As County Judges for Nueces and Kleberg County we enthusiastically submit this application to designate our Coastal Bend Region, inclusive of Nueces and Kleberg Counties, as an "American World War II Heritage City." Located in Texas on the Gulf of Mexico, Nueces County's most populous municipality is the City of Corpus Christi. Just south of Nueces, is Kleberg County. Nueces County and its surrounding area played a significant role in supporting our nation's response to World War II. This was a call that our community answered. It is a rich history that our community identified with and proudly preserves.

It was here that many World War II pilots were trained. Our region has two Naval Air Stations that were built in response to World War II, Naval Air Station – Corpus Christi (NAS-CC) located in Nueces County and Naval Air Station – Kingsville (NAS-Kingsville) located in Kleberg County. Both bases remain active and operate today. NAS-CC opened in March of 1941. Thousands of aviators were trained and earned their wings here during World War II. I encourage you to select the City of Corpus Christi, Nueces County, and Kleberg County as Texas' American World War II Heritage Region. The Texas Coastal Bend region is uniquely situated to be selected for this designation due to the region's many contributions to the nation's war efforts since the 1940s.

The region is home to the Naval Air Station ("NASCC") Corpus Christi and the Naval Air Station Kingsville ("NASK"). Located on the Corpus Christi Bay, the NASCC was established as the nation's second air training base and commissioned its first flight training in 1941. The NASK, founded in 1942, served the nearby NASCC as an auxiliary field, aiding in training many of the U.S. Navy's pilots for World War II. By the end of World War II, more than 35,000 naval aviators had earned their wings there including former President George H. W. Bush. Other notable people who received their training here include astronaut Neil Armstrong, Senator John McCain, and Senator and astronaut John Glenn.

The tradition continues today as NASCC trains approximately 400 pilots each year. One of the current tenants of NASCC is the Corpus Christi Army Depot, the world's largest rotary wing aircraft repair facility. I am writing in support of the collective submission of the City of Corpus Christi, Nueces County, and Kleberg County as Texas' American WWII Heritage Region. This region is uniquely situated to be selected for this designation due to the region's substantial contribution to the nation's war effort, its on-going preservation of this heritage and legacy, and the presence of the USS Lexington Museum.

Situated aboard one of the longest serving and most decorated aircraft carriers in the world, the USS Lexington Museum offers a unique experience to over 300,000 visitors annually who tour this historic WWII aircraft carrier while visiting the Coastal Bend Region.

Commissioned in 1943, USS Lexington (CV-16) and her crew fought in WWII and survived direct hits from both a torpedo and a kamikaze. USS Lexington fought in many battles, including the Battle of the Philippine Sea and the Battle of Leyte Gulf. USS Lexington was also the first foreign large fleet aircraft carrier to enter Tokyo Bay. This ship survived its wartime prowess to become a training carrier for thousands of sailors and naval aviators. This extraordinary history is being preserved in Corpus Christi where we are always sharing the awe inspiring stories from WWII to all who come aboard—from across Texas and around the world.

It was due to local support for the military, veteran engagement, and the eagerness to preserve WWII history that the City of Corpus Christi "landed the LEX" in 1992. Since that time, the USS Lexington Museum hosts an annual Pearl Harbor Remembrance Ceremony, Veterans Day Ceremony, and Memorial Day Ceremony, and supports the annual Battle of Midway Ceremony. Our annual "Stage Door Canteen" is a WWII-themed dance with big band music from the 1940s era that celebrates the ship's commissioning and has great support every year.

While the ship itself is living history, the USS Lexington Museum manages many exhibits and displays that honor the legacy and sacrifices made onboard during WWII. These exhibits include but are not limited to: historic WWII-era aircraft, the President George H.W. Bush Display, Lexington's Victory Board or "Score Card," the Battle of the Coral Sea Exhibit, the Pearl Harbor Exhibit, the Pea Coat Memorial, the Lexington Chapel Exhibit, and the Medal of Honor Exhibit.

In 2003, the USS Lexington was designated a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service and the U.S. Department of the Interior. Additionally, we are working in cooperation with the Nueces County Historical Commission and the Texas Historical Commission to install an official historical marker in our Lexington Plaza. We are also working with the City of Corpus Christi on a history plaza that will include a highlight of USS Lexington's contributions to WWII and naval aviation.

We also strive to preserve WWII history with our "Oral History Project" led by our volunteer organization. The USS Lexington Museum operates with the help of more than 100 active volunteers, including many veterans, and some WWII veterans, who are still active and tell their stories to guests and school groups on a regular basis. Captain Bob Batterson, our 100-year-old volunteer, served in WWII and is a Pearl Harbor survivor. One of our other veteran volunteers, Ken Kohlstedt, offers an annual WWII and USS Lexington History presentation that is free to the public. We also have been involved in many author's book signing events and have been featured in many WWII books that can be found in our Ship's Store.

Combined, the military facilities of South Texas employs over 6000 people and has an economic impact of \$5.3 billion.

South Texas was integral to the American war effort during WWII and continues to preserve its military history and community pride in our contribution.

Let me take this opportunity to express my enthusiastic support for Corpus Christi to be designated as an American World War II Heritage City. This city has a rich history involving military centers. The Naval Air Station of Corpus Christi, the Lexington Museum on the Bay, and the Corpus Christi Army Depot, a United States Department of Defense Center of Industrial and Technical Excellence for rotary wing aircraft are located here. The Naval Air Station provided intermediate flight training in WWII, training naval pilots to fly a range of aircraft during the war. By the end of 1944 it was the largest naval aviation training facility in the world. Women worked along side the men to help build and maintain the planes.

Here at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, Special Collections and Archives we house many collections that pertain to World War II. The Dr. Norman Delaney Collection of Corpus Christi Naval Air Station Interviews and Memorabilia of World War II Veterans were captured on tape and preserved. The digital files, transcripts and photographs are available for research. The Dr. Hector P. Garcia papers highlight a Mexican American's service in WWII as a physician and soldier. Correspondence and photographs illustrate his military activities in the European Theatre of WWII. Later in 1948 he founded the American GI Forum to improve Mexican American veteran benefits and enhance medical attention.

The Shelby Davis WWII papers and PFC Elwood Sidney Whitehouse WWII Letters contain a wealth of first-hand information of the war from the front lines. Other collections include Ester Bonilla Read WWII Oral History Collection, and photos of men and women enlisting are included in Murphy Givens South Texas Historical Research papers. Mr. Givens wrote a history column for the Corpus Christi Caller Times for thirty years. Aalbert Heine papers recount his time as a Prisoner of War in a German camp. These are a few of the collections related to WWII held at the archives.
