Board Chair Clem Lear called the meeting to order at 11:45 a.m.

#### CONSENT AGENDA:

Lear asked for a motion to accept the Consent Agenda as presented. Board member Rick Lindsey made a motion to approve and accept; second by Board member Karen Cooperstein. With no opposition and no further discussion, the Consent Agenda was unanimously approved.

#### **PRESENTATION**

The Irving Convention Center Environmental Initiatives presentation was postponed.

Assistant Executive Director Marketing/Communications Diana Pfaff introduced Marketing Manager Kayla Mansour to give a presentation of the ICVB initiatives at the South by Southwest Show in Austin, Texas. Mansour gave a recap report of the four-day tradeshow and the goal to spread the message of "Irving Rocks." She noted the audience and demographics at the event were a great match to promote that message. A social media mosaic was displayed, and 4,620 picture spots were used to create the final product. The ICVB had an excellent booth location at the main entrance and surrounded by other countries and cities. The design of the ICVB booth popped and stood out from the crowd. She commented this particular trade show was perfect for meeting potential visitors. It had a huge audience and overlapped with dates for the three conferences at South by Southwest. She shared demographics and statistics from the event and noted 75,000 people attended the four-day tradeshow in total. The Irving website and social media impressions were up as well. Attendees who participated in the mosaic received an email, a chance to win prizes, and a print out of their picture. Over 1,400 email addresses were collected and an estimated 15,400 social media contacts. The branded swag items were a big hit, and attendees received items by liking the ICVB page on Facebook, Instagram or Twitter. A follow up email was sent after the event and shows a 32.5% open rate, which is well above the average. A time lapse video of the event was shown to the Board.

In response to a question from Board member Karen Cooperstein, Mansour said things to do differently may include a tradeshow sticker that attendees were collecting; continuing with an interactive booth will be key. Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce President Beth Bowman complimented the entire ICVB team and their effort to get the "Irving Rocks" message out and in a first-class and creative way from a destination perspective. Lear commented social media posts were impressive and fun to follow throughout the event.

### **BOARD CHAIR REPORT**

Lear thanked everyone who participated in the USA Jump Rope Association welcome committee flash mob. She reminded everyone of the Charity Bowl-a-Thon on April 23 at Pinstack in Irving. The Irving Marathon is scheduled for April 27 and the Irving Trivia Contest will be held later that day. She also reminded the Board on May 1 Executive Director Maura Gast will give an ICVB update to City Council at Work Session, which is an item on the ICVB Strategic Plan. She encouraged everyone to attend and give their support. The next Board meeting will be on May 20 at the Westin Convention Center Hotel, and June is the budget retreat Board meeting at the Hilton Garden Inn DFW South.

#### **BOARD AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE**

Committee Chair Debbi Haacke reported the Texas legislative session is still in session and the Tourism Public Improvement District (TPID) item is still in play. The Committee is confident in the direction it is taking from the Senate to the House of Representatives. The next Committee meeting is scheduled for June 7 and an update on legislative items should be available at that time.

### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Rick Lindsey gave a brief recap of the April 2 Committee meeting. He reported Sybil and Lyle Novinski received the High Spirited Citizen Award at the April 18 City Council meeting and he thanked Mayor Rick Stopfer and City Council for their recognition. He noted the Novinski's are wonderful people and a well-deserved award for all their efforts in promoting Irving with their volunteer efforts. He thanked the Board for the approval of the nomination for Chuck Kirk to receive a High Spirited Citizen award and will keep the Board apprised of the date and time for the presentation at City Council. He noted that on May 2, Mayor Stopfer will read a proclamation kicking off National Travel and Tourism Week, which is May 5-11; this year's theme is "Travel Matters." As part of the strategic plan, the Committee is working on a bus tour to introduce and showcase Irving to the community. An initial tour will be scheduled for Board members and updates on a date and time will be communicated. The next Committee meeting is scheduled for July 9.

### **DESTINATION DEVELOPMENT**

Committee Chair Greg Malcolm reported the next Committee meeting will be held on May 7 and will be a site trip to The Star in Frisco and Legacy Hall in Plano. All Board members are invited to attend.

#### **CITY REPORTS**

Mayor Pro Tem John Danish reported early voting has begun and encouraged all to participate and vote. Deputy Mayor Pro Tem Oscar Ward gave a brief recap of the American Planning Association conference in San Francisco. The conference brings together hot topics (Air BNB and Smart Cities), tools and leading voices to build a community. The conference next year is in Houston and Ward would like to have a presence at the conference to talk about economic development for Irving. He reminded everyone of the Heritage Society Fish Fry event on May 3. Councilman Kyle Taylor commented the Irving lanyard was a great networking tool at the APA conference that lead to conversations about Irving, Texas. It is a simple detail that made it easy to lead into those conversations. He reported that economic development and experiences were topics of conversation at the conference.

