
Marking a decade as part of the Las Cruces community, the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument is characterized by majestic desert mountains surrounding the entire city, rising boldly from flat plains. The nearly 500,000-acre monument includes: the Organ Mountains, Robledo Mountains, Sierra de las Uvas, Potrillo Mountains and Doña Ana Mountains. The extensive ecological range of the monument allows for a variety of activity including hiking, mountain biking, bikepacking, horseback riding, OHV use, camping and wildlife viewing.

The Organ Mountains are the most established area of the monument and home to the popular Dripping Springs to the west and Aguirre Springs to the east. They contain designated camping areas, a visitors center, well-marked trails and pet-friendly paths. The Potrillo Mountains are the most remote section of the monument with a volcanic landscape of cinder cones, lava flows and craters.

The Doña Anas are a favorite among mountain bikers and OHV enthusiasts due to its more rugged terrain. An arch located at the top of one of its hills is a photographer's dream.

Slot Canyon and Broad Canyon are nestled within the Sierra de las Uvas Mountains.

Neighboring the Uvas is the Robledo Mountains, which you can spot towering over the north end of the Mesilla Valley. The mountains are home to the popular hiking spot Geronimo's Cave, accessible when the Rio Grande isn't flowing.



Las Cruces is in the northern portion of the Chihuahuan Desert— considered the most diverse desert in the Western Hemisphere and one of the most diverse arid regions in the world. The area is largely a dry climate with most of the rain falling between late June and early October. While the desert offers many opportunities for recreation and provides solitude and a surreal landscape, extreme temperature and changes in weather patterns can make it a dangerous place to be if one is not prepared. Follow these tips for a safe outdoor experience.



HYDRATE

Hydrate before you go and take plenty of water with you.



AVOID HIKING ALONE

If you do, let someone know where you are going and when you will return.



BE PREPARED

Learn the trail, know your limits and bring navigation aids.



WATCH FOR ANIMALS

Wild or domestic, give them their space.



PLAN AHEAD

Plan activities for cooler times of the day; avoid strenuous activity during extreme heat.



BE PROTECTED

Wear clothing that fully covers your body to protect it from the sun. Wear hiking shoes or boots to protect from surface heat and injury.



CHECK THE WEATHER

Avoid rural and low-lying areas when there is a chance for rain. Monsoon rains can come in fast and furious, causing washouts and flooding.

While the Chihuahuan Desert can seem like a harsh environment, it's quite delicate. The sensitive flora and fauna respond quickly to seasonal changes and ecological damage, and degraded areas can take decades to be restored. INSTA-WORTHY Areas

DOÑA ANA ARCH

The Doña Ana Mountains north of Las Cruces is an area popular for four-wheel drive and OHV users. Hiking is also allowed and the view from the mountains' arch captures breathtaking sights of the Mesilla Valley.

STAHMANN FARMS

Stahmann Farms' pecan trees line NM Highway 28, creating a surreal green canopy that shades the road during the summer months.

DRIPPING SPRINGS NATURAL AREA

The Dripping Springs Natural Area is situated about 10 miles east of Las Cruces and has over four miles of easy hiking trails, accessible restrooms, 12 picnic sites, a large group site and a visitor center that showcases the history, and flora and fauna of the area. Pets are only allowed on one trail.

PICACHO PEAK

Picacho Peak is a 4,959-foot-high peak just northwest of Las Cruces. The peak is a volcanic mountain composed of rhyolite that solidified at the surface approximately 35 million years ago. The recreation area has over 15 miles of mountain biking, hiking, and equestrian trails.

TORTUGAS "A" MOUNTAIN

Tortugas "A" Mountain Recreation Area is located on the eastern edge of Las Cruces. The "A" is a nod to the New Mexico State University Aggies. It is primarily used for hiking and mountain biking. In addition to the beautiful views, visitors will also find an observatory managed by NMSU and a shrine to the Virgin of Guadalupe that is used by the Tortugas Pueblo in their annual pilgrimage.

