

Climate: Enjoying a relatively mild climate for Alaska, Haines experiences summers with temperatures typically ranging from 50 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit, while winters range from 10 to 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Annual precipitation averages around 52 inches, with an annual snowfall reaching 133 inches.

Population: The population of Haines stands at approximately 2,400 residents.

Employment: Haines features a seasonal economy, with numerous jobs tied to tourism, fishing, and The local construction. government employment opportunities for a significant portion of the population through the borough and school system.



The harbor is dredged out to a -15 in all areas that larger vessels would tie. Harbor is able to accommodate any vessel from a 10'skiff to a 100' vessel. Transient side-tie space is used in the harbor for larger vessels but everyone is encouraged to call ahead to check space availability. 30 amp power is accessible throughout the harbor will 50 amp in designated locations. Potable water is available during the summer months. Fuel dock carries diesel and gasoline.

BY LAND

Haines stands as one of only three communities in Southeast Alaska with road access to the contiguous United States. Situated 85 air miles north of Juneau, the state capital, and approximately 600 air miles southeast of Anchorage and Fairbanks, it boasts a strategic location. Connected to the interior of Alaska and the continental United States by the Alaska Canada (Alcan) Highway, travelers will cross the US/Canadian border on this route.

To cross the border, you must have one of the following documents:

- Passport or US Passport card
- Trusted Traveler card (NEXUS, FAST, SENTRI, or Global Entry)
- Enhanced Driver's License

For US citizens ages 15 and under arriving by land, presenting an original birth certificate or a copy (issued by the Vital Records Department in the state of birth) is acceptable. If only one parent is traveling with the child, carrying a consent letter from the absent parent is recommended. The letter should include the full name, address, and phone number of the parent or legal guardian, and some travelers choose to have it notarized.

Additionally, dogs, cats, and other animals must have a current rabies certificate, while birds require a special permit. There are also restrictions on foods and other items allowed across the border.

If you require immediate medical assistance beyond what is offered locally, you will be transported via air medical transport to Juneau, Anchorage or Seattle. The location depends on the medical condition and availability of services. With the exception of heart issues or head traumas, Bartlett Hospital in Juneau can handle most medical conditions.

Emergency air medical transportation is expensive, fortunately, the emergency medical air lift companies which service Haines offer annual memberships which greatly reduce the costs. Unfortunately, you cannot guarantee which one will be available at the time you may need assistance, so it is wise to purchase memberships to both if you want be certain you are covered.

HEALTHCARE CONTINUED/PLACES OF WORSHIP

PREGNANCY

Being pregnant in Haines presents some unique challenges. If you have insurance, it's essential to double-check your plan to determine what will and won't be covered for travel, out-of-area, and out-of-state providers. If you don't have insurance, the State of Alaska offers assistance for families who meet income guidelines. Information on **DenaliCare** and **Denali KidCare** can be accessed through the Division of Health Care Services for the State of Alaska website at www.dhss.alaska.gov, where applications are available.

All prenatal checkups, testing, and even ultrasounds can be done locally. However, since there isn't a hospital in Haines, you'll need to go elsewhere for labor and delivery. Caregivers recommend leaving Haines to be closer to the facility you have chosen for your delivery three weeks before your due date. They also suggest staying in town for at least a week after the baby is born in case of complications. During this time, you have the option of staying in a hotel/motel, vacation rental, or with friends or family. Some insurance policies will cover travel and lodging in this situation, while others may not. Planning ahead is crucial, as this can be one of the costliest parts of your delivery.

For families wanting to deliver in Alaska, the most common options are Juneau Family Health and Birth Center (www.juneaubirthcenter.org, 907-586-1203) and Bartlett Regional Hospital (www.bartletthospital.org, 907-796-8900). Bartlett is the closest hospital with labor and delivery services, though it does not have a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). If you are having a high-risk pregnancy or prefer the security of a NICU, you will need to seek care elsewhere.



MOVING CHECKLIST

- Ensure your car is tuned up before embarking on your move.
- Secure housing arrangements in Haines prior to departure.
- Notify the post office and submit a change of address form.
- Refill prescriptions and gather necessary medical records.
- Collect school records if required.
- Notify financial institutions, credit card companies, and insurance providers.
- Inform utility companies and cancel delivery subscriptions as needed.
- Prepare cash or ensure credit card availability for travel expenses.
- Check that your driver's license and passports are up to date for travel.
- If moving from a rental, notify the landlord to arrange for the return of your apartment deposit.
- Pack an essential night bag including a change of clothes, flashlight, toiletries, and non-perishable snacks.