Mayor Rick Stopfer noted the importance of people going out and voting for bond issues, etc. Based on this election, Irving will revisit the selling of the bonds. He added in agreement the Novinski's are two of the dearest people and has known them for over 30 years and their involvement and commitment to Irving is hard to match. Stopfer reported he had an opportunity to meet with the mayors of Arlington and Plano to discuss AirBNB and housing rental registration issues. They discussed how to work together and wrap arms around the issues. In addition to transportation, the City is focused on the trails and receipt of \$5 million for trails. The City is finalizing the Parks Master Plan and looking at the recreation centers, libraries and senior facilities. Also working on summer youth programs and working with Irving ISD and Irving Schools Foundation to take on the challenge of children who don't have anything to eat over the weekend. Irving Mall has donated 10,000 square feet of space to put food bags together; five or six recreation centers will open to youth from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. to provide food and meet their needs, and over the summer will have \$5.00 field trips. He gave kudos to the Parks and Rec Department.

Reporting on DART, Stopfer noted the Cotton Belt bids are out and DART is working on stations and cars are being designed. Cars will be exchanged over a 36-month timeframe. DART officially approved renaming the Carpenter Ranch Station to Hidden Ridge Station. Agreeing to the change now allows DART to incorporate the name into future construction with no incremental costs. He reported City Manager Chris Hillman is working on a Memorandum of Understanding for the Loop 12 station that will come before the DART Board at the end of the month.

City Manager Chris Hillman reported the budget retreat will be kicking off the budget season and staff is pulling together the basics and a preliminary budget process has started. Legislative session decisions that will affect the budget are anticipated; i.e., red light and right-of-way cameras could have a \$7 million hit to the budget. Operation Finally Home last month was an incredible opportunity to show the community who we are and provide a wonderful family with a home. ICTN did a piece on the project and ABC's World News Tonight covered the story. The City is still focused on infrastructure, and City Council approved \$22 million to continue to finish the final phase of a storm drain project, which will take hundreds of homes out of the flood plain.

### **BUREAU MANAGEMENT AND STAFF**

Executive Director Maura Gast reported the City's Public Safety Committee discussed public safety issues at two local hotels. Neither property has reached a level 4 in public safety, but one is close to that level. Irving Police will follow up on specific issues. A separate discussion was held on telephones in hotel rooms; properties built prior to 1999 were not required to have a telephone in the rooms. All local hotels built after 1999 are 100% compliant; the City will work with the City Attorney's Office to see what can be done to retroactively require telephones in the pre-1999 rooms. She reported the AirBNB data reports 350 available listings in Irving which is a 52.8% increase in listings over last year's data. However, she pointed out last year's data only included AirBNB data and this year includes AirBNB and Home Away data, which may have caused the increase. She thanked Mansour and Marketing/Communications team for the great job they did representing Irving at South by Southwest. Gast also acknowledged and thanked ICVB Accounting Director Marianne Lauda for her extra efforts in the transition of the City's accounting software system, while still doing her regular job duties.

VP of Sales and Services Lori Fojtasek reported the Sales team is at 112% of their goal for year-to-date and they are very busy. She congratulated ICC Director of Sales Matt Tungett and his team on already meeting their room night goal for the year. Both teams have a common goal and they work well together, and she expressed her gratitude. She also thanked everyone who participated in the USA Jump Rope Association welcome committee flash mob. She noted their group toured the ICC and Drive Nation for a potential USA Jump Rope Federation event that has 1,300-1,400 room nights associated with it for the summer of 2020. They were impressed with the Board participation, along with staff and were surprised by the welcome. Frisco, Texas is also being considered. The team had sales calls in Austin last week with the ICC team and hoteliers. Fojtasek noted the Lost Business Report that is included in the Sales Board report and noted the code "no response from customer." This RFP information comes through a platform and it is not an obligation to answer further questions. The team will still try to get answers on lost business.

Assistant Executive Director/Marketing and Communications Diana Pfaff noted that RFPs in March saw the highest number with 115 RFPs, which equates to over 48,000 associated room nights, a 34% increase year-over-year. March also saw the largest increase in Visit Irving website traffic with 35,409 sessions and 29,403 users. She noted that South by Southwest contributed to the increase. Pfaff also asked for contributions of bags for the Irving Schools Foundation tackling child hunger campaign. They are in need of bags that will be filled with food for children over the weekend.

Gast added in the packet is a letter from Irving Cares thanking the ICC for their partnership with the Grocer's Supply show in donating leftover produce and pantry items.

#### CONVENTION CENTER MANAGEMENT REPORT

SMG General Manager Tom Meehan reported this week is Green Week and ICC Operations Manager Jarred Smith is the leader of the Green Team and has done a great job in creating fun activities for staff to participate in Green Week. He is moving on in his career and will be missed. The building is doing well and running steady. The next few months are up and down based on budget forecast. The National Business Media Show (NBM) used compressed air in the building, a first time since the building opened. That show alone did \$32,000 in electrical orders and was very successful. It was complicated and detail-

oriented, but they were excited at their post-conference meeting and will be returning next year. The carpet on the third floor will be replaced this year, and capital improvement plans for the building for the next 20 years are being worked on. Director of Sales Matt Tungett reported attending the Association of Chief Executives for Sport in Colorado Springs where SMG was a sponsor. March had 3,438 future guest rooms booked, and over 22,000 for the year. There were 20 events and 22,630 visitors in March, 132 events and 11,000 visitors year-to-date. Breakfast with the Stars is scheduled for May 1, and the second annual "Imagine Irving" art contest honoring third graders from Irving ISD. The art will be hung on the walls of the ICC third floor and a presentation program to honor them will be held on May 2. USA Wrestling will be back for the fourth time and the Ultimate Women's Expo moved to May 17-19 from the fall.

