Bryce Canyon Country welcomes visitors from all over the world to witness horizons filled with the cliffs of two national parks, to wander through deeply-carved canyons and to overlook and experience the desert sandstone of our national monument. In addition to two national parks and one national monument, the area offers three state parks and a national forest for outdoor recreation. National Scenic Byway 12 — Utah's All-American Road, Utah's Heritage Highway 89 and Utah's Patchwork Parkway (HWY 143) provide scenic drives connecting many of the beautiful and breathtaking vistas located here, in Garfield County, Utah. Take your time, because there are adventures for days in both Bryce and Beyond. We're glad you're here.

BRYCE CANYON NATIONAL PARK

Fall in love with the fiery colors and iconic rock formations of the area. Look out over the amphitheater of Bryce Canyon National Park and you'll see spectacular landscapes filled with orange and red rock formed into tower spires and castle-like turrets. These tall and majestic hoodoos look as if they rose up from the earth, but have been formed by years of water and wind erosion.

No two rock shapes are alike as you make your way through trails such as Queen's Garden, Peekaboo Loop, Navajo Loop and Fairyland Loop. Watch the sunrise and sunset at Sunrise and Sunset Points — the perfect bookends to your day.


Journey through the marvelous maze as the scene unfolds before you. Not only is each turn the perfect photo opportunity, but also one to be experienced in multiple ways. Hiking is common and makes up the majority of the trails, but horseback riding is another way to explore the floor of the amphitheater with experienced guides. Outside the park, biking is a popular way to overlook the area and take in the surrounding sights.

In 2019, Bryce Canyon National Park was certified as an International Dark Sky Park, sharing yet another eye-catching skyline with thousands of stars visible to the naked eye and even more with use of a telescope. Many educational stargazing opportunities are available in the park throughout the year.



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CAPITOL REEF NATIONAL PARK

Take a step back into the "American West" while visiting Capitol Reef National Park. Experience the rugged western landscape, accessible via National Scenic Byway 12 (UT-12) and UT-24. Hike Cassidy Arch, named after the infamous outlaw, Butch Cassidy, located in the central portion of the park. Ending above the arch itself, your photos will have the highest viewpoint.

Another era of history within the park is the Historic Fruita settlement showcasing the lifestyle of the ancestral Fremont people and petroglyphs they left behind. Here, you can visit an old log schoolhouse for an immersive history lesson. Explore the Waterpocket Fold — a colorful geologic feature that can be described as a 100-mile wrinkle in the earth's crust, also rich in history and culture.







GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT

With three distinct units called Grand Staircase, Escalante Canyons and Kaiparowits, Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument covers over 1 million acres (over 4,4046.9 square kilometers) of public land managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). Over these acres of land, sandstone canyons, plateaus, cliffs and unique rock formations expand over Garfield and Kane counties. Take in a wonderful sight of colorful cliffs extending from the North Rim of the Grand Canyon to Bryce Canyon. To explore this vast backcountry, hike through the Escalante Canyons or take a backpacking trip to fish, camp, ATV, Jeep and mountain bike in this monument. Canyoneering is also a popular activity in this area. Warmer seasons are ideal for travel through this unit as many roads are dirt and can be impassable when wet. Also, bring extra water in the hot summer months to stay hydrated.

Visitor information can be found at the Visitor Center in Cannonville or the Interagency Visitor Center in Escalante. Guides and outfitters are available in nearby communities to give you the ultimate experience.

DIXIE NATIONAL FOREST

Utah's largest national forest covers one third of Bryce Canyon Country. Blanketing over 190 miles (305.8 km) and two million acres across Southern Utah. This forest is divided into four geographic areas: Markagunt Plateau, Paunsaugunt Plateau, Aquarius Plateau and Boulder Mountain. Three of these sections are in the Bryce Canyon region and encompass major plateaus including familiar areas such as Red Canyon, Panguitch Lake and Boulder Mountain. All of which are marvelous for a range of year-round activities.

Boulder Mountain - At a high elevation of 11,316 feet (3,449.1 m) and covering half of the Aquarius Plateau, Boulder Mountain is one of the largest high-elevation plateaus in the United States. This destination is excellent for relaxing fall scenic drives and inversely, is an adventurous location for ATV riding, hiking and biking. Bryce Canyon Country has more than 2,500 miles (4023.4 km) of ATV trails on forest and public lands, many of which are on Boulder Mountain, offering exciting experiences and stunning scenery.

