With 424 campsites and 375 cabins, including winterized vacation rental cottages and cabins, Allegany is a true camper's paradise. The park's two developed areas, Red House and Quaker, have sandy beaches and hiking, nature interpretative programs, mountain biking and equestrian trails that double as cross-country ski and snowmobile trails in winter.

Midway State Park, right on Lake Chautaugua is one of

the oldest continually operating amusement parks in the nation. With the renovated 1928 roundhouse encasing the 1946 Allen Herschell carousel, this family-friendly park offers midway games, children's rides, go karts and



picnic shelters. Also Midway State Park located right on the lake, Long Point State Park has a marina and is a popular spot for muskellunge fishing.

Spectacular sunsets await you at Lake Erie State Park. take your pick from 100 campsites and 10 cabins seated on a bluff overlooking Lake Erie. Don't forget your binoculars, this park is a natural resting place for migrating birds

CENTRAL

Green Lakes State Park is a must see as the two aquahued glacial lakes will leave you mesmerized. Surrounded by forest, miles of trails, camping, a swimming beach and an 18-hole championship golf course, this park has it all.

Gilbert Lake State Park is known as the "wildlife" park of the region, featuring 135 campsites and 33 cabins. Or try **Bowman Lake State Park**, known for its spacious 180 campsites, 7


the eastern end of Oneida Lake, Verona Beach State Park boasts 49 campsites and outstanding shaded picnic areas. Pixley Falls State Park offers visitors a dramatic

50-foot waterfall, 22 stream-side campsites and



miles of trout streams. Chenango Valley State Park features two glacier-created kettle lakes, superb camping and an 18-hole golf course.

Visit the impressive 19th century **Fort Ontario State** Historic Site. From the French and Indian War through World War II, this star shaped fort played an important part in military history. Nearby **Sandy Island Beach State Park** offers a wide expanse of white sandy beach and a portion of a 17-mile stretch of protected dune and wetland system. Located on the heights above Lake Ontario, Selkirk Shores State Park is home to some of the finest fishing in the state and spectacular sunsets.



Hike, bike, canoe, kayak, or snowmobile at the Old Erie Canal State Historic Park. This 36-mile linear park runs alongside a historic waterway. Picnic creek-side at Chittenango Falls State Park as the water cascades ove

limestone terraces. Explore nearby Cazenovia and Lorenzo State Historic **Site** to tour the Lincklaen family's 1807 Federal-style home and formal gardens overlooking Cazenovia Lake.

FINGER LAKES Regional Office: 607-387-7041

At Buttermilk Falls, Robert H. Treman, Stony Brook or Fillmore Glen State Parks, swim at the base of a waterfall, hike along the rim of a gorge and camp in a wooded glen. Take your time and walk a gentle trail through a rugged canyon at Taughannock Falls State Park to glimpse one of the highest waterfalls in the east, plummeting 215 feet on its way to Cayuga Lake. Allan H. Treman State Park, one of seven marinas in the region and one of the largest inland marinas in New York State, has 381 seasonal and transient slips and

also provides access to Cayuga Lake.

The experience at Watkins Glen State Park is truly unforgettable. Winding paths and steps will lead you over stone bridges, and behind waterfalls. Later relax at the Olympic sized pool or one of 305 campsites.

Taughannock Falls State Park



Known for its white sandy beaches and panoramic lake views from the campsite bluffs, Fair Haven Beach State **Park** is also great for boating and fishing. Anglers will fall madly in love with **Keuka Lake State Park** for its trout, bass and salmon, and Cayuga Lake State Park for its large- and small-mouthed bass, lake trout, salmon, perch and northern pike. Seneca Lake and Sampson State **Parks** offer a ton of water-based resources on Seneca Lake including a beach, marina and fishing, as well as a spray park at Seneca Lake. The Military Museum at Sampson draws visitors from all over.

