As you explore this vast region's wilderness, history, and communities, know that you can preserve the Keweenaw for future generations by practicing responsible recreation and Leave No Trace principles. Doing so makes your experience safe and enjoyable while ensuring your visit positively contributes to the local area.

TIPS FOR YOUR TRIP



The Keweenaw is not a destination to be rushed through. Most of you have traveled a long way to get here, so let's make sure to really enjoy the experience by slowing down. This includes driving along our roads and local communities. Trust us, the Keweenaw is a laid-back destination with ample space between points of interest. So, enjoy the views as you drive along our scenic routes to really take in the beauty of the area.

LEAVE NO TRACE

The concept of Leave No Trace (LNT) has become synonymous with outdoor recreation across the globe. And it's no different in the Keweenaw. Commit to packing out what you packed in and leave nothing but footprints. That way, others will enjoy the area's pristine trails and scenic areas as much as you did. Know that many of the Keweenaw's trails and trailheads do not have restrooms or waste receptacles, but that's not an excuse for leaving waste in the woods. Learn more at Int.org.

RESPECT PRIVATE PROPERTY

The Keweenaw's mix of public and private lands dedicated to recreation offers visitors and residents incredible opportunities to experience the outdoors. But it's often unclear where those public areas end, and private lands begin. To avoid the community losing access to special places, please respect all 'no trespassing signs' and stay on the trails.


PREPARE FOR NO CELL SERVICE

One of the unique aspects of visiting the Keweenaw, especially if you travel to the northern portion of the peninsula and Isle Royale, is the refreshing lack of cell service. You've come here to disconnect and get away from distractions, and that includes mobile devices that we've all become dependent on. So, be sure to plan and know that your favorite mapping app may not work as you head north of Calumet or into the Sturgeon River Gorge Wilderness Area south of Houghton. Pack that paper map, plan your routes, and be aware of fuel station locations to avoid a mishap if your phone can't connect to cell service.

5 DON'T PUT YOURSELF OR OTHERS AT RISK

Know your limits and respect Mother Nature. Lake Superior can turn from calm to tumultuous without much notice, and it can be easy to become disoriented while navigating unfamiliar backcountry. Combined with limited cell service and the Keweenaw's vast terrain, this makes emergency response very challenging. Whether you're new to outdoor adventures or a pro, consider connecting with a local guide who will help with proper gear and planning to make the most of your experience.





The name was written by several early visitors to the area, including a fur trader, John Johnson, who noted the peninsula was called Keewayan—for the river portage route required to complete the inland waterway across the peninsula.

Adventure calls from rocky shores, where you can find solitude on the trails of Isle Royale National Park. Dive into history at Keweenaw National Historical Park and traverse the land by foot, bike or paddle. Take in the landscape on the seat of a bike in our world-class mountain bike trails. You'll encounter inspiring vistas, hidden waterfalls and rare stands of virgin Michigan forest.



THE CROSSING PLACE



In winter, our cross country ski trails are groomed and home to national championship races. Like going vertical? Find thrills downhill skiing on the longest runs with the highest verticals and deepest powder in the Midwest or hang ten and catch waves on an unbridled Lake Superior.

When relaxation is your goal, become one with nature on a beach along the shores of Lake Superior. Or, sit on a patio and enjoy locally harvested fish and beverages at one of our outstanding restaurants or award-winning breweries.

Come visit with family or friends, for the Keweenaw gives you every opportunity to connect with nature and people, while disconnecting from the everyday. There is a magic and a rustic majesty to this place. One visit and the laid-back lifestyle will let you be more like yourself—rejuvenated and secretly longing to return.


THE BIG LAKE


Gitchee Gummee, named by the Ojibwe who inhabited the region, means great water or big lake. With pure water still as glass at times, she calls to those who love paddling, kayaking and shipwreck exploration. When the wind picks up, she draws adventure seekers looking to catch a wave on their surfboards. But, when fall and winter storms arrive, waves climb as high as 30 feet.

Superior both feeds and shapes life in the region. Its waters are home to fish sought by anglers and featured in local restaurants, including whitefish, perch, walleye and lake trout. As the largest freshwater lake holding 10% of earth's fresh surface water, she serves as a climate regulator—generating hundreds of inches of snow each season and moderates both winter and summer temperatures.

