

From Bonnie & Clyde to Buddy Holly; Jessie James to Johnny Cash, experience 24 fun-filled days exploring Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Tennessee.

Day 1 – Grapevine, Texas

- Arrive at Dallas Fort Worth (DFW) International Airport, located in Grapevine, Texas. Grapevine is centrally located between Dallas and Fort Worth, as well as the home of Bonnie & Clyde, not to mention the location where many great musical artists got their start including LeAnn Rimes, Post Malone, Nora Jones and Shoji Tabuchi, making this a great place to start your tour!
- Grapevine has a wide selection of hotels to choose from, all conveniently within 10 minutes of DFW Airport and all attractions that Grapevine has to offer. Complimentary airport shuttles are available to most Grapevine hotels.
- If ready to get this tour started, plan dinner or just drinks at the **Hilton DFW Lakes**, **Bonnie & Clyde's Bar & Grill**. Here you will find lots of great history on Bonnie & Clyde as well as a great view of where their hideout once was...now a lake behind the Hilton DFW Lakes.

Day 2 – Grapevine, Texas

Start your day with coffee from one of our local cafés including 9:30 a.m. Re:defined Coffee House, Brew & Batter, Napoli's Italian Kitchen & Market, Main Street Bakery or Main Line Coffee Bar. Take in the view of the surrounding Grapevine area from 150-feet up 10:45 a.m. at the Grapevine Observation Tower. 360-degree views include the skylines of both Dallas and Fort Worth, DFW Airport and beautiful Lake Grapevine. 11 a.m. Explore the **Historic Main Street District** with **Grapevine Food Tour**. This three-hour walking tour highlights the history of Grapevine as well as a taste of some of Grapevine's local cuisine. Be sure to note the Palace Theatre where LeAnn Rimes and Shoji Tabuchi got their start performing on the Grapevine Opry stage as well as the bank that Bonnie & Clyde's gang robbed. View the Grapevine Glockenspiel, the only Glockenspiel in North 2 p.m. America featuring the Would-Be Train Robbers, Nat Barrett and Willy Majors.



2:05 p.m.	Visit Grapevine's working artisans, including Holder Dane Gallery,
	Vetro Glassblowing Studio & Gallery, the R Town and the Grapevine
	Blacksmith. You will find their work throughout Grapevine during your
	stay.

3 p.m. Visit **Grapevine's Settlement to City Museum**, which tells the story of Grapevine's settlement in 1844 to our days as a farming community to how we got to where we are today as a thriving tourism destination. (*Open Friday –Sunday*)

4 p.m. Enjoy a leisurely afternoon exploring the shops, chocolatiers, winery tasting rooms and galleries of the **Historic Main Street District**. Be sure to drop into **Bermuda Gold** to view the newspaper clippings and learn more about the robbery that took place at this former bank location years before.

- **5:30 p.m.** North Texas was a hot bed of bootlegging activity during the 1930s and 1940s. Fast forward to today, where Texas is now the fifth largest producer of wine in the United States. Enjoy a glass or a flight of wine along the **Grapevine Urban Wine Trail**, with multiple winery tasting rooms located within the Historic Main Street District.
- 7 **p.m.** Plan for dinner at the **Texas Star Dinner Theater**, a comical, western, "who-dunnit" murder mystery and dinner show. (*Only available on Friday* & *Saturday evenings*) -or-

Enjoy dinner in the **Historic Main Street District** followed by live entertainment at the Historic Palace Theater. (*Be sure to check ahead for their schedule*). You will want to be sure to visit this historic theater, which has hosted artists on the rise such as LeAnn Rimes, The Judds, Miranda Lambert, Willie Nelson, Charlie Pride, Shoji Tabuchi, and The Light Crust Doughboys.

9 p.m.Live entertainment is abundant in the Historic Main Street District.
Stroll along Main Street and enjoy various different entertainers ranging
from country to jazz to classic rock, available six nights a week!