For a change of pace visit Sonnenberg Gardens & Man-



sively preserved country estates from the Victorian era. A short drive northeas will bring you to Ganondadar State Historic Site. the location of a major 17thcentury Iroquois town and its massive granary See a full size

replica of a bark long house, walk the interpretive trails, and learn about the history of the Seneca people, their customs and beliefs.

GENESEE

Regional Office: 585-493-3600 Known as the Grand Canyon of the East, **Letchworth** State Park, is a 14,350-acre masterpiece. A wild 17-mile gorge carved by the Genesee River tumbles over water-

alls and meanders through the heart of the park, provid-



amid cliffs as high as 600 feet encircled by lush forests teeming with wildlife. Walk the scenic sevenmile gorge trail and be sure to visit the park's Humphrev Nature Center to learn more about Letchworth's geology

This spot is also the start location for whitewater raft rides Choose from the 270 campsites and 82 cabins, or attend a nature, history or performing arts program. The beautifully restored Glen Iris Inn houses guests in exquisite period rooms and serves elegant meals.

Oak Orchard Marine State Park, Silver Lake State Park, Irondequoit Bay Marine Park and Conesus Lake Boat Launch provide boaters easy access to a day on the water and great fishing. Explore the historic 90 mile Genesee

Lake Ontario, has superb Darien Lakes State Park fishing, several large swimming beaches, lakefront paths, great birding and a nature trail in the Yanty Creek Marsh

Also on Lake Ontario is Lakeside Beach State Park which offers fishing, picnicking, 2 disc golf courses and panoramic views that bring thousands of visitors to this serene park year after year.

LONG ISLAND

Jones Beach State Park, famous for its landmark water tower and popular sandy beach, is the most celebrated of the many parks on Long Island. The Theodore Roosevelt Nature Center features exhibits on beach ecology. Golfers can choose among five championship courses at the renowned Bethpage State Park or opt to hit the links at Montauk Downs State Park. Nissequogue River State Park connects with Sunken Meadow State Park allowing visitors to explore 153 riverfront acres of trails, saltwater



wetlands and wildlife habitats. Visitors can surf cast for striped bass at Camp Hero State Park. The boat basin at Captree State Park is popular with charter boats, and Connectquot **River State Park** Preserve is a favorite spot for fly fishermen Anglers can also enjoy some of the best surf fishing in





playgrounds picnic areas and a kid-designed carousel. Roberto **Clemente State** Park. located along the Harlem River in the Bronx offers year-round sports and athletics programs, cul tural and creative

Nothing will prepare you for your first visit to the spec-



Falls State Park. Only then will you understand what keeps millions of visitors returning year after year to the oldest state park in the country. For a complete Niagara experience, you nust board the

famous Maid of the Mist boats which will bring you front and center to the mighty falls. Afterwards, descend down into the gorge for the Cave of the Winds excursion bringing you under the falls and within arms reach of the thundering waters.

Passionate anglers will flock to the Niagara Gorge salmon run at Whirlpool and Devil's Hole State Parks, both with trails that travel 300 feet into the gorge. Nearby along the Niagara River is Earl W. Brydges Artpark, devoted to the visual and performing arts. Artpark offers a full spectrum of performances from Broadway musi-

cals to indie rock bands to cultural festivals. The park also offers nature trails, picnic facilities and fishing access. Fort Niagara State Park has access via two boat launches to the Lower Niagara River and Lake Ontario, hiking trails, swimming pools, playing fields and tennis courts. Adjacent to the park is Old Fort Niagara State Historic Site steeped in history and strategically located at the mouth of the Niagara River. This imposing fortification, built by the French in 1724 controlled access to the

Great Lakes and the westward route to the North American frontier. The site offers tours, programs and annual reenactment events. Thousands enjoy lake-

side camping annually,

especially at Four Mile

Creek, Golden Hill, and

Evangola State Parks



Golden Hills State Park

which has 82 campsites and each park has two yurts for those wanting to try something a little different! Check out the Buffalo waterfront and gorgeous Lake Erie at Buffalo Harbor State Park. With a 1000-slip marina, playground and dining options, the newest state park is not to be missed.