Aquarius Plateau - Rugged cliffs and dense alpine forests make this the highest timbered plateau in North America at 11,328 feet (3,452.8 m). This plateau runs along the northern edge of Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument and was formed around 20 million years ago by tectonic plate uplift. Traverse trails through the meadows, grasslands and dense forests of Aspen, Spruce and Fir trees thriving here. As you tower above the world, see if you can find Capitol Reef National Park and Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument below. Markagunt Plateau - This plateau is topographically defined by its lava fields and forested highlands throughout parts of Cedar Breaks National Monument and Brian Head Ski Resort. Excellent for hiking, biking, fishing, skiing and snowmobiling, this plateau was named after the Paiute word meaning "Highland of Trees." This wooded area is home to miles of ATV trails and mountain biking routes for the adventure enthusiast, and showcases Panguitch Lake, one of the best trout fishing lakes in Utah.

Paunsaugunt Plateau - As you overlook the Bryce Canyon region, you might just be looking at Paunsaugunt Plateau without knowing it. Named after the Paiute word meaning "home of the beavers," it consists of magnificent red rock formations seen beyond the amphitheater of Bryce Canyon. This plateau offers breathtaking views of Southern Utah, landscaped by ancient bristlecone Pine forests, Alpine meadows, lakes and streams. It's the perfect location for winter activities, as well as the summertime adventures of hiking, biking, ATV-ing and fishing.

KODACHROME BASIN STATE PARK

As visitors drive down the paved road south of Cannonville, sandstone chimneys and unique petrified spires, called sand pipes, rise skyward from the valley floor creating the unforgettable scene of Kodachrome Basin State Park. Named by a 1949 National Geographic Society expedition, the park is a photographer's delight.


Prior to arriving at Kodachrome State Park, experience a local favorite — Willis Creek Slot Canyon. Slot canyons create fun experiences for both individuals and families and the Willis Creek Canyon hike is an easy level of difficulty. Mountain biking and trail rides are also available offering memorable views.

Once you settle down for the night, don't forget to look at the stars for another remarkable view. Campgrounds with hot showers, restrooms and modern conveniences are within the park. Without the city skyscrapers and light pollution of urban communities, this area is a window to the galaxy with thousands of stars and constellations to gaze at.

ESCALANTE PETRIFIED FOREST STATE PARK

Hike along the mountainside and spot pieces of petrified wood, both large and small, in the Escalante Petrified Forest State Park. Large and colorful petrified logs nearly five feet (1.5 m) long can be found along several short trails. See how many you can find! Fossilized dinosaur bones can also be seen at this location.

While here, Wide Hollow Reservoir is located adjacent to the park. Enjoy fishing and bird watching, as well as paddleboarding. Wide Hollow Reservoir is one of a few wetland bird viewing sites in Southern Utah thus offering a unique opportunity for visitors.

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM

Step inside the Anasazi State Park Museum and step back in time to A.D. 1050 when the Fremont and Kayenta Anasazi people occupied the area. Learn about the lifestyle of an estimated 200 people once lived at this site, making it one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. As you wind through the exhibits, you can see displays of prehistoric artifacts as well as an auditorium and gift shop. Behind the building outside, visitors can walk through an excavated partial village, called the Coombs Site Ruins. The museum is open year-round and in front of the museum, a picnic area is available for prolonged enjoyment in the area.

NORTH LAKE POWELL — TICABOO

Set against a desert backdrop of red rock canyons, Ticaboo might remind you of a Mars-like landscape. This small town is jampacked with adventure and provides unparalleled opportunities for backcountry experiences including guided tours, ATV riding, biking, canyoneering, and boating. Water? That's right. About 20 minutes from Ticaboo is the famous Lake Powell. The contrast of the blue water against the red rock is exceptionally beautiful as it showcases one of the largest manmade lakes in the country. Boating enthusiasts travel from near and far to experience the refreshing and splashing fun this Utah lake offers.

Boat, and adventure activity equipment can both be acquired at nearby adventure centers.

HIKING/BACKPACKING


Bryce Canyon Country is the prime location for outdoor recreation, starting with the most common activity of hiking. Whether you decide to walk a paved trail, hike a moderate incline or go on a multi-day backpacking expedition, there's something here for everyone. Hiking is a year-round activity that takes you to the great heights of mountains and the depths of canyons.

