

National Museum of the United States Army — Located on the public grounds of Fort Belvior, the Army's first national museum is a technological marvel using the latest advancements in museum exhibits to tell the story of over 30 million men and women who have worn the Army uniform since 1775.

National Museum of the Marine Corps — Designed to evoke the image of the flag-raisers of Iwo Jima, the National Museum of the Marine Corps is a lasting tribute to U.S. Marines. Combining world-class exhibits with innovative interactive technology, you'll be immersed in the sights and sounds of being a Marine.

United States Navy Memorial — Featuring the "Granite Sea" map of the world, the memorial honors the men and women of the U.S. Navy with towering masts, fountains, and an iconic symbol of their mission to honor, recognize, and celebrate the men and women of the sea: The Lone Sailor statue.

Air Force Memorial — A national place of pride, reverence, and remembrance dedicated to the men and women of the United States Air Force and its heritage organizations. Three stainless steel spires soar into the sky, inspired by the contrails of the Thunderbirds in a precision "bomb burst" maneuver.

George Washington's Mount Vernon — Learn about Washington's life as Major General of the Continental Army at his beloved estate. Step into his shoes by making your own decisions about battle tactics in the "Be Washington" experience. Tip: Purple Heart recipients receive free daytime admission.

Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center — Stand amid some of the world's most famous pieces of aviation history. The museum's 10-story hangar displays hundreds of air and spacecraft, like the Space Shuttle *Discovery*, the grande dame of the orbiter fleet with more missions completed than any other.


