York Progresses Within Changing Environment

From the conventional, strict atmosphere of just a few short years ago and through the heights of dissatisfaction and disorder, York has evolved into a progressive learning community.

With the initiation of five shifts, open campus and other relatively liberal policies, a halt in student participation and school spirit was feared. Mr. Thomas Nelson, Math department head, commented, "School spirit is not quite the big thing it used to be with the students. Shift has almost been a death blow to activities."

Responsibility has shifted to the student. It is up to the individual whether his years at York are going to be successful.

Every student was eligible to elect one course to be taken on the pass-fail option. The purpose of this program was to allow students to enroll in classes for interest without pressures attached to a letter grade.

Independent study, a program for expansion of student interest, was available this year. Students entered contracts with faculty members to earn credit. Teachers also found this an ideal opportunity to express their own talents and share interests with others.

Dual credit could be earned by students qualifying for admission to near-by colleges. Higher learning was now available while still completing high school requirements.

IBM sheets reporting absences in each class period were included in the report cards this year. This was an attempt to clarify the previously complicated attendance report.

Ratification of the Students' Rights Bill provided a list of student privileges in day-to-day activities and under punishment.

Outwardly, York has grown. Its resource centers are an integral part of class work. Here students could find assistance from teachers in individual subject areas.

The school itself, through a beautification committee, has taken on a fresh, new look. Money funded by the government and donations from the PTSA have provided newly-painted halls and artifacts throughout the building.

Sincere attempts at reform and changes made in the interest of all have helped structure York into the constantly growing, learning school it is. As French teacher Miss Ryan stated, "Apathy is our worst enemy. We badly need a sense of pride."

3,922 at York

What's adventure at York? Getting to class. Passing periods are a constant reminder of the overcrowding problem at York. Halls narrowed by seemingly infinite lines of lockers increase the sardine situation.

Designed for 2,700, York is presently a bustling community of 3,922. To accommodate the growing populace the District 88 plan was initiated, putting students on five shifts.

During the lunch periods when most students are at school, places to study, congregate or eat are scarce. It is not an unusual occurrence to set down your books at a table and go and get lunch, only to find someone sitting in your place when you return.

Various answers to the overcrowding problems have been proposed by students, teachers, and administrators. A fourth school has been one suggestion. Night classes and a wider spread of shifts has also been brought up. Most hope that York can work out its difficulties without expanding.

As principal Dr. Trevarthen said in an interview with the **York-Hi**, "We don't want to expand York because it's too big already. We should improve York by being more creative with our schedule, such as initiating more evening classes or college courses. Without a referendum we have no money for a new school so we should work to better utilize our present facility."

Outside World Challenges York

Change and the challenge that accompanies it — not only are they evident in the world — they are reflected in York itself. Newly formed doubts about the credibility of government officials plagued the United States. Questions concerning the legality of official actions demanded answers from even the most complacent students.

The energy crisis and its far-reaching effects prompted a change to year-round Daylight Savings Time. Because of the gas shortage students were encouraged to walk or ride the bus to school. Thermostats were lowered making the school uncomfortably cool.

Inflation began to affect students with the mounting food costs in the cafeteria. Milk had increased 40%. Everything from cookies to Fritos had gone up. At one time there was a 5¢ charge for ketchup.

Styles changed also. Pant legs got wider and wider and waistlines went higher. Boys were wearing bow-ties and high-heeled shoes. Girls' heels also got bigger.

A changing community evolved within a changing world, York continues to move with the rapidly changing times. Each individual within the school is affected by each change; no matter how small or insignificant the transition seems, it is an integral part of **THE YORK SHIFT.**

Because of the fuel shortage, York was "dialed down" to approximately 66 degrees. Wearing a coat and staying in close vicinity to a radiator seemed to be the only way to keep warm.

