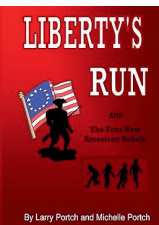

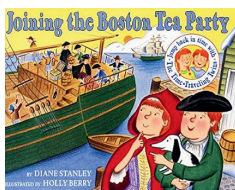
The four metal detecting adventurers are back - this time back to the American Revolution. Beware, when your ancestors are deeply involved in history. You could be swept up into the history yourself!

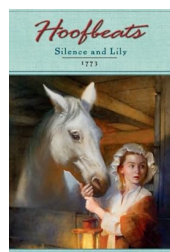
Eleven-year-old Abigail's diary describes life in Valley Forge from December 1777 to July 1778 as General Washington prepares his troops to fight the British.

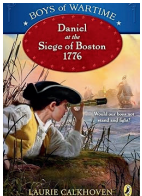

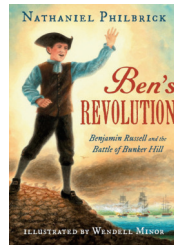

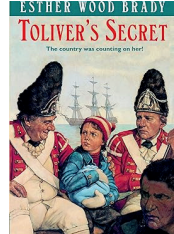

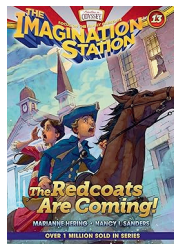

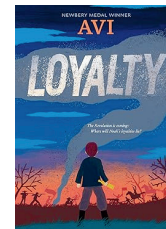
On the eve of the American Revolution, Patrick and Beth travel back in time to deliver a letter to Paul Revere.