Day 3 –Grapevine and Fort Worth, Texas

8:30 a.m. Enjoy breakfast at one of Grapevine's popular breakfast diners, including Old West Café, Main Street Bistro & Bakery, Waffle Way or Lone Star Café.
10 a.m. This morning, plan a visit to the Texas Gun Experience, where you will learn to shoot like a real Texas outlaw. Really feeling adventurous, experience one of their machine gun packages, including the opportunity to shoot an 1860s Gatling gun, one of the best-known early rapid-fire spring loaded and hand cranked weapons.
11:30 a.m. Enjoy lunch in the Historic Downtown Grapevine District at Willhoite's Restaurant. Formerly a service station, the original gas pump still sits

out front and a Model T Ford hangs over the expansive buffet.

	12:30p.m.	Board the Grapevine Vintage Railroad (<i>Saturday & Sunday's only</i>) or TEXRail (<i>daily schedule</i>) for the Stockyards National Historic District . There you can explore the Texas Cowboy Hall of Fame and Stockyards Station, where legends are memorialized and unique Texas gifts abound.
	4 p.m.	Do not miss the Fort Worth Herd in the world's only twice daily cattle drive –Texas Longhorns driven by genuine Texas cowhands.
	4:30 p.m.	Saddle up at the bar at one of the local saloons or purchase yourself some western wear at one of the local shops before heading to dinner.
	6 p.m.	See why Texas is known for their steaks at Cattlemen's or H3 Steakhouse .
	8 p.m.	Attend the Stockyards Champions Rodeo at Cowtown Coliseum (<i>Friday & Saturday evenings only</i>).
	10 p.m.	After the rodeo, scoot on over to Billy Bob's Texas , the largest Honky Tonk in the World!
-		Day 4 –Dallas, Texas
	9:30 a.m.	Depart for a day in Dallas (30- <i>minute drive</i>).
	10 a.m.	Start your day with a visit to the Sixth Floor Museum , commemorating the life and assassination of President John F. Kennedy. This museum is located in the former Texas School Book Depository Building, Lee Harvey Oswald's vantage point in his assassination of President Kennedy.
1	11:30 a.m.	Enjoy lunch and shopping in the Historic West End . While here, be sure to visit Wild Bill's Western Store , where you can enjoy a cold Texas beer while you get a hat steamed to fit you perfectly, or get measured for custom-made boots.
	2 p.m.	Next stop, Pioneer Plaza to view the world's largest bronze monument depicting a cattle drive, complete with nearly 50 longhorn steers, herded by three cowboys.
	2:30 p.m.	Dallas is well known for both craft beers and margaritas. Choose your preference and enjoy a refreshing, afternoon tour exploring some of the local favorite watering holes.
	4:30 p.m.	Whichever tour you choose, plan your final stop in Deep Ellum . This lively entertainment district is known for its vibrant murals, quirky art galleries and long-time concert venues. For craft brews, we recommend Deep Ellum Brewing Co. and for margaritas, we recommend stopping into Revolver Taco for one of their refreshing Margaritas. You will want to allow time to explore this fun district before dinner.
CT AND	6:30 p.m.	Enjoy dinner at any of Deep Ellum's unique restaurants. From good greasy burgers, Texas BBQ, sushi, Tex-Mex, you will find a wide assortment of restaurants to choose from.

8 p.m. After dinner, head over to Adair's Saloon, or just simply Adair's, as it is known around Texas. Possibly the oldest bar in Dallas, Adair's has become home to live music and can boast that musicians such as Jack Ingram, Deryl Dodd and members of The Dixie Chicks have graced the stage.

