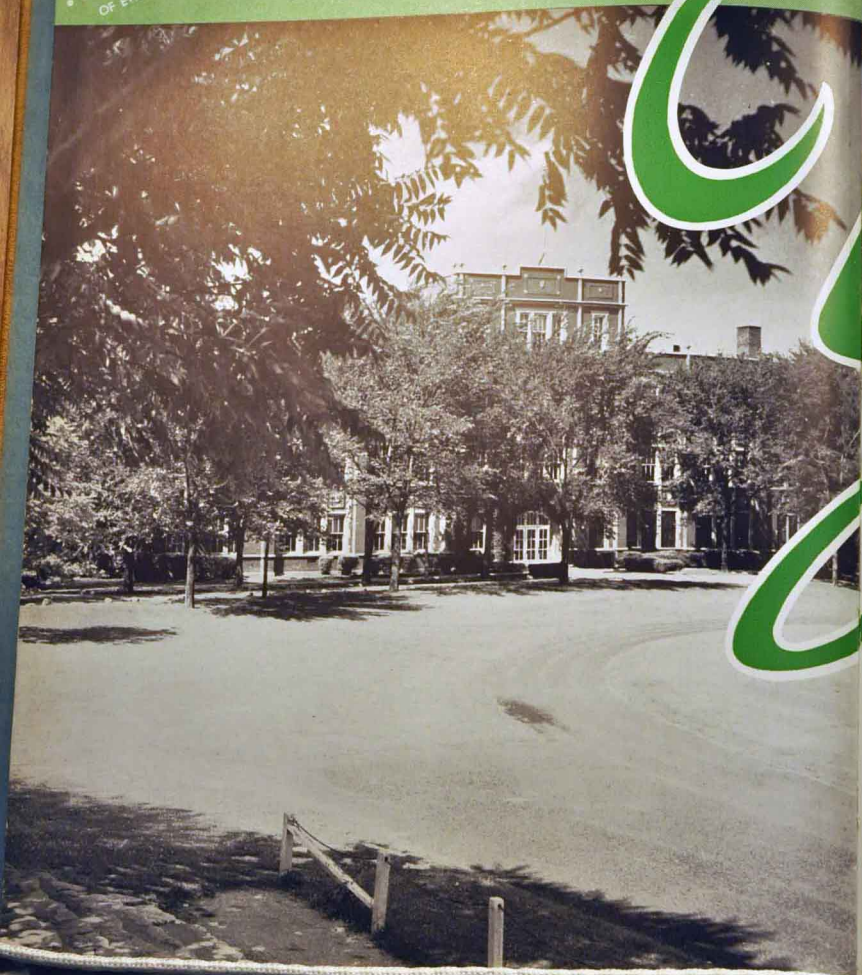

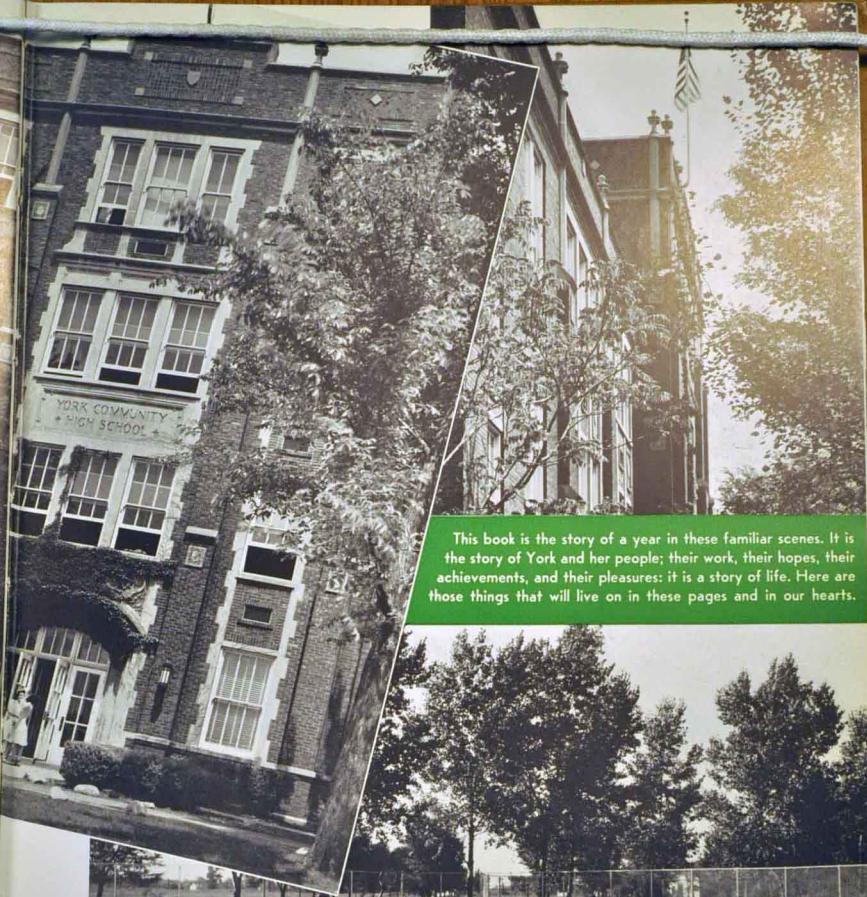

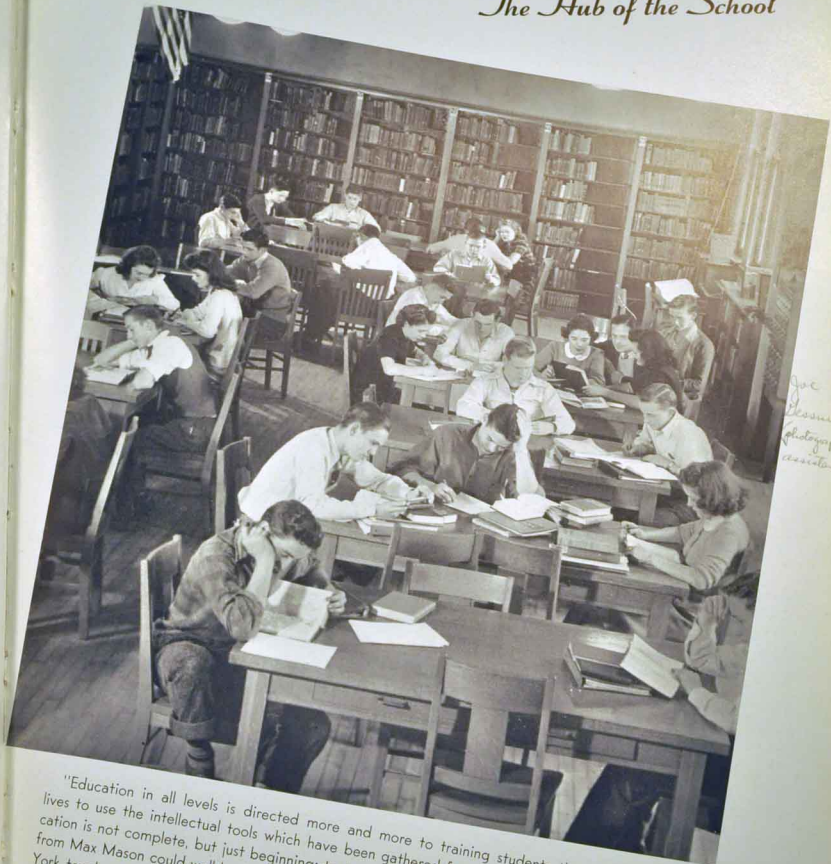


## Office

# Spanish Club is York's Oldest Student Organization

The Spanish Club, sponsored by Miss Miriam Bonifield, is the oldest student organization at York. For twenty-one years it has upheld with dignity and honor its motto, "Foster friendly Pan-American relations." Never before have the principles for which the club stands been of more value than today in this time of world crisis.

Membership in the club is restricted to Spanish students only. This year's enrollment totals 134 members. Any student who is in his second year is automatically eligible, as well as freshmen who have completed the first semester with an A or B average.

A merit system is followed whereby the more active members are rewarded for their services to the club, by earning 20 points. The highest award given by the club is a guard for the pin. Points are earned by attending the club meetings and for any services given to the club.

Meetings of the club are held after school on the second Wednesday of each month. Occasionally meetings are conducted in cooperation with other high schools in order that the students may become acquainted with the problems and ideas of other clubs. Programs for all meetings are arranged by a committee chosen by the president. Various speakers, widely known in their respective fields and of interest to Spanish students, are frequently presented. Students have charge of programs, plan them and to a great extent actually give them.

The Spanish Club is a member of the National Pan American League. Special honor was received by the club when Emmett Comiskey, a member of the club for the past three years, was elected president of the North Central Association of the Student Pan American League at its 1941 meeting at Quincy Senior High School, Quincy, Illinois.

