Embark on an outdoor adventure along mountain terrain: venture off the beaten path on an ATV excursion with Appalachian Adventures, ride horseback through rolling foothills, test your strength and strengthen your family's bond with a ropes course challenge at Luray Caverns, or feel the wind on your face as you glide above the forest's canopy on a tour at Bear Mountain Ziplines.

Explore wide open spaces. Relax in cozy cabins. Fill your Page Valley days with care-free adventures and small-town excursions.



THINGS TO DO

Take in the sights of delicate stone formations and enormous chambers at **Luray Caverns**, the largest caverns in the eastern United States. Explore the caverns on paved, lighted walkways, and marvel at towering stone columns, shimmering draperies, and crystal-clear pools. Continue your adventure at Luray Caverns with stops at the **Car & Carriage Caravan Museum**, **Shenandoah Heritage Village**, and **Toy Town Junction**, included with every Luray Caverns ticket. Tickets for the **Garden Maze** — the largest evergreen hedge maze in the Mid-Atlantic — and **Rope Adventure Park** are also available for purchase.

Take in a different view of Page Valley from the **South Fork of the Shenandoah River** — the meandering river of “Oh Shenandoah” fame. Renowned for its beauty and opportunities for **fishing** and **boating**, the Shenandoah River in Page Valley stretches for 55 miles. **Public access points** facilitate opportunities to plan a wide variety of float trips of varying distances for the thousands of visitors who take to the South Fork each year. Page Valley outfitters help river-goers plan their trips, arrange transportation, and rent equipment.

Valley Float Trips

Whether it's by tube, kayak, or canoe, we've got float trip recommendations for you on the South Fork of the Shenandoah River in Page Valley. See the signs of the season and sweeping mountain views from the middle of the river. Soak up the sunshine, paddle through warm waters, and breathe in the fresh-air surroundings.

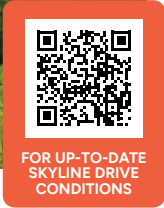
Public Boat Landings

The South Fork of the Shenandoah River in Page Valley begins at the confluence of the North River and South River near Port Republic, flowing north for 97 miles to meet the North Fork of the Shenandoah in Front Royal. Because of its northeasterly flow, locals often refer to the South Fork as being “up” the Valley.



Dramatic expanses of protected wilderness, fascinating historic sites, and the tradition of inspired recreation make **Shenandoah National Park** a must-see destination. “Ride the Sky” along **Skyline Drive**, savor regional specialties with farm-to-fork flavors at **Skyland** and **Big Meadows Lodge**, attend a wide variety of ranger-led events and **NPS programs**.

- More than 500 miles of trails, including 101 of the **Appalachian Trail**, lead visitors to panoramic views, waterfalls, protected wilderness, and preserved history in the Shenandoah Valley.
- Shenandoah — the first of **Virginia’s national parks** — was **dedicated on July 3, 1936**. The dedication was attended by U.S. President Franklin Roosevelt, an enthusiastic supporter of the park and Skyline Drive.
- The **Civilian Conservation Corps**, known as the CCC, played an integral part of the construction of many of the man-made features of Shenandoah, installing 136 miles of phone lines, constructing 1,145 miles of fire trails and 101 miles of hiking trails, and planting 147,595 trees and shrubs.



Skyline Drive

The National Scenic Byway rides along the crest of the Blue Ridge Mountains and through the heart of Shenandoah National Park.

- **Skyline Drive** rides the crest of the Blue Ridge Mountains for 105 miles through Shenandoah National Park and joins the Blue Ridge Parkway, which connects Shenandoah to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

The **George Washington National Forest** is one of the nation's most popular national forests and offers hiking, hunting, fishing, ATV riding, mountain biking, horseback riding, camping, fishing, and picnicking activities. Nearly 28,000 acres of Page County are included in this mountainous terrain, which harbors a wide variety of plant and animal life.

History & Culture

Native Americans lived in the area for about 15,000 years before the first Europeans arrived. European settlement of Page Valley began in the 1720s, and Page County was formed about a century later, in 1831. Most of these early settlers were Pennsylvania Germans who brought their farming practices and architecture with them, building sturdy log cabins and stone houses. The Valley's rich limestone soils of the bottomland attracted settlement and formed the basis of a diversified and robust agricultural economy that continues to the present day. In 1881 the Shenandoah Valley Railroad (now the Norfolk Southern) arrived, stimulating growth in Luray and in the railroad communities of Shenandoah and Stanley. Page Valley gained a reputation as a tourism destination with the opening of Luray Caverns, and the subsequent development of Shenandoah National Park and Skyline Drive in the 1930s.

The Shenandoah Heritage Village at Luray Caverns houses a spectacular collection of treasures, ranging from pre-contact Native American history through the present. The walkable village is a

re-creation of a small 19th-century farming community in Page Valley.

Here, you can explore beautifully restored historic buildings and cottage-style gardens as you learn about local history and traditions.



