Plan Your Vigit

We encourage our guests to discover the many charms of Ava Gardner's hometown, Smithfield, NC. Enjoy delicious meals at our chef-driven restaurants; take a leisurely stroll along the scenic Neuse River on the **Buffalo Creek Greenway**, part of North Carolina's Mountains to the Sea Trail; visit our local boutiques and destination shopping center, the **Carolina Premium Outlets**; explore the exhibit hall at the **Johnston County Heritage Center**; and stay a night at one of our area hotels.

9:30am Arrive at the **Ava Gardner Museum** in historic downtown Smithfield. Watch our introductory video, tour our exhibit galleries, and visit our gift shop for exclusive souvenirs.

11am Take the short walk to the **Johnston County Heritage Museum**. Tour the exhibit hall to learn more about Ava's hometown and the surrounding area, and pick up the Smithfield Walking Tour Map for a stroll through Smithfield, which was founded in 1777.

12pm Grab lunch at one of the restaurants within a short walking distance from the Museum. Choose from comfort food at The Diner, soups and sandwiches at Gotham's Deli, Italian favorites at Sami's Pizza and Pasta, or artisanal, chef-driven specialties at The Glided Pear Brew House, or SoDoSoPa.

2pm Enjoy the walking trail through downtown. Explore the unique architecture and history of Smithfield at 19 featured stops, and shop at our downtown boutiques like **Evan's Jewelry, Jewels Formals, The Twisted Willow,** or **The Oak City Collection.**



4pm Visit Ava's gravesite at **Sunset Memorial Park**, located one mile west of downtown. Follow the signs to the Gardner family plot.

5pm Enjoy a delicious dinner at one of our area restaurants by your hotel. Smithfield has eight hotels located one mile from the Museum, adjacent to outlet shopping and dining.

7pm Activities after five include shopping at **Carolina Premium Outlets**, or for movie fans, see what's playing at **Smithfield Cinema** or **The Howell Theater**.

Ava's Story

AVA'S CHILDHOOD

On Christmas Eve 1922, Jonas and Mary Elizabeth "Mollie" Gardner welcomed their seventh child into the world, Ava Lavinia Gardner. The large close-knit Gardner family made their home in the rural North Carolina community of Grabtown, seven miles east of Smithfield. They lived in a white, two-story farmhouse surrounded by acres of land they cultivated to grow tobacco and cotton.





DISCOVERY STORY

Before starting college, Ava traveled to New York City in the summer of 1939 to spend time with her older sister Beatrice "Bappie" Gardner. During the visit, Larry Tarr, Bappie's husband, made several portraits of Ava and placed one in his studio's window, attracting the attention of Barney Duhan, who posed as a MGM scout looking for a date with Ava. Larry and Bappie decided to send Ava's photo to MGM anyway, which lead to a screen test and a sevenyear contract. Ava, chaperoned by Bappie, would travel by train to Hollywood in August 1941.

HOLLYWOOD

Ava spent her first five years in Hollywood playing small, often uncredited roles. Her career took off when MGM loaned her out to Universal Studios for an adaptation of Ernest Hemingway's The Killers (1946). Ava's casting as the quintessential femme fatale Kitty Collins would elevate her to leading lady status. At the beginning of the 50s, Ava was poised for some of her most celebrated film roles. In 1951 alone, she starred in the melodrama My Forbidden Past, the romance Pandora and the Flying Dutchman, and the musical Show Boat. Later, she would appear in such acclaimed films as Mogambo (1953), The Barefoot Contessa (1954), On the Beach (1959), and The Night of the lauana (1964). Over the course of her five-decade career, Ava would star in over 60 productions and become an international film icon.





LOVE

In her first two decades in Hollywood, Ava fell in love and married three successful entertainers – Mickey Rooney, Artie Shaw, and Frank Sinatra, the greatest romance of her life. Although her marriages were brief, she deeply loved her spouses and stayed friends with all of them for the rest of her life.

Ava's Story



LATER LIFE

By the mid-1950s, Ava was tired of the constant glare and scrutiny of the entertainment press, so she left Hollywood and moved to Madrid, Spain. For more than 10 years, she fully embraced the city's vibrant culture of Flamenco dancing and bullfights. Then, in 1968, Ava was ready to shift to a quieter life, which she found by moving to London, England. She would stay in her adored Ennismore Square apartment for the rest of her life. During her years abroad, Ava returned to America often for her career commitments and to visit family in her beloved North Carolina.

LEGACY

Throughout her award-winning career, Ava never forgot her humble beginnings. Once she achieved professional success, Ava contributed her time, money, and celebrity status to social, political, and humanitarian causes near to her heart. In the 1960s, she became a lifetime member of the NAACP, and she also raised funds for philanthropic organizations like the March of Dimes, the American Cancer Society, and the American Red Cross. In her final years, she directed her estate's trust to commit all future funds earned to non-profits and charities which advance medical research and animal welfare. Her legacy of generosity continues today through the work of the Ava Gardner Trust which supports St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, the Queen Victoria Hospital, and the Ava Gardner Museum.
