# History at Home: Nine Men's Morris

#### **Purpose:**

This activity focuses on games played by children during the Colonial Era

### Materials required:

Game Board (available to print below), nine game pieces for each player (buttons, beads, checkers or any small object.

## **Background Information:**

Children in the Colonial Era played games, just like kids today. Many of these games are still played today like: jump rope, tennis, hop scotch, tag and hide and seek. One game that isn't quite as popular, but still a great deal of fun is Nine Men's Morris.

### The Rules:

- 1. Nine Men's Morris is played by 2 players.
- 2. Each player gets **9** game pieces.
- 3. Players take turns placing each piece on the board. Pieces are placed on the circles or dots where the lines intersect.
- 4. Once all the pieces are on the board, players take turns moving the pieces from space to space, trying to get a line of three (either horizontal, vertical or diagonally, or to block an opponent from getting a line of three.
- 5. Whenever a player makes a line of 3, they remove an opponent's piece from the board.
- 6. Once a player is down to two pieces (can no longer make a line of three) that player loses and the game is over.
