#### CONCERT BAND

The Concert Band is quite a versatile organization. # Spanish Club is York's Oldest Student Organization

The Spanish Club, sponsored by Miss Miriam Bonifield, is the oldest student organization at York. For twenty-one years it has upheld with dignity and honor its motto, "Foster friendly Pan-American relations." Never before have the principles for which the club stands been of more value than today in this time of world crisis.

Membership in the club is restricted to Spanish students only. This year's enrollment totals 134 members. Any student who is in his second year is automatically eligible, as well as freshmen who have completed the first semester with an A or B average.




der for state supremacy.



the activities of the club. Just before Christmas a pot luck supper is held to initiate the new members,




At the mothers' and daughters' tea in the spring, certificates of awards are presented to those girls who have earned them, and the mothers are acquainted with the functions of the organization.
