


### Class of '50 is Bound for Golden Opportunities







The York Round Table is a discussion and debate club open to all students interested in public speaking, debate, or discussion.

The point system was revived. A member must earn thirty-one points before he is eligible to receive a pin. These points may be earned by participating in debates and discussions, by attending the meetings, and by selling at sports events.

The program includes four types of activities: panel discussions, round table discussions, formal debates, and extemporaneous speeches. Panel discussions teach the member to cover part of a subject thoroughly and to keep on that part. After a panel discussion comes a question period, during which the speaker must be able to answer any questions thrown at him by the audience.

Formal debates must be well prepared and all the rules of formal debating are closely followed. This teaches the members poise, control of their voices, and courteous argumentation.

Extemporaneous talks teach one to think on his feet as he talks. A member may be called to talk upon any subject whatsoever and to continue until the rest of the club thinks that he has exhausted the topic.

Topics for discussion and debate range all the way from the serious to the facetious: "What can we do about taxes in Illinois and in York Township?" or "Do zebras have black stripes on yellow or vice versa?"

Meetings are held twice a month with Mr. Maclear, the adviser. The programs of panel discussion, round table, formal debate, extemporaneous speaking, and business procedure are rotated so that all members will get what they want.





# Coach Cady Heads Gold Rush in Frosh-Soph Basketball




In the second season of big league basketball, under the able coaching of Mr. Cady, the Frosh-Soph did a little better than the varsity, winning four games.




