

AFTER THE ECLIPSE

At 3:06 p.m., Monday, April 8, Hamilton County residents and visitors experienced the 2024 Total Solar Eclipse, a significant celestial event that drew almost 90,000 visitors from all 50 states, which is a 96% increase in normal visitation for that same day in 2023. Hamilton County Tourism led a hard-working local organization committee comprised of city officials, public safety departments from throughout the county to plan and prepare schools, businesses and residents for the event. They also helped create an air of excitement along with preparation. This report recaps the event, detailing the impact, successes and key takeaways for future planning (of large events).

OVERVIEW

Hamilton County was in the direct path of a total solar eclipse April 8, 2024, creating an unprecedented travel opportunity. The event was eagerly anticipated by residents and visitors. The totality ranged from 2 minutes and 50 seconds to 3 minutes and 38 seconds throughout Hamilton County, offering an awe-inspiring experience for all who attended.

VISITOR ATTENDANCE & DEMOGRAPHICS

- Data from Pacer.ai indicate that 86,600 visitors (people from 30+ miles who stayed at least 30 minutes in the county) visited Hamilton County on April 8.
- According to a Longwoods International study, 7% of travelers reported traveling at least 50 miles to
 observe the eclipse. On those trips, 7% spent more than 5 nights away from home, 9% spent 3-5 nights,
 39% spent 1-2 nights away, and 44% traveled and returned on the same day.
