
According to STR, U.S. occupancy was at 46.2%, which is 38.7% lower than the same week in 2019. The country has now seen a small weekly rise in occupancy for 11 weeks.




The highest recorded daily occupancy was 61.3% on Saturday, the first time the county has surpassed 60% since the second week of March.

Also worth noting, the percentage of rooms participants reporting to STR has seemingly returned to the typical level for the county, which we haven't steadily seen since early March.


