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

PLAN AHEAD

Before you pack, check the forecast. You may need to pack a refillable water bottle, snacks, umbrella, insect repellent, non-toxic sunscreen, sunglasses and cap, and compass or map.

LEAVE WHAT YOU FIND

Preserve the past. Observe rocks, plants and artifacts.

RESPECT WILDLIFE

Watch wildlife from a distance and never feed or handle wild animals. Keep an eye out and leash on your pups at all times.

PACK IN, PACK OUT

Inspect your rest area for wrappers, trash or spilled food. Be sure to pack up all the litter you have. Strive to leave the site in better condition than when you arrived.

BE COURTEOUS & KIND

Respect other visitors and be trail-friendly — maybe even say 'hi' while passing by. Let the sounds of nature prevail - save the music for your car ride.

Use existing trails and rest stops. Walk in the center of the trail.




Of course, if you can make it to LivCo for some of our premier, annual springtime events, there's nothing better to put you in a sunny mood. Through the end of May and early June, the Tree **Peony Festival at Linwood** Gardens draws in visitors to see corners of the estate that are rarely open to the public. Also in early June, the New York State Yoga Festival at Letchworth State Park will bring some peace and tranquility to your life, and the Camp Lima German Festival gives you a taste of German culture and cuisine, without ever leaving town.

The Summer Solstice at Hillcrest Estate is certainly a can't-miss event in an historic setting. Meanwhile, the Dansville Dogwood Festival brings smalltown fair fun to visitors in early May, as does Caledonia's Trout Festival in early June. For a dose of whimsy, make tracks for the Fairy Festival in Dansville. Or if you're lucky enough to spend Memorial Day weekend in LivCo, the Red, White & Blue Balloon Festival at Letchworth State Park is a must, as hot air balloons take to the skies over the park's gorgeous gorges and waterfalls.

Of course, this spring, LivCo will also welcome visitors for the oncein-a-lifetime Great North American Eclipse, a total solar eclipse happening on Monday, April 8th. Sitting in the path of totality, LivCo is one of the few locations in the country where guests are assured a spectacular view of this astronomical phenomenon.

Whatever your reason for visiting, we're so glad you're here. As you, your family, and your friends soak up all the seasonal fun LivCo has to offer, we hope you leave with a spring in your step - and already planning to come back for more.





AS A HUB FOR EXCITING OUTDOOR RECREATION,

even the least adventurous people won't be stuck with nothing fun to do in LivCo. Embrace nature and beat cabin fever by soft hiking

along one of the many gardens, parks, and trails throughout the region. Soft hiking makes outdoor recreation more accessible for travelers of all skill levels and abilities, making the outdoors more welcoming, inclusive, and diverse. The entire point is to turn hiking into something that's uniquely suited to your wants and needs, something for every type of nature-seeker and outdoor enthusiast. Here's where to try soft hiking in Livingston County.

WHAT IS SOFT HIKING?

No, it's not just going for a walk. It's a little more like forest bathing, which is a mindfulness practice that takes place outdoors. Soft hiking keeps all the most enjoyable parts of hiking being out in nature, seeing amazing natural sights, getting your steps in - and removes all tougher aspects of hiking, like trying to get to the top of a peak as quickly as you can, or pushing yourself to the limit as your aching, sweating limbs protest.

When soft hiking, you take it easy. You go slow. You don't push yourself harder than you feel you need or want to. You allow yourself to be present and to truly enjoy your surroundings. Don't want to go to the end of the trail? You don't have to. Want to just go half-way? That's totally fine.

There's no need to buy fancy or special equipment for soft hiking. So long as you have clothing that's comfortable and safe for the trail you've chosen, anything will work. You'll want to bring plenty of water and some nourishing food on your hike, if it's on the longer side, but don't feel like you need to buy special equipment or fancy hiking foods to enjoy your day. Focus on picking the items that will make your body and soul feel good.

There's likewise no need to pick a trail of a certain difficulty, or a trail that's deemed more "worthwhile" or "best." Pick the trail or hiking experience that's right for you, your skill level and your interests. Maybe you're not keen on hiking to a lookout, for example, and would instead rather take a leisurely hike to a point of historic interest.

