

The kids found an entire colony of wild hermit crabs and tried to race them. As you can imagine it didn't work out and they were returned to their natural habitat unharmed.

A bit further down the beach we found giant driftwood that a previous visitor fashioned into a fort. The kids had a blast playing "Survivor," fully immersed in the peaceful isolation of this island until hunger set in and we realized we forgot to pack lunch. We contemplated going full survivor mode and making sashimi from the fish my husband caught but the little one put a stop

We made our way back down the path to the pick-up location for the Jetty Boat and I waited with my toes in the sand and a full heart, watching the sky fire off a brilliant orange, pink and purple.

When we got back to the mainland the fish cleaner at Fisherman's Wharf cleaned our catch and we walked over to Virginia's on the Bay, where they turned our fish into a gourmet meal. Mama even got a big 'ol frozen drink with a fun umbrella.

As we piled in the golf cart to head back to the condo my daughter asked, "Did that just happen?" and we just grinned at each other. To call it the perfect day would be an understatement. It was an adventure, almost too special to share. But we would have never found this treasure if someone hadn't shared it with me, so I'm passing on this gift to you.






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Quick & Easy · Grab-N-Go PICNICS

Conservation efforts do not stop at the shore but carry out into the Gulf as well. The dolphin population in the area is quite active year-round, providing moments of joy as they gracefully skip around the water. Port Aransas offers popular dolphin cruises, where visitors can enjoy an exciting adventure on the Gulf while learning about efforts to preserve the area's waterways.

Providing one of the most memorable dolphin excursions in Port Aransas, The Scarlet Lady offers a mix of entertainment and education. The Scarlet Lady is a 50-foot catamaran, ensuring a steady voyage during 90-minute daytime and sunset tours. Cruising along the Lydia Ann Channel, visitors see wild dolphins, sea birds and a picturesque view of the Lydia Ann Lighthouse.



Winging it

Be on the lookout for birds in Port Aransas, where whooping cranes winter and hundreds of native and migratory species mingle throughout the year. The Great Texas Coastal Birding Trail is a state-designated system of trails, bird sanctuaries and nature preserves along the Texas Gulf Coast. Port Aransas has six sites along the trail, making the area a must-see for avid birders and wildlife photographers. When the light hits just right, visitors feel like they have stepped inside an Impressionist painting at these popular birding areas.

Amos Rehabilitation Keep


A local point of pride, Amos Rehabilitation Keep (ARK), rescues and rehabilitates sea turtles and shore birds in the area while educating the public about the problems local wildlife endure from human encroachment. Texas State Aquarium

The Texas State Aquarium engages people with animals, inspires appreciation for bays and seas, and supports wildlife conservation.

Each year, thousands of protected, threatened, or endangered species along the Texas coast become ill or injured. Some have been impaired by predators, diseases, or other natural causes. Most are brought with problems caused directly or indirectly by humans. This includes entanglement in fishing line, nets, or lures, and even illegal harassment and shootings. With education and conservation initiatives. such as the Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation practices along with the "Going Green" program, perhaps visitors' experiences will lead to a better understanding of the importance of their own responsibilities in the environment.

Port Aransas features several opportunities for nature lovers and birding enthusiasts to experience; with Nature Preserves, Parks and Shorelines Port Aransas is the perfect getaway.

The Nature Preserve at Charlie's Pasture

The Nature Preserve at Charlie's Pasture is a vast 1280 acre property with uplands, sand flats, marshes, wooded motts and ponds that support a diversity of plants and animals. Hundreds of species of shorebirds, waterfowl and songbirds use the area to forage, nest, rest and refuel while undertaking strenuous migrations. This area has been dedicated as preserved land in an effort to protect these endangered, threatened and vulnerable species and provide visitors a glimpse back in time to the coastal prairie habitat that has all but disappeared from the Texas Coast. The Preserve's main entrance lies on Port St. adjacent to the Corpus Christi Ship Channel. A large pavilion overlooks tidal flats and is a gathering place for free activities like Nature Preserve Yoga (Tuesdays at 11:30 a.m.) and Nature Walks. The area is the trailhead for a mile of paved trail graced with lookouts of prairie and pond habitats and leads to the Port Aransas Community Park. A second 1/4 mile unpaved loop trail branches from the parking area on Port St. across from the restrooms and leads up and around Clay's Hill, a wooded area with adjacent cattail pond. Nature walks leave from the Community Park Saturdays at 8 a.m. Those who visit are reminded to stay on the trails, carry out litter

Leonabelle Turnbull **Birding Center**


The Birding Center can be found on the South end of Ross Ave. down the street from the Community Park. Pollinator gardens, a large mural, bird drips and educational signage flank the entrance to the site. A 700 ft boardwalk with shaded observation tower, provides visitors with expansive views of the freshwater marsh fed by the Nueces County Water District treatment plant and all of the diverse wildlife it attracts. A newly opened trail extends the path of the boardwalk along the shoreline toward the southern portion of the Nature Preserve at Charlie's Pasture. Future boardwalks will connect these sites as the Preserve is working on creating a system of interconnected nature areas. Visitors often see a large American alligator at this location along with ducks, pelicans, wading birds and songbirds. Birding on the Boardwalk is a free guided program on Wednesdays at 9 a.m.

