

Where to See Birds

The Mansion Use Area has open spaces, wooded edges and the mansion garden. Vultures and hawks may be seen from the mansion terrace, which overlooks the Cumberland Valley. Brown thrashers and common yellowthroats hide throughout the area. Wood thrushes sing their distinctive song in the evenings. Bluebirds nest in manmade boxes. Please do not disturb the nesting birds.

Pond Use Area - The best diversity may be found in this wet area. Kings Gap Hollow Run and the small pond attract various species of birds. Be sure to look in the canopy of the trees for birds like Baltimore orioles, and scarlet tanagers. At the ground layer you can find ovenbirds, rufous-sided towhees and wood thrush.

Pine Plantation - This area consists of a coniferous forest surrounded by shrubby areas and deciduous woods. There is an open area at the log house, which provides a good area for viewing birds in the wooded edges of the coniferous and deciduous forests. The Pine Plantation Trail leads hikers through varying habitats.

Species diversity increases during peak migration in mid-May and early September. Year-round residents like woodpeckers, barred owls and wild turkeys are exciting finds even in the middle of winter.

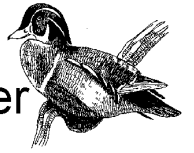