Day 5 – Abilene and Lubbock, Texas

7 a.m.	Depart Grapevine for Lubbock, Texas (5-hour drive).
12:15 p.m.	Relax after a morning of driving with an order of chips and queso and a down and dirty fried chicken sandwich at Caprock Café in Lubbock.
2:30 p.m.	Visit the American Windmill Museum , the world's largest windmill museum, which showcases more than 160 beautifully restored American style windmills.
3:45 p.m.	Next stop, the National Ranching Heritage Center , home to 19 acres of authentic ranching structures, rotating art galleries and 42 life-size bronze outdoor sculptures.
5 p.m.	Lubbock happens to be one of the top wine producing regions of Texas. Step into the vineyard at English Newsom Cellars and take in the picturesque landscape and Tuscan architecture, while drinking a glass of 100% Texan made wine.
6:15 p.m.	For dinner, enjoy a heap of classic Tex-Mex with an ice-cold, frozen margarita, at Albarran's Mexican Bar & Grill .
7:30 p.m.	Experience a tribute show to entertainers such as the Eagles or Led Zeppelin, at the Cactus Theater , a 1930's movie theater turned concert venue. (<i>Be sure to check ahead for entertainment schedule</i>)
9:30 p.m.	Not ready to go back to the hotel? Walk next door and see another concert at one of Lubbock's most famous red dirt music bars.
	Day 6 –Lubbock and Grapevine, Texas
8:30 a.m.	Enjoy breakfast at the Cast Iron Grill , the one restaurant where pie for breakfast is encouraged!
9:30 a.m.	Learn about the life of Lubbock's favorite son and musician, Buddy Holly, at the Buddy Holly Center and J.I. Allison House . Before going in, be sure to get a picture with the larger than life statue of Buddy Holly and all of his famous West Texas friends.
	Depart Lubbock for Abilene (2.5-hour drive).
11:15 a.m.	Depart Bubboek for fiblicite (2.5 <i>nour artic)</i> .

3:15 p.m. View the Old West through the magic of state-of-the-art technology at **Frontier Texas**! Located in historic downtown Abilene, Frontier Texas brings the frontier to life and lets visitors met people who played out their lives on the Texas frontier.

4:15 p.m. Depart Abilene for Grapevine (*3-hour drive*).

7:30 p.m. Enjoy dinner in **Grapevine's Historic Main Street District**, followed by live entertainment at local restaurants and winery tasting rooms throughout.

Day 7 –Grapevine, Texas and Duncan and Tishomingo, Oklahoma

- 9 a.m. You can't leave Texas without experiencing a Texas BBQ Breakfast Burrito at Meat You Anywhere! If you're a soda drinker, wash it down with an original recipe Dr Pepper, invented right here in Texas.
 10 a.m. Get in some shopping time at Grapevine Mills mall, with over 180 shops or Bass Pro Shops Outdoor World, to get any items that the modern-day Cowboy may need.
 Noon Grab lunch at Grapevine Mills or make a final stop at Harvest Hall, a
- European-style food hall inside **Grapevine Main Station**, offering seven different International kitchens.
- **1 p.m.** Depart for Duncan, Oklahoma(2.5-hour drive).
- **3:30 p.m.** Visit the **Chisholm Trail Heritage Center**, an attraction that brings one of America's greatest cattle trails to life. Learn about the life of the cowboy and look out for those rustlers.
- **4 p.m.** Depart for Tishomingo (1.5-hour drive)
- **5:30 p.m.** Arrive in Tishomingo, Capitol of the Chickasaw Nation and Home of Country Music and Reality TV Star,Blake Shelton. Check into your Bed and Breakfast before heading over to **Ol' Red**, Blake Shelton's original restaurant and honky tonk.

Day 8–Tishomingo, Norman and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

9 a.m. Depart Tishomingo for Gene Autrey, or Davis, Oklahoma (45-minute *drive*)

10 a.m. (Saturday option only) Visit the Gene Autrey Oklahoma Museum in Gene Autrey, Oklahoma named after the Singing Cowboy himself. Here you will experience the world's largest collection of singing cowboys memorabilia from the 1920's to present day. (*Sunday –Friday option*) Arrive Davis, Oklahoma for a special treat at **Bedre Chocolate**. This is the only American Indian owned chocolate factory in the world. Make sure you try the chocolate covered potato chips.