AGUIRRE SPRINGS RECREATION AREA

Aguirre Springs Recreation Area is located about 20 miles from Las Cruces, along the eastern slopes of the Organ Mountains. At nearly 5,000 feet in elevation, the site offers spectacular views of the Tularosa Basin as well as opportunities for hiking and camping.

MONUMENTAL SIGHTS

The Monumental Loop is a 250-mile bikepacking route that takes riders through all four regions of the Organ Mountains Desert - Peaks National Monument. While the route was created for bikepacking, it is suitable for any non-motorized use.

The Prehistoric Trackways Nationa Monument includes a major deposit of Palezoic Era fossilized footprints within approximately 5,000 acres. Fossil viewing is limited as many of the fossils have been moved, but visitors can enjoy spectacular views of the entire Mesilla Valley as well as hiking, mountain biking, horseback riding and OHV use. Paleozoic Era fossils that were found at the monument are housed at the New Mexico Museum of Natural History The Las Cruces Museum of Nature and Science has a permanent exhibit about the trackways.

MESILLA VALLEY BOSQUE

This photo-worthy, Audubon-designated 'Important Birding Area' offers several easy hiking trails for hiking and bird watching. Spend time at the visitor center and learn about the unique bosque (woodlands) ecosystem, history and culture of the area, or stroll through the native plant garden. There is a small entrance fee; however, the fee is waived for those who are riding their bicycle.

The Bataan Memorial Death March traverses the high desert terrain of White Sands Missile Range and Las Cruces in a challenging trek honoring the heroic service members who defended the Philippine Islands during World War II.

The Chile Capital of the World hosts a family-friendly event with a carnival, parade, vendors and live entertainment.

FRANCISCAN FINE ARTS FESTIVAL

Set among pecan orchards at the serene Holy Cross Retreat Center, artists display and sell paintings, ceramics, jewelry, photographs, quilts, woodwork, glasswork and more. Enjoy the beloved enchilada lunch, paella, wine garden, raffle, silent auction, information booths and more.

DIEZ Y SEIS DE SEPTIEMBRE FIESTA IN HISTORIC MESILLA

Historic Mesilla commemorates Mexico's independence with a celebration on the plaza. Enjoy folklorico dancing, mariachi music, food, shopping and activities.

MESILLA VALLEY MAZE

Take a hayride to the pumpkin patch, enjoy family-fun activities, food and trek into the twists and turns of the corn field (design changes annually). Open throughout the fall season.

The Las Cruces Farmers and Crafts Market is a Saturday tradition for locals and a must-shop for visitors! 

PAT GARRETT MURDER MYSTERY

Widely known as the lawman who shot and killed the infamous Billy the Kid in 1881, Pat Garrett was mysteriously killed in 1908. He was found dead on a barren stretch of road between his ranch and Las Cruces. Wayne Brazel was the man who killed Garrett in alleged self-defense. He was tried and found not guilty of murder. However, many conspiracies arose after the trial accusing him of conspiring to have Garrett killed as numerous things didn't appear to add up.

DOÑA ANA COUNTY COURTHOUSE AND JAIL

The old Doña Ana County Courthouse, located in downtown Las Cruces, was built in 1937 and served as the county courthouse until the 1980s. The building offers ghost tours, other activities and events. Many people believe that the spirits of former inmates and other entities haunt the building. Visitors have reported strange noises, slamming of cell doors, feeling of not being alone and unexplained cold spots in the courthouse.

HATCH, NM

Via New Mexico Highway 185: 49 minutes, 40 miles

Highlights of taking this route: It's a back road through pecan orchards, agricultural areas and along the Rio Grande. Stop and hike Slot Canyon, Broad Canyon or Faulkner Canyon. Get drinks and food at the popular Blue Moon Bar in Radium Springs. Closer to Las Cruces, the highway offers access to Prehistoric Trackways and Fort Selden Historic Site.