TENNENT PARK

Very conveniently located, Tennent Park in Caledonia provides access to Matthews Trail, which offers a short and easy soft hiking experience that's just a half-mile long. The trail follows Spring Creek and provides a nice opportunity to immerse yourself in nature, while never being too far from civilization.

2. HIGHLAND PARK

Highland Park, in Geneseo, offers a range of amenities, including a dog park, fitness loop, playground, and sports courts. If you'd like to incorporate a little historic intrigue into your soft hike, stop by the park's former Erie Railroad Depot, which was built in the late 1800s.

At state parks, like Letchworth State Park, rangers are knowledgeable sources of information if you're looking for





3. VITALE PARK



7. HEMLOCK LAKE PARK

LivCo is filled with shorefront and waterscapes, so don't miss the chance to soft hike near one of our many lakefronts at Hemlock Lake Park. Bring your fishing poles and throw out a line, if that's your thing. Otherwise, just enjoy the water views.

8. AVON DRIVING PARK

This park in Avon offers all of the amenities you need to work up a sweat while enjoying your favorite sporting activity, whether that be baseball, basketball, pickleball, or volleyball. If you want to soft hike, you'll find that you can easily do so while enjoying the park's historic appeal, as the grounds were previously a sulfur spring health spa.

9. BELLAMY PARK

This park offers historic appeal, as it's named after past Mount Morris resident Francis Bellamy, who penned the Pledge of Allegiance. This community park is right in town, so it's an easy stop if you're busy exploring the rest of the village and want to get your steps in.



PACK A PICNIC FOR YOUR PERFECT HIKE

No matter which of our favorite soft hiking spots you head to during your LivCo excursion, consider bringing along a scrumptious picnic. Our region boasts a variety of delis, country stores, sandwich shops, and specialty grocery stores to outfit your picnic basket with everything you'll need for a yummy meal out in the open. Try Six Sprouts Farm Market in Avon, The Valley Shop in Nunda, Honeygirl Gourmet in Geneseo, Wendy's Pantry & Country Mouse Tea House in Mount Morris, or Shoreless Acres General Store in Livonia.

If you'd prefer not to plan your own picnic, though, Letchworth Valley Picnics can help. The pop-up picnic providers offer picnic experiences in the region, where all you have to do is show up, and they craft the most magical picnic for you to enjoy without lifting a finger.

However you pull together your picnic for your hiking adventure, remember to bring the necessities you'll need like utensils, condiments, and something to sit on, whether that be a beach blanket or any quilt you don't mind spreading out on the ground. Be sure to pack some fun activities as well, such as lawn games, and be sure that you leave no trace of your experience. Whatever you pack in, be sure to pack it right back out.

PALMITER'S GARDEN NURSERY



Palmiter's Garden Nursery carries a wide range of annuals, perennials, and trees. Some are on the common side, while others are a little more unexpected. The nursery uniquely offers more than 50 varietals of peonies. Cacti and succulents are likewise favorites here, and a good gift for a loved one (or yourself!). You'll also find glazed pottery for sale. Want to learn more about the nursery? Just ask one of the staff for a guided tour of the grounds.

LIGHTHOUSE GARDENS



This organic garden in Lima stands out in the region as the only one to narrow in on a fun and important niche: organically grown edibles and ornamentals. The family-owned business grows more than 500 varieties of herbs, vegetables, berries and more, across more than 12,000 square feet of greenhouses and a market garden. Not in the market for plants, but will never say no to farm-fresh produce? You can buy Lighthouse Gardens' fresh produce at the Brighton Farmers Market.



Nothing beats the flavors of freshly picked and locally grown produce. Farmer's markets and farm stands across Livingston County will be opening back up for the season, be sure to stop by for fresh flowers and bouquets.



INTO THE MYSTIC BLOOMS

O CALEDONIA, NEW YORK

Into the Mystic Blooms is a sustainable field-to-vase flower farm. Here, you can stop by on select days throughout the season, and purchase some simply magical floral arrangements. If you're lucky enough to be in town on May 25th, you can see the farm's work at the 4th Annual Plant Sale & Vendor Show, which takes place in Geneseo at the Strange Design Public House. The event highlights not just the farm's flowers and other area plants, but other local small businesses, crafters, and artisans. (Hint: If you're planning a LivCo wedding, keep Into the Mystic Blooms in mind for your floral arrangements!)