If you appreciate architecture and design do not miss the Darwin Martin House Complex, one of Frank Lloyd Wright's most celebrated Prairie style homes. Nearby, the 950-acre Beaver Island State Park offers a marina on the Niagara River, an 18-hole championship golf course, and a half-mile sandy beach for swimming. In the historic village of East Aurora sits Knox Farm State Park. This 633-acre original horse farm encompasses a variety of habitats for hiking, biking, horseback riding, walking or nature study.

PALISADES

In the mountains on the west bank of the Hudson River lies Bear Mountain State Park, home of the Trailside Museums and Zoo and the historic Bear Mountain Inn overlooking Hessian Lake. From the Perkins Memorial Tower, visitors can enjoy panoramic views of the Hudson Highlands, and on a clear day, the Manhattan skyline. Go boating, and fish in the lake, or in the Hudson. Swim in the enormous pool, picnic, hike, bike, cross-country ski or snowshoe on the trails. In winter, there is skating on the



Rock climbers are welcome at Minnewaska State Park Preserve's sheer ledges of the Shawangunk Mountain ridge that rises more than 2,000 feet above sea level. Explore the park on foot, by bike, on horseback or on cross-country skis along a 50-mile network of carriageways and trails.

History buffs will revel in the area's rich military heritage. Explore the exhibits and ruins at Fort Mongomery State Historic Site and learn why this fort was considered key to American defenses. A visit to the Washington's Headquarters State Historic Site in Newburgh is a must. This national landmark, and the nation's first stateowned historic site is where Gen. Washington brought the Revolutionary War to a close and helped shape a new American republic. Tour the visitor's center and see costumed interpreters at nearby New Windsor Cantonment to gain insight into the weaponry and activities of life as a Continental soldier. The site serves as home to the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor.

Sterling Forest State Park, a magnificent natural refuge. is just an hour northwest of New York City. This park's hiking trails feature

dense woodlands, lakes, marshes, and dazzling views of the New York-New Jersey Highlands. For a quick escape trv Rockland Lake State Park for its ina trail. swimmina

John Boyd Thacher State Park is known for its panoramic views of the Hudson and Mohawk valleys and the Adirondack and Green Mountains. Visit the Welcome Center to learn about the park's history and fossil-rich geology. Enjoy the dramatic views from the observation deck. The park offers miles of trails for hiking, biking, cross country skiing, snowshoeing and snowmobiling. Stay overnight at the park's Thompson's Lake Campground and visit the nature center for children's activities and environmental education. Swim at the sandy beach, rent a rowboat, fish or play volleyball.

Peebles Island State Park sits at the confluence of the Hudson and Mohawk Rivers with river views along miles of paths. Picnickers and fishermen come to relax, and winter visitors can cross-country ski, hike and snowshoe. At Crailo State Historic Site learn about Dutch life in the upper Hudson River Valley through exhibits and artifacts in this unique museum. Schodack Island State Park provides hiking trails and a boat launch along the Hudson River; bring your binoculars to spot some resident Bald Eagles.

On a forested mountain ridge Grafton Lakes State Park offers five ponds with excellent swimming and fishing and ice-skating in winter. Twenty-five miles of trails are open for hikers and equestrians in summer and to crosscountry skiers and snowmobilers in winter. In Hoosick Falls visit Bennington Battlefield State Historic Site where in 1777, American militiamen defeated General Burgoyne's forces. View the Interpretive signs, enjoy

the scenery and stop by the visitor's center in the nearby Barnett House.

Moreau Lake State Park offers rustic, tranquil campsites in the Adirondack foothills. Take a

drive north to Lake Champlain and explore Crown Point State Historic Site and marvel at the spectacular views and preserved ruins of Fort St. Frederic (1734) and His Majesty's Fort of Crown Point (1759).

