Anonymous	Email	5/12/2026	Tour Vehicles	Downtown	<p>May 12, 2026-around 9:20-9:40am. I had stopped for the crossing guard at Dock street who was letting pedestrians cross. This bus driver ran the stop sign at that same time and he almost ran over 2 pedestrians still in the crosswalk. At the crosswalk just down the street at the marina, he did not stop for 2 pedestrians who were already in the crosswalk before he got close to the intersection. He also stopped traffic so a different bus could pull out just past Ketchikan Sam's. Both busses were going 10 miles per hour until the bus let in front pulled off to go towards the docks and Harley Davidson. I went to pull around them and the original bus 1110 pulled into the 2nd lane and blocked me. He then proceeded to drive 5-10 mph under the speed limit through town, and not just in the construction zone. Once we passed the coast guard base, they continued to drive 30 mph. Once he passed the Forest Park area, he drove 40-45mph until he came to the village of Saxman. He abruptly put on his brakes and slowed down to 20mph. After we passed 3 Bears entrance, he continued to drive 30-35mph and could not stay in his lane on any of the curves. He crossed over the double yellow lines at least 12 times and the white line at least 8 in the 45 minutes I had to follow him.</p>	HAP	05/14/2026	<p>Good evening, We are grateful to be able to respond to these concerns. Safety is very important to our organization, and we always want to follow up to ensure our drivers are upholding a high standard. We were able to pull dash cam videos of coach 81110 throughout the day and several during the time frame noted. On review we did see one instance where our driver did not yield appropriately to pedestrians who had just entered the crosswalk. We did not see any instances of him running a stop sign however. It is difficult for motorcoaches to make some tight turns without infringing into the other lane, the turn by front street extension is one of those turns. The safest way to maneuver through a turn if you are not able to be completely out of the lane is to "split or take the lanes" so they can safely complete the turn without other vehicles coming into the area where they could be at risk. This is legal and encouraged for drivers who need the extra space to safely maneuver a large commercial vehicle. While this does block other cars from using the inside lane it is just for the duration of the turn. We will review crosswalk guidelines with this driver. We regularly do safety audits and will ensure his is done soon so we can verify he is operating correctly. Sincerely, Bethany McCurry</p>

Its a bad look. While I understand this is a trooper issue, we should be doing better! Also the number of breakdowns and accidents by tour companies already this year is insanity and embarrassing as a community. Alaska Administrative Code Title 13 - Public Safety Part 1 - Division of Alaska State Troopers Chapter 04 - Motor Vehicle and Driving Offenses: Vehicle Equipment and Inspection Article 4 - Brakes and Other Equipment 13 AAC 04.247 - Color and special equipment on school buses Universal Citation: 13 AK Admin Code 04.247 Current through May 30, 2025 (a) Every school bus used for pupil transportation must be painted National School Bus Chrome Yellow (National Bureau of Standards Color #1305). No other vehicle may display this color. A bus originally painted and used as a school bus which is no longer used as a school bus must be painted a color other than National School Bus Chrome Yellow before it may be driven on a highway or vehicular way or area. (b) When transporting a school child to or from a school activity, a school bus must display signs as follows: (1) the words "SCHOOL BUS" in black letters at least eight inches in height on a contrasting background, plainly visible to the front and rear; and (2) the words "UNLAWFUL TO PASS WHEN RED LIGHTS FLASH" in black letters at least four inches but not more than six inches in height on a white background on the rear of the bus. (c) A school bus with a manufacturer's rated capacity of 24 or more students must be equipped with a stop arm mounted on the left side of the vehicle. The lights on the stop arm must be automatically activated with the red flashing lights required by sec. 97(a) of this chapter. The stop arm must be at least 17 inches high at the side opposite the hinge and, when fully extended, extend 19 inches from the bus. The word "STOP" must be displayed on the stop arm in white letters on a red background, and two alternately flashing red lights must be mounted, one above the other, on the left side of the arm, which must flash and be visible to the front and rear when the arm is fully extended. (d) The signs required by (b) of this section may not be displayed nor may the stop arm required by (c) of this section be extended on a school bus during times it is being used to transport persons not under the supervision of a school. ID-00013	Email	05/31/2026	Tour Vehicles	South Tongass	<p>Dear Madam or Sir, I received your contact information from Laurie Booyse. I am writing to report an incident that occurred on Friday 29 May 2026 at approximately 1130. This occurred on Tongass Highway south of Herring cove. A friend and I were bicycling on S Tongass Highway heading outbound a few miles beyond Herring Cove. I was the front rider in the line. We were approached from behind by three Alaska Coach Tours buses. We were riding in a single file line and were as far to the right of the road as possible. In many areas of South Tongass, this is the fog line or just to the right of it. The first two buses, numbers 243 and 189, were within ten feet of each other and passed us, allowing us less than four inches of clear space from the side of the bus. Immediately after passing us, the second bus passed the first bus on a curve in a no passing zone. A third bus, number 232, then approached from behind and gave us a safer clearance than the first two buses, however it moved back over to the right before clearing me and almost hit me with the back of the bus. This was more clearly observed by the rider behind me. We rode on to try to find and identify the buses and were approaching George Inlet Lodge. This is a downhill approach from both directions, and we average between twenty and thirty miles an hour on this stretch of road when cycling. As we approached George Inlet Lodge, it became evident that buses number 243 and 232 were parked completely in our lane of travel, bus number 189, was pulled off to the side not completely out of the travel lane, and a fourth bus was stationary and blocking the oncoming lane of travel. We had no line of sight of the road ahead of us and were forced to ride in the oncoming lane without any visual of other traffic approaching. I realize that this description is difficult to envision so I have attached pictures to try to clarify the situation. There was one parking spot left in the designated bus parking lot for the Lodge, a pull-off on the town side of the lodge about one half mile away, and the pull-off just beyond the lodge that fits multiple full-size buses comfortably. Use of these areas would have accommodated all the buses blocking the highway that day. As cyclists in our community, we are committed to sharing the road and believe that we are respectful and responsible in our riding. We ride single file when same-direction traffic approaches and move to the right as far as it is safe to do in each circumstance. Fortunately, the two riders on this particular day were skilled and accustomed to riding our roads. Another inch, or a less experienced rider, may have resulted in a death. Not only were these bus drivers reckless and dangerous on this day, but several laws were broken by these drivers. They endangered citizens and visitors to our area. I have attached pictures of the buses involved. The bus numbers were 243, 189, and 232. The bus parked in the oncoming lane had an illegible bus number and license plate number. I imagine that Alaska Coach Tours would have the driver and bus information on the manifest for that day. The message here is that there was extremely dangerous behavior by commercial bus drivers that is totally unacceptable by any standard."</p>	Alaska Independent Coach Tours	06/01/2026	Dearest TBMP, We were made aware of this incident by our drivers, all three of whom believed they were passing the bicyclists safely. I am very sorry to hear that the bicyclists did not feel the same way. We have since communicated with all our drivers regarding the importance of sharing the road and ensuring they wait for a safe space to pass. Our goal is to be responsible community members and minimize our impact on others.
