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## OUR CAMPUS

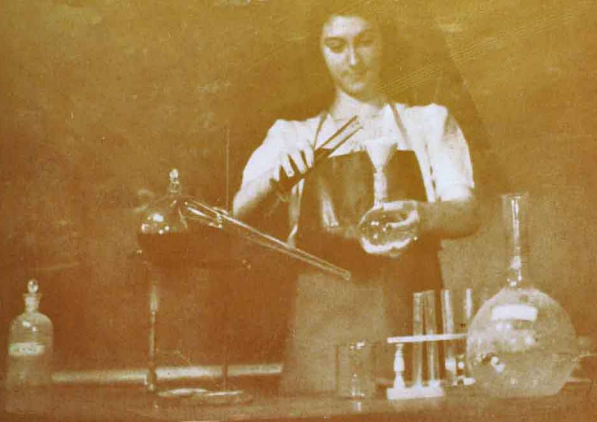

Whether it be spring, summer, fall, or winter, York's campus is enjoyed by students, faculty, and residents of the community.







Her first teaching was done in the Community House on Church Street, where makeshift classrooms were used until the first unit of the York building was ready for occupancy in the fall. She at first taught mathematics and Latin; now she teaches the Spanish language.

The many interesting articles such as vases, baskets, and sombreros found in Room 221 are reminders of Miss Canan's trips to Spain and Mexico. She has taken it upon herself not only to teach the Spanish language but also to know about the cultural and economic backgrounds of the people who speak the language. The extensive set of picture post cards which she has collected in all the countries she has visited make up many interesting volumes.

Miss Canan takes an active part in the Modern Language Teachers' Association. She originally sponsored the York Spanish Club; and now, although she no longer supervises it, she still remains vitally interested and ready to lend a hand in its activities. The club gave a tea for Miss Canan this year to show its appreciation and gratitude for her work. The Board of Education presented her with a beautiful orchid and a resolution of esteem which she has already put among her memoirs. The York P.T.A. also gave her recognition at its February meeting.

This year she initiated a new course in the curriculum, Latin-American history. She has great interest and a rich background in this field which will give her students a fine conception of their South-American neighbors.