Via Interstate 25: 42 minutes, 40 miles

Highlights: Hatch, NM is "The Chile Capital of the World." Stop by The Pepper Pot, the small town's signature restaurant for New Mexican food. Right off the highway, check out Sparky's Burgers, Barbeque and Espresso. Walk Main Street and check out other local spots.

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES, NM

Via Interstate 25: 1 hour 10 minutes, 75 miles

Once named "Hot Springs," the town of Truth or Consequences was renamed after a game show. The small community is an oasis in the desert. Offering soaks both indoors and outdoors, and a downtown area with galleries, shops and dining, this small town is worth a visit.

ELEPHANT BUTTE LAKE STATE PARK

Via Interstate 25: 1 hour 15 minutes, 79 miles

The largest of New Mexico's state parks, Elephant Butte provides opportunities for camping, RVing, boating, fishing, hiking and swimming in a magnificent oasis in the desert. The area is named for the rock at the center of the lake resembling an elephant.

CONCHA (KONE-CHA)

Often referred to as pan dulce or sweet bread, Conchas are a fluffy, butter brioche-like pastry topped with a colorful streusel topping.

MARRANITOS (MAR-RUH-NEE-TOZE)

Gingerbread cookies flavored with molasses and shaped like pigs.

EMPANADA (EM-PUH-NAH-DAH)


A crescent-shaped, filled pastry that is either baked or fried. It can be filled with a sweet fruit or savory filling.

Also known as Mexican wedding cookies, these are melt-in-your-mouth, fall apart, very crumbly, soft cookies somewhat like shortbread. While still warm, these cookies are rolled in confectioner sugar.

BISCOCHOS (BEE-SKO-CHOZE)

Shortbread-like cookie with base flavors of anise, cinnamon and sugar. They are sometimes referred to as "biscochitos."



DID YOU KNOW?



·Las Cruces is the second largest city in New Mexico.



•No one knows exactly how the name "Las Cruces" was selected for the city, although there are many stories that claim to be true. The name itself translates to "the crosses."



·Las Cruces was founded in 1849. Initially the neighboring town of Mesilla was the larger settlement, until the railroad was built in the 1880s and New Mexico State University (first known as Las Cruces College) was founded in 1888, both contributing to the growth in population.



•The land Las Cruces sits on was ceded to the United States as a result of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo of 1848, marking the end of the Mexican-American



•Las Cruces is in southern New Mexico at the crossroads of two major interstates— Interstate 10 and Interstate 25.



•Fort Selden was built in 1865 and was the original home of the Buffalo Soldiers. •Las Cruces is home to the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum which



spans 47 acres and is the one of the most visited attractions in southern New Mexico.



• Geronimo's Cave is located Las Cruces' Robledo Mountains and is said to have been used by the Apache leader and his followers to escape from U.S. soldiers in the late 1800s. Today it is a popular hiking destination.



•Las Cruces is home to the world's largest roadrunner and world's largest chile



•Las Cruces was once home to the world's largest enchilada. It was a flat enchilada made by local Roberto Estrada and held the title since 1980. The title was lost during Mexico City's 2012 National Enchilada Fair when a larger, rolled enchilada was created. Some say it is not a fair comparison.



• In 1989, New Mexico made the "biscochito" or "biscocho" its official state cookie.



•In 1629, the first grapevines were planted along the Rio Grande and were originally smuggled from Spain by monks to make wine for ceremony and sacrament. This established southern New Mexico as the oldest wine-producing region in the nation.



•Pat Garrett, who became renowned for killing the infamous outlaw Billy the Kid, was the sheriff of Doña Ana County from 1896-1902.



•In 1996, New Mexico became the only state to establish an official state question, referring to its most famous product, chile. The question is "Red or Green?"



Las Cruces is home to the Chile Pepper Institute, the only international, nonprofit devoted to the education and research of chile peppers.