TACONIC

At Clarence Fahnestock Memorial State Park, a short drive from New York City, one can be fully immersed in nature, camp amid oaks and hemlocks, swim at sandy Canopus Beach and soak in the magnificent views along miles of trails, including the Appalachian Trail. Camp at Taconic State Park, where swimming is available at the Ore Pit Pond and recreational opportunities available on the Harlem Valley Rail Trail. The challenging terrain of the park's extensive trails system also provides ac-

The exotically furnished interior, paintings, grounds, intricate stencils and exquisite views at the 250-acre estate will fill you with a sense of wonde

At James Baird State Park, play tennis or enjoy a round of golf at the Robert Trent Jones-designed championship course; or play 18 holes at Mills-Norrie State Park's Dinsmore Golf Course, one of the oldest public courses in the country. At the park's marina, anchor your boat overnight or for the season. For other water sports, try kayaking on the Hudson and on the nearby creeks from paddle centers at either Mills-Norrie or Annsville Creek, part of Hudson Highlands State Park Preserve.

THOUSAND ISLANDS Regional Office: 315-482-2593

Wellesley Island State Park on the St. Lawrence River is the largest camping complex in the region offering tent and trailer sites, cabins, a marina and four boat launches, as well as year-round activities found at its



Seaway Trail. Pitch a tent or Southwick Beach State Park rent a cabin, enjoy some of the best fishing in the northeast, picnic swim, and hike trails that wind through fields, forests and wetlands. Southwick Beach State Park on Lake

Find out how Americans held their ground during a surprise attack by British forces in 1813. At the far eastern portion of the region is Point au Roche State Park, with its expansive vistas of Lake Champlain and the Adirondack Mountains. This scenic park offers swimming, picnicking, hiking trails, cross country skiing and a boat launch, while Cumberland Bay State Park, with 2,700 feet of beach on Lake Champlain offers 152 campsites

For winter time activities, there's no better place to play in the snow than the Belleayre Mountain Ski Center, where 55 downhill trails, 8 lifts and a terrain park invite skiers and snowboarders of all abilities.

Today, there are over 10,400 miles of state-funded, interconnected snowmobiling trails across the state. The trail system passes through more than 47 counties and is maintained with the help of approximately 200 local snowmobile clubs. This vast network includes lands under the jurisdiction of State Parks, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), NYS Canal Corporation, local governments and many private landowners.

For winter family fun, take advantage of the variety of snowmobile trails and winterized cabins at many parks, including Allegany and Letchworth State Parks.

ADIRONDACKS

With nearly three million acres of "forever wild" Forest Preserve, the Adirondack Region offers some of the most wild and remote places in the state. With over 3,000 lakes and ponds and forty peaks exceeding 4,000 feet in elevation, this rugged landscape is a paradise for hikers and paddlers alike.

For breathtaking 360-degree views, hike into the High Peaks Wilderness and climb Mt. Marcy, New York's tallest peak. Experience backcountry solitude while canoeing in the Five



At any of more than 180 State Parks, boaters can choose to enjoy some of the best waterways in the state including the Atlantic Ocean, Great Lakes, Lake Champlain, Hudson, Mohawk and St. Lawrence Rivers, Erie Canal, and a multitude of small lakes and ponds. Select parks include marinas, launch ramps, while others may rent motor boats, canoes, kayaks or rowboats.

It is strongly recommended that everyone complete a boating safety course before venturing out on the water. Boating safety information along with a statewide list of Boating Safety Courses can be found at parks.ny.gov. Any motor boat operator born on or after May 1, 1996 is now required to have a boating safety certificate and be at least 10 years of age. All personal watercraft operators are required to have a boating safety certificate and be at least 14 years of age. Individuals may rent motor boats and personal watercraft, without the otherwise required certificate, provided they are given alternative instruction at the point of rental. The operator must be at least 18 years of age.