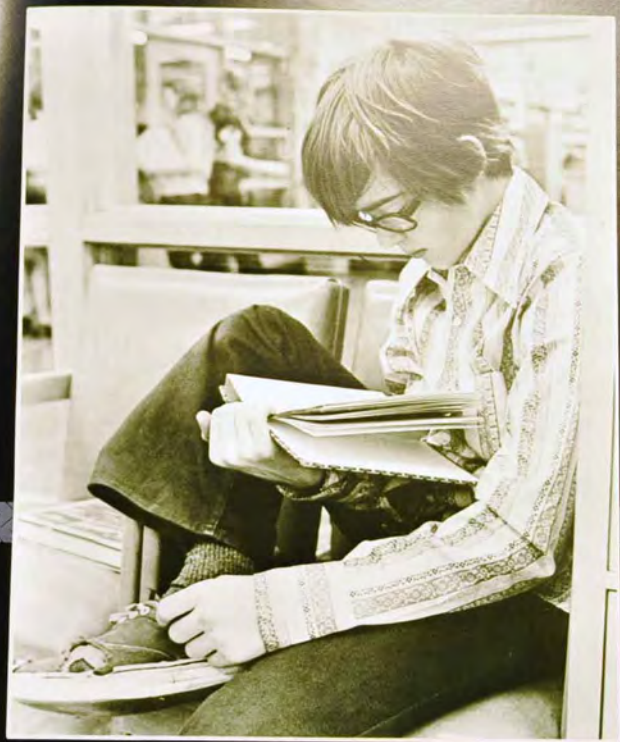


Shoes became a trademark for some this year. Platforms such as these could be identified by their "clunk-clunk" half-way down the hall.

No Valedictorian in '73

Graduation 1973 was marred by the unusual event of a bomb scare. While Mr. Patterson, Senior Class advisor, kept the graduating students calm in the auditorium, Mr. Haebich, assistant principal, searched the area near the gym. When the search proved futile the ceremony began.

Visual aids enhance the curriculum in any field of study, and for this reason, the Audio-Visual department is one of the most vital functions in the school.

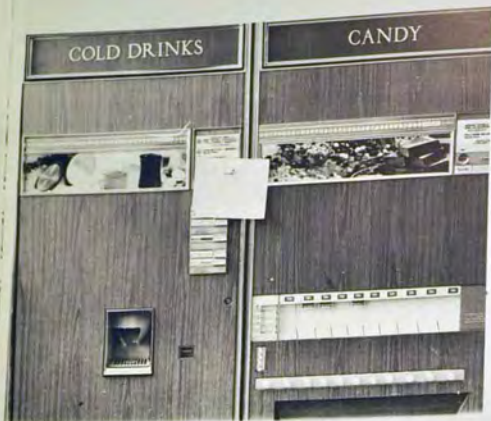
The A-V student uses his ability in photography, electronics, and other related areas to service and operate various audio-visual equipment. A-V assistants also deliver and pick up equipment from classes.

Due to the efforts of a hard-working Student Council publicity committee, the performance of **Chase** drew a large crowd.



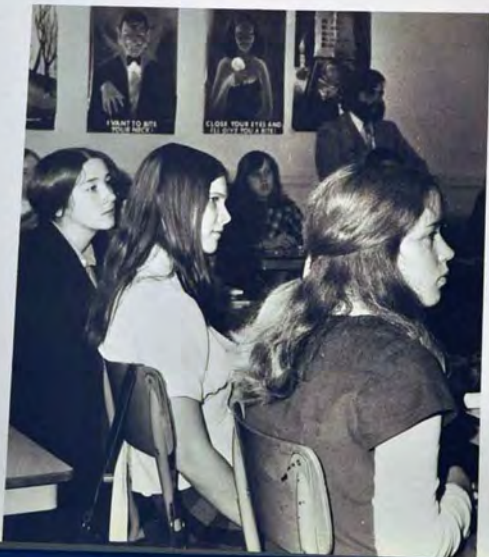

Poet Laureate Presents And Discusses Her Works

A unique view of the world was opened to York students and faculty when Gwendolyn Brooks, Poet Laureate of Illinois, presented some of her major works in an assembly and two successive small group encounters.

"Life Distilled" was the theme of the auditorium talk. Having been raised in the ghetto, Miss Brooks was able to move the audience with her poetry reflecting that Black community. "The Preacher: Ruminates Behind the Sermon" and "Sadie and Maud" were just two of the selections.

Miss Brooks also talked in a more relaxed atmosphere with small groups in the library and in a Black Literature class. Difficulties in writing and technique in addition to topics relating to African culture were discussed.

Also in the English Department was a new individualized reading program designed to improve any and all facets of reading — rate, vocabulary, and study skills. Students work two days a week independently for one semester and receive a half a credit.