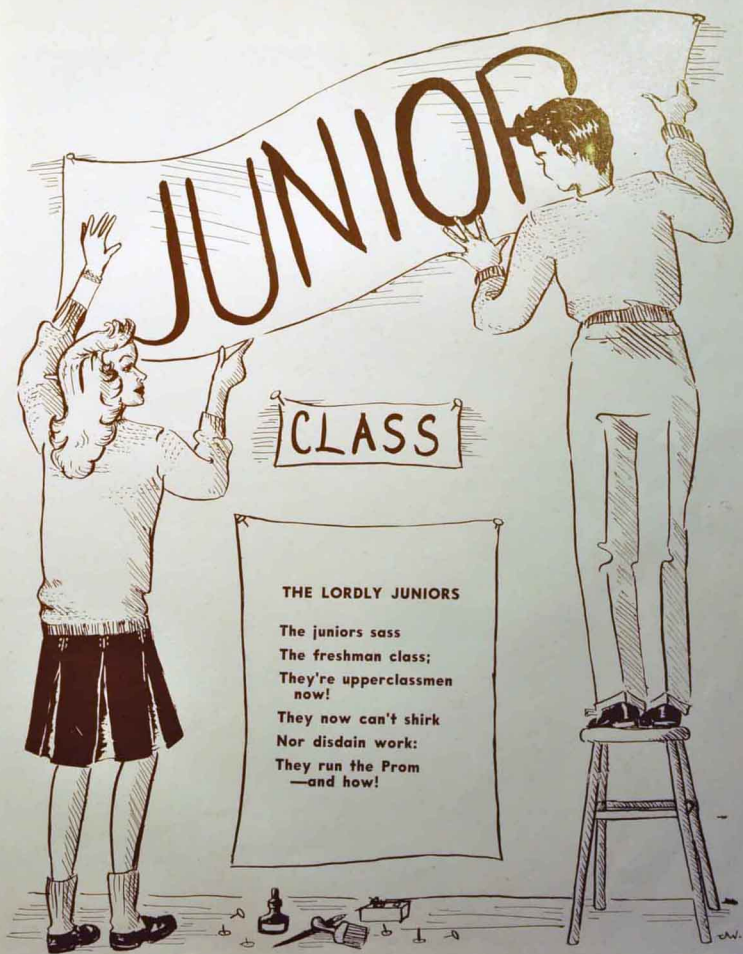

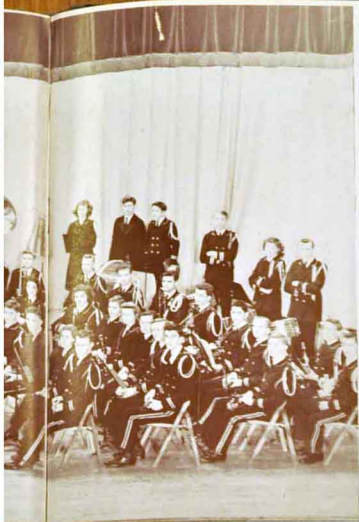

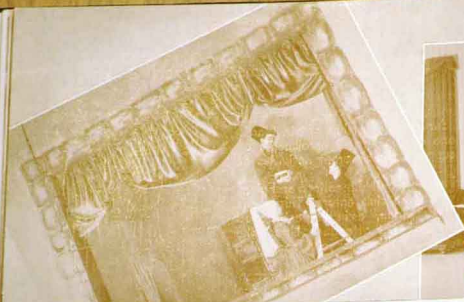

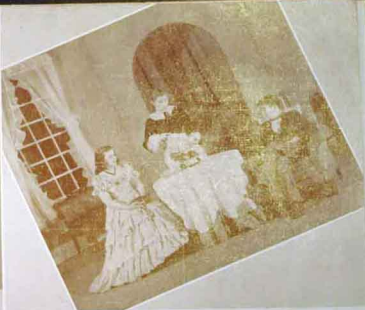
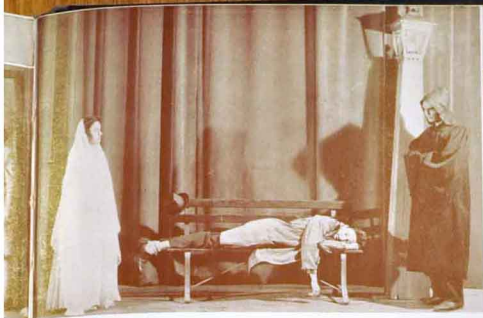
The Thespian Club, a national dramatic honor society, under the direction of Miss Doris E. White, represents York's dramatic talent.

The Red Cross Club, founded in the spring of 1940, has for its goals service, health, and education for better citizenship. The war has put an emphasis on the goal of service and the Red Cross has achieved it nobly.

The Victory Book Campaign was a definite success. Approximately two thousand books were collected in York's English classes, one hundred of which were sent directly to a service center in the Pacific area. Two hundred books for women were sent to the women's branches of the armed forces. Five hundred of the books of the juvenile type were distributed to orphan homes.

The Red Cross also sponsors projects through other clubs. Through the Spanish Club one hundred and seventy-six dollars and seventy-two cents was collected by the sale of bangle pins to stamp out tuberculosis. Afghan squares were knitted and slippers made by the Home Economics Department. The National Honor Society packed boxes of school supplies to re-equip schools destroyed in Europe. All this has been accomplished under Miss Hibbard's leadership.

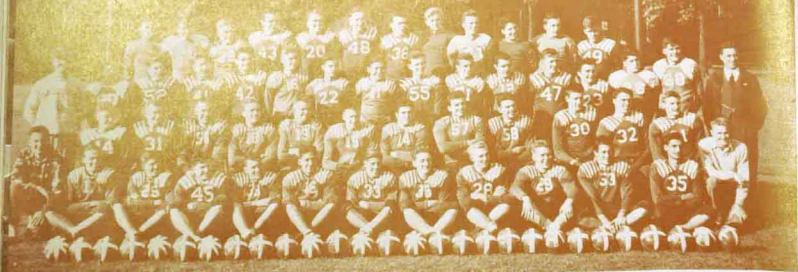

The Riverside game was the upset of the conference, York was picked to lose, but smashed through to a score of 13-6. If the boys had started about fifteen minutes earlier, they might have won the game.

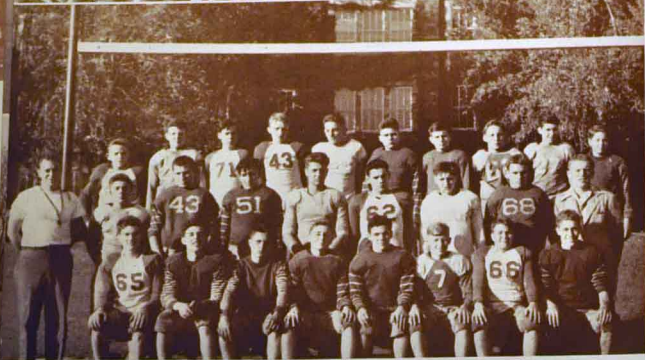

## Heavyweight Basketball

In the second season of Mr. Fallon's mentorship, the York Dukes won four conference games and lost eight to tie for fifth place.