- **10:30 a.m.** Depart for Norman, a suburb of Oklahoma City OK (1.5-hour drive)
- Noon Stop in for lunch at **The Monte** in Norman, OK. With close proximity to the University of Oklahoma, this local hangout is sure to satisfy a craving for local eats. Make sure to try the queso.
- **1:30 p.m.** Selfie stop at the **Vince Gill statue**, located on the campus of Northwest Classen, his former high school. He has recorded more than 20 studio albums, charted over 40 singles on the U.S. Billboard charts as HOT COUNTRY SONGS, and has sold more than 26 million albums.
- **2 p.m.** Settle in and have an afternoon coffee or tea at a local stand. Meet a few locals and get the lay of the land.
- **3 p.m.** Check-in hotel and freshen up before an evening of fun in Stockyards City.
- **4 p.m.** Arrive at **Stockyards City** for some shopping at one of the many businesses that cater to the working cowboy. Pick up a pair of Wranglers, grab a pair of boots, or have a hat custom shaped just for you, so many things to explore.
- 5 p.m. Sit back and relax at Oklahoma's oldest continually run restaurant.Cattlemen's is a favorite stop of presidents and locals alike. Be sure to try the lamb fries.
- **6:15p.m.** Venture off to **McClintock's Saloon & Chop House** for a beverage at the high-caliber 50-foot bar. Visit with some locals before heading next door.
- 7 p.m. Settle in to your seat at the Rodeo Opry (Saturday evening performances only). Known as Oklahoma's official country music show, this evening will feature rising stars from around the state, veterans of the Opry stage and an occasional country star.

Non-Saturday options—check out a performance (*tickets required*) at the **Criterion Tower Theater**, **Lyric Theater** or enjoy a stop at one of the many live performance venues spread out across the **diverse districts of Oklahoma City**. (Live music venues are celebrated across the city, with Oklahoma City's districts including: The Paseo, Midtown, Uptown, Downtown, Film Row, just to name a few)

Day 9-Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

9 a.m.

Sleep in or take a walk through **The Myriad Gardens** or **Scissortail Park** to enjoy flora and fauna.



10 a.m. Continue your day with a visit to the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum. From fine art,pop culture and halls of fame to Native American objects, historical cowboy gear, shopping and dining, the figure of the cowboy tells America's Western story at this unique museum. Enjoy lunch while at the museum.

- **1:30 p.m.** Make a stop at the **Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum**, one of the city's most notable destinations. This memorial and museum stands as a celebrated example of a living monument to honor those who were killed, those who survived and those changed forever by the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building.
- **3 p.m.** Return to hotel for a little rest.
- 4 p.m.Head on over to the Bricktown District and stop in at the American
Banjo Museum. Here you will find the largest collection of banjos on
public display in the world, as the nation's only museum dedicated to
America's instrument.
- **5:15 p.m.** Take a fun ride through Oklahoma City's Bricktown Entertainment District with **Bricktown Water Taxi**. During the water taxi rides, guests will learn history about the Oklahoma City buildings they pass, as well as fun facts along the one-mile canal.
- 6:30p.m. Head on over to Toby Keith's I Love This Bar and Grill for dinner. Toby Keith is one of Oklahoma's famous country music stars. Everything about this place is bigger and badder, just like its namesake. The menu reflects the same attitude—nothing fancy here, but lots of down-home favorites. While you're there, be sure and browse the hundreds of pieces of Toby Keith memorabilia on display, from guitars and platinum records to clothing.
- **Evening** Spend the remainder of the evening checking out other local bars in the district. A favorite is **Michael Murphy's Dueling Piano Bar**. Check local information for other music venues in the area.