Comprised of a staff of over 50 seniors and juniors, the **York-Hi**, York's student newspaper, enjoys a wide circulation within the school. In addition to the usual bi-monthly issues the junior staffers are put in charge of four special issues, which are printed magazine style. New resources such as cassette tapes and players, records, and books are available to the students in the lab. Video tapes from T.V. programs, used extensively in the classroom, are at the students' disposal for presentations. These are used to supplement classroom materials and are not the same as independent study where a student creates his own course. A variety of books, tapes and audio-visuals correspond with the "Unipack" study.

Pass-fail and improved cultural programs were two major changes in the foreign language format for the 1973-74 school year.

For sequential French and Spanish students in levels nine through eleven, a mandatory pass-fail system took effect for grades other than an "A". Teachers felt that this change would encourage more students to take a foreign language, since the pressure of grades in theory and practice was eliminated. Added to the cultural curriculum were Spanish folk dancing and a French class field trip to the Art Institute to view French impressionist paintings.

In Latin, third and fourth-year students read several works in their original forms by Cicero and Plautus. They also presented the play, *Curculio* by Plautus, to the freshman Latin class.

The works of such masters as Schubert and Beethoven and the reading of *Faust* were included in the activities of the German arts by the students of that language.

One class of second level Russian was taught within the Foreign Language Department. The students continued the processes of mastering the difficult Cyrillic alphabet, grammar, and pronunciation of the Russian language.

Aviation, FTA Weather Command

Representatives from Armed Forces, colleges and several airlines participated in Aviation Club's annual Careers Seminar held in February. Group Orientation flights offered Advanced Aviation students the opportunity to operate airplanes at a reduced cost, thereby reinforcing and furthering the knowledge of aviation acquired in classes.

Activities of the Future Teachers of America Club included participation in several experimental education programs at other schools. Topics studied included special education and "no-failure" schools.

At Weather Command meetings, guest speakers from the Federal Aviation Administration, the U.S. Weather Bureau, and the Elmhurst Fire Department gave talks concerning weather conditions.

Business Education Adds New Equipment

Business Education has added a third year of typing to their curriculum. Upon the completion of Typing 10, exceptionally skilled typists are exempt from Typing II and introduced to clerical work in a course designed for them. This eliminates unnecessary routine work to advance students in practical office training.

Students learn to operate the IBM composer which prepares copy to be reproduced by printing. The final product is more finished and clearer than mimeographed copies.

A new electronic printing calculator has also been installed in the department. It features a memory bank capable of retaining material previously fed in. Although other data is transmitted and typed in the meantime, information may be retrieved at a later date.

The business department is keeping up with the changing times by modernizing their programs for the students' present and future needs.

CWT Aids in Job Plans

To help students find their place in the complex world of today, the CWT program aids participants in locating jobs and thus gaining valuable experience for possible future careers.

Coordinators worked all summer to secure job placements for the school year. "We want our people doing jobs that have good learning potential," said Mr. Kuehn, Industrial Arts Department head.

The advantages of on-the-job training while at the same time earning school credit attracted many York students to the CWT program. In order to receive credit, participants were required to work a minimum of 15 hours per week.

Expanded Programs Spark High Course Enrollment

New equipment, more course offerings and expanded programs all contributed to a high course enrollment in industrial arts this year.

The architectural drawing program was expanded to two years. Also, an option for independent study was introduced into most courses.

For the first time, a woman was part of the department, and they were pleased to have a higher percentage of girls in their courses.

New equipment included a multilith 1250 offset press in the graphic arts department and a die filer in the metals lab. This equipment helped students gain a greater amount of precision and widen the scope of their capabilities.

Special Ed Meets Needs of Students

Helping to develop the individuality of students who have learning handicaps and to promote personal adjustments were the Special Education Department's main objectives. These goals were accomplished in varying degrees through the EMH (Educable Mentally Handicapped) and IAP (Individual Achievement Program) Classes.

EMH students learned the basic skills in each field of study, while IAP students followed a modified curriculum.

Some of the special activities which were sponsored by the department included trips to bowling alleys, ice skating parties, and hockey games.

Other students with learning difficulties met with a tutor three to five hours a week for individual assistance.