PADDLE THE CALM. COLLECT AGATE STONES. RELAX IN YOUR SANDCASTLE. EXPLORE ENDLESS MILES.

The Keweenaw has 125 miles of pristine shoreline that serve as a beacon to explorers. Calumet Waterworks Park offers a rocky coastline ideal for agate hunting and family picnics. Misery Bay Beach, near Twin Lakes State Park, has an extended sandbar for wading, excellent swimming, sea kayaking, paddling and sandcastle building.





From flat, open areas to forests, hills and magnificent beaches, McLain State Park provides extensive rock picking opportunities and camping for RVs, tents and rustic cabins. Located between Eagle River and Eagle Harbor, Great Sand Bay is a great place to watch the sunset, relax on the beach and get sand between your toes.

Closer to Houghton and Hancock are two beaches ideal for families looking to build sandcastles. Wade in the water, enjoy a picnic or play on the playground at the Hancock Recreation Area or Houghton's Ray Kestner Park. Slow down and relax in one of the nation's safest college towns.

Nearly every beach along Superior's shoreline provides a view of or from a lighthouse. Each was once essential to help ships navigate safely and many remain as important waypoints for boaters. Whether you're in search of solitude, adventure, or ending your day with sunsets and s'mores, we ask that you help maintain Lake Superior's beauty. Take nothing but memories and leave nothing but footprints.



THE BIG ISLAND: ISLE ROYALE

Isle Royale presents its visitors with the unique opportunity to relax, recharge and disconnect from technology in an environment surrounded by flora, fauna and the vastness that is Lake Superior. Chances to marvel at the aurora borealis are also greater in this region due to the absence of light pollution. The remoteness of the island is further emphasized by its

limited accessibility, only via ferry from Houghton or Copper Harbor, by private boat or seaplane. Due to Lake Superior's extreme weather conditions, the park is only open from April 16 to October 31.

While a day trip to the island is technically feasible, visitors are encouraged to stay a few days at Rock Harbor Lodge, which offers lodge rooms, cottages and cabins. Be sure to book early. For those choosing to camp, a backcountry camping permit is required. Boat rentals are available at Rock Harbor to reach more remote trailheads and points of interest on the

45-mile-long island.

ROYALE NATIONAL PARK.

Boasting 165 miles of hiking trails of varying lengths and and difficulties, visitors to the island are more likely had. to encounter local wildlife, including 18 species of lovir animals, than they are to see other humans. Many retu visitors head to the park knowing stories of the local

The dark sky park was certified in June 2022 as the newest destination in the International Dark Sky Places program—the first in the Upper Peninsula.

The Keweenaw Dark Sky Park encompasses over 550 acres of land around Brockway Mountain Drive and the Keweenaw Mountain Lodge property. The certification as a dark sky park comes as a result of a lengthy application highlighting the remoteness of the park and proof of low light pollution, lengthened nighttime hours and terrain ideal for viewing meteors, constellations, the Milky Way and the northern lights.



KEWEENAW DARK SKY PARK



While it is impossible to guarantee observation of the northern lights, the conditions of the Keweenaw Peninsula are nearly ideal. You'll find yourself in close proximity to the North Pole, to the dark skies and unobstructed views of the horizon—especially given the hundreds of miles of unobstructed Lake Superior shorelines that face north.

To increase your odds, we recommend you download an app (like My Aurora Forecast) and set notifications for peak viewing. The solar flares that lead to the northern lights don't follow a schedule but are most common between August and April—with April, October and November offering peak visibility. Find your spot, whether that's at the Keweenaw Mountain Lodge, atop Brockway Mountain Drive, along the beach at Hunter's Point Park, on the rocks at Breakers Beach, the shores at McLain State Park or at Great Sand Bay.

Soak in the constellations, let the sky bring you wonder and your chance to experience the aurora.



IMMERSE YOURSELF IN THE RICH HISTORY OF COPPER MINING IN THE KEWEENAW THROUGH HISTORIC LANDSCAPES AND ARCHITECTURE.

Step back in time and witness the difficulties of life under extreme work environments, battles to improve working conditions, and the rugged way of life for hundreds of thousands of immigrants, mine owners and lumber barons from the early 1840s through 1945.