Experience the Rim Trail in Bryce Canyon to overlook the amphitheater at popular viewpoints including Sunset Point, Sunrise Point, Bryce Point and Inspiration Point. Explore Kodachrome Basin on the Grand Parade Trail to see two box canyons. See how far you can slide through the slot canyons such as Spooky Gulch, Peek-a-boo and Willis Creek. For the ideal photo opportunity, Lower Calf Creek Falls is a stunning sight.

Let each hike take you on an adventure like an explorer, discovering scenic vistas you would not have witnessed otherwise.

CANYONEERING/ SLOT CANYONS

Slot canyons are a true escape from the world where slivers of light reflect and shadows shift constantly throughout the day. Sandstone slot canyons are narrow crevices carved partially by wind and primarily by water.


These hidden gems are a thrilling way to explore with multiple variations of experiences from hiking to rappelling, rock scrambling and more. These natural wonders offer varying levels of difficulty. Slot canyons are filled with zigzag paths, long descents, sheer drops and small cliff-like rocks that could require some climbing. Willis Creek, Spooky and Peek-a-boo are slot canyons you can visit on your own without technical experience and are popular among visitors.

When traveling through the slot canyons, watch the weather to ensure safe travels. Water can accumulate and wash through the canyons. It is highly recommended to avoid canyoneering in the rain.

Contact guides and outfitters to guarantee you have someone with the knowledge and expertise to navigate the canyons. Guides are also available to experience rappelling and other high-adventure activities.

STARGAZING

Bryce Canyon Country is the ultimate location for stunning stargazing scenes. Whether you already know about astronomy or not, the stars make this vacation complete. The night sky provides a sense of wonder for many that cannot be matched at home. Urban environments contain light pollution blocking one third of the world's population from seeing the Milky Way.

Here, you can not only see the Milky Way bright and clear, but thousands of other stars. Bryce Canyon Country is proud to hold two International Dark Sky Parks in their region: Capitol Reef and Bryce Canyon National Park (IDSP). This certification is given to land possessing exceptional or distinguished quality of starry nights and a nocturnal environment that offers protection through this designation.

Through Bryce Canyon National Park, there are many interesting stargazing events. Qualified staff, rangers and volunteers give weekly astronomy presentations on Wednesday and Friday nights from May to September. During each new moon, night hikes are offered for 1-2 days. Lastly, the Astronomy Festival, held annually in late June or early July each year, is something you might want to add to your bucket list.

BIKING

Sail through the wind while biking by spectacular red-rock scenery and large Ponderosa Pine forests. Climb to the top of the mountains, plateaus and canyons of Bryce Canyon Country to get the bird's eye view of the area. All biking trails hold excitement for the thrill seeker and the adventurous family. The ideal trail, both challenging for individuals and enjoyable for families, is the paved Red Canyon Trail (5.5 miles or 8.9 km long). This trail is part of the Canyon2Canyon shared trail system extending 20 miles (32.2 km) total with multiple sections for shorter adventures. True to its name, this trail can take you from the beginning of Red Canyon to Inspiration Point inside Bryce Canyon National Park.

ATV

Travel through the majestic backcountry of Bryce Canyon Country on the back of an All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) or Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV). With more than 2,500 miles of thrilling trails, it's easy to become immersed in nature. Ride for miles from Circleville to Tropic Reservoir on the Fremont ATV Trail or ride loops from Pine Lake to Powell Point. Rev the engines to reach the pinnacle of panoramic views overlooking the red-rock utopia and high-mountain forests. When it comes to safe travels on an ATV or OHV, you can bring your own and use maps to adventure, or you can utilize our guides and outfitters to help maximize the fun. Outfitters have vehicles to rent and offer guided tours to ensure you find miles of scenic views.



Panguitch Lake is one of the most popular lakes for fishing and has driving accessibility in all seasons. Enjoy peaceful serenity as the water rushes by and you patiently wait for your catch in the forested scenery of Panguitch Lake. Try low-lying streams like the Sevier River or clear mountain lakes high atop Boulder Mountain. Catch includes a variety of Rainbow, Brook, Cutthroat or German Brown Trout.

As you relax and reel in, please ponder and act to preserve and protect the land and water you enjoy. Also, watch for weather to determine the safety of the roads to each location.

Rodeos and roundups

Put on your boots for a true Western experience. Saddle up and experience the Wild West on a trail ride, pack trip, wagon ride or cattle drive. You can watch the wranglers test their skills, revel in the roping rivals, barrel racing braves and cowboy action shoots, or you can listen to cowboy poetry and bring your appetite for dutch oven cookouts and more.

