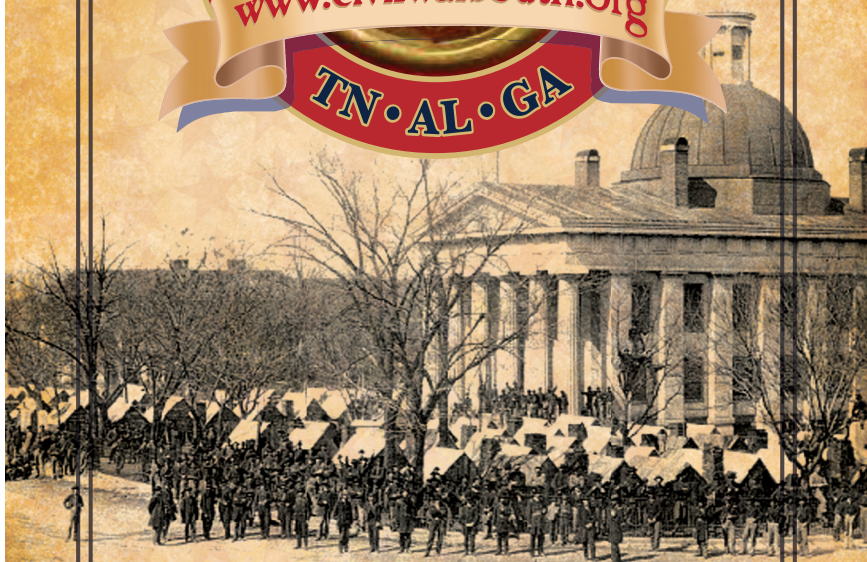

## MADISON COUNTY, AL WALKING TOUR

Stroll through the historic Twickenham District, Alabama's largest collection of antebellum homes, many of which were seized by the Union Army. Tour the Weeden House Museum and the Historic Huntsville Depot, captured by General O.M. Mitchel and used as a prison and hospital where Confederate prisoners passed the time by writing their names on the depot's walls, graffiti still viewable today. Contemplate the honor of the fallen at Maple Hill Cemetery, where many known and unknown soldiers lie in their final resting place.