### **INDUSTRY PARTNER REPORTS**

#### **HOTEL REPORTS**

Malcolm reported from the March 2019 STR report March shows Occupancy is at 77%, up .9% from last year and Average Daily Rate is at \$111.53, up 2.9% from last year. Rev PAR is 85.88%, up 3.8%. April is moving well, and he anticipates the year will end flat from last year.

General Manager Kim Limon reported the Hampton Inn Las Colinas ended March at 4.8% down in Occupancy over last year. RevPAR is down 1.3%. April is down slightly and rebounding from a bigger budget. The ownership group has recently acquired the Hilton Garden Inn at Las Colinas.

General Manager Holly Turner from the Omni Mandalay reported a loss year-over-year to date, but April is strong and will continue. The Omni Mandalay level renovation on the third-floor meeting space is completed and moving to Phase 2 of renovations.

#### IRVING-LAS COLINAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce President Beth Bowman reported economic development for 2019-20 Quarter 2 is off to a great start with 12 total wins, 4 retentions, 3,000 jobs and \$106 million in capital expenditures. Wins include VARIDESK, We Works, and Prosper Hospitality; retentions include Frito Lay Expansion, Ace Cash Express, Flowserve Global Headquarters and Trend Micro. There are 43 active projects in the pipeline, representing \$900 million in capital expenditures and \$4.4 million in potential commercial office space. Unemployment for March reports 3.1% for Irving, Texas and national numbers are reporting 3.8%. She reminded everyone that May 6 is National Small Business Week and encouraged everyone to volunteer for May 9 small business blitz. She is seeking 36 volunteers for the event. The Chamber team has actively been present in Austin working on behalf of the business industry and advocating on several bills. They will continue to keep Texas a business-friendly state. There is a business mixer at the Texican Court Hotel on April 23 before the Charity Bowl-a-Thon. She congratulated Mayor Stopfer, City Council and ICVB team for the Westin Convention Center Grand Opening.

#### **IRVING ARTS CENTER**

Arts and Culture Executive Director Todd Hawkins and Irving Arts Board Chair Judy Pierson reported the Arts Center is working on initiatives during Green Week – all lights in the theatre are LED to keep electrical costs down and working on a recycling project. "Steve Trash – The Science of Ecology" will be at the Dupree Theater on April 23 at 9:30 a.m. Author Roz Chast will deliver the keynote presentation for Irving's NEA Big Read, preceded by a reception. Summer Camp registration is open and filling up quickly. Hawkins reported another initiative is to plan to apply for a designation from the Texas Commission on the Arts to designate downtown Irving as a cultural district. It is a year-long process and will pull together other initiatives already in process in the Heritage District. It is approved by the Arts Board to help revitalize the downtown area. The Irving Archives and Museum construction is scheduled to be completed and a soft opening this summer. A Grand Opening will be scheduled when the permanent exhibits are fully operational. The facility will host the only Smithsonian Spark!Lab in Texas. Pierson reminded everyone that the Trivia Contest is open for everyone to attend on April 27.

TIF

TIF Chair Michael Randall reported there has not been a TIF Board meeting recently and no further update at this time. City Council has filled the open TIF Board seat with Dionte Stewart and he looks forward to working with him. Randall added he has attended the APA Conference when he served on the City's Planning and Zoning Committee and he thanked the City for their continued involvement. It is good to see what different cities are doing and very educational.

#### LAS COLINAS ASSOCIATION

Board member Hammond Perot thanked everyone for their participation in the Charity Bowl-A-Thon, benefitting Kidd's Kids. The signage for the Westin Convention Center hotel is expected to be installed this week and a photographer will be assigned to take the pictures. Perot attended the Urban Land Institute Spring Conference in Nashville, where 3,000 executives met and had dialogue on land use, bicycles, and redevelopment of neighborhoods. As the 50-year anniversary of Las Colinas is approaching, Perot is gathering insight on the development of Las Colinas to be sure the story is told and maintained. He encouraged anyone with historical information to contact The Las Colinas Association. In response to a question from Taylor, Perot noted the dog park is scheduled to start construction in late August or early September.

Lear noted the next Executive Committee meeting is on Monday, May 20, a week early due to the Memorial Day holiday.

With no further discussion, Lear adjourned the meeting at 1:17 p.m.



*U.S. News & World Report* released its highly anticipated Best High School rankings for 2019, and on the list are three of Irving ISD's very own. Irving and MacArthur high schools along with Singley Academy are among the more than 17,000 top-performing public high schools recognized nationwide.

*U.S. News*, known as the global authority in education rankings, made the announcement April 30, debuting a revamped edition of what is said to be the most comprehensive evaluation of America's public high schools ever produced by the publication. Now, more than 17,000 schools nationwide are numerically ranked – up from last year's 2,700 schools.

The list is comprised of schools ranked on their performance on state assessments, graduation rate and college-readiness. Other factored data includes Advanced Placement (AP) participation, student performance and proficiency based on figures from the 2016-2017 school year.