Wetland Park

The Wetland Park overlooks tidal marshes along Hwy 361 across from the US Post Office. During wet periods and high tides, the basin is typically crowded with waterfowl, wading birds and shorebirds. A small gazebo and boardwalk provide visitors quick access to the marsh habitat. Visitors are encouraged to document their sightings on the chalkboard at the entrance to all the birding areas, including this one!

Joan & Scott Holt Paradise Pond

Paradise Pond is nestled in the 400 block of Cut Off Rd. behind Taqueria San Juan. It is one of only a few wooded natural freshwater ponds on Mustang Island. Short boardwalks and seating areas provide excellent access to a lush vegetation for hundreds of species of migrating songbirds in the spring and fall. This Preserve site is recognized as an important stopover for migrating birds along the Central Texas Coast. The site is currently undergoing habitat restoration after many invasive Brazilian peppertrees were removed and neighboring land was developed. Preserve staff have planted a variety of native trees and are expanding the property that will eventually connect via a walking path to the Community Park.



PRO TIPS: BUILDING A PROPER

Learn to build insta-worthy sandcastles in Port A!

1. Set up close to the waterline (works best when the tide is going out). Dig a hole to the water table, where the sand is saturated

with water. Stack the sand from your hole in a large pile to the dune side of your hole.



- · A bucket
- A 5-gal. paint bucket works well
- ·Shovel
- ·Plastic knife, fork, and spoon

2. Stir the sand and water in the hole till you get large patties of wet sand to scoop with your hands. This process can be duplicated in a bucket too.

- 3. Take a scoop of sand and water, plop it on top of the sand stack and pat gently on top of the stack. The idea is to make a pancake of wet sand. You want the water to wrap around the sand, so bring the water to the top of the pancake then pull your hand away to watch the sand go back down. Repeat the process until you have a tall stack of sand pancakes.
- 4. The goal is to get big scoops of sand and water. The larger in diameter the bottom pancake is, the taller your stack can go. When you build it as tall as you can, you are ready for your carving tools.
- 5. Use the carving tools (knife, fork, and spoon) to make a roof, bricks, windows, stairs, and doors. I use the knife to carve and block out the different features. The spoon and fork may be used for texturing and making windows. Use the tools gently to carve and shave the sand. Never poke, jab, stab, or hack at the sand. Have fun!



VISITORS FIND PORT A'S HISTORY WELL WORTH DIVING INTO

While vacations in Port Aransas are timeless, the history is as deep as the sea.

Like many other lucky Texans, I have countless childhood memories that are inseparable from Port Aransas and Mustang Island.

On spring and summer weekends, our family would pile into a packed suburban and head for the coast—with a chorus of "Are we there yet?" filling the air until we were finally aboard the ferry and throwing stale bread to circling seagulls. Once settled into the stilted beach house my parents owned until the mid-1980s, my brother and I would make a beeline for the beach, where we'd race out to the sandbar, frolic in the surf, hunt relentlessly for sand dollars and build drip castles under a circus-striped tent.

If we tired of these activities, we'd pester Dad to take us fishing on the jetty or fire up the metal detector so we could comb the beach for buried treasure.

As an adult, I've continued to visit Port Aransas regularly. With the family beach house long sold, I stay at the historic Tarpon Inn whenever possible (nothing beats the authenticity of lazing in a rocker on the wraparound porch). Beyond prerequisite beach time, I always try to spot the fantastically colored Roseate Spoonbills and the lounging alligator at Leonabelle Turnbull Birding Center, dine on fresh seafood at Shell's Pasta and Seafood and snap photos of candy-colored houses, quirky yard art and the Texas-size shark heads that guard the gift shops.

With its relaxed pace, unpretentious attitude and festive spirit, Port Aransas is easy to love. But like any other place on Earth, there's much more than meets the eye. A quick dig into local history reveals accounts of nomadic Karankawa people living off the land and traveling by canoe, wild mustangs running free, infamous pirate Jean Lafitte burying a treasure chest and marking his booty with a silver dagger, English





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immigrant Robert Mercer ushering in a ranching period and anglers from all over the world getting reeled in by the thrill of catching a "silver king" in the quaint fishing village once known as the "Tarpon Capital of the World."