At least half of the club's meetings are devoted entirely to social pleasures with the alternate meetings devoted to business. The club is financed by yearly dues, by selling candy and ice cream at football and basketball games, and by sponsoring socials and booths at school events such as the Hallowe'en Party and the school carnival. Pins are awarded after a member has earned forty-five points through participation in club activities. In these pursuits the members have a good chance both to enjoy themselves and to show their skill in the arts of cooking and sewing. The colorful Style Show displays sewing ability, while club parties display the culinary ability of the girls.

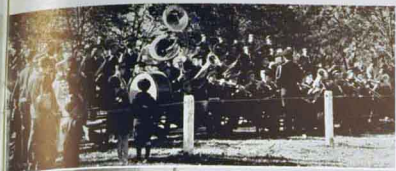

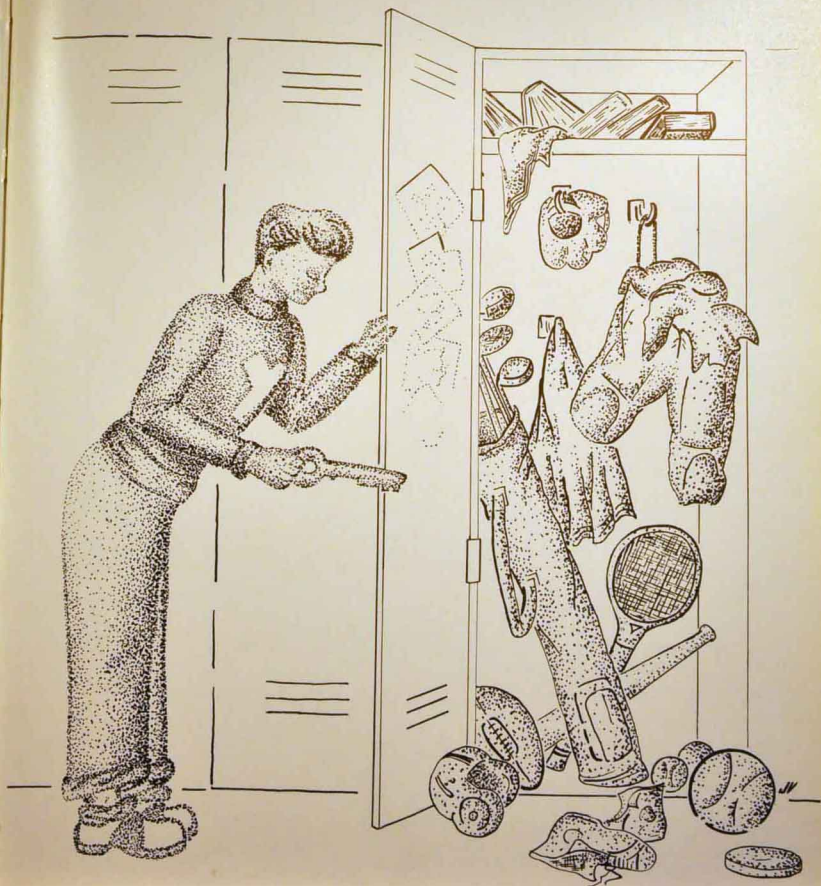

But one muddy day, the same day the heavyweights made their only triumph, the Maine line plunging proved a little more effective in the slough than the fast offensive of York and the hoped-for title was lost by one point.

The Red and White ponies from Hinsdale were the first team to succumb to the Baron onslaught. Maine set York back in the mud the next week, 7-6, as mentioned above. Coming back to vent their chagrin on all who stood in the way, the lightweights smothered Riverside and Glenbard by track-meet scores. Downers Grove was next. The Purple had won every game by three touchdowns until they invaded York, but they couldn't stop the Korfmen all afternoon. The Barons piled up a three touchdown margin over the hapless Purple eleven while Downers never reached pay dirt.

Last to fall before the Lights was LaGrange. Another muddy field slowed the teams up, but York's second period touchdown was all that was necessary to win. The victory climaxed a season that will not only be remembered by the gridders themselves, but by many fans who follow the successes of lightweight football at York.

