

Community Service Program

Pay your court costs through community Service

About the Program

The Community Service Program is an initiative for qualifying individuals to satisfy their court costs through community service. The program works by connecting participants to Community Partners. Participants then complete a designated number of community service hours based on their court costs owed.

Offering an alternative method of satisfying court costs reinforces the belief that everyone deserves a second chance while positively impacting the community.

Compensation Structure

Costs will determine compensation vs. community service hours performed. For example, four hours of service equals \$100 off fees. Please visit the Criminal Court Clerk's website by scanning the QR code to review the entire compensation structure and for more detailed information.

Eligible Participants

The program is available for individuals who owe court costs in Knox County and are indigent. Some charges may exclude individuals from participating in the program. Please contact the Program Director for more information.

The Program Rules and Requirements are used to maintain the highest standard of conduct expected and deserved by our Program Partners. This enables these organizations to continue to offer services required by those in need.

The Community Service Program has partnered with several local agencies in Knox County to complete service hours. Please contact the Program Director to review and determine which approved Community Partner is right for you.





Driver's License Specialist Program

Reinstate your driver's license with help from the Criminal Court Clerk's Office

About the Program

The Driver's License Specialists are a team of Deputy Clerks available to assist individuals trying to reinstate their driver's license.

Program Services

- Provide contact information for partner agencies.
- Provide notarized affidavits.
- Schedule court appearances to review fines and fees with court (if applicable).
- Provide copies of reinstatement requirements.

FAQs

What if I have court fines and fees?

You may be eligible for a driver's license payment plan. Please speak with our driver's license specialist to determine if you qualify.

How long does the process take?

Depends. Every person's case is unique. It may take as little as an hour to three days to provide your information. The process to reinstate your license typically takes longer and varies per individual.

How much does it cost?

The reinstatement fee is determined by department of safety and homeland security. Your reinstatement requirement cost will vary. The Clerk's Office does not charge a fee for their service assisting individuals with the reinstatement process.

Do I have to live in Knox County or be a resident to use your services?

No, you do not need to be a resident of Knox County or currently live in Knox County to use our service.

Can you help people with their commercial driver's license?

Yes, we can!



Homeward Bound

Families and youth experiencing homelessness are provided supportive services and case management so they can obtain or retain housing and achieve sustainable stability and eventual self-sufficiency. Services include housing placement, education and employment assistance, advocacy, and connection to resources.

Families in Need

This HUD-funded case management program offers re-housing services to families with children who live in shelters, streets, hotels paid for by charitable organizations, cars or other places not meant for human habitation.

REACH

HUD-funded street outreach and case management assists the chronically homeless living in camps, vehicles, and under bridges to access emergency shelters and/or safe housing.

Elizabeth's Home

This HUD-funded re-housing program offers financial support and case management to families as they transition from homelessness to permanent housing.

Youth WINS

Unaccompanied youth ages 18-24 (including those in high school) who struggle with housing insecurities or homelessness are provided outreach and comprehensive guidance to help them access housing, education and job resources.

YAB sponsor.

Youth Action Board (YAB)

Empowering youth through leadership and engagement, YAB members who have experienced homelessness advise community leaders on the diverse challenges homeless youth face and impact community change.

Emergency Solutions Grant

This federal grant helps CAC to better serve its unsheltered program participants. Assistance regularly includes payment of housing deposits, first month's rent, utility deposits, and other supportive services.

Resilient Families

Whole-family approach case management helps selected families with children move from crisis to stability and long-term, financial self-sufficiency by offering comprehensive assistance addressing employment, education, childcare, transportation, and more.

CAC Social Services—865-544-5200

Project LIVE

Senior residents 60 and older facing housing insecurities and/or homelessness are assisted in finding or maintaining safe and secure housing. Case management offers connection to resources so they may continue to live independently. Eligibility guidelines apply.

Case Management Project

Case management services are provided to residents of three local high-rise apartment buildings to help prevent eviction. Services are offered in partnership with City of Knoxville and KCDC properties, including Cagle Terrace, Guy B. Love and Isabella Towers.

Neighborhood Centers

Located in East, South and West Knoxville neighborhoods, individuals and families are helped to achieve and maintain self-sufficiency through connection to community resources.

Access to Benefits

Individuals already working with CAC Case Management staff may be assisted with SSI/SSDI. Eligibility guidelines apply.

Families Together Academy

Free, family-oriented, on-site and/or virtual classes vary monthly, and include Knox County court-approved certification classes, such as Anger Management and Parenting. Schedules may be requested from susan.brADFORD@knoxcac.org.

Tutoring

K-8th Graders are offered tutoring in Mathematics and English Language Arts at the East Neighborhood Center. Classes meet on site. Eligibility guidelines apply.

Workforce Development

Employment specialists assist those in search of employment:

Workforce Connections

Workforce Connections provides a comprehensive set of employment services tailored to the needs of jobs seekers.

