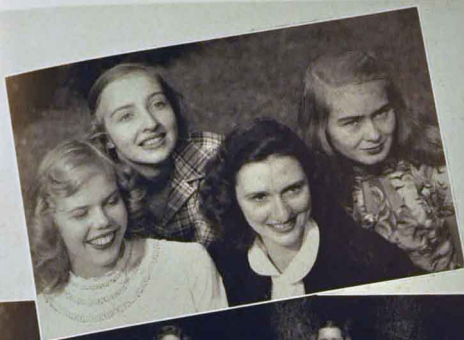
The climax of the Year's activities, of course, is the induction ceremonies for new members in April.

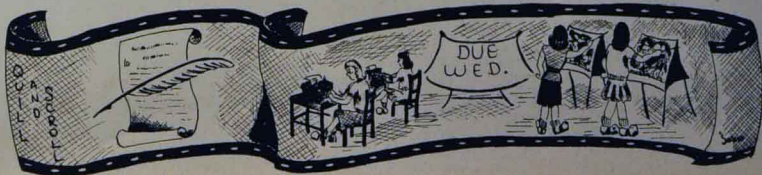

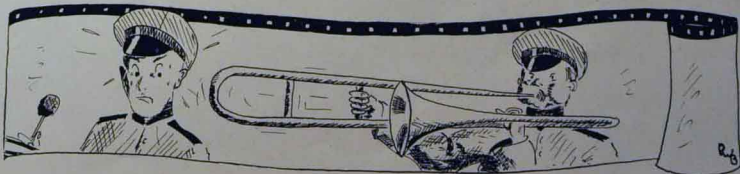

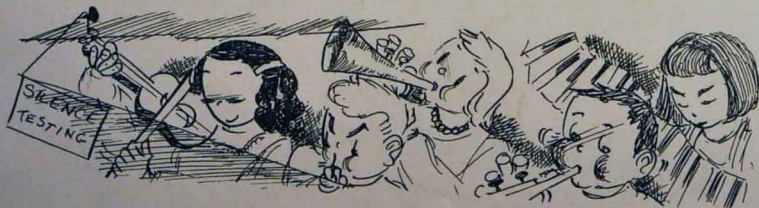

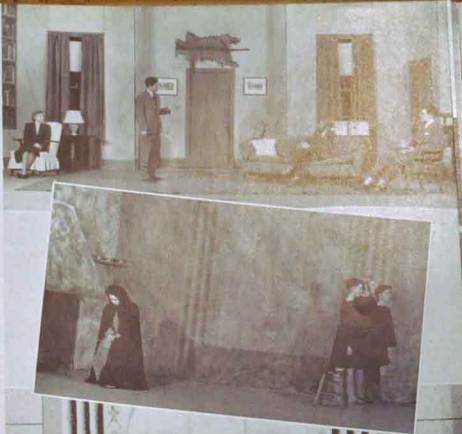
All three plays were smashing hits.