Compared nationally, Irving, MacArthur and Singley place in the top 40 percent, earning a well-deserved spot among the best in the nation. Their rankings at a glance are as follows:

### MacArthur – 77.41 score overall out of 100

- #3,895 in national rankings
- #323 in Texas high schools

- #6,062 in national rankings
- #487 in Texas high schools

"With graduation rates at a record high and all 33-rated campuses repeatedly performing at the state's highest standards, we are seeing our students compete and achieve in exceptional ways," says Irving ISD Superintendent of Schools Magda Hernandez. "In recent years, the district has earned notable recognitions including Top Digital District, District of Distinction, Best Communities for Fine Arts, and National Advanced Placement (AP) District of the Year in 2015.

"Since taking the helm of this amazing district, I made it my mission to position Irving ISD as the best school district in the nation," continues Hernandez. "These national rankings recognize the significant achievement of three of our high schools. This is only the beginning as it is always our objective to remain focused on a path of continuous improvement."



In the case any traps test positive, Irving's vector control technicians will spray at night. The city's mosquito control staff works along with the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Dallas County Health and Human Services Department to conduct surveillance and testing year-round of the mosquito population for diseases.

How can residents help? Self-protection is the best course of action, so be sure to follow the four Ds:

- **Dusk and Dawn** When mosquitoes are most
- Drain Eliminate standing water, such as in flower pots, rain gutters, etc.
- **DEET** Make sure insect repellent contains this ingredient. DEET has been tested and approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
- Dress Wear long sleeves, pants, shoes and socks when outside.

# Cimarron Family Aquatic Center to Reopen Memorial Day Weekend



The City of Irving recently completed renovations on the Cimarron Family Aquatic Center. The facility is scheduled to reopen on Memorial Day weekend.

The city's first water park was in need of repairs to its gutter system, which controls how water flows in and out of the pool. The \$712,000 project includes the installation of a new concrete gutter system, along with plastic grate covers and reconstructed pool piping, upgraded underwater lighting, a refurbished play unit and new pool plaster.

The updates will not only enhance the look and user experience at the water park, and will ensure that the facility runs efficiently and provides reliable service during its busy summer season.



#### **Marketing and Advertising Analytics**

#### **RFPS**

April saw a drop from the previous month with **95 RFPs** (below average) and **27,603 associated room nights** (below average). Year-over-year April 2018 to April 2019 performed slightly better in the number of RFPs but remained flat in the number of associated room nights.







#### **Website Traffic**

April saw another increase in the website traffic with the <u>highest total traffic to date</u> with **52,898 total sessions** and **43,441 total users** visiting both websites. <u>The Visit Irving website again had its highest traffic ever with **39,036 sessions and 32,234 total users (well above average)**. The Irving Convention Center also performed well with 13,862 sessions and 11,207 users (above average). The year-over-year performance showed an increase in Visit Irving traffic while the Irving Convention Center website decreased slightly.</u>


Blog traffic also increased again in April with **8,569 pageviews** and 7,457 unique pageviews, which was a 15% increase over the previous month and again the second highest number of pageviews in the past year. The average time visitors spent on the blog remained steady at four minutes and 12 seconds (well above average) while the bounce rate increased slightly but remained low at 16.24%. The top blog posts were again "Irving Texas Bluebonnets Guide," with 3,558 pageviews and "We Tried the 3-Day Juice Cleanse at Freshii, Here's What Happened," with 502 pageviews.






#### **Advertising and Paid Search**

Advertising engagement remained high with **8,943 advertising impressions** and **2,924 site-visits**, which is a slight decrease from the previous month, but a 22% year-over-year increase in advertising impressions. Tegna Media was again the top performer with 2,946 impressions and 1,410 site-visits, followed by MPI with 2,055 impressions and 876 site-visits. AJR Media also performed well with 695 impressions. The Google AdWords paid search campaign also remained strong in April with **54,124 impressions** and **6,566 site-visits**, which generated **2 RFPs**.






#### **Hotel and Flight Bookings**

The information available through the ADARA Magellan travel intelligence platform displays approximately 70% of the hotel bookings, room nights, hotel booking revenue and flights booked by travelers who viewed the bureau's digital advertising or visited either website. The attribution window is 60 days, which means that the most complete information available is from February 2019. In February, 75 hotel reservations were booked, which accounts for 179 room nights and \$30,720 in hotel revenue. Travelers also booked 271 flights in February.



#### Social Media

The number of new social media followers increased by **1,055 new followers**, which brings the total influence to **89,323.** The Visit Irving Facebook page saw the largest increase with 904 new likes for a total of 58,815 likes.

They offer several types of cruises from gondolas in actual imported gondolas from Venice to a really cool ride on a boat designed by engineers from Lear Jet. We opted for the Lear Jet boat and our Captain, Keith, gave us the history of the boat, his company and told us all about the area. From the restaurants, hotels and apartments being built I can see why Las Colinas is a popular destination. Gondola Adventures offers service 24 hours a day and they will pick you up for a breakfast, lunch or dinner cruise. They also offer just about any kind of cruise you want, maybe a Whiskey and Cigar cruise with the guys?





Elm Fork Shooting Sports is a large facility only a couple of miles from the hotel. With over 460 acres of space they have the room to offer outdoor shooting ranges for a lot of people. Take your guys group out to the range and rent a few guns, then try your hand at skeet, trap, rifle or pistol target practice. They have two pro shops, instructors and also archery ranges. The staff was friendly, helpful and we had a blast, literally, tearing up some targets with handguns and rifles.