AMANDA'S NATIVE GARDEN

🔾 SPARTA, NEW YORK

This plant nursery specializes in woodland native perennials, with local plants perfect for creating a lush landscape that's as good for the environment as it is pretty to look at. The best part? If you visit Amanda's Native Garden and find a plant that you can't live without, the helpful team will ship your plant anywhere in the northeastern United States. If you're in town from May 3rd to 5th, visit for the nursery's Annual Wildflower Celebration, which includes demonstrations, guided tours, and familyfriendly activities like scavenger hunts and planting stations.

J&A FARM MARKET

AVON, NEW YORK

At J&A, you'll find a mix of local products, produce, and plants. Pick up a freshly harvested snack or two and some flowers, if you visit during the right season. Even if you're in LivCo in the wintertime, though, you'll find gorgeous poinsettias, holiday wreaths, and Christmas trees. Stopping by couldn't be easier, thanks to the market's roadside self-serve wagon.

DAYLILY GARDENS

O CALEDONIA, NEW YORK

Daylily Gardens boasts a niche – as the name suggests, this display garden is all about daylilies. The gardens grow 2,500 different daylily varieties and while you can certainly buy varieties for your own use, visitors are also encouraged to simply stop by and tour the grounds. The gardens are organized in such a way that they're accessible for most travelers, including wheelchair and mobility aid users. Daylily Gardens opens for the season on June 28th.

HILLSIDE GARDENS

🔾 SPRINGWATER, NEW YORK

In Springwater, this garden center and country store is home to the Springwater Farmers Market (who doesn't love a stop by a farmers market during travels - it's a great way to meet the locals and try a bit of regionally grown and produced fare!). Pick up some flowers when the season's right, but also peruse the many local products and gifts available in the country store.

PIKE'S GREENHOUSE

O AVON, NEW YORK

Pike's Greenhouse offers a variety of plants, as well as local goods, like apple cider, dairy products and beef products. Stop in and grab a few items for your house or rental, if you prefer to stay in and cook for your family during your travels. Of course, be sure to peruse all the plants as well, including hanging baskets and displays for the springtime holidays, like Mother's Day.

NORTHVIEW GREENHOUSES

O DANSVILLE, NEW YORK

You'll find a little bit of everything at NorthView Greenhouses in Dansville. This is a good spot to stop no matter what season you're visiting LivCo. In the spring, flowers, hanging baskets, and vegaies are the main attraction, with available plants changing with the season, and ending with mums in the fall. Then, come winter, this is the place to pick up your fresh holiday wreath. Be sure to follow NorthView on Facebook; the greenhouse gives away a hanging basket every week.











VALLEY VIEW FARMSTEAD

O DANSVILLE, NEW YORK

Valley View Farmstead boasts a pop-up flower truck in the spring, summer, and early fall, where you can purchase a fresh bouquet, flower jar, or even just a single bloom that catches your eye. Make sure to check the farmstead's event calendar ahead of your arrival in LivCo. The farmstead hosts fun, floral-themed events, such as a Mother's Day Bouquet Bar, where you can craft your own bouquet for Mom.

DON'T FORGET AMISH STANDS AND MARKETS THROUGHOUT LIVCO

While you can find many of these farmstands, greenhouses, and nature centers online, be sure to keep your eyes peeled as you drive around Livingston County (and ask a few locals for recommendations) to discover our many Amish stands and markets that don't have a listing online. Many of the county's Amish open up their homes and farms to the public, every day of the week except Sunday, selling an array of items, from flowers and produce to quilts and furniture.

Visit Miller's Greenhouse at 7724 Reeds Corners Road in Dansville for quilts, jams, jellies, and florals. Or try Samuel and Sarah Yoder at 6215 Strong Hill Road in North Dansville for Amish-made lawn furniture and clocks. For a bite of Amish goodness, try Cedar Lane Bulk Foods at 6081 Church Road in Dansville.





