rodeo from all over - 44 states and 12 countries. As for participation and competition, ten Champions were crowned, and it was Saddle Bronc rider Ryan Koupal of South Dakota who took home the most earnings along with the Hell on Wheels saddle.

While the rodeo gave plenty of prize money, it brought in far more in terms of its impact on the community. Over the course of the summer, the rodeo series brought in \$800,000 to the Laramie County economy.

2023 was also a season of firsts for the rodeo. The first Hell on Wheels rodeo queen, Abigail Marcott, was crowned. Along with royalty making its way into the rodeo, HoW debuted a special single-barrel whiskey through Pine Bluffs Distilling. Both programs look to continue in the 2024 season, along with hopes and confidence in the rodeo's growth and success.

"To see the incredible growth in a matter of four years that Hell on Wheels has achieved is very gratifying," said Jim Walter, Vice President of Visit Cheyenne, and the Hell on Wheels Rodeo project manager for the organization. "The increase in attendance and the consistently high numbers of cowboys and cowgirls who participate in each performance really speaks to our success there."