Pinstack Bowling is about 10 miles from the Dallas Marriott at Las Colinas and has everything needed for a group of guys to have some fun. Regular and VIP bowling lanes where you can enjoy some time knocking down pins along with a bunch of other stuff. They have a high ropes course suspended 20 feet above the video game floor, bumper cars, laser tag and a laser maze along with video games and a rock climbing wall. Not only do they have great games but also a full bar and food.





Music Factory. The Toyota Music Factory is a destination all its own with music, food venues, bars and movie theaters. The Pavilion at Toyota Music Factory is the centerpiece for live entertainment. The indoor venue converts from a 2,500 seat intimate concert area to a 4,000 seat capacity indoor concert theater and can open up to host an open air venue that holds up to 8,000. There is also the Texas Lottery Plaza where you can catch regional or national acts or even reserve it for corporate or private events. Numerous restaurants and bars are located within the 17 acre complex and include everything from burgers, pizza, sports bars and steak houses. When your finished, just walk across the street back to your hotel.



#### Places to Eat in Irving



The Ranch Las Colinas is one of the popular places to eat. Expect there to be a lively crowd no matter what time you visit. The Ranch advertises Farm to Fork and sources as much of the food as possible from Texas based growers.



The Ranch has some great food and also offers live entertainment. It is a really good place for a group of guys to have a few drinks and grab some excellent food.



Po Melvin's is Cajun on steroids. Owner Mel LeMane and his father opened their first business 30 years ago dishing up Louisiana down home cooking like Po Boy sandwiches, red beans and rice, gumbo, seafood and mixing in Texas favorites such as chicken fried steak.





The portions are huge and absolutely delicious. From the fried pickles to the shrimp, chicken and dumplings and home made bread pudding for dessert Mel uses the best ingredients and time tested recipes to keep people coming back. You won't leave this place hungry.



Boi na Braza Brazilian Steak House is located at the Toyota Music Factory complex and is a meat lovers dream and vegan nightmare. The bar is stocked with an excellent selection of whiskeys and spirits along with an impressive wine room.

Fourteen different cuts of meat from chicken, lamb, sausage, pork and beef arrive and you select what you want. Once you are finished, they bring yet another selection of desserts for you to choose from. Just steps away from the pavilion it makes a perfect stop before heading to a concert.

# Westin Irving Completes City's Convention District

Last month, after more than a decade of planning, the ribbon was finally cut on the doors of the 350-room Westin Irving Convention Center hotel at Las Colinas in Texas. The new property — which offers more than 20,000 square feet of indoor and outdoor event space — completes the budding meetings destination's convention district that includes the nearby 275,000-square-foot Irving Convention Center and the 45,000-square-foot Toyota Music Factory.

"The Westin Irving Convention Center Ihotell at Las Colinas provides the final component of Irving's vision for its convention district," said Maura Gast, Irving Convention & Visitors Bureau's executive director. "With the Westin's opening, meeting professionals and attendees now have a perfectly efficient destination package with the Irving Convention Center and Toyota Music Factory with its Live Nation Pavilion and restaurant options."

Not only is the Westin's downtown location convenient for attendees, but it offers sweeping views of the city. "It's great, [because] we've got lake views on one side and we've got the convention center on the other," said Zak Kimble, the Westin Irving Convention Center hotel's director of sales and marketing, "so you don't have a bad view."

Nature is incorporated wherever possible at the Westin. Guests are greeted with an indoor/outdoor living wall upon entering the lobby, and the hotel's café offers indoor and outdoor seating. Plus, the scenic rooftop Vibe Pool Bar, which accommodates up to 85 people features views of the city skyline, and the 4,200 square-foot junior ballroom opens out onto a tri of private terraces and lawn space for events.

"Clients always look for that," said Diana Pfaff, Irving Convention & Visitors Bureau's vice president of marketing and communications.

"With the weather here in Texas, we have a true spring and a true fall with perfect weather, and so clients are always wanting to do something different and [meet] outdoors."

Also onsite at the Westin is Mesa Mezcal, where delegates can enjoy authentic Mexican dishes like huevos rancheros for breakfast or fresh shrimp ceviche for dinner. The restaurant offers an outdoor patio that's also available for private events.

"We've got really an oversized restaurant for the size of the hotel," said Todd Winch, the Westin Irving Convention Center hotel's general manager, "that can double as event reception and hospitality space."

With the 2011 opening of the convention center and the 2017 opening of the Music Factory — which features 250,000 square feet of restaurant and retail space, a 50,000-square-foot outdoor plaza, and an 8,000-seat Live Nation concert hall and amphitheater known as the Pavilion — and now the Westin, Irving's meetings district is complete. This means good things for the up-and-coming convention destination.

"We're going to get group business on the books further out in advance than we currently do," Gast said. "We're going to see a lot more multi-day groups with a lot more community impact."

If you have never been to a Brazilian Steakhouse it should be on your list and no one does it better than Boi Na Braza. Another great upscale option is The Ranch at Los Colinas, a traditional Texas style steakhouse with a broad menu and an incredible dessert selection.



Po' Melvin's Fried Pickles

Obviously, splurging on a fancy steakhouse dinner one night is fine, but if you are looking for amazing food that won't break the bank, then Po' Melvin's has to be on your list. It is not only the best Cajun dining I have ever had outside of New Orleans but the average menu item is about \$12, from amazing seafood gumbo and classic chicken n' dumplin's Po' Melvin's will impress you with the quality of food, complex flavors, and shockingly good value. Be sure to try the fried pickles and jalapeño cornbread.