Re-Connections

Re-Connections assists justice-involved job seekers obtain and maintain employment by helping them overcome barriers.

Connect 3E

Connect 3E provides employees rides to jobs in Knox County and in some cases surrounding counties using CAC Transit.

Ticket to Work

Ticket to Work supports career development for people ages 18-64 who receive Social Security disability benefits (SSDI/SSI) and want to work to improve earning potential.

- ✓ **Bring family or interpreter, if needed.**
- ✓ **Have questions and concerns written and prioritized.**
- ✓ **Come prepared with information on current prescribed and herbal medications, test results, symptom and side effects log.**
- ✓ **Be concise—stick to key facts rather than long stories.**



“HOW TO TALK TO YOUR DOCTOR”

- ✓ **Follow doctor’s instructions for taking medications as prescribed.**
- ✓ **Take thorough notes on the doctor’s advice, next steps, prescriptions, etc.**
- ✓ **Ask about a follow up appointment if there is not time to address all issues.**



“HOW TO TALK TO YOUR DOCTOR”

- ✓ **Clarify anything you don’t understand before leaving.**
- ✓ **Request handouts, websites, or apps for more information on meds and diagnosis.**
- ✓ **Recap/check that you have all details right by reading back from your notes.**

THINGS TO KNOW:

- Lifeline benefits are limited to a single line of service per household. You may not receive multiple Lifeline discounts. You may apply your Lifeline discount to either one landline or one wireless number, but you cannot have the discount on both.
- You must use your service once every 30 days to keep your service active.
- You are required to annually re-certify your Life Wireless account. Life Wireless will contact you via text when your account is due for recertification.
- To complete the activation process you must power on your phone and place a call to 770-200-1000.
- If you have further questions or concerns, Life Wireless Customer Service is ready to help. Monday-Friday: 9AM - 6PM EST and Saturday-Sunday: 10AM - 7PM EST. From your Life Wireless phone, dial 611 for Customer Service (this does not use your minutes) or from any land line phone, dial 1-888-543-3620.

IMPORTANT: consumers who willfully make a false statement in order to obtain the LifeLine benefit can be punished by fine or imprisonment or can be barred from the program.

Forms of documentation may be necessary for enrollment. All subscribers will be required to demonstrate eligibility based at least on (1) Household income at or below 135% of Fed Poverty guidelines for a household of that size, or the percentage guideline for your State; OR (2) the household's participation in one of the federal assistance programs. Acceptable documentation to prove participation in a qualifying federal assistance program includes: (1) current or prior year's statement of benefits from a qualifying state, federal or Tribal program; (2) a notice or letter of participation in a qualifying state, federal or Tribal program; (3) program participation documents (e.g., consumer's proof of participation in SNAP or Medicaid); (4) other official document evidencing the consumer's participation in a qualifying state, federal or Tribal program. Acceptable documentation to prove income eligibility includes: Prior Year's state, federal or Tribal tax return; current income statement from an employer or paycheck; Social Security statement of benefits; Veterans Administration statement of benefits; retirement/pension statement of benefits; unemployment/ Worker's comp statement of benefits; Federal or Tribal notice letter of participation in General Assistance; Divorce decree, child support award, or other official document containing income information for at least three (3) months' time. Life Wireless will NOT retain a copy of this documentation.





Residential Recovery Program

The Steps House offers 90 beds for their residential recovery program for men recovering from alcohol and drug use.

The Residential Program is TN Department of Corrections approved and is able to receive Reentry Housing Program funding for men coming from prison or jail. We provide case management services and have licensed counselors to provide 12 Step Meetings and Release Prevention Groups.

We coordinate with local community providers for employment, Narcan training, nutrition education, employment assistance mental and physical healthcare. Our Program consist of 2 phases: Phase 1- Intake, Orientation, Day Program, Early Stabilization, and Employment/Life Skills and Phase 2- life skills implementation and stabilization in recovery.

Admission Criteria: Males 18 or older, able to work a full-time job and/or assume financial responsibility, abstain from alcohol or drug/illegal substance use, and follow the program's rules.

Veterans Program

Steps House has 45 beds dedicated to providing stable housing for Veterans experiencing homelessness. We aid in Veteran services, disability cases, legal interventions, and working with the State of Tennessee parole and probation agencies. Coordination of care with local Knoxville Veteran Outpatient Clinic, Safety Net providers for mental health care, and James H. Quillen Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Mountain Home, TN.

We work with our Veterans to obtain employment, transportation, recovery, counseling, and life skills. Our Veterans are eligible for aftercare case management services free of charge for 6 months. We are currently working on creating long-term transitional housing for some clients who wish to remain at Steps House after the complement of the program.

Admission Criteria: Applicants must be a male Veteran experiencing at least one day of homelessness a qualifying discharge status and be willing to participate in the program. The Veteran goes through a screening with Veterans Liaison before being placed at Steps House.






