#### Hell on Wheels Sets Record Attendance

The 2022 Hell on Wheels Rodeo and Chuck Wagon Dinner set a record for attendance this year with one less rodeo than last year. More than 1625 tickets were purchased from 40 different states and seven different countries.

The partnership between Visit Cheyenne and the DeLancey family continues to drive economic impact to Laramie County with more than \$750,000 spent in the community by visitors to the rodeo.



Hell on Wheels is a full rodeo with both rough stock and timed events. This season more than \$40,000 was paid out to the cowboys and cowgirls who participated, and championship buckles were distributed to winners in each of the events. Several athletes who competed in our rodeo also competed in PRCA rodeos around the mountain west this summer.

Planning is already underway for the 2023 season for six more nights of rodeo action at the Laramie County Fairgrounds. Tickets for the 2023 season go on sale April 1, 2023.