GET YOUR HANDS DIRTY AS YOU CHANNEL YOUR INNER ARTIST AT ONE OF LIVCO'S **MOST POPULAR GALLERIES**

If you don't already know, LivCo has quite the arts scene. Theater, dance, film, and live music - all be found throughout our towns and villages. Galleries likewise are scattered throughout the county, showing off the breadth of our residents' ample talent.

During your visit, there's no better activity to include in your itinerary than a bit of gallery hopping. Visiting our galleries is an easy, accessible, free activity that you can enjoy no matter the season. There's no better way to get to know a local area than by soaking in its art. And exploring new-to-you artists and artworks is a great way to get to know your own tastes, as well as those of your fellow travelers. You may just find a piece that you can't live without and that you simply have to take home!







There's one gallery in particular that you should visit, if you don't want to just look at the art, but also want to make your own.

Studio Sales Pottery has been in business since 1980... or, at least, the first iteration of it has been. With renowned artist Michael "Mike" Carroll at the helm, the business is split into three focuses. There's a pottery supply shop where you can buy anything you might need for your own pottery outfit. There's a community studio where locals and visitors alike can try their hands at one of ten electric pottery wheels. Then, there's the Schoolhouse Gallery, which displays local artwork and pottery in a historic space once used as the area's schoolhouse in the mid-1800s.

Visit and see the local artwork, but consider booking one of the studio's classes. While more intensive classes are offered weekly, one-off, private classes can likewise be scheduled for the weekends, during which you'll learn more about the ceramics process and how it relates to LivCo's history, as well as get a chance to use the potter's wheel. Similar private, individual classes are available with a focus on clay work.

Tell us a little bit about Studio Sales Pottery, how it got started, and your story as a maker and creator.

I started playing with clay at age 14 in junior high school at Rush Henrietta. In high school I was able to take 2 years of college elective ceramics courses at R.I.T. Then I graduated RH and joined the US Army. Upon leaving the US Army I went to Nazareth College for Studio Art. After graduation my wife Roxanne and I set up a pottery classroom and supply business on South Avenue in Rochester. In 1988 we moved that business, Studio Sales Pottery to Avon on Route 5 and 20. Between 2006 and 2007 we purchased and renovated the now 170 year old one room schoolhouse next to the original property to function as a gallery and supply showroom.

For 52 years I have had clay under my hands and the plasticity, movement, forms, and compositions give me a peaceful joy; to make an inanimate clay lump come alive and fire it to a permanence. Oh, and I like fire...

Why Livingston County? Why did you choose to set up your business here?

In 1987, I saw the East Avon property on my way to Geneseo one morning and my wife and I were ready to leave the city. From the beginning, this has been a very welcoming and supportive community for my business and our family. From neighbors to local governments, schools to culture, it's a great place to be.

We heard you found an arrowhead on your property, can you talk a little bit about that experience?

The arrowhead or javelin point was found by Tom Kuch of Avon next to the schoolhouse while cleaning up old vegetation to prepare for last year's WNY Pottery Festival. The piece needs to be examined firsthand, but from sharing pictures with an anthropologist I was told it is either 1600 years old or possibly 3000 to 5000 years old. Obviously much older than the Hartford/Avon settlement, but the Niagara Road which ran from Fort Niagara to the Hudson Valley had traffic much earlier than the European settlements. The arrowhead or javelin point is in incredible condition and still very sharp. There is a feature that photos don't show, so it needs to be examined to identify the time period and culture.

Can you talk about your partnership with Howlett Farms in Avon? How you've been sourcing clay with them?

Parts of Howlett Farms working fields are on the "flats" in Avon. A potter friend had provided me with an early 1900s geologic study from SUNY Geneseo about the makeup of the Genesee River Valley and showed me how there were pretty clean deposits of sedimentary red clays, earthenware, capable of fairly high temperatures, 2000° to 2100° F in this region.

One day several months ago I noticed a drainage ditch had been dredged and the piles on each side of the ditch were much lighter in color than the surrounding soil and consistent from one end of the ditch to the other. Bruce Howlett met me at this field and let me take some 5gallon barrels as samples of what has turned out to be VERY clean clay deposits. Not far from the ditch are ponds which Bruce indicated were formed from old brickyard excavations.