Day 10–Edmond, Guthrie, Pawhuska and Bartlesville, Oklahoma

- 8:30 a.m. Enjoy breakfast at **Railyard Pie Company** in Edmond, OK, a suburb of Oklahoma City. Try the locally made bread to farm fresh eggs but don't fill up too much as your day will be filled with a taste of Oklahoma today.
- **9:30 a.m.** Depart for Guthrie (25-*minute drive*)
- 10 a.m.Visit Guthrie and enjoy the nation's largest district registered with the
National Trust. This Victorian city was the original Capital of Oklahoma.
- **10:30 a.m.** Depart Guthrie for Stillwater (30-*minute drive*)



Next stop, **Eskimo Joe's** in Stillwater. Known as Stillwater's Jumpin' Little Juke Joint, Eskimo Joe's is nationally recognized for its fun T-shirt designs and presidentially-endorsed cheese fries. This is a progressive meal day,so make sure you leave room for the next stop.

Stillwater is also home of **Oklahoma State University.** Garth Brooks is one of the most famous to attend this school. Brooks has won the CMA's Entertainer of the Year seven times, the most of any entertainer.

11:30 a.m. Depart Stillwater for Pawhuska (1.5-hour drive)

11 a.m.

1 p.m. Arrive in Pawhuska,home of the Food Network Star Ree Drummond,The Pioneer Woman. Visit The Mercantile and enjoy a sweet treat in the bakery or pick up a special kitchen gadget. This All-American town is also the Capitol of the Osage Nation. Most recently featured in the book "Killers of the Flower Moon", this tribal nation has seen its share of outlaws. Learn about the Osage Massacre at the Osage Tribal Museum.

3 p.m. Depart Pawhuska for Bartlesville (30-*minute drive*)

3:30 p.m. Visit **Woolaroc** (*woods, Lakes and Rocks*) **Museum & Wildlife Preserve**. A working ranch, museum and wildlife preserve,this Bartlesville establishment welcomes countless visitors each year. Woolaroc also hosts the annual Cow Thieves and Outlaws Reunion the last weekend of September.

5:30 p.m. Check into **The Inn at Price Tower**. Spend the night in Frank Lloyd Wright's only skyscraper at the Inn at Price Tower in downtown Bartlesville, considered to be one of the architect's greatest works.

Evening Have dinner on the 15thfloor of the tower or take a short walk to downtown and try one of the restaurant offerings like **Frank and Lola's**.

Day 11–Miami, Chelsea, Claremore and Tulsa, Oklahoma

8:30 a.m.	Bid Bartlesville farewell and depart for Miami, Oklahoma (1.5-hour drive)
10 a.m.	Arrive in Miami, OK a Route 66 treasure. Visit the Coleman Theater , a Miami landmark that began as a Vaudeville movie theater. A highlight of this building is the original pipe organ, called "The Mighty Wurlitzer," which continues to fill the beautiful theater with terrific music today. The theater presents a variety of exceptional entertainment year-round.
11:15 a.m.	Depart Miami for Chelsea, Oklahoma (1.5-hour drive)
Noon	Chelsea is your next stop. The Ed Galloway Totem Pole Park is a Route 66 icon and home of "The World's Largest Concrete Totem Pole." Nearby is a "Fiddle House" which houses a display of Galloway's hand- crafted fiddles and other inlaid wood artifacts.
12:10 p.m.	Continue along Route 66 to Claremore (20-minute drive)



12:30 p.m. Arrive in Claremore, OK in time for a special treat, lunch at **Hammett House**. A northeast Oklahoma tradition since 1969, Hammett House has become a success by keeping things simple. The "pamper fried" chicken and pork chops are this eatery's calling card, but don't leave without sampling one of the 14 types of equally renowned pies, ranging from chocolate chip peanut butter to sour cream blueberry.

1:30 p.m. A short drive away and you arrive at the **Will Rogers Memorial Museum**. The museum features art and artifacts pertaining to the life of Oklahoma's favorite son, Will Rogers. Learn about Will Rogers' life as a trick roper, Vaudeville performer, movie star, radio commentator, newspaper columnist, author and philosopher.

2:45 p.m. JM Davis Arms & Historical Museum is the largest privately-owned arms museum in the world. It houses more than 50,000 unique items, including firearms, swords and knives. The museum also offers a "Believe It Or Not Oddities" gallery of outlaw guns, Native American artifacts, John Rogers statuaries, Western memorabilia, antique music boxes, musical instruments and 1,200 steins from all over the world.

