SHOPPING DISTRICTS

1 Old Town Eureka

(see cover photo)

The Victorian seaport features more than 19th century architecture. It's a lively commercial district with eclectic bookstores, antique shops, art galleries, vintage stores, chic apparel and storefronts that specialize in Humboldt-made foods, goods and souvenirs.

2 Historic Ferndale

Known as California's best preserved Victorian Village, Ferndale's Main Street and its storefronts



seem frozen in time. Nineteenth century curios, antiques, the old drug store, a mercantile emporium, a blacksmith shop and more await those seeking historic treasures.

3 Downtown Fortuna

The Friendly City boasts many fine antique stores on Main Street. Gas pumps, Amish bowls, vintage toys and more abound. A few miles south on Hwy 101, Chapman's Gem & Mineral Shop displays geologic wonders.

4 Henderson Center, Eureka

Pedestrian-friendly commercial district is a local favorite for coffee, clothing, toys, jewelry, gifts, housewares, thrift items, Asian foods and more. Stop in Fresh Freeze for a burger, shake or ice cream cone, which they've been perfecting since 1951. The district is two miles southwest of downtown Eureka.

HUMBOLDT COUNTY



5 Bayshore Mall, Eureka

With almost 50 businesses, including major department store chains, this shopping center is the North Coast's largest. Get souvenirs from local merchants, stop at the food court exhibit to learn about Humboldt's own Nessie monster or power up your electric vehicle in the parking lot. It's located at 3300 Broadway, right off Hwy 101 on the south side of Eureka.

6 Progressive Arcata

Home to Cal Poly Humboldt, one of the nation's greenest schools, Arcata features chic shopping around the downtown plaza, including organic clothing stores, progressive bookstores, bead and crystal shops and home and gift stores. Don't miss the historic Jacoby Storehouse.

7 Seaside Trinidad

Besides showcasing some of California's best coastal scenery, this quaint cliffside fishing village welcomes visitors with art galleries, smoked seafoods, wine tasting rooms and souvenir shops, many with local Native American keepsakes.

8 Redwood Burl-esque

Local woodsmen transform fallen trees into beautiful pieces of art and furniture, including slabs of burl into tables, Bigfoots, and whatnot. Look for their works on Hwy 101 around Orick and Garberville, and along the Avenue of the Giants.
