ABOUT

The Arts District of New Orleans (ADNO) was created in 1990 in an effort to improve the Arts/Warehouse District of New Orleans. Today, it is a burgeoning hub for young professionals and creatives. The organization strives to connect all aspects of the visual arts, culinary arts, musical arts, and the art of travel in this sought-after neighborhood.

ADNO seeks to promote every facet of this architecturally distinctive and historic district of New Orleans by sponsoring four major events every year: Jammin' on Julia, Fidelity Bank White Linen Night, Art for Arts' Sake | Downtown, and Holiday Cheers. These fundraising events are meant to encourage both tourists and the local community to appreciate the art scene in New Orleans. Additionally, ADNO hosts free gallery receptions every first Saturday of the month from 6-9 pm, which often marks the premier of new exhibitions.

Since its origin, the Association has partnered with other institutions, such as the Downtown Development District, to cultivate economic development in the downtown area. The non-profit organization has numerous contemporary art galleries, world-class museums/institutions presenting visual and performing arts, a rotating outdoor public sculpture collection, many hotels, cafés, bars, and star chef restaurants all working together to support and reinforce the unique qualities of the Arts District. 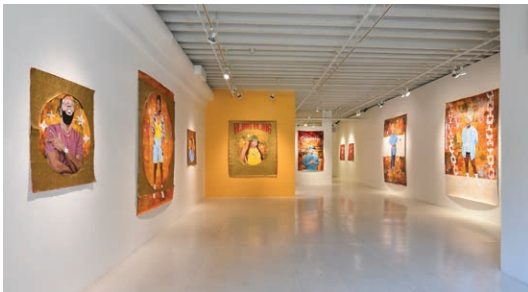

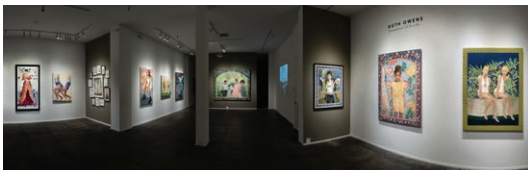

Ayo Scott originally painted as a means of letting go of life's curveballs, such as the death of his father, grad school and post-Katrina New Orleans. Those curveballs brought grief, but also a purpose to Scott's art. After seeing the face of a city change so quickly, he began creating to preserve and magnify pieces that make the city special. While much of his work is abstract, his subject is now focused on ways to celebrate the defenders of the spirit of New Orleans.

As the son of the late artist, Xavier professor, and MacArthur Genius, John T. Scott, his mural is an ode to generations of New Orleanians, with depictions of his father's well-known public sculptures *Spirit House* and *Ocean Song* and his young daughter dressed as Wonder Woman holding a daisy as tribute to his mother.

Etam Cru's murals are rich in Eastern European references and folkloric symbolism. The untitled mural depicts a reflective Polish man, a close friend of the group, sitting in a quiet room largely dominated by a traditional Polish rug. The scene contains other Polish references, which the group wishes to be discovered by the viewer. As with their existing mural portfolio, the duo challenges the viewer to stop, reflect, and engineer a story "in their own heads."

Williams' work involves figures and narratives, featuring complex color combinations, and rhythmic patterns inspired by geometries found in nature and through cultural echoes of African diasporic memory. The word "Alaafia" in Yoruba language means peace, tranquility, calmness, and good tidings coming from the person that says the word.

"In my journey as an artist, I have found that my creative impulses and social convictions and spirituality have harmonized. Through a sense of self-discovery and awareness, with this mural, I intend to create a work of art that is strongly connected to a familiar presence. For many years, I have been drawn to the African American traditions of quilt making. This interest has expanded to textiles, tapestries, and African fractals. All of these elements are integrated to create an abstract narrative that attempts to connect to the human condition, revealing dreams of peace and tranquility in the consciousness of people both present and departed." -Carl Joe Williams

Using homemade tools, adapted masonry techniques, and a lifelong study of color theory, MOMO makes non-representational murals that are finely tuned while remaining simple and universal. "My paintings have no theme or meaning, like music without lyrics. There's a composition of things to be felt, the way rhythms, tones, and harmonies reach us beyond narrative or language." -MOMO.

OPEN HOUSE is a mural and an invitation. The mural depicts a life-size section through a late 19th century New Orleans home. Illustrated in black linework on a white background, the mural reveals a domestic interior rarely exposed in totality. Like an open house, it transforms the private home into a public space. *OPEN HOUSE* also invites visitors to become temporary inhabitants. The floor of the house is drawn level with the sidewalk, creating a two-dimensional stage set replete with domestic props. Walk through passively or act out — jump on the bed, shower with your clothes on, hold court around the fireplace mantel. Either way, make yourself at home.

Survive is a collaboration between the Young Artist Movement (YAM) and Brandon "B-Mike" Odums. The theme, created in collaboration with YAM students, reflects New Orleans' joyful resilience. The students' work is represented by a body of water composed of words and images that symbolize the reality of living in New Orleans. Here, a smiling father gives a child swimming lessons. The father and child represent the people of New Orleans, learning to survive in the water.

Jessica Strahan is a native New Orleanian who is inspired by the vibrancy of the Crescent City, as well as the African diaspora. Self-taught, she creates portraits that amplify the African influence on New Orleans culture, from the city's neighborhood cultural practices to its shotgun architecture and culinary traditions to the facial features and hair stylings of its residents. Taking inspiration from the food we eat and the connection it has to our heritage, the portraits in *You Are What You Eat* combine people with the food and fabrics from their culture. This mural was created in partnership with students from the New Orleans area and depicts family life reflecting New Orleans community strength and resilience.

