




York Dedicates This Page to Her Alumni and All Americans Fighting to Preserve Truth and Right


York will remember them for their contributions to the school, and in turn these students will cherish always the memories of their alma mater and the four years so profitably and enjoyably spent there.



Miss Canan, head of the Foreign Languages Department, came to York High on January 14, 1920, first teaching mathematics to the 116 pupils in the one-room community house on Church Street where classes were held after the old high school burned down. Since she came to York, she has been prominent in junior class work, P.T.A., Parents' Club. and Spanish Teachers' Associations. On her trips from coast to coast, including several to Mexico, she has collected many interesting articles which she has on display in her Spanish room. One of her hobbies is saving Latin-American cartoons, which collection she started in 1914. At the close of the twenty-fourth year at York she comments, "I've thoroughly enjoyed every year here."

Twenty-five years ago a new York was being built, and in the fall of 1920 Mr. East came to York. Since he has been here, fe has taught a variety of subjects including mechanical drawing, algebra and physical education. He holds the somewhat dubious honor of being the only man to have taught girls' physical education classes of York. He has coached over his quota of York football, track, swimming, and basketball championship teams. He enjoys coaching football most, with track running a close second. After struggling in vain for several years, York's Orchestra has slowly been coming into its own. Mr. McAdow, the director, believes that with the help of the incoming talent from the newly organized grade-school orchestra York's orchestra will in a few years be a regularly recognized organization, capable of giving its own concerts.

Since a different number of people seem to come out each time the orchestra plays, it is rather hard to give any set instrumentation. 





The York Historical Society, at present under the sponsorship of Mr. Van Norman, has played an active part in school life, since its founding in 1938. The purpose of the Historical Society, often familiarly called the History Club, is to bring to the attention of the members significant facts not ordinarily covered in the regular courses of history.

Red Cross Serves Nation in Wartime


In war times one of the most important clubs at York is the Junior Red Cross Club. It has sponsored most of the drives in which high school students are able to contribute to the war effort. 



Byron Dixon, one of the team's mainstays, was at the dulback spot, where he carried the ball and did the passing in a commendable way.

In front of this fast backfield, which used the popular T formation, was a strong, heavy line. Spearhead of the forward wall was Co-Captain Bobby Poile, outstanding tackle. Al Dobbeck manned the center position and did a fine job on defense backing-up the line. At guards were Kenny Apel and Hank Garland. The 185 pound Apel, by the fime the season ended, turned into one of the most rugged players in the league. Harry Winn, 200 pounds of tackle, carried the brunt of the Duke attack.

At the end position York had three expert wingmen, Bob Kerkoch, Dick ("Joe") Quiter, and LeRoy Bright. Kerkoch was the best defensively, while Quiter was called Don Hutson, and you know why.

Herman Rabe and Roy Ottesen were the managers for the Green and White varsity. York had a reliable list of reserves. Don Olson, a junior, and Art Jonsson, a sophomore, were subs in the backfield. "Ole" was Dixon's understudy, while Jonsson could play either Avedisian's or Sturtevant's position. Dick Mitter was an alternate tackle with Harry Winn. Dick entered the Army Air Corps in February. John Weber and Tom Floyd were alternates at guards. The latter left in mid-season to ioin the Armed Forces.

York Lightweights Retain Conference Crown


This year, York's Barons successfully defended their conference crown. Hampered by injuries, however, they managed only a title for the first notch with Downer's Grove. One of the greatest obstacles confronting the lights was their over-confidence, which was quickly taken out of them by their loss to Maine and tie with Downers.

York opened its season with a nocturnal contest against the Wheaton Frosh-Soph. Lloyd Sandford led the way for a York victory of 37-0 by scoring three touchdowns against the heavier opponents. The next week-end, York traveled to LaGrange and again came out on the long end of a 28-6 score. False confidence was further bolstered against a weak Hinsdale team which went down in obscure defeat with a score of 33-0. This was the last game at which backfield Coach Walter Knudson was officially present before he entered the Navy as a lieutenant [i.g.]. Against Maine, York was attacked with a case of fumblitis and was greatly hampered by the absence of "Red" Sandford, who was injured in the Hinsdale game. Speedily scoring in the first quarter, York slowed down, and Maine began a sustained march which payed off late in the last half. York's still bright chance for an undisputed

crown were greatly diminished the next weekend by tying Downers Grove, 6-6. With the prospect of a third or fourth place facing them, the Barons buckled down and defeated Glenbard, 13-0. York then played Highland Park, a non-conference foe, and defeated them 6-0. In the final and all-important game against Riverside, the Barons played brilliantly and vanquished the Zoo-Towners by an overwhelming margin of 25.0

Much credit for York's championship must be given to Lloyd Sandford, Baron backfield ace. His presence in the line-up not only aided the lightweights physically, but it gave them a tremendous boost in morale. He undoubtedly was the West Suburban Conference's highest scorer, and, as Coach Korf has said, he was the best backfield man to play on one of York's lightweight squads.



Fallon Jakes Over Heavyweights in Birks' Absence

As another basketball season goes into the record books, York's players and fans can look back on a successful heavyweight cage team.

