## **PONCA CITY**

#### Oil Barons and Palaces

The magnificent Marland Mansion is the crown jewel in Ponca City. This 55room mansion was built by oil tycoon E. W. Marland during the oil boom days of the 1920s. It is exquisitely furnished and has been recognized as one of America's castles. Marland's first home, the Grand Home, is also available for touring with an American Indian Museum on the second floor showcasing a diverse collections of Native American Indian artifacts focused on the north central tribes of Oklahoma: Ponca, Osage, Otoe-Missouri, Kaw, Pawnee and Tonkawa. In addition, the museum exhibits items from the Great Plains and Northwest and Southwest tribes. There are over 1,200 artifacts in the historic collection representing the lives of American Indian men, women and children.

Learn the story of area tribes at the Standing Bear Museum, which also boasts a beautiful park and memorial watched over by a very large bronze statue of Chief Standing Bear. Other Ponca City attractions include the Pioneer Woman Museum, the Conoco Museum, and the Poncan Theatre, which has been completely restored to its original glory and displays the largest collection of 1930s, hand-painted lobby art in the world.

There is no shortage of entertainment in the Ponca City area where several casinos feature high-stakes gaming, day and night. Popular annual events include the Draggin' Grand Car Show in June and the Festival of Angels during the holiday season. Ponca



City's Rock'n It is a gift shop offering an overall educational experience with a black light room, indoor cave and sluice system, fairy garden, apothecary demonstrations, geode cracking, and mineral identification.

Championship barbecue can be found at Danny's BBQ Headquarters, home of the famous "Head Country" barbecue sauce. Get off the beaten path at The Rusty Barrell Supper Club where entry can only be gained after ringing a doorbell. Located within the Ponca City Municipal Airport, Enrique's Mexican Restaurant is another great option where the view - and food - can't be beat.








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


## **PAWHUSKA**

### Tallgrass Prairie and Western Charm

For a taste of the Old West and a deep dive into Native American culture, Pawhuska is the place to be. The Osage Nation is headquartered here, and the town is surrounded by rich ranch land - a notable one is home to the Pioneer Woman Ree Drummond, of Food Network fame, so you won't be able to resist dining at The Mercantile to taste some of the scrumptious menu offerings. Of the ninety-eight buildings downtown, eighty-six are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. And The Osage Nation Museum is the oldest tribally operated and owned museum in the country.

Pawhuska also supports its rich history and culture through annual events such as the National Indian Taco Championship where you can experience traditional Native American dance, not to mention delicious native food, and The Cavalcade, the world's largest amateur rodeo. During the Cattleman's Convention, you can experience authentic "cowboy life" with a ranch tour.


You can also "shop 'til you drop" for authentic Native American items that include art, bead work, shawls, and so much more. There are plenty of shops offering western wear and items; and that's not all — in Pawhuska, there is something for everyone. You can spend an entire day shopping at stores such as Saltcreek Marketplace, Gypsy Cowgirl, Mudpies², Spurs and Arrows, Sister's Attic, Prairie Cottage, Sunset Ridge Gallery, and The Waterbird Gallery - a Native American (citizen



of the Osage Nation) woman owned business. The Water Bird Gallery captures the beauty of Native American artisans through its bead work, fans, shawls, and other items throughout the store. See pages 9 and 10 for more information.



Just north of Pawhuska, drive through the Tallgrass Prairie Preserve with its protected ecosystem, the largest remnant in North America. Don't miss this opportunity to see bison grazing, three hundred species of birds and other wildlife along this scenic drive. Nearby lakes and a state park make this area a "must do".

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#### **PAWNEE**

Pawnee Bill & the wild, wild West

The small community of Pawnee has two big claims to fame: Pawnee Bill, who established a famous Wild West Show, and Chester Gould, who created the popular comic strip Dick Tracy. At the Pawnee Bill Ranch & Museum - on the western edge of Pawnee, Oklahoma, atop Blue Hawk Peak - visitors will see a treasure trove of historical items, as well as roaming bison and long-horn cattle. Pawnee Bill's Wild West Fest is the historical recreation of the famous show. The annual event is in June



and includes trick roping, riding, and shooting, wild West rides and plenty of activities to keep everyone entertained.

Downtown Pawnee is charms with centuryold native stone buildings, unique shops and outstanding eateries. A giant mural of Dick Tracy guides visitors to the Pawnee County Historical Society Museum where many pieces of the comic strip are on display. A birthday celebration in Gould's honor is held each October.

More history is featured at the annual Oklahoma Steam Threshing & Gas Engine Show each May held at Steam Park Grounds. Exhibits and displays include gas and Corliss steam engines, shingle and saw mills, wheat threshing, power pulls and climbs, crafts and handmade items.

Enjoy shopping one-of-a-kind stores such as Hurricane Dixie Leather, and Spears Furniture. When hunger strikes, visit Click's Steakhouse for friendly service and mile high pies.

The Ralston Opera House was built in 1902 and provided the area with live entertainment and silent movies until 1927.

Western Heritage Day is celebrated in the fall with food trucks, merchandise stands, activities for the kids, and more. You won't want to miss the Longhorn cattle strolling through downtown Dewey in the celebration parade.

Walk in the footsteps of Tom Mix, the beloved star of silent Western movies, and browse collections of his belongings and memorabilia at his namesake museum in the town where he once served as marshal. Across the street you can explore the beautifully restored, Victorian-style Dewey Hotel which now serves as a museum. Make your way through three floors and 31 rooms filled with authentic antique furnishings as you marvel at this charming glimpse into turn-of-the-century hospitality.



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
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## **VINITA - Historic Route 66**

Fill up at Clantons Café on Route 66 and try their famous chicken fried steak. Not only has this steak been called one of the best on Route 66, but it has also garnered rave reviews from Guy Fieri on Diners, Drive-Ins, and Dives. If you're feeling adventurous, order the calf fries. This regional classic is hand-breaded and flash-fried to a golden perfection. Craving more? Join in the fun at the World's Largest Calf Fry Festival each June. If breakfast is your meal, then Hi-way Cafe is your place with all day breakfast. Piguet's Prime Time has your steak and catering needs covered.

Western Motel is conveniently located next to the Hi-Way Cafe on Historic Route 66. Amenities include full size beds, mini fridge, microwave, truck parking, cable, and Wi-Fi.




## **PRYOR - Rocklahoma and Motor Racing**

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
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## **MUSCOGEE NATION RESERVATION**