Overall, the department stressed a broadening of experiences outside of the classroom routines.

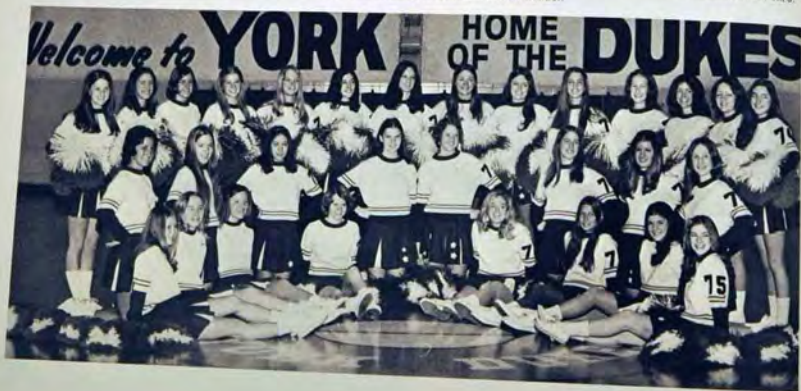

Dukes Capture First in WSC

Following the Newton tradition, the Dukes again dominated the WSC. Highlights of the season included victories at the Outdoor and District meets, where they out-distanced 16 other teams. Running aces Dennis Julison, who set an all time York record of 1:54.7 in the 880, and sprinter John Thomas, who took a first and second in the WSC, carried the season's track events in top form. York's high jumping tandem, George Muschler and Brian Smith, cleared heights of 6'9" and 6'8" respectively, placing them within the top three in the state. Weightmen Lad Pircon and Kevin Halley placed third and fourth in the shot-put, rounding out the varsity squad.

The Barons ruled the WSC, winning both indoor and outdoor meets. Leading the Barons were pole-vaulter Scott Maechtke who cleared a record-breaking 13'6", Bob McCarty who ran the two mile in 9:36.4, Rich Behlmer who put the shot 51'11 1/4", and Jim Nelson who placed second and third respectively in low and high hurdles. Freshman Bill Hart, sprinter and long jumper, was moved up to sophomore competition.

Dukes 2nd in District; Kay Downstate

Coach Nelson's turf-busters enjoyed a fine tournament and sectional season. The Dukes were led by Tom Nelson and Bob Kay and placed second in the District, qualifying them for sectionals where they placed fifth. There, Bob Kay shot a 75 and became the first York golfer to go downstate in 10 years. The Dukes placed fourth in the West Suburban Conference.

On the Frosh-Soph level, the consistently low scores of Kevin Murnane and Gary Granback brightened an otherwise disappointing fifth place finish in the WSC.