When coach Henry Fallon took over the coaching borth, both he and the players were handicapped. It required quite a bit of time before the players caught on to Coach Fallon's system of play. Then again the Duke mentor was unfamiliar with the material at York. Despite these drawbacks, the Green and White had a commendable season, finishing in a tie for third in the West Suburban conference.

The Dukes dropped their first three non-conference games because of their inexperience with Fallon's new style of play. Proviso defeated York twice and Oak Park did the trick once. The first conference game was with Maine, York winning 46 to 35. This is the tilt in which Byron Dixon broke the conference scoring record by virtue of 28 points on 12 basets and four penalty shots.

The following weekend the Green and White traveled to Hinsdale only to suffer a 43 to 33 setback. Riverside nosed the Dukes out 35 to 34 in an overtime in York's next game. On their home floor the Dukes took another pasting, this time at the hands of Downers Grove, 36 to 30.

Against La Grange the heavies finally hit the winning column, defeating the Lions 37 to 33. With Dixon and Olson scoring 25 out of their team's 34 points, York trounced Maine 34 to 18.

Then Glenbard invaded York. Glenbard won the game on free hrovs—York gave them 39 chances. The score was 43 to 34. York's next game with Hinsdale was another one of those one-point games. York lost again 36 to 35, after leading the first three periods. In the meantime Glenbard had a nine game winning streak to top the conference. The Dukes upset the Bards 40 to 33, handing them their only defeat of the season in league play.

York added another victory by downing Riverside 46 to 39 only to be defeated 38 to 27 by Downers the following weekend. In their last league game of the season, the Dukes were nosed out by La Grange, 43 to 40. Playing Belvidere in a post-season game before the tourney, York lost 40 to 35.

The sparkplug of the Dukes was Co-captain Byron Dixon, who scored 154 points in conference play, only to be nosed out by Dick Malm's 157 points. At the other forward position with Dixon was Don Olson, a junior, who was fourth in the conference scoring race. At center was Paul Luehr, another boy who will be back next year.

Co-captain Dick Coons manned the guard spot in a capable manner. The other guard spot was handled by Bob Poile and Ken Apel. Coach Fallon had good reserves in Al Jones, Lee Sturtevant and Jiggs Mueller, a sophomore.

Coach Fallon and the players are to be congratulated on their fine showing. Next year's prospects appear bright since there will be experienced men returning.





One of the disadvantages of having track


he has always had a boy who could put the shot over 45'.

Physical Education Program Meets Wartime Needs



Just as the war has brought about many changes in our daily life, so has it affected the life of York's male students. At the present time the physical education program, under the supervision of Mr. Maynard J. Black, is preparing the youth of this community for service in the armed forces. Students are now given extensive drills in big muscle building activities which will properly condition the boys physically for service in Uncle Sam's family. Tests are given at regular intervals to measure and evaluate the progress of each student.

Boys of the junior and senior classes are required to take physical education, or as it is more often called, "gym," three times a week. While the underclassmen have to attend health classes, they also are required to take physical education. Assisting Mr. Black in instructing the gym classes is Mr. Henry Fallon, who also doubles as heavyweight basketball coach. In March, however, Mr. Fallon took a leave of absence from the faculty, making it necessary for Mr. Herbert Korf to take over his gym classes. Up to that time Mr. Korf had been health instructor for both the boys and grifs.

Calisthenics were the most used means of putting muscle on York's Charles Atlases. A horizontal ladder, stall bars, horizontal bars, as well as climbing

ropes, were used to condition gym class students.

In the fall touch football is played, besides the usual calisthenics. Basketball is the game the boys play in the gym classes in the winter, while in the spring baseball takes the spotlight.

York's Intramural Program Made Year-Round Activity

This year, for the first time in York history, a concentrated, year-round program of intramural sports was put into a ffect for the benefit of those boys who did not participate in varsity competition. The program was under the direction of Messrs, Black, McClear, Zacharias, and Emery, who were aided by Miss Hanifen in the girls' division.

During the touch football season, a league was set up based upon the gym class divisions. Each class entered one or two football teams of six men each who participated in a schedule of about four games per team. Shialds were awarded to the freshman and sophomore champions only, although there was a large turnout among the upperclassmen.

An attempt to organize a wrestling program failed when it was found impossible to obtain an instructor and sponsor for that sport. For the midwinter period, however, large basketball programs in which over 300 boys were entered was carried on throughout the winter season. Each team played about seven games over a period of as many weeks. Mr. Black was aided in the scheduling and compiling of averages by his student manager, Charles McCaleb. At the end of the season two championship basketball games were played with Glenbard quintets. All Dobback's team, which captured the championship for York in the junior-senior division, dropped a decision to the Glenbard junior champions, and an all-star team captained by Lee Bright firmly trounced the Hillfoppers.


A program of softball was planned for the spring with an estimated 400 boys participating. The entire program gave all York boys much needed recreation and the training which they lacked by not being on varsity teams.

The highlight of the softball season will be reached when an All-Star game is played with Glenbard, York's arch rivals. Messrs. Emery, Zacharias, and McClear are also to be congratulated along with Mr. Black on the manner in which they have conducted the intramural program. Several hundred boys are now enjoying competitive athletics, whereas before they did not possess the ability to play varisty athletics.