DON'T MISS THE LARGEST ALL-CLAY **FESTIVAL IN WNY!**

Held June 15th & 16th, the WNY Pottery Festival at Studio Sales brings together artists, families, locals and travelers for live demonstrations, hands-on children's activities and shopping from more than 20 artisans and potters.

From some of my own "research" I believe the brickyard in question produced a lot of the bricks used on properties in the village of Hartford/Avon as the community grew. For my purposes I crushed the clay, wet it down and screened it, then dried out some small batches on plaster and turned some small pieces on my wheel. I made some very tight, durable pots and look forward to working with some more of the samples I have to make pots and glazes over the next two months.

What can people expect at this year's WNY Pottery Festival? What's your favorite thing about the event?

More artists! We have had a very robust response to the show from ceramists this year and there will be more displays and booths. It will be clay-focused, pottery, sculpture, and tile work, all handmade. The venue is a park-like setting and my wife and I, with some help, put in a lot of prep work to have it looking good. (OK, mostly my wife.) I enjoy the way the properties look when the show is opened. Each year a glaze kiln of wood-fired pottery is unloaded on the Saturday and that is like opening presents for a potter.

Gallery in the Valley

GENESEO, NEW YORK

The Gallery in the Valley is a locally-owned gallery that features new artists every month. In addition to their rotation of visiting artists, resident artist Stephanie Krist of Fired Figments Ceramics creates handcrafted pieces at her home studio near Ithaca, New York. Inspired by a lifelong love of dragons and fantasy, Stephanie's mugs, spoon rests, plant pots, and sponge holders are all available at the Gallery.

Talulah's Fancy Wildflower Farm Studio & Gallery

O LIMA, NEW YORK

Turn off Rochester Street in Lima and you'll find Talulah's Fancy Wildflower Farm Studio & Gallery, an indoor-outdoor studio that beautifully blends nature with art. During your visit, shop nature-inspired pottery, jewelry, and more created by local artist Tamara Stopinski. While you're there, you can view fields of wildflowers and create your own colorful bouquet.



SPRING IS THE PERFECT TIME FOR QUICK FARM-FRESH MEALS.

LivCo boasts an amazing food and dining scene, with its array of farm-to-table restaurants, fine-dining options, international eateries and more. However, we get it - sometimes, when you're running to and fro, exploring all the adventures that the county has to offer, you just don't want to stop and sit down for a meal. You want to grab something convenient and be on your way.

Luckily, in LivCo, prioritizing convenience doesn't mean sacrificing amazing flavors and superb quality. When you stop by one of these delis, sub shops or casual cafés, you'll find that a delicious meal awaits, ready in mere minutes, so you can get back to exploring, fast.

MILK & HONEY CAFÉ

O LIMA, NEW YORK

For healthful lunchtime favorites and a menu that can cater to both vegan and vegetarian diets, look no further than Milk & Honey in Lima. The cute and cozy café offers grown-up versions of nostalgic classics, like peanut butter and jelly and grilled cheese sandwiches. If you stop in early enough, breakfast sandwiches are also an option.



CRICKET'S COFFEE

GENESEO, NEW YORK

Cricket's Coffee has your coffee, cocktails and all-day brunch cravings sorted. When you're in a hurry, the melts, wraps, and other handheld items on the menu are just the thing for a meal on the go. From a chicken pesto melt served on garlic sourdough, to a three-cheese melt filled with gooey mozzarella, cheddar, swiss and chipotle mayo goodness, there's not a bad choice on the menu.

Had maybe a little too much fun in LivCo last night? The Hangover sandwich, available until 3 p.m., is here to help, served up with avocado, hash browns, cream cheese, over-easy egg, and your choice of breakfast meat.

AUNT COOKIE'S SUB SHOP

GENESEO, NEW YORK

A SUNY Geneseo alumni-favorite, Aunt Cookie's has been around for decades and claims the best toasted roll subs in town. Find all your sub classics, including the crowd-favorite toasted Italian sub. Make sure to save room for a chocolate chip cookie, too!

T'S ON GENESEE

O AVON, NEW YORK

One of the newest spots in town and already becoming a local favorite, T's on Genesee in the Village of Avon combines Italian and Irish flavors for a one-of-akind sandwich shop known for a variety of lunch and dinner options including their Italian sub dip (yes, it's a dip, but it tastes like an Italian sub; just try it and you'll see why we love it!) and meatball subs.

