

Morning

Start the day at <u>Coventry Transport Museum</u>, which is home to the world's largest collection of British road transport. Here you can see a range of vehicles, from bicycles and motorbikes to cars, buses, and trucks.

Next, head to <u>Coventry Cathedral</u>, one of the city's most famous landmarks. The cathedral was destroyed during World War II but has since been rebuilt, with the ruins of the original structure preserved as a reminder of the city's history. Take a guided tour or explore the cathedral on your own.

Take a break for lunch at one of the many restaurants you can find in **Cathedral Lanes**. There's something for everyone, whether you're in the mood for pizza, burgers, or vegan cuisine.





Afternoon

After lunch, take a short walk to the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum. This museum has a variety of exhibits, including local history, art, and culture. You can also take part in workshops and events, making it a great place for kids. While you are at the museum, be sure to stop by and say hello to Dippy the Dinosaur, a life-size, plaster-of-paris replica of a Diplodocus carnegii skeleton who is visiting the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum from the Natural History Museum.

Just a two-minute walk from the from the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum you will find the iconic **St Mary's Guildhall**. Built in the 14th century, it has been used for a variety of purposes over the years, including a meeting place for the powerful medieval guilds that helped to shape the city's history. With its striking architecture, impressive collection of art and artefacts, and connection to the city's past, St Mary's Guildhall is a must-visit destination for anyone interested in Coventry's history and culture.

Evening

End the day with a splash at **The Wave.** Offering a range of thrilling activities and features, including six high-speed slides, a wave pool, lazy river, and an interactive water playground.