Danaé Brissonnet from Quebec, Canada specializes in public mural illustrations, mask making, and puppetry. Creating imagined worlds for the viewer, her work invites a deeper consideration into the power of symbolism, myth, and metaphor. *Ignite* is a homage to the rich history and culture of the BIPOC communities that have created the city. Brissonnet highlights the interconnectedness of resistance, resilience, and creative power of community in light of both the historical oppression and the natural world. Using elements of the natural environment, like the surrounding swamps and unique wildlife, Brissonnet's mural looks to touch the collective unconscious, using her wildly graphic and colorful style, bringing a narrative of the beauty of New Orleans to life.

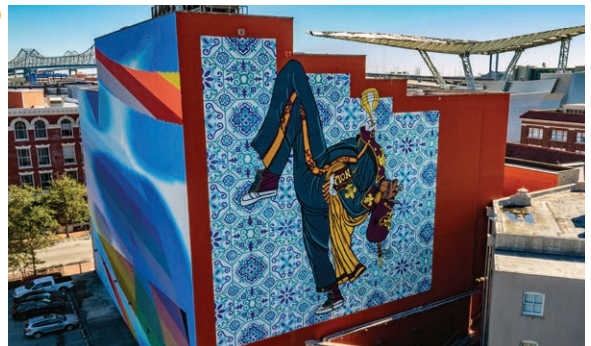

Just Us features a clouded sky punctured with the words "Just Us" in a cutout-style font that reveals alternative views of more clouds. *Just Us* both evokes "justice" and highlights an unnamed group "us" suggesting a multifaceted and nuanced nature of the idea of "justice." Here, the conflation of text and image questions notions of stability and consistency of meaning within language. Local artists, Wendo Brunoir, a New Orleans native and 2020 Best in Show winner of Ogden Museum of Southern Art's *Louisiana Contemporary presented by The Helis Foundation*, and New Orleans visual artist JoLean Laborde worked with Biggers to execute the mural.

Keith Duncan is a visual storyteller whose narrative artworks depict widely relatable imagery that is often specific to New Orleans. *Drum Major of NOLA* pays tribute to a grand tradition of marching band pageantry and performance at Historically Black Colleges and Universities. Dressed in an invented uniform decorated with the fleur-de-lis, the monumental acrobatic drum major additionally symbolizes the vibrant spirit and rich musical traditions synonymous with the city of New Orleans.

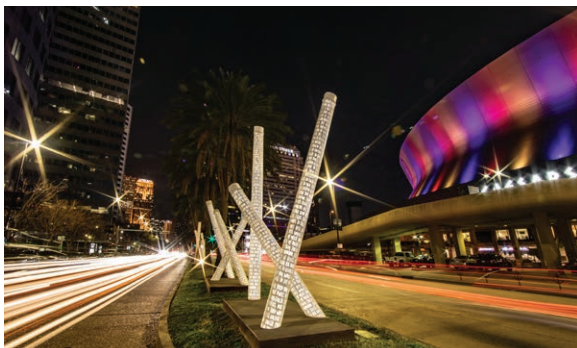
POYDRAS CORRIDOR SCULPTURE EXHIBITION

PRESENTED BY THE HELIS FOUNDATION

The Poydras Corridor Sculpture Exhibition presented by The Helis Foundation (PCSE) is the South's leading outdoor, rotating public sculpture exhibition in the heart of downtown New Orleans spanning Poydras Street between Convention Center Boulevard and N. Galvez Street. Since 2013, PCSE has featured over 40 sculptures along the Poydras Corridor, showcasing the work of renowned local, regional, and international artists. The vision of PCSE is to increase accessibility to interesting and inspiring sculpture for the residents of and visitors to one of New Orleans' most highly trafficked thoroughfares.

PCSE is a collaboration between The Helis Foundation, Ogden Museum of Southern Art, and the City of New Orleans Department of Parks and Parkways. The Helis Foundation is the exhibition's sole funder.

As the South's largest rotating public sculpture exhibition, with fourteen installations currently on view, Poydras Corridor Sculpture Exhibition presented by The Helis Foundation reinforces New Orleans' status as a leading international destination for the visual arts; creates economic and programming opportunities for a diversity of artists; and beautifies and provides visual interest to the heavily-trafficked vehicular and pedestrian artery connecting the Arts District, Central Business District, and historic French Quarter.

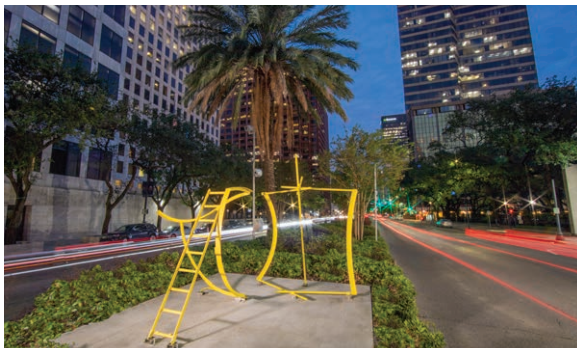

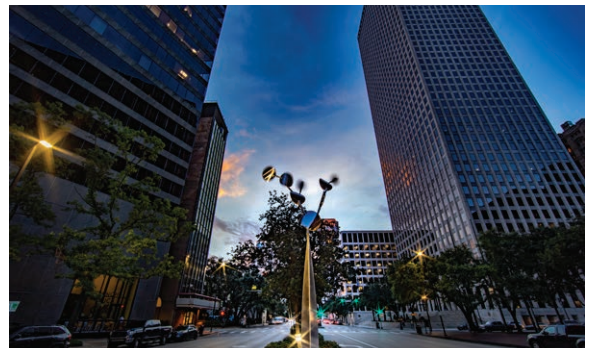