As you peruse the expansive menu of hot and cold sandwiches and appetizers, be sure to ask about the soup of the day, too, the perfect accompaniment on a blustery LivCo spring day.

GATHERINGS AT THE DEPOT

LEICESTER, NEW YORK

Combine a quick pitstop for lunch with a peek into the past at Gatherings at the Depot, located within the village's historic train depot. The café offers a full espresso bar, in case you need a caffeine fix, and a range of sandwiches, salads, soups, and paninis. Try the house special sub, The Steam Engine, piled high with steak, chicken fingers, bacon, sautéed peppers and onions, and cheese. It's exactly the thing you need to fuel the rest of your day.

TONY'S PIZZERIA

O DANSVILLE, NEW YORK

Tony's Pizzeria serves up much more than just pizza (though the pizza, with its house-made dough and red sauce, is certainly nothing to overlook). The menu's list of subs and wraps is long and includes unique options that you won't find elsewhere, such as a fried bologna sub topped with American cheese and yellow mustard, a chicken cordon bleu with chicken fingers, ham, swiss and lettuce, or a chicken parm sub, with chicken fingers, red sauce, parmesan and mozzarella.

The menu includes options like grilled artisan cheese sandwiches served on homemade glutenfree bread, and savory gluten-free waffle sandwiches with delicious bites of roasted pork or everything needed for a classic BLT.

ANGRY ROOSTER DELI

O CALEDONIA, NEW YORK

You're certainly not going to leave this lunch spot angry. In Caledonia's downtown shopping district, Angry Rooster Deli is a convenient spot while you're checking out the rest of the village's charm.

in the early 1800s. Not long after, Seth Green, the "Father of American Fish Culture", established the oldest fish hatchery in the Western Hemisphere, right here. You can still see this fish culture at play today, but, as of the 21st century, Caledonia has grown into so much more. With a quaint main street, shopping, dining, and plenty of familyfriendly fun, here's how you can get to know the area in a single day.

START THE DAY WITH A HEARTY BREAKFAST AT COZY KITCHEN

A long-standing restaurant on Main Street, the Cozy Kitchen, is the perfect place to fuel up for a day of adventuring around Caledonia. The menu features all your breakfast favorites, like omelets, pancakes and French toast, plus breakfast platters, frittata and benedicts. (If you're craving something boozy, you'll also find mimosas on the menu!)

SPRING INTO THE **OUTDOORS**

Burn off breakfast with a hike through the wetlands of MacKay Wildlife Nature Preserve. This 26-acre preserve offers a short and easy, one-mile loop trail. While hiking is convenient and within easy reach, the environment will make you feel as if you've escaped to your own wilderness retreat, thanks to the thick hardwoods, large boulders and dirt paths that crisscross through it all.

Who doesn't love a little blast from the past? At Reminisce Soda Fountain, you'll find yourself transported back in time to a 1950s diner where you can find all your favorite comfort food classics (sloppy joes, mac 'n cheese, meatloaf), but also plenty of oh-so-perfect diner fare, like patty melts, hot dogs and more. The menu is extensive, so you're sure to find something you'll love.



SNAP A SELFIE WITH A "FISHY" MURAL

If there's one photo op you're going to want to take advantage of when you're spending a day in Caledonia, it's got to be the photo op with Trout Culture, created by Indianabased muralist, Tim Parsley. One of LivCo's many outdoor murals, this one celebrates Caledonia's heritage and is a true can't-miss, located at 3103 Main Street.



SHOP YOUR WAY DOWN MAIN STREET

Afterwards, enjoy a leisurely stroll down Main Street and pop in and out of some of the local shops. Reflections from the Past offers antiques and collectibles ranging from housewares to jewelry to ephemera. You'll find similar antique wares at McKay's Antiques, where even the surroundings are historic; the storefront dates back to 1891. For something on the newer side, visit **Pastique**, offering stylish and unique home décor. If you're in the mood for some retail therapy that focuses on all things fashion, try Bellissimo Boutique, which specializes in premium clothing for women and children.

