


Many Scenes in Our Sentimental Journey

Scenic Charm of York's Campus Impresses Sightseers






The 1947 Ys Tales is a Cook's Tour of York Events






Y's Student Council Steers Us Through Another Year

























Collectively a great team, individually a swell bunch of guys, the 1947 heavyweight squad deserves all the cradit we can give 'em!