The Dukes dropped the first two games, both non-conference, to Wheaton, 37-27, and to Proviso, 50-29. The next week, however, La Grange was downed by a determined York five, 26-20. This was followed by heavy losses, to Blue Island and Wheaton, both by close scores, and Maine. The Dukes again hit the win column by trimming Hinsdale, 45-32. The team, which scored twenty-eight points to their opponents' six in the first half, was led by Captain Olson with 15 tallies.

Following the Christmas holidays, York met her traditional rival, Glenbard, at Glenbard and bowed, 30-26, after losing two valuable men, Vogel and Dobbeck, on fouls. The next week found York holding Riverside to their lowest conference score thus far, but still losing, 36-20.

Four losses followed close upon each other, three conference and one non-conference, before the Dukes found their pride again and sent Glenbard under, 37-32. A loss to Riverside and then a victory over Downers Grove closed the door on York's 1944-45 heavyweight basketball conference season.

The team was lead by Olson and Luehr, lanky center, who between them accounted for 198 of the teams 360 conference points. "Jiggs" Mueller and Al Dobbeck handled the guard position, abetted only by "Curly" Vogel. Three fellows, Fusaro, Reuhl, and Edwards shared the other forward berth.

One cannot call this an extremely successful season, but neither was it a failure. Though they could not be called a championship quintet, the Dukes visibly improved in their last three conference games and undoubtedly would have gone places in the league if they had found themselves earlier in the year. A win over Proviso in the Regional was the happy climax of the year.

Mr. Fallon performed a fine job of coaching and really had a trim-looking squad. The members of this year's team wish him all the luck in the world during his next season.

Playing their first game at home and also their first conference game, the Barons completely shattered the La Grange defense by a score of 34-21.

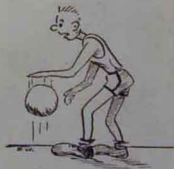

The following week-end the Green and White traveled to Hinsdale, only to be sent home after suffering a 37-21 loss. Trying desperately to defeat their arch rivals from Glenbard, the Barons were unable to come through in the right moments and were defeated, 38-22. When Riverside traveled to York, a basketball game was played which will not be forgotten for a long time. Dan Egan finally saved the game by sinking a difficult shot and gave York a 24-23 victory. The following week Downers Grove fell, 36-25. In the first round of play, York had won three and lost three.

Traveling to La Grange for their second tilt of the season, York again hit the winning column by a score of 42-30. Again Maine appeared on the scene, only this time York didn't appear to have what it takes and lost, 41-28. On their home floor, the Barons accepted Hinsdale's challenge, holding the Imps to an 18-18 tie at the half; but being unable to cope with a second-half drive, they finally were defeated 42-32. The earlier defeat at the hands of Glenbard was avenged in an exciting game from which York advanced victor, 29-27. A repeat performance with Riverside was enacted when again York defeated them, 31-24. For the third straight conference victory, the Barons, led by Dan Egan, defeated the league-leading Downers Grove team in the most thrilling game of the season by a score of 35-32.

York's ability to finish second in the West Suburban Conference, one of the toughest conferences in the state, is ample proof of Mr. Ferry's and the Barons' skill. On the basketball floor this year we have seen many outstanding athletes, including Captain Dan Egan, the high scorer and an outstanding player, at right forward. John Thomas, who alternated at right and left forward positions, was always hot. Bob Kastholm, Joe Kindl, and Ronald Anderson could always be relied upon for points when needed. Jack DuPre and Roy Newlander were seen at center. Their height allowed them to recover many a rebound, and having the ball, they both knew how to use it. The guard positions were shifted among three excellent players, Robert Koenig, Robert Shaw, and Robert Sieving.

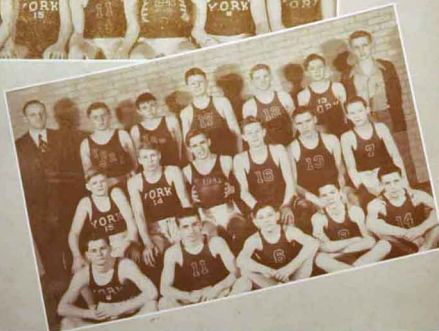