Irving also has plenty of activities that will entertain the interests of any group of men, from PINSTACK a modern bowling alley, arcade, and laser tag complex to free live music events at Toyota Music Factory's Texas Lottery Live. The free concert series from 8pm-11pm Thursday, Friday, and Saturday with artists like Shooter Jennings, Jenna Clar, and Mitchell Ferguson performing live in the plaza. Of course, you can always check the calendar to see if any of your favorite brands are playing in The Pavilion, where headliners like Slayer, Weird Al, and Die Antwoord take the stage in an intimate venue.

If you are like me and my friends you might also want to head over to Elm Fork Shooting Sports where you can rent a variety of weapons to fire under the supervision of a qualified range master. The range offers several different shooting experiences including trap shooting, pistol, and rifle ranges, and for beginners firearms safety and marksmanship courses. I rented one of my favorite firearms the Walther PPQ .45, as well as a Glock 22 9mm, and a few AR15 rifles. It, of course, became a bullseye competition, and even the guys who haven't shot before or in a long time enjoyed learning more about the various types of shooting sports. The range is just a short drive from the Los Colinas center, making it a great half day activity.

If golf is an outdoor activity more your speed, Irving has several world-class golf courses to choose from including Hackberry Creek Country Club, TPC Club Las Colinas, and Cottonwood Valley Golf. Just learning the game or need to practice? Head over to Luna Vista just a short drive away in Dallas, this full-service, 18-hole golf course also includes a full a practice facility, lessons, a golf shop, and bar and grill.

Irving is the perfect weekend escape, offering something for everyone without having to go out of the way, for this trip we had friends drive in from Oklahoma, Denton, myself from Waco, and friends who flew in had the choice of two major airports making it simple for them to get in and out of town. Now if you have been around my blog for awhile, you know I always have to talk about food. This post is no different. I was able to be a part of a few different dining experiences during my trip to Irving and I always view restaurants through the lens of being a parent. Here are a few of my favorite options.

For a casual meal that will surprise you, you must check out **Po' Melvins**. They are a New Orleans inspired restaurant with a cozy feel. # Maura Gast, FCDMF Executive Director, Irving Convention & Visitors Bureau

Maura Gast is nothing if not hands on. She led the team that delivered the architecturally distinctive Irving Convention Center at Las Colinas en-time and under budget and has oversight of its day-to-day operations. She's been with the Irving, TX CVB for 28 years, becoming its executive director in 2003.

Oct ting there was hardly a straight line. "My path, like that of most of my peers, was accidental. I had prior careers in publishing and retail, but it was active involvement in an advertising trade association that was the connection that ended up opening the doors that brought me to the Irving Convention & Visitors Eureau."

Gast's "building blocks" for DMO/community shared success are strategic. "Build a place where people want to visit, and you'll build a place where people want to live. Build a place where people want to live, and you'll build a place where people want to work. Build a place where people want to work, and you'll build a place where business has to be. Build a place where business has to be, and you'll build a place where people bave to visit. It all starts with the visit, and the visit starts with us."

She says her own success has largely been defined by "tenacity, persistence, stubbornness and a willingness to continue learning, including fearning from my mistakes."

Those traits no doubt helped when issues of gender put obstacles in her way — "many places, many times," she says. "But that's just a fact of life. You woman up and just do your job and you do it to the very best of your ability."

She has poodered the question as to whether female and male leaders are different. "I really wrestle with this distinction about how women lead vs. how men lead. We all have individual skills and abilities, which we temper or top with knowledge and experience and that's what we bring to the table. Our experiences along the way shape us much more so than our genes. That said," she notes, "we encounter different experiences and there are different standards and rules set for us as women—the expectations and assumptions are different than they are for men. So it's what we do with our experiences, as well as our experience and skills, that shape how we lead."


Gast is proud of the positive growth in Irving during her time at the CVB, but some successes stand out. "I'm proud of the things we've been able to get done in Irving, thanks to a long-tenured team and long-tenured community leaders and volunteers," she says. "Certainly the convention center, Toyota Music Factory and The Westin Irving Convention Center at Las Colinas hotel, which just opened, are key to those."

She advises the young women entering or rising in the tourism industry to not wait to be asked to the table. "Pull up a seat for yourself. Volunteer for the messy, hard work that no one else wants to take on. Don't be afraid to make mistakes — but make sure you learn from every one of them."

Gast has lived and led by her own words for many years. Her chairmanship of the (then) DMAI 2008 Futures Study pushed to the forefront that which she continues to champion — a seat at the tables that matter for the industry.

Gast is a former chair of Destinations International and currently chairs its Certified Destination Management Executive Board of Directors. She also serves on the Destination Marketing Accreditation Program board as its chair-elect and is a member of the DestinationNEXT task force as well as a DestinationNEXT facilitator. Additionally, she serves on boards for the Heritage Society, Rotary, La Cima Club, Salvation Army Advisory Council and Chamber of Commerce, and she's a past chair of the Dallas Advertising League/AAF-Dallas. Gast has earned the designation of Fellow, Certified Destination Management Executive (FCDME). In 2016 the Dallas Business Journal recognized her in its inaugural Women In Tourism Awards. In 2015, she was honored with the La Cima Legacy Award for her contributions to the Irving community. She has also been named a Top-25 Extraordinary Mind by the Hospitality Sales & Marketing Association International. She's the recipient of an Irving Schools Foundation Fellow, and in 2017 was recognized by the NAACP Irving-Carrollton Branch with the Fletcher Yates Community Service Award.





