Built circa 1740, some 40 years before the American Revolutionary War, Hopsewee Plantation was one of the South's major rice plantations and the birthplace of Thomas Lynch, Jr., one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. Now a private residence, this National Historic Landmark is open for tours, tea, and seasonal dining. Enjoy lunch or their Southern Tea in the River Oak Cottage, one of the top 100 tea rooms in the USA.

The Wicked Tuna

Murrells Inlet is the Seafood Capitol of South Carolina and has several great restaurants along the boardwalk area called the MarshWalk. This includes the renowned Wicked Tuna restaurant for fresh seafood!

If you have time after lunch, explore the MarshWalk, a half-mile boardwalk along the inlet. Be sure to notice "Goat Island," the island home to several goats and some peacocks!

Visit Brookgreen Gardens

1931 Brookgreen Gardens Drive, Murrells Inlet, SC Considered the finest outdoor presentation of American figurative sculpture in the world, Brookgreen Gardens was created in the early 1930s by Archer and Anna Hyatt Huntington on the site of four former rice plantations. As one of the most affordable attractions in Myrtle Beach offering admission that is good for seven consecutive days, Brookgreen Gardens is home to more than 1,400 works (550 currently displayed) by 300 of the greatest names in American sculpture, past and present. In addition to the Archer and Anna Hyatt Huntington Sculpture Garden, visitors can explore several other fascinating exhibits.

Huntington Beach State Park boasts a lagoon, maritime forest, salt marshes and three miles of the most well-preserved beach on the Grand Strand. The lush park environment provides prime habitats for wildlife including alligators and more than 300 recorded species of birds. The park is also home to Atalaya, the former winter home of prominent American sculptor Anna Hyatt Huntington, whose works are displayed at Brookgreen Gardens. Other park amenities include a campground, education center, boardwalks and nature trails. (There is an entry fee.)
