

Creative Economy

Houston has a total demand of \$25.6 billion from the local Creative Industry (10-county region) of which \$10.5 billion is produced and sold locally.

This data reflects a total employment of about **114,000** workers in Creative Industries.

The demand for more investment in the Creative Industry Economy has increased by over \$5 billion in the past 4 years since this study was first conducted.


The nonprofit arts and culture sector is a significant industry in Houston*