•New Mexico is the second largest pecan-producing state in the nation.



•Doña Ana County is the top pecan-producing county in the nation with over 32,000 acres of pecan orchards.



•For all those pop culture buffs, an entire episode of the 90s sitcom Wings revolves around a flight to Las Cruces. In the episode titled "Das Plane" a man pays \$10,000 at a charity auction for a flight anywhere. He chooses to fly from Nantucket to see his estranged brother in Las Cruces.

The New Mexico FARM + RANCH HERITAGE MUSEUM

Agriculture is a major industry in southern New Mexico and carries an intriguing story that spans 4,000 years. As one of the most prominent attractions in the state, the New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum shares this history with visitors of all ages through exhibits, hands-on activities, annual events and live demonstrations.

Nestled at the foot of the Organ Mountains, the Farm and Ranch Museum is a testament to

the enduring spirit of the farming and ranching community. It stretches 47 acres and is home to multiple structures that outline the history of agriculture from the ancient indigenous peoples who first settled in this area to the Spanish Colonial era to the settlers who traveled west seeking their fortunes. Through fascinating artifacts and interactive displays, visitors can gain a profound appreciation for their wisdom and resourcefulness. The 24,000-squarefoot main building houses permanent and temporary exhibits, art exhibits, meeting and event spaces, a mercantile, working ranch, livestock, a gift shop and a theater.

The museum offers a wide variety of tours and activities that enhance the overall experience. Visitors can choose from guided tours, group tours, livestock tours, and youth camps or attend one of the many popular annual events held at the museum, among them, Ice Cream Sunday, Cowboy Days and Homegrown.

TRADITIONS



Hollowed out colorful eggs filled with paper confetti. It's a tradition to chase your family around during the Easter season and crack an egg on their head.

BAYLOR CANYON PASS WILDFLOWERS

If the rains are generous enough, in spring, yellow poppies blanket the northern foothills of the Organ Mountains along Baylor Canyon Pass. All visitors are asked to be respectful and not step on, pick or crush the flowers while at the site.

Summer

CALABACITAS

Southern New Mexico has a great climate for growing squash and zucchini, making "Calabacitas" a perfect summer dish. Although it translates to "little squash," this dish often incorporates sautéed corn, tomatoes and onion. Chile and cheese are welcome additions.

CORN MAZES

The Mesilla Valley becomes ripe with fall festivities during the season.

As a renowned agricultural community, its corn fields and pumpkin patches are frequented throughout September and October, and made even better by the idyllic weather. Get lost in one of two of the area's corn mazes—La Union Maze or Mesilla Valley Maze.

DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS

In late fall, Mesilla and Doña Ana hold Dia de los Muertos celebrations. The holiday honors deceased loved ones. Ofrendas or small altars are built to honor their memory and consist of colorful decorations and offerings. It is celebrated over three days locally and encompasses Oct. 31, known as Day of the Dead; Nov. 1, known as All Saints Day; and Nov. 2, known as All Souls Day. The celebrations can vary by region.

Winter

LUMINARIAS

Luminarias are traditional New Mexico holiday decorations. The paper lanterns are weighed down by sand with a candle nestled safely inside. Tealights or bulbs are used now. They are sometimes referred to as "farolitos."

BISCOCHOS

Every family seems to have their own "secret" recipe for these melt-in-your mouth, shortbread-style cookies. Anise, cinnamon and sugar create the base flavors to this holiday and family-gathering favorite. It's what each family adds to their own recipe that makes it special.

PONCHE NAVIDEÑO

This hot, spiced fruit punch is made with fruits like guava and tejocotes. It is flavored with piloncillo, cinnamon sticks, jamaica and sugar cane. Some recipes may also add dried plums, apples, oranges, tamarindo, cloves and alcohol.

CHAMPURRADO

This is another hot beverage perfect for warming those cold desert nights. Base ingredients include masa (corn dough), piloncillo, cinnamon and other spices. The masa adds a creamy consistency that makes the texture and flavor unique.