See for Yourself

Thanks to the Port Aransas Preservation and Historical Association (PAPHA), visitors seeking cultural enlightenment can dive into some of these fascinating chapters at two homegrown institutions: the Port Aransas Museum and Farley Boat Works.


Situated in a restored kit house from the early 1900s, the Port Aransas Museum celebrates local history through rotating exhibits and permanent installations. Since opening in 2008, the volunteer-staffed museum has shed light on everything from the island's first inhabitants to the "taming" of the Aransas Pass-a complex saga involving "Spanish explorers, early 'Texians' and the armies of three warring nations." Highlights of the permanent collection include a dazzling lighthouse lens designed by French engineer Augustin-Jean Fresnel, a bronze bell from the train that transported the granite used to build the south jetty and film footage dating back to the 1920s. The museum also runs a historical database and a gift shop stocked with vintage photographs.

Billed as a "living exhibit," Farley Boat Works preserves the legacy of a family business that played a vital role in the tarpon boom that swept Port Aransas from the 1880s to the 1950s. Arriving in 1910, aspiring tarpon guide Barney Farley recognized the developing fishing village needed motorboats and shared the idea with his brother Fred, a master woodworker who established Farley and Son Boat Works in 1915. Built from solid wood planks and powered by old car engines, Farley Boats were designed with low sides and a high bow that helped them fight choppy waves, and open cockpits that allowed anglers to cast in any direction.

Led by guides versed in wrangling massive, thrashing tarpon, these handcrafted boats were at center stage for notable events such as the annual Texas Tarpon Rodeo (initiated in 1932) and an oft-cited fishing trip Barney Farley organized for President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1937. Although later models incorporated windscreens, marine engines and cabins, Farley Boats were always built out of solid wood (initially cypress and later mahogany) even after the popularization of fiberglass. In addition to displaying historic motorboats, Farley Boat Works offers boat-building workshops and is in the process of completing a 60-foot Scow Schooner "like the ones that plied our local waters in the days of sail."

Slated to open this year, the Maritime Museum will expand the PAPHA's scope significantly with 6,000 square feet dedicated to showcasing Farley Boats and facilitating restoration projects.

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



Five Tips for Fishing at the Jetty in Port Aransas

Fishing the south jetty can be an inexpensive way to put fresh fish in the cooler but it is also a serious test of your angling skills. The rocky edges of the south jetty are notorious for stealing tackle and tackling pride. Want to give it a go? Here are five tips for fishing at the jetties.

1. Pack the essentials


The trek down the jetty to your honey hole is a long one. From the shore to the tip of the last hunk of granite is just about a mile. But while carrying your gear, bait, provisions and hopefully a stringer full of fish, that mile feels like a marathon. Pro-tip: Pack only what you need. If you can't fit everything in a backpack, grab a rolling cooler or a jetty cart to help haul your gear.

2. Watch your step

Wearing a non-slick, rubber sole shoe can be the difference between an epic fishing trip and an adventure to the emergency room. The uneven rocks create a perfect habitat for small marine life, which in turn draws in the bigger fish anglers are after. However, those same rocks can be tricky to navigate loaded down with gear.

Avoid the dark spots on the rocks. Red, green and brown seaweed carpet the jetty just below the tide line. When the seaweed is dry, it is not a problem, but even the smallest amount of moisture, say from waves crashing on the rocks, and that innocent seaweed turns into a dangerous patch, slicker than ice.





3. Bring extra tackle

FACT: The jetty will steal your tackle. Do not fish like you are afraid to lose it. Imagine how much you will need on your worst day and bring more. See step 5 for a tackle saving tip!

4. Use live shrimp

Look for the white bait flag at Deep Sea Headquarters, Woody's and Port "A" Outfitters to grab at least a pint of shrimp per angler. Why use live shrimp? Because fish like it. All species of fish that frequent the jetty will eat live shrimp. Insert the hook under the horn, behind the eyes to secure your bait.

5. How to make a lemon bottle rig

This unusual rig is a secret of seasoned jetty anglers. The lemon bottle sets you up for good presentation and you are less likely to get snagged. Just remove the cap of a common lemon bottle and wrap the line around the threads, replace the cap to secure

> your line and tie off a 4 foot line to one eye in a 3-way-swivel rig. Off the other eye, tie 3 feet of 30 lb. fluorocarbon as your leader to the hook. Add a small split shot weight (two if the current is strong), 10 to 12 inches above the hook to keep your shrimp swimming down and you're all set.



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



Party on the Bay