MOVING YOUR PET TO HAINES

- Ensure your pet's rabies vaccination certificate is current and valid, as both USA and Canadian Customs require it for border crossing. You can find more information at www.aphis.usda.gov/aphis/pet-travel/bycountry/pettravel-canada.
- Remember that pet carriers and current health certificates are mandatory for transporting pets by air and on the Alaska Marine Highway System (AMHS) ferry.
- Familiarize yourself with Alaska Airlines' pet policy at www.pettravel.com/airline_pet_rules/alaskaairlines.cfm.
- Review the AMHS Animal Policy at www.dot.state.ak.us/amhs/policies.shtml for additional guidance on traveling with your pet.

VETERINARIAN SERVICES

- Prioritize regular medical care for your pet by planning ahead in Haines. Ensure your pet wears an ID collar securely attached with your contact information.
- Obtain a health certificate for air travel if needed.
- Ensure all vaccinations, including the rabies shot and certificate, are up to date as required for entering Canada and the USA.
- Prepare necessities for pet travel, including water, a bowl, and enough dog food.
- Note that Haines does not have a resident veterinarian. The nearest veterinary services are located in Juneau or Whitehorse. Visiting veterinarians come to Haines several times a year. Haines Animal Rescue Kennel (HARK) also offers some assistance to residents.
- If your animal requires regular medication, it is advisable to pack several months' supply if you are moving to Haines.

SHIPPING INFORMATION

- United States Postal Office (USPO): Located at 0 Mile Haines Highway, USPS is the fastest and most economical option for shipping to and from Haines. Mail is delivered along the highway, while other areas require pickup from the Post Office. Consider obtaining a Post Office Box or using your employer's PO Box for shipments.
- Alaska Marine Lines: Visit www.lynden.com/aml for information on their weekly barge service between Seattle and Haines, ideal for heavy or bulky items.
- UPS: Drop off UPS shipments at Alaska Seaplanes in the airport terminal. Ensure you have a preprinted label, as they are not provided.
- FEDEX: Shipments are flown to Sitka or Anchorage before being transferred to the US Postal System for delivery to Haines.

EXPLORING THE PAST

The town of Haines holds a history as intriguing as the landscapes that surround it. Named in honor of Francina Haines from the Presbyterian Home Missions Board, the town's roots trace back to 1879 when S. Hall Young, accompanied by his friend John Muir, became the first missionary to the area. Their mission: to find a suitable location for a mission and a school.

The first recorded encounter between white settlers and the indigenous Tlingit people dates back to 1741 when a Russian ship anchored near Haines, marking the onset of the fur trade in the region. In 1892, Jack Dalton established a toll road along the Tlingit trade route, serving gold-seekers and other travelers heading north into Canada. Sections of this historic route now form the Haines Highway.

In 1902, ongoing border disputes between the U.S. and Canada led to the establishment of an army post in Alaska. The enduring white buildings of Fort William H. Seward, though decommissioned in 1947, remain as distinctive landmarks of Haines. These structures, once part of a military complex, have been transformed into privately owned homes, accommodations, restaurants, galleries, and shops, a living testament to Haines' unique journey through time.

CULTURAL HERITAGE

The Chilkat Valley's very first inhabitants were the Tlingit Indians, who bestowed the name "Dei-Shu" or "End of the Trail" upon what we now know as Haines. The Chilkat Indians, with their mother village located 22 miles north in Klukwan, have deep roots in the region. Klukwan, the oldest of the Chilkat villages, stands as a testament to its rich history.

Haines, once traversed by the Dalton Trail used by gold-seekers and now connected to Canada through the Haines Highway, was a vital part of the Tlingit trade route into the interior. This trail earned the moniker "grease trail" due to the prized commodity it carried - oil extracted from the eulachon fish.

Thanks to the area's abundant resources, the Tlingits could devote more time to honing their skills and less on mere survival. As the first settlers in the Chilkat Valley, their traditions continue to thrive, preserving a vital part of Haines' cultural identity.

BREATHTAKING LANDSCAPE

Haines boasts a spectacular natural canvas sculpted by ancient glaciers. Surrounded by mountains and water, the town is embraced by the imposing Takinsha Mountains and Chilkat Range to the south, the Takshanuk Mountains to the north, and the Coast Mountains to the east across the Lynn Canal.