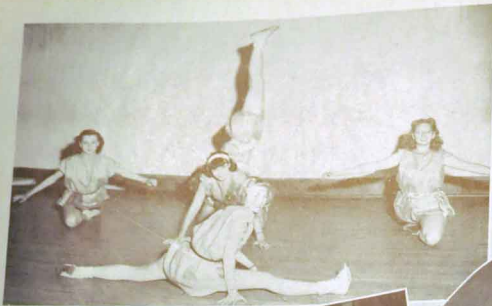

Red Cross Gives Dance for Underprivileged Children



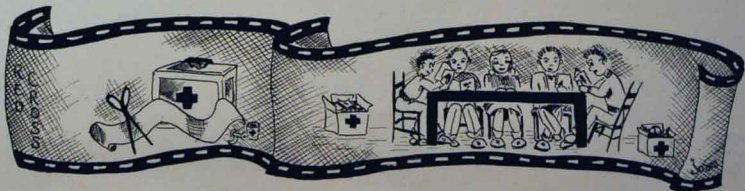

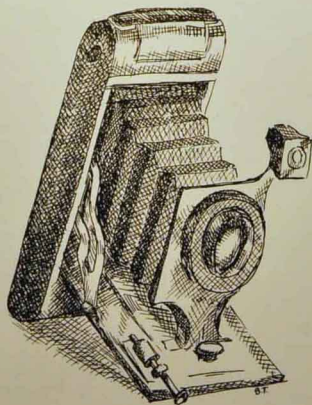

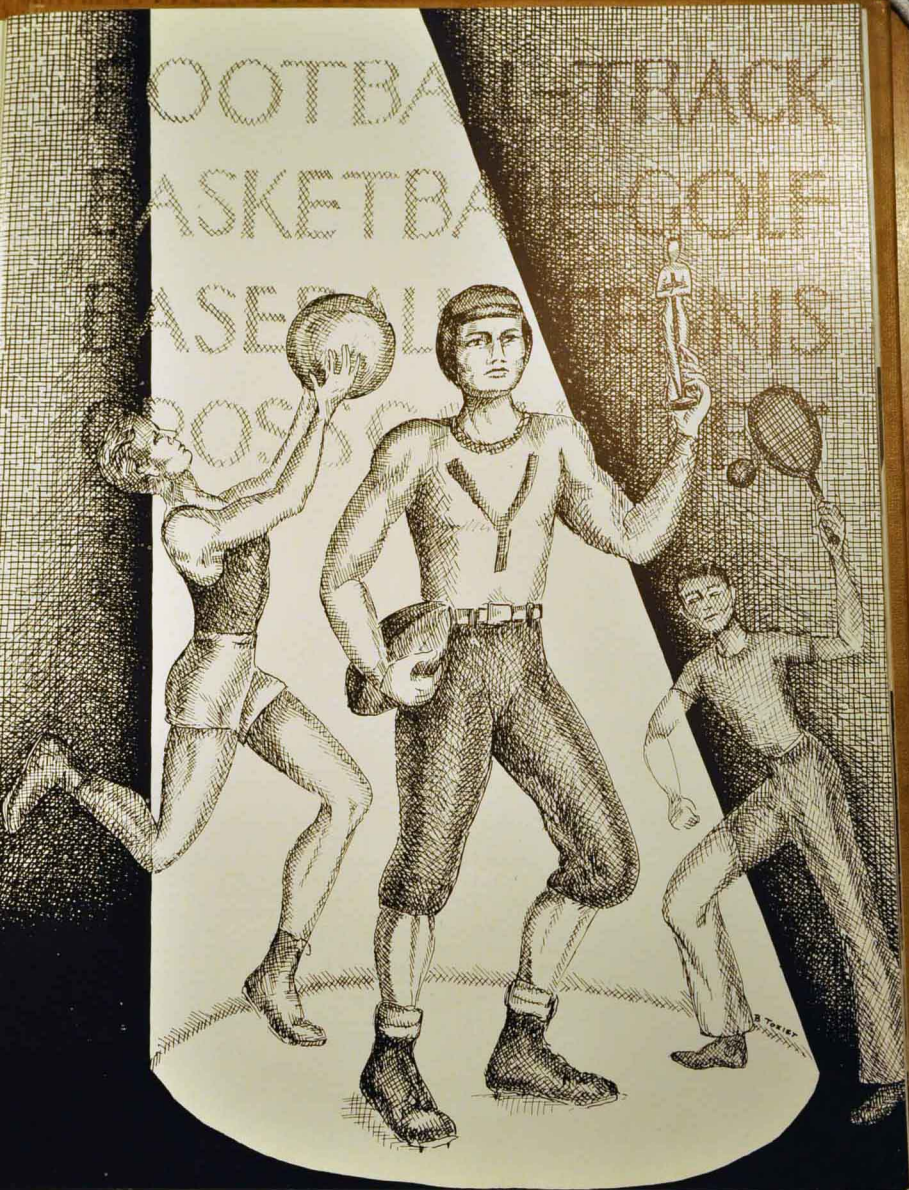

Stefani and Kieffer Pilot Light, But Spirited Team

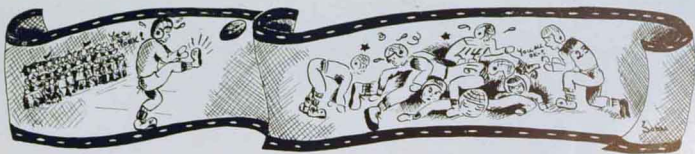

Starting their conference season off on the right foot, the little Dukes won a close game with Hinsdale 7-0. Sykora went over early in the first quarter for the only score of the game.

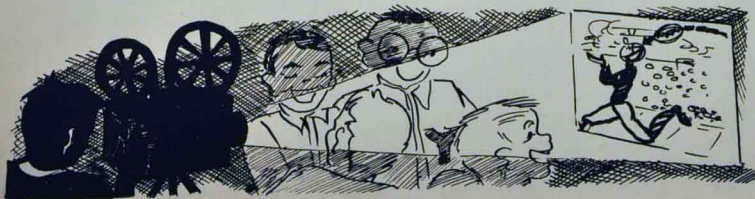
Under the lights at Maine, York put together a safety by Ross and a touchdown by Luhrsen to win by a score of 9-0.

