Student Government Makes a Success of Its First Year

Backed by an overwhelming student vote of approval, vigilantly supervised by Miss Ida Lane Settle and Mr. Howard Van Norman, operated by alert, interested students, York's student Government has successfully terminated its maiden voyage.

To function, a student council needs a firm, yet elastic, constitution; it needs a cooperative crew of workers. All these prerequisites were supplied to York's council. Provided with the best tools of labor, the council had, then, to prove its worth.

At the top to direct the council's program are three executives: a president, a vice-president, and a secretary. The constitution provides for five administrative committees which act as advisors to the executive officers. These bodies, the Activity Committee, the Assembly Committee, the Calendar Committee, the Public Relations Committee, and the Safety Committee, serve to broaden the contacts of the council. Lastly every recognized organization and advisory group is represented by a delegate to the Council. It is the duty of these delegates to initiate legislation and to carry to the council the opinions of the students they represent.

Now the year which served as a test of the strength of the Student Government has passed. Now it would seem that the council deserves the undivided approbation of students and faculty members alike, not merely for its material accomplishments, but for what is far more important, the lessons it has taught in democracy and the American way of life.

Library Is Center of Attraction for Busy Yorkites



York's library is under the supervision of two librarians, Miss Ellis and Mrs. Spencer. They have jurisdiction over the nine thousand volumes in our library, the greater portion of which are supplementary reference books for courses taught at York. Fiction for the reading pleasure of students makes up a large share of the total books, however.

The routine work of the library is done in a large part by a voluntary student staff. These students are chosen from applicants maintaining a C average throughout their terms of service; if their marks drop below this level, they are not permitted to continue. These students must also pass a standard library test with a score of 100 and know the Dewey system of classification. This is the first year that students have received points for helping out in the library. They must devote one hour each day assisting the librarians. For their services they receive points at the rate of 100 per year. At the Honor Day Assembly they receive pins.

During the first week of school the freshmen are brought into the library to become acquainted with its facilities. Later in the year the freshman English classes are given a special unit in library science. This unit includes learning how to use the card catalogue and other reference devices in the library to the best advantage. The unit is presented by the librarians and the English teacher.

The library issues pamphlets and bulletins from time to time to keep students posted on new material and on new bibliographies and visual-aid materials which are being made available from time to time.

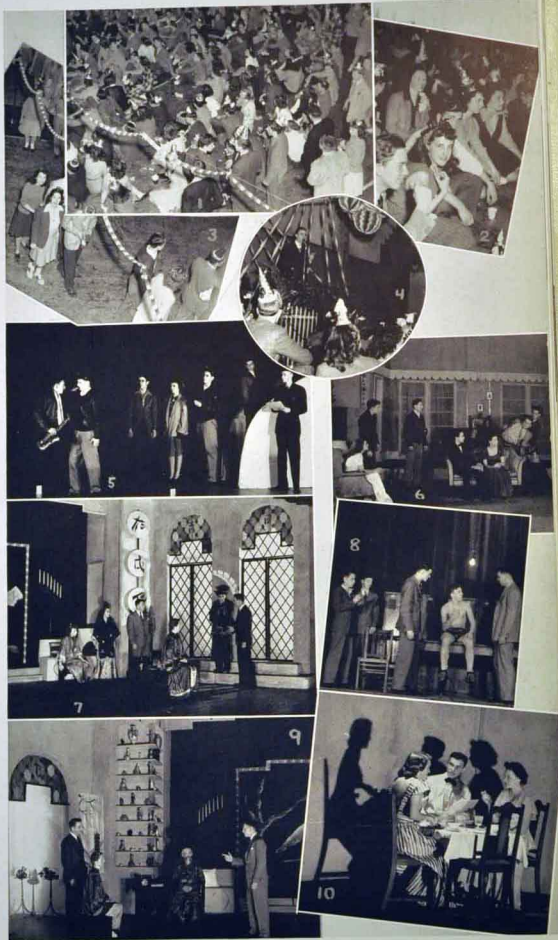

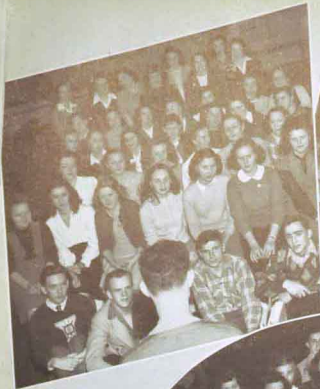

Spanish Club Encourages Good-Neighbor Policy

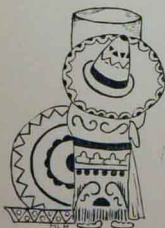
The Spanish Club, oldest organization at York, is sponsored by Miss Miriam Bonifield. For a quarter of a century it has continued to sustain and encourage friendly relations between America and her neighbors to the south. Not only does the club correspond with fellow students in South America, but it tries to give Yorkites an insight into the Latin-American way.