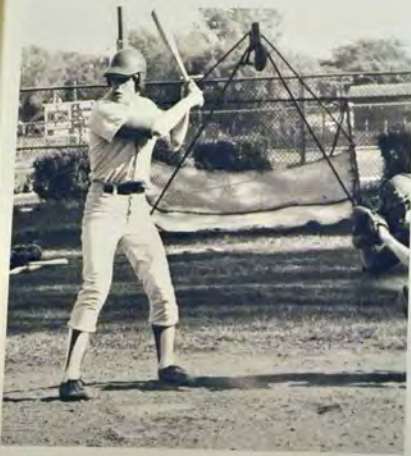

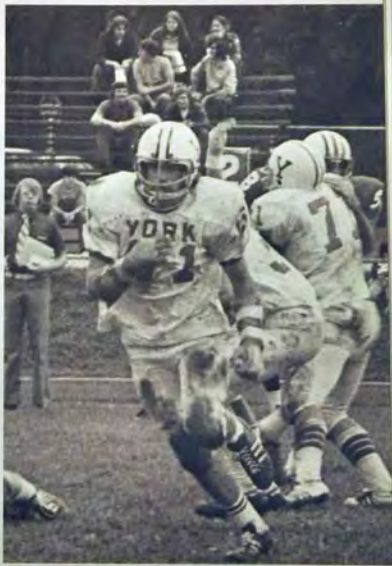

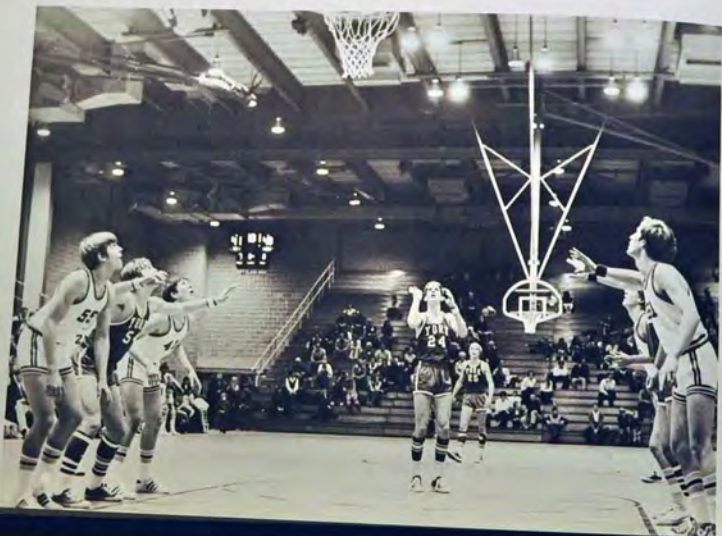

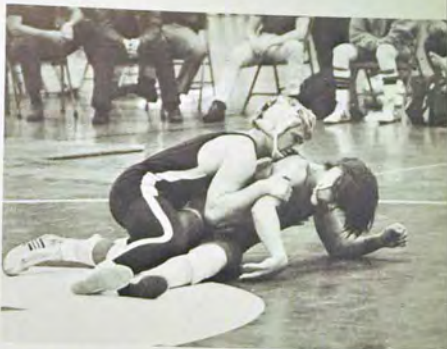

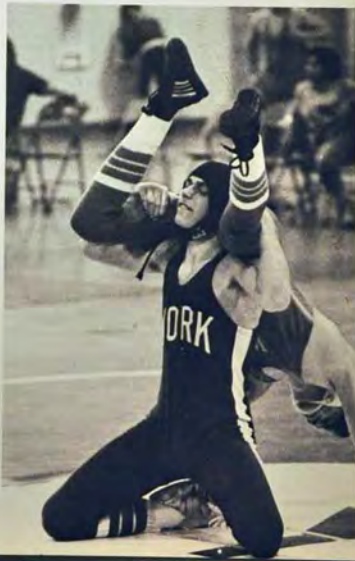

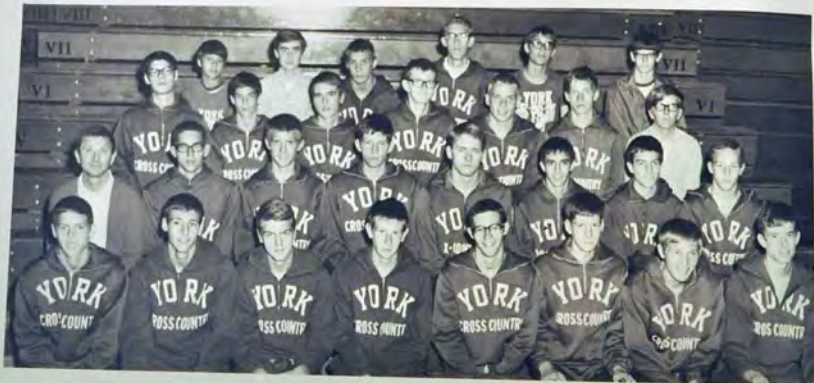

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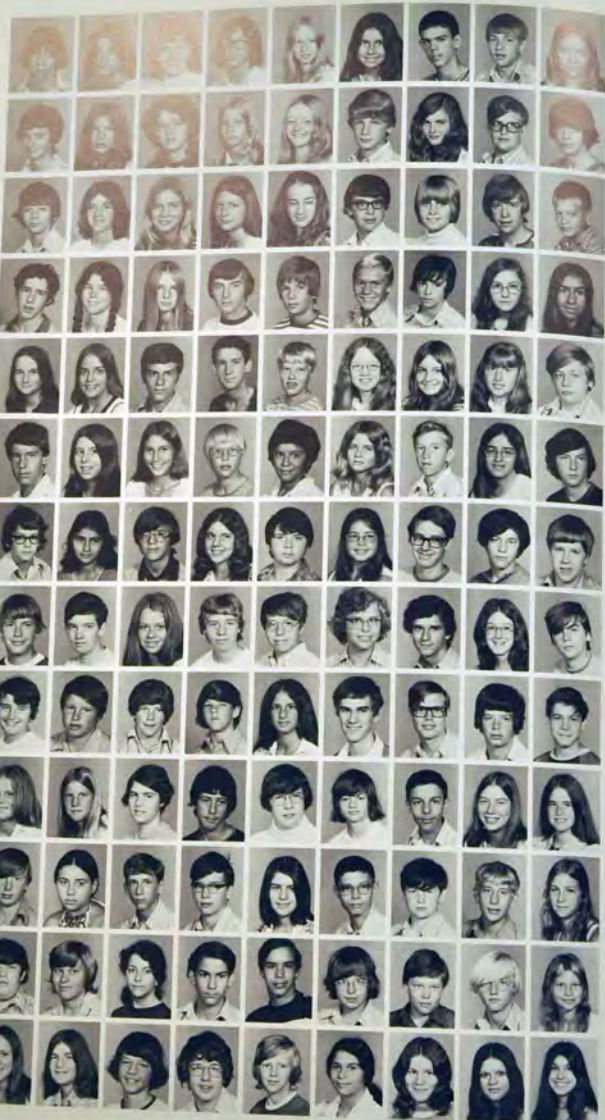
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U. S. Faces Crises

Richard Nixon.

This name stirred a wide variety of reaction in the world, and within York.

A rare kind of student concern was invoked by events of Watergate and traumatic after-effects demonstrated day after day on television, newspaper; all aspects of the media. Everyone had an opinion. Not too many could remain indifferent.

The entire structure of our government seemed to be on trial. Would one man prove to be stronger than the judicial and congressional branches of the government? Could the excuse of "national security" sheathe the criminal offenses of government officials? These were typical questions asked by concerned citizens.

President Nixon's inner circle of close aides closely diminished. High-ranking officials were indicted and convicted of federal offenses related to the Watergate break-in. John Erlichman and H. R. Haldeman; two top White House aides, resigned their posts and faced questioning by a select Senate committee. Another, John Dean was fired and testified against the President before that same committee. A news leak questioned the credibility of Vice President Spiro Agnew. After resigning, he pleaded "no-contest" to allegations against him.

The question of impeachment was raised. Was there enough evidence to prove the President guilty of punishable offenses? The Congress had to decide.

Meanwhile, the economy situation continued to deteriorate. The nation was faced with one of its most serious shortages in history. Food, gas, fuel, virtually everything was in demand, while Americans tried to reassure themselves with President Nixon's statement, "There will be no recession."