Both the hotel landscapes in North and South Arlington continue to evolve as the city remains an entertainment capital of the state and as new commercial development helps spur new hotel

### Arlington: History as a Popular Texas Playground

Arlington's Entertainment District neighborhood is deep rooted within the sports and entertainment industries. Six Flags Over Texas opened in 1961, followed by Six Flags Hurricane Harbor (opened as Wet 'n Wild) in 1983. Seven Seas Marine Life Park operated in the early 1970s on what is now the site of the Sheraton hotel, with some original structures incorporated into the hotel's physical plant. In 1994, the \$191-million Globe Life Park in Arlington replaced Arlington Stadium, which had served as the home for the MLB Texas Rangers from 1972 to 1993. The 2009 opening of the \$1.3-billion AT&T Stadium, formerly Cowboys Stadium and home to NFL Dallas Cowboys, once again transformed the Entertainment District. Aside from sporting events, the AT&T Stadium is a large producer of room nights for hotels via concerts and other special events. Additionally, in 2010, the International Bowling Museum & Hall of Fame opened in Arlington.

### Texas Live!

The newest catalyst in the area is the \$250-million Texas Live! sports/entertainment complex, which is under construction on seven acres of land between AT&T Stadium and Globe Life Park in Arlington. The initial phase (restaurants, bars, retail establishments, and an outdoor concert venue) of Texas Live! opened in August 2018, and a 300-room Loews Hotel will open in August 2019; the new, \$1.1-billion stadium for the Texas Rangers is set to open in 2020. Moreover, in October 2019, Arlington unveiled a \$10-million transformation of its convention center to create a 100,000-square-foot "e-sports" venue within the facility. The Esports Stadium Arlington includes a 2,500-seat stadium with 90-foot LED stage display and theatrical lights and sound; a broadcast and production studio; a gaming lobby with fully furnished computers; eight team training rooms; a VIP player lounge; and a modular breakout space for press, catering, and VIP lounges. West of the Entertainment District, Downtown Arlington has also been a focus of redevelopment and revitalization.

Supporting the growing Entertainment District landscape, the ongoing \$233-million Interstate 30/State Highway 360 Interchange project will replace existing cloverleaf turnpike configurations with modern direct connect interchanges; State Highway 360 in also undergoing a widening project.

### Local Economy

While the entertainment, retail, and tourism industries represent significant sources of revenue and employment for the area, manufacturing plays a chief role in the area's economy. General Motors (GM) has an assembly plant in Arlington that has been in operation for over 50 years. Arlington Logistics Center, a new automotive supplier park built by GM, is located on the former site of the Six Flags Mall. In October 2018, Bell unveiled its expanded Flight Research Center; this South Arlington facility houses many of the Fort Worth-based newest technology and innovations, including the Bell V-280 Valor, 525 Relentless, V-247 Vigilant and the Autonomous Pod Transport (APT). The University of Texas at Arlington (UTA) also represents a significant source of employment in the area. UTA has a student population of roughly 42,000, offering more than 180 degree programs in an extensive range of disciplines. UTA opened its \$125-million, 220,000-square-foot Science, Engineering Innovation and Research building in September 2018.

The North Arlington lodging market has long been serviced by three primary full-service hotels—the 311-unit Sheraton, the 308-unit Hilton, and the 200-room Crowne Plaza complemented by a variety of limited- and -select-service hotel options. A Holiday Inn opened in 2008, and just north of the city limits, the former independent Admiral Hotel was converted to a DoubleTree by Hilton in December 2016. The City of Arlington has instituted development requirements for hotel construction; for example, full-service hotels must have a minimum of 200 rooms, 10,000 square feet of meeting space, a restaurant with a full-service kitchen, room service, and recreational facilities, among other requirements.

Additional restrictions in place include the prohibition of limited-service hotel development in the Entertainment District Overlay District. New supply under construction in the North Arlington lodging market includes an Aloft, set to open in May 2019, and the Loews Hotel at Texas Livel, scheduled to open in August 2019. Proposed projects also include a Drury Hotel near Lincoln Square (outdoor mall) and an AC Hotel by Marriott at Momentum Park. Lastly, construction of a new full-service hotel and convention center has been rumored within the market.

The South Arlington lodging market, once dotted with mostly limited-service hotels along Interstate 20 and around the Parks Mall at Arlington, has expanded in recent years, largely paced by retail expansions near the Park Mall at Arlington and Arlington Highlands lifestyle shopping center, as well as new warehouse/distribution centers. The Arlington Municipal Airport, a "reliever" airport for corporate, cargo, and recreational pilots, is also located in this neighborhood and is home to Bell Helicopter. New hotels that opened in 2016 and 2017 include a Homewood Suites by Hilton and a Hilton Garden Inn, respectively. New supply under construction in the South Arlington lodging market includes a Fairfield Inn by Marriott, set to open in June 2019, and a dual-brand SpringHill Suites by Marriott/TownePlace Suites by Marriott, anticipated to open in 2020. Proposed projects in the South Arlington lodging market also include brands such as Aloft, Tru by Hilton, and Home 2 Suites by Hilton.