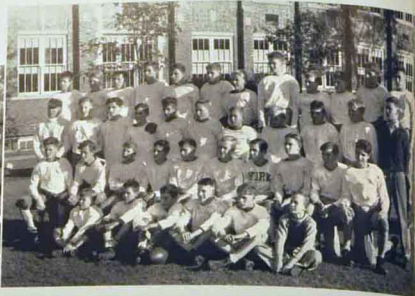

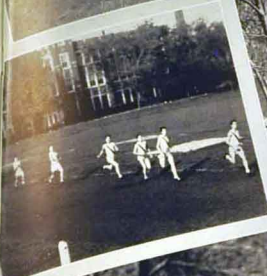

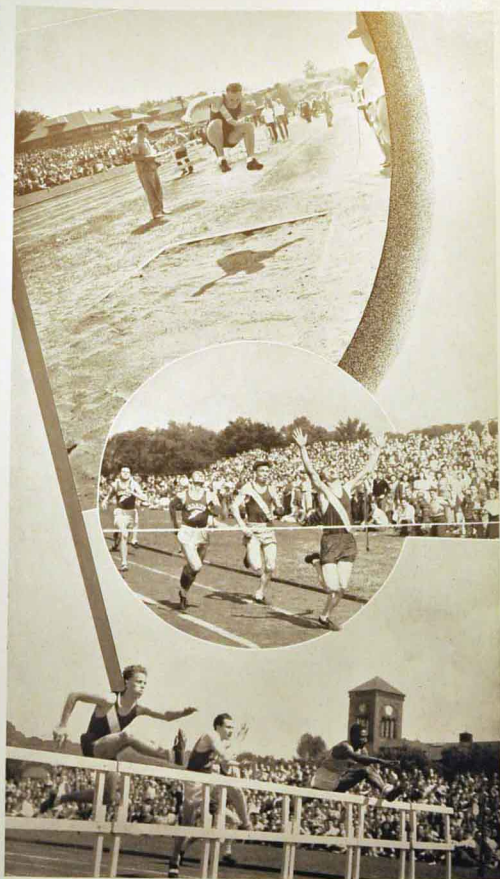

A thrilling 53-43 defeat of Naperville by the Green and White was the high point of York's indoor dual meets. In four years the Red and White had not been beaten in dual meet competition in the North Central College field house, the scene of most of York's hot house activities. It was this meet in which Harvey Nack of the spring Dukes established a prep 440 record for the N. C. oval.

The Eastmen defeated, in all, six teams; East Aurora, Joliet, Wheaton, Hinsdale, Naperville, and Maine, and lost to three; Naperville (first meet of season), Oak Park, and New Trier.

One of the most encouraging features of the early work was the outstanding improvements in some of the boys over the previous season and the continued improvements during the long winter work. Cross country did much for Stu Haney, junior, and Gerald Bushey, senior, as was evidenced by their performances in the mile; while a very encouraging feature for future teams was the actions of freshmen Dick Rose and Don Nelson in the dashes and broad jump and Thorton Lowe, junior, in the hurdles. The outstanding improvement was shown by Bill Faganel, a senior, in the pole vault. He raised his mark more than two feet over his last year's standard. If such improvements are experienced by all the tracksters, York will be a definite threat to coin the Naperville Relays for the second successive year.

A combination hike and picnic is held in the fall, at which prospective members are introduced to the activities of the club. Just before Christmas a pot luck supper is held to initiate the new members.

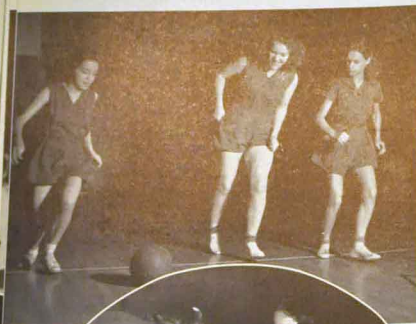
At the mothers' and daughters' tea in the spring, certificates of awards are presented to those girls who have earned them, and the mothers are acquainted with the functions of the organization.

## Girls Friendly Foes in Sports

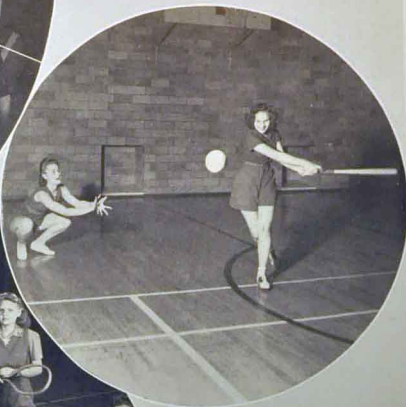