Relive this microcosm of the American experience during the industrial revolution through the Keweenaw National Historical Park (KNHP). KNHP is committed to remembering the heritage of the region for generations to come through the preservation of cultural and natural resources. The park maintains 21 sites across the region that commemorate the rich history of copper mining from the built environment to the machinery and people. Each site allows you to experience hardships, challenges, innovation, and successes of the copper miners through a variety of displays and immersive experiences.

Go underground and witness life in the mines and marvel at the beauty of the minerals that ignited the mining boom at the A.E. Seaman Mineral Museum. Go back in time to Old Victoria and the Hanka Homestead to understand the challenges faced by the miners, farmers and their families. From the roar of canons at Fort Wilkins State Park to the whisper of ghost towns, your imagination is alight with the rich history of the region.

With everything from indoor artifacts in museums to outdoor trail systems and underground mines, the Keweenaw National Historic Park has the perfect excursion for all ages and abilities.

While mining was popular throughout the region, the impacts of its end are seen and felt today throughout the Keweenaw. Abandoned architecture, towering mine rock piles and preserved machinery are waiting to be discovered, but please explore safely and without trespassing.





WATERFALLS RUN WILD

With rugged rock formations shaped by lava flow and glaciers, the Copper Country creates majestic waterfalls to behold in any season. Peak waterfall viewing season is typically from mid-March through late April when the waterfalls roar to life during the spring snowmelt. However, the falls can be basked with beauty during fall foliage and glitter in wonder as frozen sculptures in the winter months.

WE RECOMMEND YOU PLAN A HIKE OR TWO, PACK YOUR CAMERA, AND WATCH FOR THE RAINBOWS.

The most accessible waterfalls are Haven Falls Park and Jacob's Creek Falls because both are easily visible from your vehicle. The falls in the Keweenaw with the largest drops, both at 60 feet, are Eagle River Falls and Hungarian Falls. Hungarian offers three unique waterfalls to view throughout a moderate 1.5-mile hike. On the hike to the upper falls, you'll see a historic dam and have your choice of paths to see the falls from the above or below—both equally beautiful.





The middle falls are considered one of the most scenic with a drop straight off a sandstone ledge and into a pool with plenty of rocky paths to take in the view. From the lower Hungarian Falls, many take in the beauty that is Torch Lake from a clearing in the trees, but the lower falls are difficult to navigate even for seasoned hikers.

Canyon Falls, located south of L'Anse and accessible via a roadside park off US-41, is a powerful falls along the Sturgeon River. Worth the hike in summer or winter, the spray from the falls coats the trees and gorge walls to create a true winter wonderland. This winter hike can be tackled without snowshoes, but please stick to the trails for your own safety.

The Sturgeon River Gorge Wilderness Area features volcanic outcroppings and a stunning gorge that reaches 350 feet in depth and a mile in width. Falls, rapids, ponds, and terraces are all visible on a hike through the established trails—surrounded by forests of pine, hemlock, aspen, maple, and birch trees.

In every season and weather condition, beauty surrounds you as you hike across the rugged landscape. Take in the scent of pine, and feel the mist rising from powerful falls.





THE TRAILS ARE CALLING

ADVENTURE ON FOOT, BIKE, PADDLE, OR ORV.

Breathtaking views, the scents of vast Keweenaw forest, and adrenaline rushes of extreme hikes or mountain bike jumps. You can lower your pulse, crank it up or do both in the same day. While our expansive views change with the seasons, they remain inspirational year round.


WITH OVER 50 MILES OF TRAILS TO EXPLORE.

the Nara Nature Park is perfect for hiking, running, biking, or skiing with your family. Enjoy Peepsock Creek, view the Portage Lake shoreline, and travel on the newly rebuilt

and accessible boardwalk along the Pilgrim River. Many species of waterfowl and raptors frequent the area.

FOR MID-TO-ADVANCED HIKERS, Mount Baldy is a must-see, towering 730 feet above Lake Superior near Eagle Harbor and Lake Bailey. The three-mile uphill climb offers panoramic views of Lake Superior and the Keweenaw Peninsula not accessible anywhere else. While on the two hour trek to the top, you may see snowshoe hares, peregrine falcons, ruffed grouse, black bear, and warblers. A good pair of hiking boots, plenty of water, and binoculars are a must for this summit.