3:45 p.m. Continue along Route 66 to Catoosa (15-minute drive)

4 p.m. The Blue Whale in Catoosa has become a beloved historic landmark along Route 66. Built as an attraction at a swimming hole, visitors can still walk around the mammoth structure and get the perspective of what it would really be like to be swallowed by a whale—no swimming allowed anymore.

4:10 p.m. Continue to Tulsa and check into your hotel. (20-*minute drive*)


5 p.m. Make a stop at **Gathering Place**. Nearly 70-acres of family-friendly activities for free and uncover unique playgrounds with tunnels, pirate ships, towers, slides, suspended bridges and more. Whether relaxing on the One OK Boathouse top-level balcony for stunning views of Tulsa or renting a kayak, canoe or paddle boat, you will have a blast.


6:30 p.m. Check out one of Tulsa's unique districts such as Brookside, Cherry Street or Blue Dome for dinner and entertainment. Check local websites for activities or just ask a local.

Day 12–Tulsa,Oklahoma

9:30 a.m. Start your morning off at the **Center of the Universe**. A concrete circle a little more than eight-feet in diameter that is an acoustic anomaly. Any noise made inside the brick circle is loudly echoed, but only those inside the circle can hear it. Amazingly, any of these loud sounds heard inside the circle cannot be heard from outside the perimeter of the brick structure.

10 a.m. A short walk away you will find the Woody Guthrie Center, which will give you a glimpse inside the life of one of America's greatest folksingers. Born in Okemah, Woody Guthrie made a name for himself with hits like "This Land Is Your Land," "Pastures of Plenty," "Talking Dust Bowl Blues" and "Do Re Mi."







Day 14 –Wilburton, Oklahoma and Fort Smith,Arkansas

9 a.m.	Spend your morning to early afternoon enjoying the park. Robbers Cave State Park is a favorite of rappellers, equestrians, hikers and outdoor lovers. The park and adjoining wildlife management area offer acres of discovery and enjoyment including seasonal trout fishing and hunting, miles of hiking and equestrian trails, rugged cliffs for climbing and stunning fall foliage viewing. From miniature golf,paddle boat rentals and golf cart rentals, to a small grocery store and a nature center with naturalist programs and exhibits, the park has something for everyone.
TBD	Depart for Fort Smith Arkansas (1.5-hour drive)
3 p.m.	Start your visit in Fort Smith at Miss Laura's Visitor Center which is the first former bordello listed on our National Register of Historic Places and now serves as the official Visitors Center. One of seven houses of ill-repute in the red light district in 1900, it came to be known as "The Queen of the Row."Here you will pick up information on other sites to see, including a map for "The Unexpected Project", Murals in our Downtown by International Artists.
4 p.m.	Next stop, the Fort Smith National Historic Site , which includes the jail, the hanging gallows and the restored courtroom of Judge Isaac C. Parker. Walk in the footsteps of some of the most famous outlaws of the West, including the James, Dalton and Younger gangs; Belle Starr; Cherokee Bill and the Rufus Buck Gang. They were all incarcerated in this jail at one time or another.
5:30 p.m.	Drive by the United States Marshals Museum , built on the banks of the Arkansas River and scheduled to open in 2021. Founded in 1789, the U. S. Marshals were instrumental in keeping law and order in the Old West, arresting such criminals as the infamous Dalton Gang.
6:45 p.m.	Enjoy a local beer and a great dinner at Bricktown Brewery.
8 p.m.	After dinner take a walking or driving tour of "The Unexpected Project" ; using the map obtained at Miss Laura's Visitors Center. This map will also tell about the artists and which country they are from.

Day 15-Fort Smith and Little Rock, Arkansas

9 a.m. Visit the monuments of William O. Darby, founder and hero of the famous Darby Rangers in World War II; Bass Reeves, the first African American to ride as a U. S. Deputy Marshal west of the Mississippi River, and Judge Isaac C. Parker at Gateway Park, all located in Downtown Fort Smith.