The gas shortage had a definite immediate effect on students. Some week-ends were spent grounded at home because the tank was dry and the stations were closed. Hour-long waits were common when stations finally did open, and then there was a \$2.5 limit on gas. The end of the month and the bottom of the dealers' monthly allowances caused gas "panic". Occurrences as drastic as fist-fights and gas siphoning became almost commonplace among frantic motorists.

Maximum speed limits were decreased to 55 miles per hour on all highways in the nation in an effort to conserve gas. Day-light savings time was put into effect and arguments were raised as to its significant saving, considering the fatalities suffered by young people walking to school in the darkness.

Politically, '74 was a probing, questioning year. Situations we had only before heard or read about now threatened to invade our lives.

Let's Go the Hop, Happy Days, saddle shoes and wild-patterned argyle knee-socks appeared on the scene. Nostalgia, especially for the "fabulous fifties," was in the air. The second annual fifties soc-hop was held. More and more enthusiasm for the good old days was sparked. Students put aside the heavy issues facing the world and let themselves go, in style.

Lines at the Yorktown Cinema in early fall stretched all the way around the theater. Crowds came again and again to see Toad and the rest of the "Graffiti Gang" bop to the music of Bill Haley and the Comets and other performers of the day.

Television re-runs made a comeback; characters of childhood days came alive again on the screen. Again you could hear

"Ya Mister Morley" . . . "Father Knows Best". Comic strips and Saturday morning cartoons were lovingly remembered. Nostalgia quizzes asked questions such as "Who was the villain on **Mighty Mouse**, or what was the storekeeper's name on **Magilla Gorilla**?"
