

GETTING HERE





Clarksville is 45 miles from Nashville International Airport (BNA) along I-24 at the TN/KY border.



The Cumberland River is a major commercial waterway winding through downtown Clarksville. A full-service marina and a day dock accommodate boat travelers.



I-24 offers four major interchanges at Exits 1, 4, 8, and 11. US Highways 79, 41, 41-A, and 76, along with multiple state highways, also run through the community.

JOURNALISTS

RED CARPET TOUR MEDIA FAM

Visit Clarksville hosts one group FAM per year with a themed itinerary. Attendance is by invitation only, with all expenses covered, and limited to six attendees. Our 2026 group FAM will be held at the end of April.



CONTENT CREATORS & INFLUENCERS

Visit Clarksville reviews and vets influencer and creator proposals based on brand alignment, audience geography, engagement, and budget. Proposals must include audience information, content fees, and deliverables. In addition to a reasonable content fee, Visit Clarksville covers lodging, feebased activities, and provides a meal and transportation allowance.

Clarksville's 3,100+ hotel rooms, 150+ vacation rentals and two campgrounds provide every visitor a variety of lodging choices. OUTDOOR ADVENTURE

With over 650 miles of navigable waterways, 1,600 acres of local and state parks, mountain biking trails, natural hiking and developed trails, rock climbing, traditional and disc golf courses, a public cave, clay shooting, and notable fishing waters, visitors often wish for more hours in the day.

BITES & BREWS

ATTRACTIONS

A charming historic downtown, two state parks, 30+ local parks, historic sites, and massive indoor entertainment centers are a part of what makes Clarksville an affordable destination that many will enjoy. Families, history buffs, empty nesters, arts lovers, adventure seekers and solo travelers will all find plenty of activities for a multiple-day stay.

ARTS & CULTURE

Clarksville's art scene is energetic, passionate and prolific. Within Downtown alone, visitors can enjoy live music, performing arts, Tennessee's largest general history museum, art galleries, and several shops where guests can make their own art. The First Thursday ArtWalk is a monthly event showcasing local artists and their pieces throughout several downtown businesses. Murals, fountains and statues can be spotted throughout the community.

ENTERTAINMENT

Performances at the historic art-deco Roxy Regional Theatre have been a staple in Clarksville's entertainment offerings for more than 40 years. The new 5,500-seat F&M Bank Arena gives visitors top-tier concert, sports and entertainment options all year long. Austin Peay State University faculty and guest artists are a source of excellent live music throughout the academic year.

JOURNEY UNDERGROUND TO SEE 14TH-CENTURY ART

Dunbar Cave features drawings from Mississippian Native Americans dating back to the 14th century. Once home to Big Band and Grand Ole Opry performances, and a Freedman's Camp, the cave sits in a state park.

STEP BACK INTO PIONEER DAYS

Experience the art of making your own butter at Historic Collinsville, where visitors are transported to a bygone era. Learn the story of life in rural Tennessee through a 40-acre, 16-structure pioneer settlement with authentic period furnishings, artifacts, and special events.

SHOOT CLAYS IN STYLE

Cross Creek Clays offers unmatched attention to detail. This rural shooting complex features three 16-station courses suitable for all skill levels. The winding rural drive, a massive lodge, and dozens of "sasquatch" carvings around the course add to the rustic charm.

SCALE RIVER BLUFFS

Kings Bluff Park is an outdoor rock climbing experience like no other. Nearly 1,700 linear feet of cliffs over the Cumberland River give climbers 160 routes and spectacular views.

BE INSPIRED BY OLYMPIC HEROES

Iconic, trailblazers, champions and Olympic Gold Medalists, Pat Head Summitt and Wilma Rudolph overcame immense challenges to rise to the pinnacle of success in their respective fields.

VENTURE INTO AN ARCHITECTURAL ICON

Constructed in 1898 as a U.S. Customs House for Clarksville's flourishing tobacco trade, this beautiful structure is now the state's largest general history museum and one of the south's most photographed buildings.

JAM TO FREE CONCERTS ALL SUMMER

Summer weekends in Clarksville are filled with music, mostly free. Enjoy outdoor tunes at Downtown Commons, Beachaven Winery and Old Glory Distilling.

SAVOR THE WORLD'S FLAVORS

Thanks to its vibrant international community, Clarksville's food scene is as diverse as it is delicious. Try authentic cuisines from all around the world, including India, Thailand, Korea, Greece, Germany, Philippines, Africa, Italy, and more.

SIP TEA FLIGHTS: HOT, ICED & SPARKLING

The Mad Herbalist tea lounge emits serious Hobbit vibes. Housed in the woods in a historic log cabin, this enchanting experience includes houseblended seasonal tea flights and delicious tiered sharable entrees.

ENGAGE WITH ARTISTS & MAKERS

Most cities have murals and public art. What's different in Clarksville is that nearly all of the city's public art pieces are painted, sculpted, or designed by local artists. Meet them at First Thursday Artwalk or in the city's galleries and artistic spaces.

PLAY LIKE A KID NO MATTER YOUR AGE

Both young and young-at-heart have a blast at The City Forum indoor entertainment center. Activities like putt-putt, bowling, go-karts, an arcade, a carousel, duck pin bowling, laser tag and thrill rides delight guests of all ages.

The 52,000-square-foot shopping mecca that is Miss Lucille's Marketplace is home to vintage, antique, boutique, repurposed, upcycled and handmade items of all types.

TRAVELING WITH TEENS

Wilma Rudolph, diagnosed at age four with polio, defied seemingly insurmountable odds to earn a bronze and three gold medals.

TENNESSEE WINGS OF LIBERTY OPENS IN MARCH 2026

Operated by the U.S. Army, the 51,000-square-foot Wings of Liberty Museum will open in March 2026. The 33-acre campus includes historic aircraft displays, a memorial brick garden, as well as multi-media and immersive displays highlighting the engagements of Fort Campbell's 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) and auxiliary units from WWII through present day.