10 a.m.Next stop, the Fort Smith Museum of History. From its founding in
1817 to the present day, the remarkable stories of the roaring frontier city
of Fort Smith are told in fascinating exhibits on two floors.



- **11:30 a.m.** Enjoy lunch at **Calico County**, with traditional American food served in an atmosphere full of American memories.
- 12:45 p.m. After lunch, visit the Chaffee Barbershop Museum at Chaffee Crossing, which is the Barber Shop where Elvis Presley got the "Buzz Cut that was heard around the World" on March 25, 1958, as he was inducted into the United States Army. Complete with the original barber pole, you will see footage of the event and included in the exhibits is a letter written to President Dwight D. Eisenhower by three teenage girls, pleading with the President that Presley's hair not be cut!
- **1:15 p.m.** Depart Fort Smith for Little Rock (2.5-hour drive).
- **3:40 p.m.** First stop in Little Rock is the **William J. Clinton Presidential Center and Park**. Walk in the footsteps of our 42nd president as you explore the Clinton Presidential Center and Park and see how his presidency was shaped by the Civil Rights Act of 1964. See if you can spot his iconic saxophone on display!

5:30 p.m. Dinner in Little Rock brings many options! Enjoy a bite at **Agasi** 7, Little Rock's new rooftop bar that overlooks the Arkansas River. Find out what makes the south special with a bite from **Soul Fish**, known for deep fried catfish and a pecan pie. 

9 p.m. Explore the River Market District for a night on the town with music. The Rev Room is one of Little Rock's best places for live music offering a variety of entertainment options and music genres. Stickyz Rock and Roll Chicken Shack, showcases the best national and international touring bands, unique and funky vibe, and award-winning chicken fingers with warm buttermilk biscuits. Or enjoy a spirited sing-along with dueling pianos at Willy D's Piano Bar.

Day 16-Little Rock, Arkansas and Memphis, Tennessee

7 a.m. For breakfast, visit the family owned @ The Corner Diner, where the concept of a diner has been matched with modern expectations for upscale cuisine; fresh, local ingredients with menus that are constantly evolving. As a farm-to-fork diner, they use farm-fresh eggs; farm-raised beef; local, organic vegetables, fruits, nuts and honey; all sourced from over 100 different local farms.





Day 17–Memphis, Tennessee

- **9 a.m.** Go to the **Liquor Store** for Breakfast and have your Bloody Marys and Chicken and Waffles and lip-smacking maple pancakes with south sweet butter.
- 10:30a.m.Memphis Rock 'n' Soul Museum-The Memphis Rock 'n' Soul Museum,
located on Beale Street, provides a comprehensive Memphis music
experience. The museum is curated by the Smithsonian Institute and
accompanied by a detailed digital audio tour guide featuring over 100
songs. Beginning in the fields of the Mississippi Delta and journeying
through the heyday of Memphis' musical influence, the Rock 'n' Soul
Museum is the perfect jumping on point for a Memphis music tour.
- 11:30 a.m. Memphis Music Hall of Fame-What began as a tribute to Memphis' legendary musicians who shook the world has finally opened as a museum that is as outrageous as our inductees! The Memphis Music Hall of Fame Museum and exhibition introduces guests to some of the greatest musicians of all time –each responsible for shaping modern music and changing the world forever right here in Memphis! This fun, fascinating and educational exhibition features never-before-seen memorabilia, rare video performances and interviews, interactive exhibits, and much more.
- 12:30 p.m. Explore Beale Street during the day and walk where legends performed and marched on the famous street. Experience the history of that time by dinning at Blues City Café, Alfreds, Silky O' Sullivan's and Pig on Beale. For more restaurant information please go to memphistravel.com/ eat
- **1:30p.m.** Enjoy a sightseeing tour of Memphis by hopping on **Backbeat bus Tour**. This tour is led by Memphis Musicians aboard a city bus and offers a unique and entertaining insiders' view of our cities rich and musical heritage.
- **3:30p.m.** Walk to **Ernest Wither's Museum** home of the most holistic collection of Wither's archives published to date. Containing images from his Civil Rights, Music, Sports, and Lifestyle collections, the text of this work delves much deeper into the history behind the images than your average book of photography.

