
















tough uphill battle.

In the Regional Tournament which finished the season, York beat I. C. of Elmhurst, 48 to 33, and then was eliminated by Glenbard who won with a desperation shot in the last second of play.



Eligibility for awards is determined by a point system set up by the


state office.