The club meets the second Wednesday of each month. Students volunteer for the committees which arrange and put on the programs. The club observes all Spanish holidays, such as Columbus Day. On that particular occasion, a talk was given by one of the members telling the story of Columbus and his famous voyage across the ocean. Like all the skits, it was written by the actors themselves.

At other meetings, movies were shown telling interesting happenings and doings of Latin Americans. One film was on sky dancers who dangled from a pole two hundred feet in the air. Another was on wooden faces. Several students gave exotic examples of Spanish dances and songs at the meetings.

Points are usually gained by taking part in the various programs, helping to plan future meetings, donating refreshments for the parties, and doing the thankless task of cleaning up after meetings.

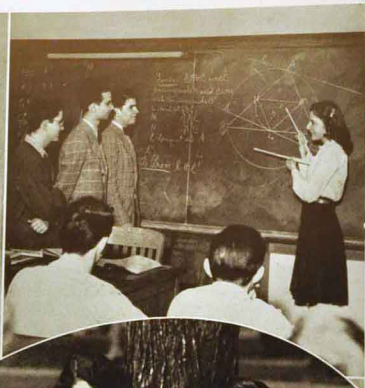


Math Club Celebrates First Anniversary This Year

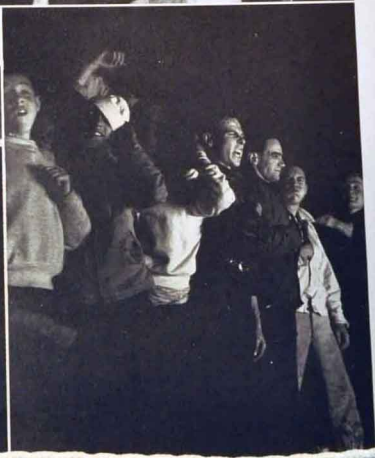
Annual Bonfire Proves a Night of Fun for Everyone

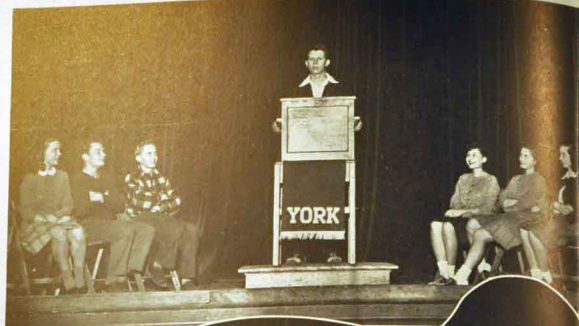
Late in October the club held a hayride in hopes of obtaining enough money to pay for the pins which were given out to members of the club who have done things to aid the school.