😘 FEED FISH AT THE OLDEST HATCHERY IN **NORTH AMERICA**

You didn't think you could visit a village with such a historical focus on fish and not actually see some fish, did you? Head to the Caledonia Fish Hatchery, the very same one that was the first one established in the country, in the 1800s. Learn about its founding and its current purpose, and, if you're in the area in June, be sure to stop in town for the annual Trout Festival.

SAVOR FRENCH FLAVORS

For dinner, savor the French flavors served at the Caledonia Village Inn. The historic setting provides the perfect environment in which to enjoy the restaurant's fine dining offerings, such as baked French onion gratin to start, then Coquille St. Jacques or chicken French as your entrée, followed by scrumptious desserts like crème brûlée and New York-style cheesecake.





With over 100 wineries spanning the area, you have the opportunity to taste an incredible variety of wines - from crisp, fruity whites to bold, full-bodied reds.

From wine flights that tease your palate to the breathtaking vistas of vineyards in bloom, there's something magical about a winery visit during springtime. And there's no better place to experience this magic than at Deer Run Winery nestled on Conesus Lake.





was a lifelong dream for owner George Kuyon. In 1975, George attended an amateur winemaking class; he became hooked and enjoyed his newfound hobby of making wine for his friends and family. He and his wife, Joan, traveled to wineries in the Finger Lakes and George always had a strong feeling that one day he would own his own winery.

Upon his retirement from Kodak in 1998, George purchased a twenty-acre plot of farmland located on West Lake Road on the northern end of Conesus Lake. He began working with the local town government to begin to establish a winery on the westernmost Finger Lake. He worked with representatives from Cornell to test the land's soil and decided on varietals to plant, some of which were new hybrids that were in the final stages of being tested. The vineyard was planted in 2001. The varietals initially planted that were unnamed at the time would become known as Corot Noir and Noiret, along with plantings of Traminette, Valvin Muscat, Vidal, Frontenac, Marechal Foch, and Riesling.

The modest 5-acre vineyard today contributes to twenty percent of the overall wine production. The remaining grapes and juice are purchased solely from vineyards within the Finger Lakes appellation.

Can you talk about your offerings and happenings at the winery?

Events are integral to our business and we enjoy offering unique in-person experiences. We have hosted a myriad of events over the years including Wineerie nights (an escape room and haunted hayride), Murder Mystery dinners, summer concerts, weddings, Paint & Sips, Yoga/Spa events, cooking demonstration classes, food and wine pairing events indoors and in our vineyard, upscale wine pairing dinners and so much more! We enjoy brainstorming and coming up with new ideas for events and will continue to do so in the future.

The Tankroom Café was added and opened in 2022. We added a full-service restaurant to our winery to allow our customers



to savor and enjoy great food paired with our award-winning Finger Lakes wines! Since we opened the cafe, we added brunch on Sundays which has been well-received by the local crowd. In addition to weekly specials and menu changes, one of the most-loved items on our menu continues to be the Cheesy New Yorker, a grilled cheese sandwich made with New York white cheddar, apple slices, and Riesling hot pepper jelly! This simple sandwich includes three main ingredients that represent what New York does very well: Apples, Cheese, and Riesling!

Another top selling menu item is the Calabria made with chicken, pesto mayonnaise, roasted red peppers and mozzarella served hot & toasty on a hoagie roll. The name was derived from owner Joan Kuyon's side of the family and pays tribute to her Italian heritage.


What's the best thing about being in Livingston County?

SHOP FOR MYSTICAL GIFTS



Driving to the Genesee River Valley is the preferred transportation method for most visitors to Livingston County. Our roads are calm, and scenic vistas draw you from one destination to the next. In LivCo, traffic jams are practically non-existent (although you might end up behind a tractor or two), but there are no long lines of cars in sight. Parking is easy throughout all nine downtown villages. But if you choose to travel by another means, we have tips on that too.

On the Western Edge of the Finger Lakes Region, Livingston County is only a short drive from three major upstate New York cities. Rochester is less than 30 minutes north of Geneseo (the seat of Livingston County), Buffalo is about 70 minutes west, and Syracuse is about 90 minutes to the east. Rochester, Syracuse, and Buffalo each have an airport, bus, and train station.
