

# WELCOME to **ELLICOTT CITY'S** HISTORIC DISTRICT

The village of what began as Ellicott Mills was founded during the English colonization of the area in the 18th century in the Patapsco River Valley. The Ellicott brothers, Joseph, Andrew and John, came from Ouaker Country-Bucks County, Pennsylvania-in 1772 to create what would eventually become one of the largest milling operations in the colonies. The settlement that grew around their prosperous milling operation was first called Ellicott Mills. In 1867, the town's name was changed to Ellicott City and is known today as Historic Ellicott City.

The National Road was started here and the first railroad terminal was established here in 1830. One of the first academic institutions in the country solely for women, the Patapsco Female Institute, was opened in this town in 1837, Civil War prisoners were confined here, and the war dead from Gettysburg and Antietam were transported through town by rail on their way to their final destination. Through the years, the town has been visited by a number of notable historic figures from Presidents to Babe Ruth who was married at the nearby St. Paul's Catholic Church in 1914. Despite this multi-dimensional history, after the Civil War, Ellicott Mills-now Ellicott City-went into a dramatic decline by mid-century.

Spurred by a renaissance in the 1960s that gained momentum in the 1980s, the historic district began to come back to life. Despite devastating floods in 1972, 2016 & 2018 and destructive fires in 1984 and 1999, Ellicott City's historic district today is a vibrant community with over 70 unique shops, restaurants & service providers, outdoor recreation, and free museums & historic sites.

# THE ELLICOTT CITY **COLORED SCHOOL, RESTORED**

May-Dec: Sat-Sun • 1-4 pm This schoolhouse was built in 1880 as the first school for African American students paid for with County funds. The school was open from the 1880s to 1953. The schoolhouse is now a museum and chronicles African American history in Howard County, particularly the era of segregation and the various segregated schoolhouses that existed in Howard County. # THOMAS ISAAC LOG CABIN

May-Dec: Sat-Sun • 1-4 pm Named after its late 19th-century owner, this rustic structure was built circa 1780 as a settler's home of Ellicotts Mills. The cabin was reconstructed on the present site in the late 20th Century. Here, visitors can learn about the settlement and development of the region and artisans. # HOWARD COUNTY WELCOME CENTER: **POST OFFICE MURALS**

Mon-Sun • 9 am-5 pm Originally a United States Post Office dedicated on December 7, 1940. After the Post Office closed in 2008, the building was purchased by Howard County Government and now serves as the Howard County Welcome Center and is home to two oil paintings by Petro Paul De Anna, an artist commissioned in 1942 by the federal government as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal. The murals entitled, "Building of Ellicott Mills" and "Landscape of Ellicott City" depict the town's beginnings in 1772. New Deal murals seen in Post Offices were intended to help boost the morale of people suffering from the effects of the Great Depression through art.

# PATAPSCO FEMALE INSTITUTE

May-Dec: Sat-Sun • 1-4 pm Perched at Ellicott City's highest point, the Patapsco Female Institute offered a revolutionary curriculum to young women from 1837-1891. The school earned a national reputation for its inclusion of botany, chemistry, and mathematics in a time where it was believed that women could not learn such subjects.

## **MUSEUM OF HOWARD COUNTY HISTORY**

The Howard County Historical Society's Museum is home to hundreds of artifacts that convey the story of Howard County's rich history from before European settlement to modern events. A permanent collection along with themed exhibitions of artifacts and information gives a deep understanding of Howard County History and the County's role in American history. Mav-Dec: Sat-Sun • 1-4 pm Located in the heart of downtown, the Firehouse Museum explores the unique challenges of fighting fire in the late 19th and early 20th century Ellicott City. This building was the first firehouse in Howard County, built in 1889 and in use until 1923

# **BALTIMORE & OHIO ELLICOTT CITY STATION MUSEUM**

Wed-Thurs • 10 am-3 pm, Fri-Sun • 10 am-5 pm Designated a National Historic Landmark in 1968, the B&O Ellicott City Station is the oldest surviving railroad station in the country. # **BENIAMIN BANNEKER** HISTORICAL PARK & MUSEUM

Museum: Tue-Sat • 10 am-4 pm (Mav-Oct): Sundays • 12-4 pm: Park: Sunrise to Sunset A 142-acre site dedicated to telling the inspiring story of the life and times of Benjamin Banneker often considered the first African American man of science The museum's exhibits chronicle Banneker's contributions as a largely self-taught mathematician, astronomer, almanac writer, surveyor, abolition advocate and naturalist during the late 1700s. 
#### THE #9 TROLLEY TRAIL

Sunrise to Sunset

A paved 1.25-mile shaded trail that follows what was originally part of the Catonsville and Ellicott City Electric Railway Company trolley line that shuttled passengers between Ellicott City and Baltimore from the late 1890s to the mid-1950s. There is a great coffee shop about halfway. The trail also connects with the Benjamin Banneker Historical Park hiking trails.
