

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# Welcome to Northeast Oklahoma's Green Country










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## **MIAMI**






## **BRISTOW**

## **SKIATOOK**



The City of Skiatook is just minutes from Tulsa's historic downtown district. Enjoy a central retail corridor consisting of a five mile stretch of State Highway 20 that dissects the community and offers shopping, dining and fun for the entire family. Located just west of the city is beautiful Skiatook Lake, which boasts 10.190 surface acres and 160 miles of shoreline. Thousands of people visit each year to swim, boat, hike, camp and connect with nature. 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


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## **DEWEY**



Western Heritage Day is celebrated in the fall with food trucks, merchandise stands, activities for the kids, and more. You won't want to miss the Longhorn cattle strolling through downtown Dewey in the celebration parade.

Walk in the footsteps of Tom Mix, the beloved star of silent Western movies, and browse collections of his belongings and memorabilia at his namesake museum in the town where he once served as marshal. Across the street you can explore the beautifully restored, Victorian-style Dewey Hotel which now serves as a museum. Make your way through three floors and 31 rooms filled with authentic antique furnishings as you marvel at this charming glimpse into turn-of-the-century hospitality.



### **GROVE**

Escape the hustle and bustle and discover a hidden gem nestled in the heart of Oklahoma. Grove welcomes you with open arms to a world of serene landscapes, charming communities and endless outdoor adventures. If it's outdoor recreation you're after, Grove has it in spades with its prime location on Grand Lake O' The Cherokees, where you're



welcomed with magnificent sunsets, all kinds of water sports and plentiful relaxation.

Step into the past with a visit to Grove's Har-Ber Village Museum, a pioneer-era village settled on six acres near Grand Lake O' The Cherokees. Browse a historic jail, drug store, mercantile, chapel and numerous cabins and log structures showcasing over 100 exhibits ranging from a chuckwagon and threshing machines to military and displays showcasing occupations of the time such as a dentist's office and doctor's office. Grove is also home to the beautiful and secluded Lendonwood Gardens where visitors can meander through eight lush acres packed with over 1,200 species. Visit during the spring for an array of azaleas, daffodils and dogwoods, while summer and fall each offer vibrant blooms and colorful foliage.

Set sail on the sparkling waters of Grand Lake, where fishing enthusiasts reel in trophy catches and memories that last a lifetime. Whether you're a seasoned angler or a first-time fisher, the region's pristine lakes and rivers promise an angling paradise. Embark on thrilling water sports adventures, from jet skiing to paddleboarding, there's no shortage of adrenaline-pumping activities on Grove's crystal-clear waters.

Make your trip to Grove even better with an overnight stay at the Honey Creek Area at Grand Lake State Park. Plan a trip during October when the park hosts the popular Pelican Festival. If camping isn't your jam, check out the dozens of privately-owned cabins and cottages surrounding the lake.

There is always something Grand happening in Grove. Those visiting over the Fourth of July are in for a treat with the Grove Independence Day Celebration at Wolf Creek. You can also join the fun at concerts, boat races and fishing tournaments throughout the year.

Nearby Salina hosts Chouteau Day - Oklahoma's Founders Day, in October with a huge celebration sure to please the entire family.

For even more thrilling action, head to the Salina Highbanks Speedway - the fastest speedway in Oklahoma! Top off the night at the on-site Finishline Bar & Grill for a great meal. Both Pryor and Salina have the privilege of being located around Lake Hudson, where plentiful camping and cabins are available all year.


Pryor's main thoroughfare, Graham Avenue/Highway 20, offers boutiques, vintage treasures and one-of-a-kind shops. Over at Manda's Coneys & Cream, you can score a chili cheese coney with mustard and onions. Afterward, enjoy premium Made in Oklahoma ice cream by the scoop. Chouteau, another nearby town, and home to a large Amish community, boasts the Dutch Pantry, Amish Cheese House and an abundance of antique stores








## **TAHLEQUAH**

## **PONCA CITY**

The magnificent Marland Mansion is the crown jewel in Ponca City. This 55-room mansion was built by oil tycoon E. W. Marland during the oil boom days of the 1920s. It is exquisitely furnished and has been recognized as one of America's castles. Marland's first home, the Grand Home, is also available for touring with an American Indian Museum on the second floor showcasing a diverse collections of Native American Indian artifacts focused on the north central tribes of Oklahoma: Ponca, Osage, Otoe-Missouri, Kaw, Pawnee and Tonkawa.

After exploring the opulent "Palace on the Prairie" and Marland's Grand Home, enjoy an equally decadent meal at Danny's BBQ Head Quarters. Family owned and operated by Oklahoma Barbecue Society Hall of Fame honoree Danny Head, this amazing eatery has twice won the Kansas City American Royal International Invitational Barbecue Grand Championship and the Jack Daniels Invitational World Barbecue Grand Championship, as well as countless other regional and state championships and prestigious awards.


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