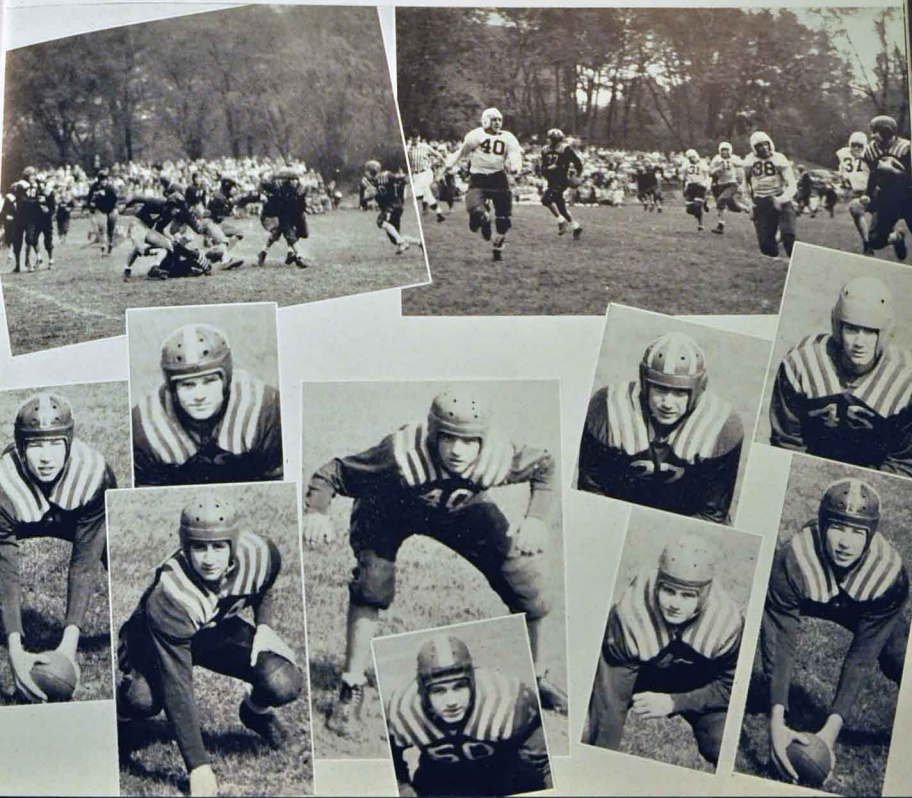
Year of Frosh-Soph Competition for President's Cup

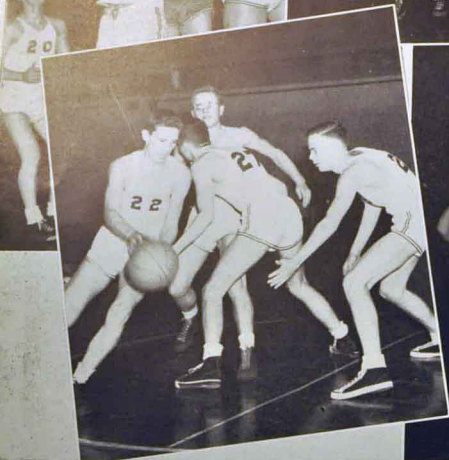

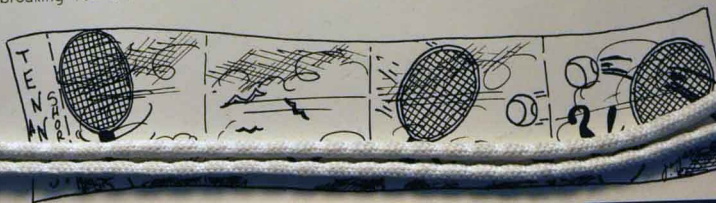

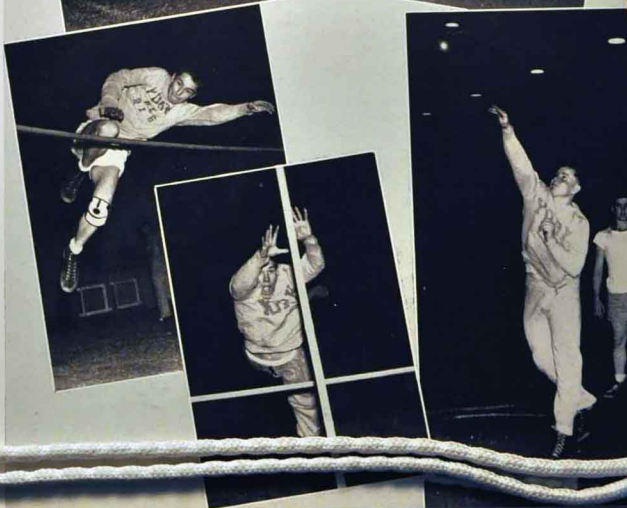