4:30p.m. Walk next door to listen to live music at **Ghost River Tap Room and Brewery** next to the famous **FedEx Forum** where our **Memphis Grizzlies Basketball** team play or check out other cool entertainment and music concert options.

5:30p.m. Enjoy dinner at **The Majestic Grille**. Originally built in 1913 as the Majestic No. 1, a silent picture house that entertained Memphians for three decades, this restaurant gives diners a glimpse into the heady Hollywood days. This would be a perfect match if you are going to see a traveling Broadway show at the **Orpheum Theater**.

7 **p.m.** The **Orpheum Theater** has been an iconic part of Memphis since 1928. It's a place where creativity is born, and ideas and stories are shared.



Day 18-Memphis, Tennessee

- **9:30a.m.** Visit **Arcade Restaurant** a favorite of Elvis Presley's. You can even sit at his booth and have his favorite Peanut Butter and Banana Sandwich.
- **10:30a.m.** Next stop, **The National Civil Rights Museum**, is a deep dive into the struggle of minorities in America from the beginnings of the slave trade to present day. Interactive exhibits such as a 1955 bus, complete with Rosa Parks and barking bus driver, place one in the shoes of victims and activists alike. Do yourself a favor and set aside a few hours to take in this incredible experience.
- **12:30 p.m.** Enjoy lunch at **Central BBQ**, a downtown restaurant offering not only a full range of barbecue options (*pulled pork, brisket, ribs*), but also large, meaty wings, smoked sausage and their famous barbecue nachos. The homemade potato chips make an excellent accompaniment to any entree. Most sandwiches come in large and small sizes and are served with coleslaw by default.

2 p.m. Experience the **Blues Hall of Fame** which opened in May of 2015. The Blues Foundation's Blues Hall of Fame Museum is a Memphis gem for both serious blues fans and casual visitors. With robust exhibits and in-depth history, the museum exposes, educates, and entertains visitors with all that is blues culture while highlighting over 400 inductees in five key categories: Performer, Individual, Album, Single, and Literature.

- **3:30 p.m.** Visit the **Edge Motor Museum** and track the rise, boom, plateau, and fall of the American sports car as you follow trends in politics, economics, culture, and technology. See how critical moments of convergence across these four areas influenced what we now regard as archetypes of design and engineering, and use this as context for where car design is today. Witness how, in just 30 short years, the American sports car became an icon of our past and a reflection of ourselves.
- **4 p.m.** Shop and explore at **Crosstown Concourse**. Initially conceived as a home for a small start-up arts organization, the building has evolved into a 1.5 million square-foot mixed-use "vertical urban village," boasting 13 restaurants, 264 apartments, a small hotel, high school, clinic, sprawling contemporary arts organization with free and open galleries, a cafe, bar, shared art-making space, concert hall, theater, artist residency program, and so much more!

6 p.m. Bass Pro Shops at The Pyramid, a former Memphis arena, is now one of the largest retail stores in the world. This location brings the outdoors in with a cypress swamp, alligators and over 600K gallons of water. Big Cypress Lodge is also located inside the pyramid and features luxury rustic cabins.

Dine at one of several restaurants at the **Bass Pro** and explore a scenic view at **Look Out**.

8:30p.m. After dinner check-out Hernando's Hideaway, right down the street from Elvis Presley's Graceland and full of rich musical history.

10:30p.m. End your evening with a walk down **Beale Street**. Experience this world-famous street from gritty, glittering Beale Street to makeshift recording studios and humble churches that are temples to sound. Memphis has been creating hits for 200 years. Come experience the legacy.

Drink Local with good beer with good water, and Memphis has some of the purest.