Geography

Page Valley is a geographically distinct branch of the larger Shenandoah Valley, bounded on the east by the Blue Ridge Mountains and on the west by the Massanutten Mountain. The highest point in Page Valley is Hawksbill Mountain (elevation 4,050 feet). The valley floor averages between 900 and 1,000 feet, and its lowest elevation (just under 600 feet) is where the South Fork of the Shenandoah River, the county's principal waterway, flows north out of the Valley.

Turn back time

This protected valley delights with its mesmerizing mountain views, hiking trails, rolling farmland, and winding back roads. Here, time moves a little slower, and vacations seem to last a little longer. Don't be surprised if you end up wanting to stay forever.

Big Meadows Lodge

Big Meadows Lodge is located one mile from the large, grassy meadow at mile 51 on Skyline Drive — a meadow which is ideal for gorgeous **night skies** viewing. Lodging accommodations range from main lodge rooms to detached small cabins, preferred and traditional rooms, suites, and pet-friendly rooms — all located within walking distance of the main lodge building.



Skyland

Skyland is nestled along mile 41.7 & 42.5 at Skyline Drive's highest elevation — 3,680 feet.

Lodging accommodations range from premium rooms to detached small cabins, preferred and traditional rooms, suites, and pet-friendly rooms — located in 28 separate buildings along the ridge and in the wooded areas on over 27 acres of Shenandoah National Park.

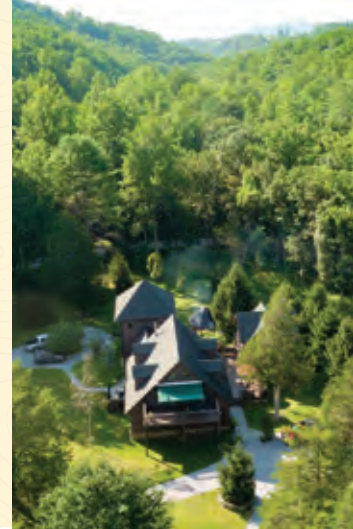

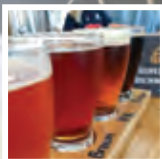

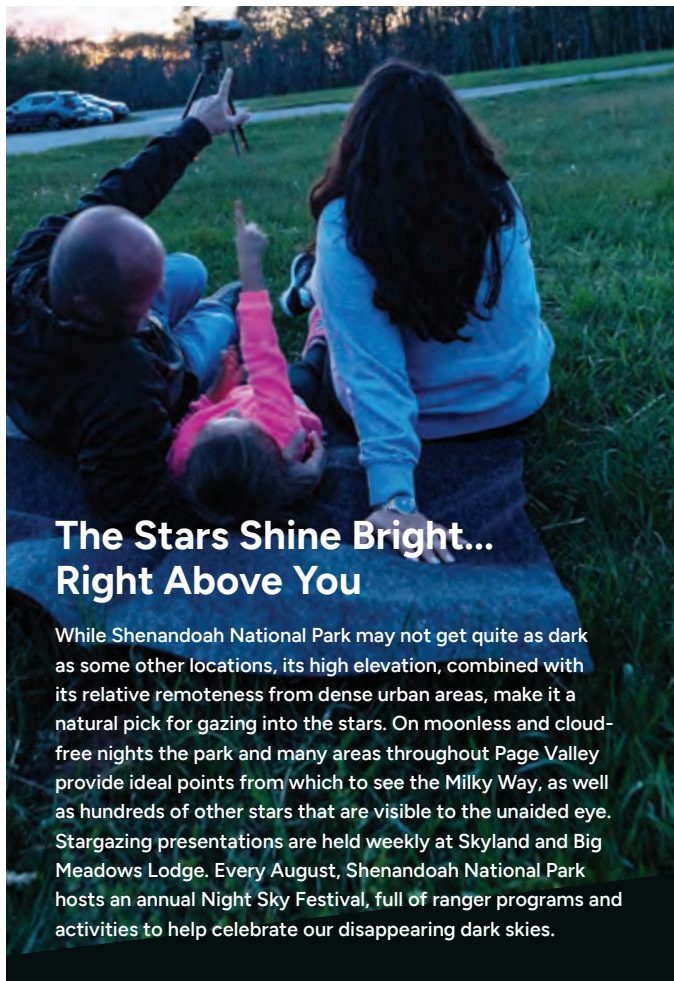

The Stars Shine Bright... Right Above You

While Shenandoah National Park may not get quite as dark as some other locations, its high elevation, combined with its relative remoteness from dense urban areas, make it a natural pick for gazing into the stars. On moonless and cloud-free nights the park and many areas throughout Page Valley provide ideal points from which to see the Milky Way, as well as hundreds of other stars that are visible to the unaided eye. Stargazing presentations are held weekly at Skyland and Big Meadows Lodge. Every August, Shenandoah National Park hosts an annual Night Sky Festival, full of ranger programs and activities to help celebrate our disappearing dark skies.