Fallon Takes Over Lightweights

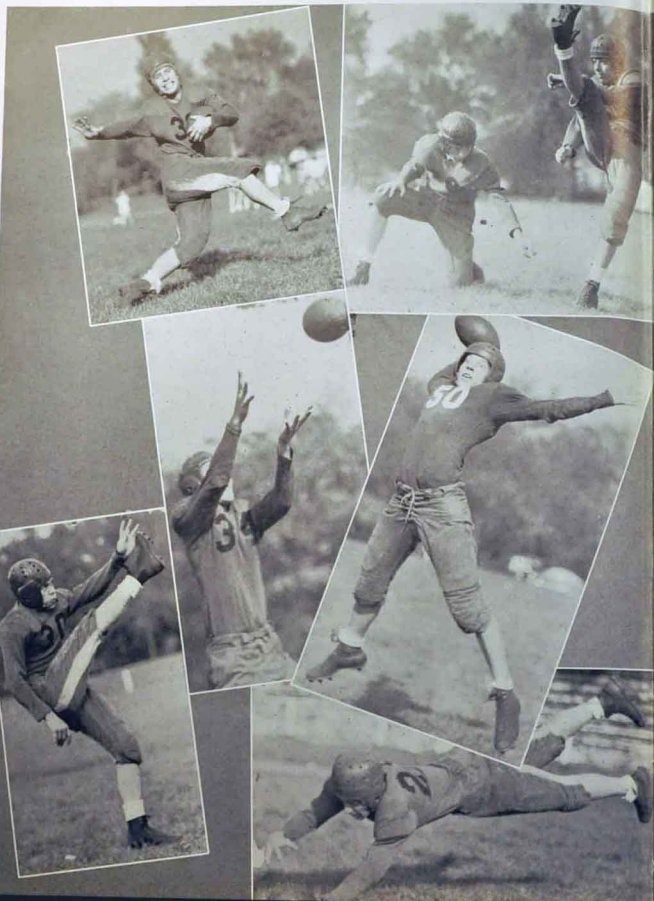

Barons Have Smallest and Lightest Team in History

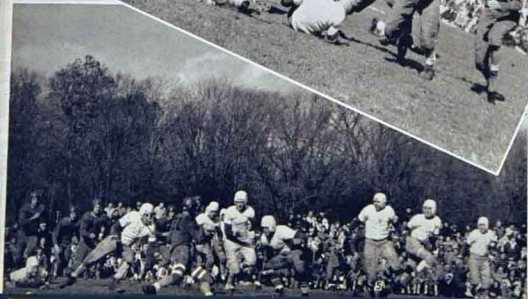
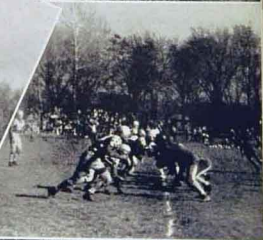

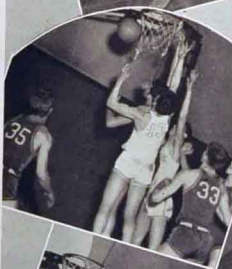
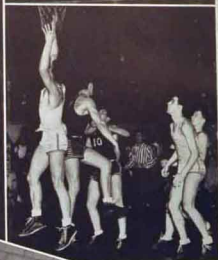

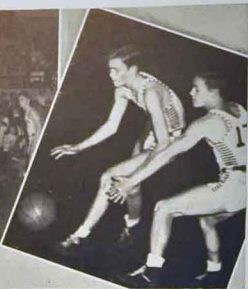

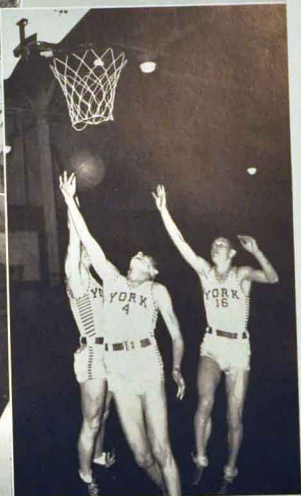

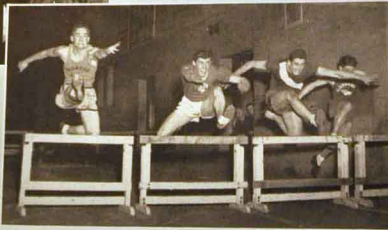
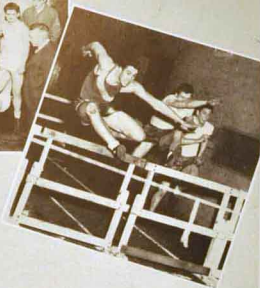
Golf and Tennis Teams Highlight Spring Sports Parade

The 880 relay team of Harbron, Lichtenheld, Dykema, and Tiedemann has been improving steadily and should go places this year.

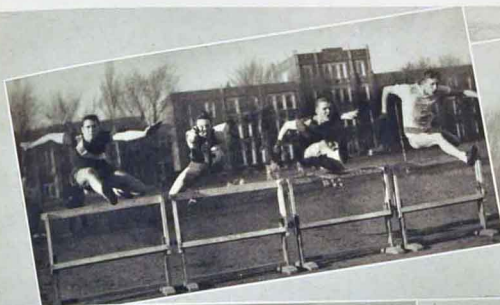
Eckstein, Bales, Dykema, and Miller compose the Eastmen's two-mile relay squad.

Mr. Black and his willing assistants are to be commended for their work toward a bigger and even better intramural program.