Fairs and Festivals

There's activity all year long in Bryce Canyon Country including multiple scenic half and full marathons for the runners and astronomy events for the stargazers. The Winter Festival brings people to try winter activities like crosscountry skiing, snowshoeing and sledding while the Hot Air Bally Rally is quite the sight to behold as balloons take to the sky together. The annual Escalante Canyon Art Festival showcasing artistic talent with speakers, vendors, demonstrations, workshops and more to help you capture the beauty of the area. Don't forget the Quilt Walk which celebrates the rich history and heritage Bryce Canyon Country loves to share with all who take the time to visit.

CELEBRATE OUR HERITAGE & HISTORY

Step back through time and take the historic trail through Bryce Canyon Country. With wildlife, adventure and scenic drives along the way, cities from Pangtuich to Escalante hold the remnants of cultures past. Utah's Heritage Highway 89 holds many stories. The city of Panguitch has historic red brick buildings and the annual Quilt Walk to celebrate the Mormon Pioneer settlers who walked over quilts to prevent from falling into deep now.

Museums, historic sites, galleries, antique shops and more are found along the scenic routes of the area. Escalante showcases cultural heritage in the Veteran's Memorial. In Boulder, the Anasazi State Park and Museum teaches visitors about the ancestral Anasazi people and how they lived with excavated dwellings.

Culture and History is often celebrated by the creation of handmade treasures and souvenirs for visitors including paintings, fiber arts and pottery by local artists and artisans throughout the West. Keep your eyes out as your drive through the area for unique shops along the way!









Sheriff Star

Within Garfield County's history, outlaws spent time in the area, including Butch Cassidy. These icons are in reference to his boyhood home located right outside the town of Circleville.



Envelope

Before the postal service was established, mail was transported by the pony express and Boulder, Utah was the last place in the continental United States to receive mail this way.

The iconic rock formation in Bryce Canyon National Park.



Hot Air Balloon

Annually, Panguitch hosts the Panguitch Valley Balloon Rally where visitors can see numerous hot air balloons soar through the sky and glow in the dark once the sun has set.



Quilt

The city of Panguitch has a quilt symbol because of its historic heritage. An annual Quilt Walk and festival there commemorates the valiant efforts of Utah pioneers who traveled through snow and used quilts to keep their wagons from sinking.



Coyote

Antimony was first called Coyote in the late 1800s by settlers because of the wildlife found there. It was changed to Antimony in 1921 after the metal that was mined from the area.



Bison

Within the Henry Mountains, 350 bison roam free as only one of three public areas left in the United States to have purebred bison herds.

Dinosaur

Within the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument, dinosaur remains have been found and researched. This area has been a significant source of the late Cretaceous period findings.



Wagon



National Scenic Byway 12 — An All-American Road

Scenic Byway 12 (UT-12) has been designated a National Scenic Byway and an All-American Road by the Federal Highway Administration. All-American Roads have one-of-a-kind features so exceptional they qualify as a destination "unto themselves." As one of the most unique roads in the United States, this 124-mile route winds through the heart of Bryce Canyon Country. It begins south of Pangtuich off of US 89 and travels eastward through Dixie National Forest, Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument, over Boulder Mountain and ends at Scenic Byway 24, west of Capitol Reef National Park.



HWY 143 — "Utah's Patchwork Parkway"

Following a 55-mile course between Panguitch and Parawon, Utah, this scenic byway connects Interstate-15 to Utah Heritage Highway 89. This pathway follows the historic migration routes used by the Anasazi people and is nicknamed "Utah's Patchwork Parkway." In 1864, pioneers were forced to walk on quilts to avoid sinking into the deep winter snow and mud as they crossed the mountain to obtain food and save their settlement from starvation. With this history, you can attend the annual, and now famous, Quilt Walk, celebrating this history and reason behind the nickname for the route.

Burr Trail

Travel through the bright red towering cliffs scattered with green trees that twist and turn with switchbacks along the Waterpocket Fold. The first 18 miles of this 68-mile road is paved, and many slot canyons are tucked to the side where you can pull over and enjoy a break from the car and smell the fresh air. The Burr Trail starts in Boulder, Utah, wanders through Capitol Reef National Park and concludes at Bullfrog Marina on the North end of Lake Powell near Ticaboo. Utah Heritage Highway 89

In Bryce Canyon Country, this road passes by Pangtuich and Hatch, otherwise known as the Headwaters section of the National Mormon Pioneer Heritage Area.

Hiking

If you are a hiking enthusiast, our seven-day hiking itinerary is for you. 

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