TAMALES

Tamale making is one way to involve family in the making of their own meal. The process consists of spreading masa on a dried corn husk, adding your filling— red chile meat, green chile cheese, green chile chicken and more— wrapping it, then steaming the tamales in large batches. The process is time consuming, but well worth the wait!

POSOLE AND MENUDO

Posole and menudo are cure-alls for a lot of people. The soups start off with a hominy and then deviate from there. Menudo has tripe and a red chile base, which sets the flavor apart from posole. Posole typically has chicken, pork or beef to flavor the broth along with either a red chile or green chile base. Lime, oregano, onion, radish, cabbage are toppings that add even more flavor and texture to the heartiness of the dish. Recipes can vary significantly from family to family, making it a staple dish during the holidays.

LA LLORONA

The Birthplace of America's MISSILE + SPACE PROGRAM

Lying a few miles west of the Organ Mountains is a sign that welcomes visitors to White Sands Missile Range (WSMR), the "Birthplace of America's Missile and Space Program." It's an accolade that very few people know about but space, and the continued exploration of the Universe, has long been a strong influence on industry in the region and in Las Cruces.

- •The very first image of Earth from space was taken on October 24, 1946 by a rocket launched from WSMR.
- •Renowned astronomer Clyde Tombaugh, who discovered Pluto, lived and worked at New Mexico State University. He also discovered other celestial bodies and

developed instruments such as the Intercept Ground Optical Recorder, which remained in use at WSMR for the next 30 years.

- •In 1963, NASA established the White Sands Test Facility (WSTF) in the western foothills of the San Andres Mountains. The primary mission of the facility was the support NASA's Space Station program and previously the Shuttle Program. Today WSTF primarily participates in propulsion systems testing and often their testing can be heard across Las Cruces in the Mesilla Valley.
- •50 miles southwest of Las Cruces lies a maar volcanic crater with ties to NASA's Apollo Space Program. Kilbourne Hole and its neighbor Hunts Hole were used by NASA to train Apollo Astronauts.
- •The public is welcome on base to visit the White Sands Missile Range Museum documenting the American missile, atomic and space history and history of the White Sands area.

SPACE TRAIL

A trip to Las Cruces offers lots of open spaces, with one of the most enchanting being outer space. Southern New Mexico is full of space history, spanning from NASA test launches long before astronauts took flight to the first commercially manned Virgin Galactic spaceship flight.

A Historic Hub

Neighboring Las Cruces, Mesilla, NM is a historic town that's home to the striking San Albino Basilica, a variety of contemporary boutiques, unique stores, galleries, wineries and restaurants serving New Mexican cuisine, fine dining and American fare.

The small town hasn't changed much over the years, allowing visitors to take a step back in time, walking the plaza that a hundred and 50 years ago was a major stop for those traveling between San Antonio, TX and San Diego, CA. The town is often associated with outlaw Billy the Kid, who once stood trial for murder in a Mesilla courtroom. Also, the Mesilla Plaza was a major stop for the Butterfield Stagecoach. Originally, Mesilla was part of Mexico, but with the signing of the Gadsden Purchase in 1854, the village

became part of the United States.

The Mesilla Plaza is anchored by the Basilica of San Albino. The church, originally built of adobe in 1855, still offers masses today, both in English and Spanish. Outside the church is a memorial to parishioners who died in combat.

Mesilla's plaza is the heart of the historic town, hosting many local and nationally recognized events honoring the area's culture. Dine nearby at the famous Double Eagle Restaurant, The Bean at

Josefina's, Don Félix Café and La Posta de Mesilla. However, there is plenty to do and see outside the plaza. Grab a drink or bite to eat at local favorites like Palacio Bar, Chala's Wood Fire Grill and Andele's or shop local goods at Heart of the Desert and FARMesilla on the way into town.


