A charming historic downtown, two state parks, 30+ local parks, numerous historic sites, and massive indoor entertainment centers a part of what makes Clarksville an affordable destination that many will enjoy. Families, history buffs, empty nesters, arts lovers, adventure seekers and solo travelers will all find plenty of activities for a multiple-day stay.

ARTS & CULTURE

Clarksville's art scene is energetic, passionate and prolific. Within Downtown alone, visitors can enjoy live music, performing arts, Tennessee's largest general history museum and cultural center, art galleries, and several shops where guests can make their own art. The First Thursday ArtWalk is a monthly event showcasing local artists and their pieces throughout several downtown businesses. Murals, fountains and statues can be spotted throughout the community.

ENTERTAINMENT

Performances at the historic art-deco Roxy Regional Theatre has been a staple in Clarksville's entertainment offerings for more than 40 years. In 2023, the 5,500-seat F&M Bank Arena opened giving visitors top-tier concert, sports and entertainment options all year long. Austin Peay State University faculty and guests artists are a source of excellent live music throughout academic year.

ANNUAL EVENTS

No matter the season, there is always something exciting happening in Clarksville. Christmas on the Cumberland lights up the RiverWalk and Drive-Thru Lights illuminate the Speedway with millions of bulbs. Home to Tennessee's Best Open Air Market, the long-standing Downtown Market spurred the creation of produce and seasonal makers markets throughout the community.

YOU'LL ONLY FIND IN CLARKSVILLE

JOURNEY UNDERGROUND TO SEE 14TH CENTURY ART

Dunbar Cave features drawings from Mississippian Native Americans dating back to the 14th century. Once owned by country music star Roy Acuff, the venue featured Grand Ole Opry friends and Big Bands each week for performances. Along with the history, today's visitors at the 144-acre park can enjoy the hiking trails, picnics, wildlife and seasonal guided cave tours.

STEP BACK INTO PIONEER DAYS

Make (and eat) butter at Historic Collinsville, where visitors are immersed in a bygone era. Learn the story of life in rural Tennessee from 1830-1900 through a 40-acre, 17-structure Pioneer Settlement and Weakley House Museum. Authentic period furnishings and artifacts, a wildlife center, and interactive special events enhance the visitor experience.

SHOOT CLAYS IN STYLE

Cross Creek Clays offers a twist on a classic experience. This rural shooting complex features three 16-station courses suitable for all skill levels. The winding rural drive, a massive lodge, and dozens of "sasquatch" carvings around the course add to the rustic charm. The attention to detail along the grounds is unmatched.

SCALE RIVER BLUFFS

Kings Bluff Park is an outdoor rock climbing experience like no other. Nearly 1,700 linear feet of cliffs over the Cumberland River give climbers 160 routes and spectacular views.

BE INSPIRED BY OLYMPIC HEROES

Iconic, trailblazers, champions and Olympic Gold Medalists, Pat Head Summitt and Wilma Rudolph overcame immense challenges to rise to the pinnacle of success in their respective fields.

VENTURE INTO AN ARCHITECTURAL ICON

Constructed in 1898 as a US Post Office and Customs House for Clarksville's flourishing tobacco trade, this beautiful structure is the state's largest general history museum and one of the south's most photographed buildings. The center features rotating shows, art galleries, and a newly renovated explorers floor complete with a bubble cave, family art room, and a massive model train exhibit.

JAM TO FREE CONCERTS ALL SUMMER

Summer weekends in Clarksville are filled with music. The Downtown @ Sundown series features free concerts each first and third Fridays from May to October. For a nominal fee, enjoy live Music at the Winery every weekend with Jazz on the Lawn concerts to open and close the summer season.

SAVOR THE WORLD'S FLAVORS

Thanks to its vibrant international community, Clarksville's food scene is as diverse as it is delicious. Try authentic cuisines from all around the world, including flavors from India, Thailand, Korea, Greece, France, Phillipines, Italy and more.

SIP TEA FLIGHTS: HOT, ICED & SPARKLING

Charming, relaxing and delicious, The Mad Herbalist tea lounge emits serious Hobbit vibes. Housed in the woods in a historic log cabin, this enchanting experience includes house-blended seasonal tea flights, tiered sharable entrees, and make-your-own oil-infused body products.