In general, occupancy in the North Arlington hotel market has hovered in the low 70s for the last several years, with levels estimated closer to 70% in the most recent year, as new supply in the South Arlington market has drawn some demand away from hotels located in the northern part of the city. Market participants also report that the conversion of the convention center into an "e-sports" venue has resulted in a reduction of group room nights. ADR for higher-quality limited- and select-service hotels is estimated to average roughly \$115, while the premier full-service hotels are achieving rates near the \$145 mark. While new hotel products are on the horizon, increased leisure demand associated with the opening of Texas Livel should help offset supply increases; occupancy is expected to register in the high 60s in the near term.

Within the South Arlington market, occupancy performance is similar to North Arlington, estimated near 70% for the market as a whole. Higher-quality limited- and select-service hotels in this market are achieving estimated ADRs in the \$120 range, reflecting these hotels' newer facilities when compared to the North Arlington supply. Occupancy in this market should continue to grow modestly, supported by the premier hotel products and brands entering the market, including the dual-brand SpringHill Suites by Marriott/TownePlace Suites by Marriott, which will include ample meeting/event space and an expanded, upscale recreational area.

The city's highly popular mix of tourism attractions should continue to drive strong visitation during the summer months, while established institutions will supply consistent economic benefits to the city. The city's Entertainment District and Downtown neighborhood are both being reimagined with new development and revitalization efforts, triggering an increased hotel bed base.

HVS continues to regularly consult in this city, with the Dallas office serving the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex and greater North Texas markets. # Irving-Las Colinas Chamber Named Finalist for Chamber of the Year

The Greater Irving-Las Colinas Chamber of Commerce has been named a finalist for the 2019 Chamber of the Year award, presented by Alexandria, Va.-based Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives.

The award, sponsored by MemberClicks, is the most prestigious and competitive recognition presented annually by the Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives (ACCE). ACCE is an association of more than 8,000 professionals from 1,300 chambers of commerce, including 93 of the top 100 U.S. metro areas.

The Chamber of the Year award recognizes the leadership role chambers have in their communities. Those honored with the Chamber of the Year designation have demonstrated organizational strength and made an impact on key community priorities, such as education, transportation, business development and quality of life.

Qualifying for Chamber of the Year is a rigorous process. Chambers compete based on meeting key performance criteria on the ACCE Annual Operations Survey. Qualifying chambers enter the competition with a written application addressing all aspects of organizational operation and programmatic work. Applications are scored by peer chamber executives to determine finalists.

Winners are selected from among finalists based on an in-person interview before a panel of experienced chamber professionals.

This year's competition drew numerous entries from chambers throughout the U.S. To ensure the fairest competition, applicants are grouped into four categories based on: annual revenue, membership, area population and other factors.

# Irving plans to increase participation in EPA's Green Power Partnership Program

The City of Irving keeps the lights on throughout their facilities utilizing at least 50 percent green energy sources and they are seeking to improve even more. Resolution 10 – Authorizing the Mayor to Sign an Agreement with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to Increase Participation in the EPA's Green Power Partnership Program, was passed during the Irving City Council meeting on April 18, at Irving City Hall.

This item was recommended by the Traffic and Transportation Department and was initially presented to the Transportation and Natural Resources Committee on February 24, 2016. The Green Power Partnership Agreement has been recommended to City Council by the City's Green Advisory Board in its ongoing responsibility to environmental stewardship. The Green Advisory Board voted unanimously to support this recommendation during their board meeting on November 17, 2015.

With the passage of the resolution, the city will gain additional opportunities for green energy improvements, public recognition for their voluntary participation. It can set an example for companies to join or create similar programs for their facilities. The City of Irving will participate at the Organization-Wide level, as well as 'On-site Use of Green Power' at the West Irving Library facility.

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Taxpayers will be happy to learn; it does not require additional funding to participate in the program. However, the City of Irving must provide an annual report to the EPA.

As for the City of Irving's latest EPA report on March 26, 2019, the city uses 26,614,266 total green power usage (kWh) per year. This is split into 26,225,000 from the Competitive Green Power, and 389,266 from the self-supply. This reflects 51 percent of total green power used by the city. Reportedly the city's primary green energy source is wind power. Texas is the leading state in producing wind power.

The EPA Green Power Partnership's goal is to help encourage growth for the American green power industry. Currently, the Partners' green power use represents nearly 40 percent of the U.S. voluntary green power market.

As reported on the EPA website, the Green Power Partnership (GPP) was established in 2001 to protect human health and the environment by increasing organizations' voluntary green power use to advance the American market for green power and the development of those renewable electricity sources.

The Green Power Partnership helps to achieve Clean Air Act requirements by reducing the pollution and the corresponding adverse health and environmental impacts associated with conventional electricity use. Since the inception of the Green Power Partnership, the voluntary market has grown by nearly 5,000 percent. The program provides a framework that includes credible usage benchmarks, market information, technical assistance, and public recognition to companies and other organizations that use green power. In return for technical support and recognition, Partners commit to using green energy for all, or a portion, of their annual electricity consumption.