Traveling northwest from Haines, you'll follow the Chilkat River through a vast valley carved by glaciers. To the east lies the Lynn Canal, one of the longest and deepest fjords globally, measuring 60 miles long and over 2,000 feet deep, once a glacier's domain.

Traces of Haines' glacial history linger in Rainbow and Davidson Glaciers in the Chilkat Range. Although no direct road links to these wonders, Mud Bay Road through Chilkat State Park offers breathtaking views.

Every day, locals and visitors alike marvel at Haines' beauty, with Picture Point off Lutak Road being a cherished spot. As you explore, immerse yourself in the awe-inspiring scenery that defines Haines, a testament to the town's natural splendor.

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DISCOVER HAINES WILDLIFE WONDERS

Haines is renowned for its thriving wildlife population, which can be spotted throughout the valley, even in the heart of downtown. To make the most of your wildlife encounters, guided tours are the way to go. BEARS IN THE WILD

Nothing beats the thrill of witnessing bears in their natural habitat. Haines is home to both black and brown bears, with certain areas in the Chilkat Valley becoming renowned for exceptional bear viewing. The Chilkoot River, flowing from Chilkoot Lake into Lutak Inlet, offers one of the most accessible bear viewing experiences in Southeast Alaska from mid-June to October. BIRDING PARADISE

The Chilkat Valley hosts over 260 bird species throughout the year. While you can embark on your birding adventure, many guided tours offer expert knowledge about the local avian residents. GATHERING OF EAGLES

Haines is known as "The Valley of the Eagles." Approximately 400 eagles reside year-round, but their numbers swell to over 3,500 from October through December. During these months, a late run of chum salmon in the Chilkat River offers a sumptuous feast for these majestic raptors. The annual Alaska Bald Eagle Festival in November showcases this natural phenomenon, featuring guided eagle viewing, educational tours, programs, and photo workshops for all ages. The American Bald Eagle Foundation is an excellent resource to learn more about our national icon and the diverse wildlife inhabiting the valley.

MAJESTIC MOOSE

Moose are another highlight of Haines' wildlife viewing experience, and they can be spotted throughout the valley, even in downtown areas. These massive members of the deer family, with full-grown bulls standing 7 feet at the shoulder, often roam with twin calves, and on rare occasions, triplets have been sighted in the wild. It's vital to remember that moose are wild animals, and they can be more dangerous than bears when threatened, especially if protecting their young. For guidelines on staying safe around moose, consult the Alaska Fish and Game Wildlife Conservation web page for wildlife viewing.

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AMERICAN BALD EAGLE FOUNDATION

Dedicated to the conservation and understanding of our natural symbol, the American Bald Eagle Foundation delves into the scientific and cultural aspects of eagles. Through research and education, the foundation plays a vital role in restoring and preserving the eagle's habitat and its coexisting wildlife. Get up close with these magnificent raptors and meet some of their residents, offering a truly wild experience.

HAINES SHELDON MUSEUM AND CULTURAL CENTER

Located on the original Mission grounds in the downtown area, the Haines Sheldon Museum is committed to collecting, preserving, and interpreting the history, art, and culture of the Chilkat Valley. Named after Steve Sheldon, whose collection became the foundation of the museum, it showcases a wealth of historical displays spanning from the past to the present.

HAMMER MUSEUM

Founded by local resident Dave Pahl, the Hammer Museum is a unique institution that houses the world's largest collection of hammers. Pahl's journey as a blacksmith and his passion for hand tools led to the creation of this fascinating museum, offering visitors a captivating walk through the history of this essential tool.

JILKAAT KWAAN CULTURAL CENTER

Located in the traditional native village of Klukwan, the Jilkaat Kwaan Cultural Center provides insights into the rich cultural history and subsistence way of life of the Chilkat people. This center offers an opportunity to immerse yourself in the local culture, tour exhibits, and witness the preservation of clan artifacts.

SCULPTURE GARDEN

A creative collaboration between local artists and the Alaska Arts Confluence. It transforms the stone ruins of one of the Fort Seward Chilkoot barracks buildings into an outdoor sculpture garden. As you explore this unique space, you'll encounter installations that showcase the local art community, and you'll learn about the history of Fort Seward, which was established for military purposes in 1901. The remnants of the fort add a historical layer to this artistic endeavor.