FOR THOSE LOOKING FOR A TWO-WHEELED ADVENTURE, the Keweenaw is home to the best mountain biking in the Midwest—from seasoned riders looking for a challenge to beginners taking in the scenery. The Keweenaw Mountain Lodge offers trails for beginner, intermediate, and advanced bikers. Rentals and group rides are available through the lodge's Outdoor Activities Center.

THE SWEDETOWN TRAILS ARE SINGLE-TRACK TRAILS of over 22 miles through rolling forests ideal for those looking to gain confidence and build bike handling skills for beginner and intermediate riders.

FARTHER NORTH, **THE COPPER HARBOR TRAIL SYSTEM** is renowned nationally and has a "Silver Level Epic Ride!" designation by the International Mountain Bike Association. It has over 37 miles of trails with gateway, cross-country, flow, and gravity style trails for riders of all skill levels. The trails take riders through old-growth forests, along lakes and streams, and through some extreme downhill tracks. A shuttle service can be utilized to take riders and their bikes to the top of the trail system for downhill thrills.

IF A WATER ADVENTURE IS WHAT YOU ARE SEEKING, Lake Superior and the countless inland lakes of the Keweenaw offer extensive paddling opportunities, each with their own unique scenery to explore. For beginners, the calm sections of the Sturgeon River are the perfect place to launch, with wide waters and low current.

ON YOUR NINE-MILE TRIP TO OTTER LAKE, the river only drops a few feet in elevation, making this the perfect paddle for families and beginners in either kayaks or canoes. Beautiful paddling opportunities await in Lake Fanny Hooe, Portage Lake, Lake Perrault, Lac La Belle, and Gratiot Lake. We recommend planning your launch and destination points, carrying a GPS, and packing plenty of water.

GO TRAIL RIDING ON YOUR ATV or side-by-side on over 160 miles of trail between Mass City and Copper Harbor. Using old railroads that were built to move copper ore and timber during the copper boom in the Keweenaw, you'll experience the Lake Superior coastline like no other, weave through the vast forestland, and witness the mining ruins in our ghost towns.

Our trail systems in all forms are built on state and privately-owned land, so we ask that you stay on the trail and leave no trace so others like you can enjoy the views for generations to come.



After a day of hiking, biking, skiing, swimming and witnessing the inspiration behind artisans in the region—step into art galleries and gift shops featuring locally produced art. Take time to immerse yourself in works that reflect the history and culture of the region.

Visit the Calumet Art District Galleries the first Friday of each month in their open house showcasing new art installations. Or, take a stroll through the guided walking tour of industrial or downtown Calumet. Immerse yourself in history as you take in a theatre, music, opera or dance performance in the 120-year-old Calumet Theatre. Lean into the area's history at the Finnish-American Heritage Center on the Finlandia University campus to see North America's largest collection of Finnish-American artwork.

Catch a live show in the largest performance venue in the Upper Peninsula at the Rosza Center, featuring world-class performances from ballet to opera from around the globe. During the academic year, the stage is graced by local productions of Michigan Tech students, film festivals, comedians and musicians.

From bluegrass to folk, blues to jazz and rock n' roll, the music scene at the Orpheum Theatre provides a variety of musical styles. You may just leave with a new favorite musical genre or local, regional or international musician.

If you enjoy architecture, follow the signage in downtown Houghton to read about and explore first-hand the history of many original downtown buildings. Many are fine examples of sandstone construction, sourced from quarries at nearby Jacobsville.

Artistry in the Keweenaw is special, just like the chemists and brewologists behind the beers brewed in the Copper Country. 

This geologically-rich region includes a variety of unique rocks and minerals that rockhounds are itching to discover. One of the most sought-after beach stones is the Yooperlite. It glows under UV Blacklight because it contains a fluorescent mineral called sodalite.

Pronounced "past-ee," this cultural point of pride is a folded pastry case with savory filling, typically of seasoned meat and vegetables. The travel-ready meal was brought by Cornish miners who migrated to the area to work in the booming 19th century copper mines.

7. TAKE A SAUNA

Taking a Sauna is a beloved tradition introduced to the Keweenaw by Finnish immigrants during the mid-1800's. Saunas are heated to 150-195°F, and steam is generated by pouring water on hot stones. Mount Bohemia offers a public Nordic Spa, which includes a traditional Finnish Sauna in addition to other hot and cool treatments.
