



Cowdray House is an exclusive-use venue offering a spectacular setting for a wide range of events. Set in 110 acres of landscaped gardens and parkland, the house offers 22 luxury bedrooms, gorgeous reception rooms, including the magnificent double-vaulted Buck Hall, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, a bowling alley and tennis court.



Cowdray Ruins, the former Cowdray House, is a Tudor mansion with a wealth of history and intrigue. Visited by King Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth I, it was partially destroyed by fire in 1793. Within the remaining tower is a stunning Renaissance Art Studio located at the top of a spiral staircase.



Polo is played throughout the summer months. Cowdray is the home of British polo and the club hosts over 400 matches during the season. The highlight is the prestigious Gold Cup for the British Open, which is a key event on the social calendar.



Cowdray Farm Shop & Café is a thriving business at the centre of the Estate. The café serves home-cooked food made from scratch using the best Cowdray and local produce. The shop and café are open seven days a week and there is ample parking and disabled access.



Golf has been played at Cowdray for over 100 years. The 18-hole championship course has breath-taking views and is immaculately maintained. The sandy soil means the course is playable throughout the year. Visitors are welcome and there are membership packages to suit all levels.



Holiday Accommodation is available across the Cowdray Estate. There are four holiday cottages at Benbow Pond, Woods Garden, a stylish country property with four bedrooms, and a Lodge at Cowdray Park Golf Club where bed and breakfast rooms are open to everyone, not just golfers.



Capron House is an attractive familiar landmark in the centre of Midhurst, with three large rooms and a wonderful private walled garden. The venue is available for exclusive-use hire for a wide range of events including weddings, parties, conferences and corporate events.



Cowdray Hall and Therapy Rooms are integral to the Cowdray ethos of health and wellbeing. Cowdray Hall hosts inspirational workshops, events and weekly classes on all areas of self-development. The three beautifully appointed Therapy Rooms are used by a range of therapists from all disciplines.



Farming at Cowdray includes a dairy herd at Moor Farm, 3,000 acres of crops as well as estate-reared beef. A strong sustainability plan is in place to ensure that great care is taken of the soil health, animal welfare and crop management.



Fly Fishing on the River Rother is available during the season which runs from April until September. We offer a range of passes from taster sessions, lessons and day passes to season membership for individuals or small fishing groups including corporate fishing days.



Cowdray Polo Academy is based at Madams Farm, just north of Midhurst. The Academy enables new players to step into the very heart of the sport following instruction by leading professional coaches. Everyone from experienced riders to beginners are welcome.



Clay Pigeon Shooting is available at the shooting school just north of Midhurst. It caters for everyone from the novice to the accomplished shot.



Wildlife Tours with the Cowdray Ranger take place throughout the year. The tours are three hours long, often up to twilight. Guests have the chance to see indigenous animals in their natural habitat.



The Queen Elizabeth Oak in the old Deer Park at Benbow Pond is estimated to be between 850 and 1,000 years old. The Deer Park has other veteran trees and is located close to the Queen Elizabeth Jubilee Walk and the John Cowdray Arboretum.

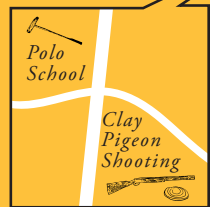


Walking Map



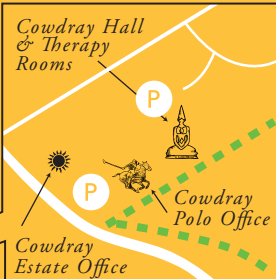
